Ray Willsey - Maryland Commandos Head Coach

Last season Ray Willsey and Bob Mischak teamed, along with Lew Erber, to coach the Los Angeles Cobras. Each a veteran NFL Raiders' coach, the three took their outdoor way indoors and gutted to a 5-6-1 record finishing strong by defeating and tieing the undefeated Bruisers on the final two weekends of the season. Willsey and Mischak have shifted east to Maryland this summer. A decade with John Madden and Tom Flores, Willsey earned two Super Bowl rings and coached defense, offense and special teams over the tenure.

A collegiate QB for the Cal Bears ('51-'52) and later a three-time All-Pro DB with CFL Edmonton ('53-'55), he won two Grey Cup rings adding player-coach duties during his final season. Willsey coached with Darrell Royal at Washington and Texas moving into the NFL in St. Louis ('60-'61) and Washington ('62-'63) before being summoned back to his alma mater in '64 to rebuild. He added AD responsibilities in '68 going 40-42-1 in eight seasons ('64-'71). Returning to St. Louis in '73 as Don Coryell's assistant head coach and defensive coordinator, his five year's there reaped two divisional titles. In '78 coach Willsey moved back to the Bay Area and Al Davis' Raiders.

Maryland Commandos Team History

Another Arena Football League charter member has returned after a one-year hiatus. The Maryland, originally Washington, Commandos will play in two different home venues this season, the Capital Centre in Landover, Maryland and the Baltimore Arena.

The Commandos played in the first-ever AFL game losing a close one on the road to the Pittsburgh Gladiators, 48-46, on June 19, 1987. Despite a 2-4 record during the inaugural schedule, head coach Bob Harrison's Commandos drew a respectable 11,525 fans per home game. Their two victories came at the expense of the two eventual ArenaBowl '87 combatants, the Denver Dynamite and Pittsburgh. They also share the distinction, with Denver, of playing in the highest-scoring game in League history, Denver 73, Washington 57. QB Rich Ingold, first-team All Pro in '87, threw eight Commando TDs, his counterpart, QB Whit Taylor, threw ten. Ingold's primary receiver Dwayne Dixon, another first team All-Pro, caught 68 passes, a League best, for eleven touchdowns in six games.
