Following tonight's exhibition fracas against the ambitious expansionist Albuquerque Six-Guns, the Golden Eagles resume training in preparation for the start of "Season V" next Tuesday, Oct. 9 vs. the Denver Spurs. And they hope to transcribe that "V" into Valor and Victory.

Let's take a quick thumbnail preview of the five other Western League competitors.

The Portland Buckaroos have the steepest climb ahead of them if they are to reach playoff contention during the 1973-74 campaign, and they may also ice the most improved club in the circuit. Last year found the Bucks in the very unaccustomed position of not only failing to reach the playoffs, but finishing dead last in the standings. This season, under the aegis of the parent Los Angeles Kings, the Bucks have made more changes in personnel and coaching than any other club. Just five returnees from the Portland hal-

cyon years return: high-scoring center Art Jones, ageless Andy Hebenton (who had an outstanding training camp and exhibi-

tion season), fleet center/left winger Ken Campbell, canny defenseman Mike Donaldson and goaltender Dave Kelly. Rick Charron, former Buck, Eagle, Roadrunner goalie was reacquired and tough defenseman Larry McNabb will be skating for the Bucks. The new coach is Ron Stewart, former N.H.L. stalwart forward, who is attempting to meld the veterans with many swift young skaters from the Kings organization.

The Seattle Totems came within an eyelash (and an unexpected Den-

The Denver Spurs, the Eagles' opponents next Tuesday, made it to the playoffs last season, and fell before the Golden Eagles in a swift, wellplayed five-game series. Their new coach, former ace defenseman Bob McCord, figures to have a talented

crew: so confident is McCord that he let outstanding center Murray Keogan drift away to Phoenix, several other young skaters went

to San Diego, and Chuck Hamilton and Claude LaForge were released. To replace proven pros such as those, the Spurs figure to have an abundance of good young talent. Jack Borotsik, a good scorer, is back and the Spurs might retain Mike Lampman, a letfwinger who had the best goals/games ratio. If goalie Bob Johnson returns to his champion form of two years ago, the Spurs could be plenty sharp.

The San Diego Gulls, third-place finishers last year, have to make up the loss of MVP and All-Star goalie Ken Broderick, but with the tough defensive corps in front of whomever is manning the nets, they may very

Just in front of them will be veteran defenseman John Miszuk, Al Lebrun, Jim Graham, Roger Lafreniere (obtained from Denver) and Connie Madigan. The forwards show classy vets and speedy youngsters: the former include Gerry Goyer, Bob Courcy, Willie O'Ree, George Swarbrick and Jim Stanfield; some new youngsters include Mike Bloom, Al Genovy and Laurie Yaworski. Coach Jack "Tex" Evans promises another tough squad this season.
