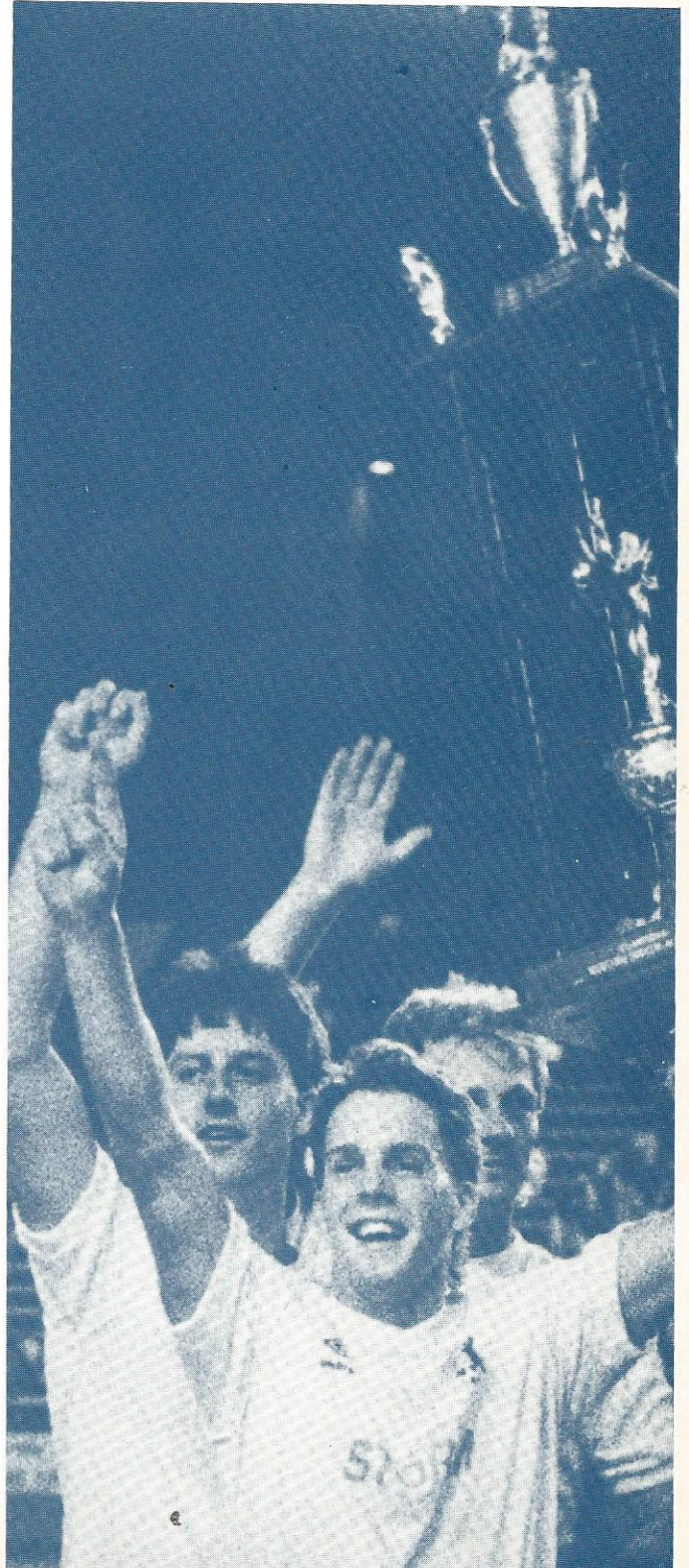

HISTORICAL DATES

- 1983 Football Club Seattle founded and begins play in the Washington state men's premier league
- May 3, 1984 Challenge Series announced with FC Seattle select team to play three North American Soccer League clubs and the U.S. Olympic Team at Memorial Stadium.
- June 10, 1984 Inaugural game against the Vancouver Whitecaps features Bruce Raney scoring the first FC Seattle goal after just 45 seconds. A late goal by Doug Backous secures a 2-2 tie.
- Aug. 4, 1984 First victory comes on the road at B.C. Place Stadium as Raney gets game-winner in 2-1 win.
- Feb. 25, 1985 Clubs announces plans to go professional in 1985. Bruce Rioch hired as coach.
- June 9, 1985 Brian Schmetzer's two quick goals gives Seattle a 2-1 victory over Santos.
- July 3, 1985 Seattle joins San Jose, Portland and Victoria in forming the Western Alliance Challenge Series, forerunner of the Western Soccer League. Later that day, in the first league game, Raney scores three goals in record 6-1 win at Portland.
- Sept. 27, 1985 Jim Gabriel succeeds Rioch as head coach. Bill Sage replaces Jack Brand as president.
- Dec. 4, 1985 FC Seattle adopts nickname Storm.
- July 4, 1986 Fire damage to Memorial Stadium turf forces Storm to play their final four games in Renton.
- Oct. 14, 1986 Tommy Jenkins replaces Gabriel as head coach.
- May 17, 1987 Storm clinches WSL playoff berth after closing season with three straight wins.
- July 31, 1987 Seattle ties English first division club Queens Park Rangers 2-2 in London at the midway point of five-game tour of Great Britain.
- July 9, 1988 Over 7,000 fans attend doubleheader featuring Sounders Reunion game and Storm 3-2 overtime victory over Portland.
- July 17, 1988 John Hamel scores two goals as Seattle beats San Jose 3-1 on the road to clinch home-field advantage in WSL Championship Game.
- July 30, 1988 Storm gets two quick goals from surprise starter Bob Bruch and rolls over San Jose 5-0 for the WSL title.
- Aug. 16, 1988 Tad Willoughby nets two goals as Storm earns 2-2 draw with England's Hull City during the club's second British tour.
- April 5, 1989 Storm acquires U.S. National Team scoring leader Brent Goulet from England's Bournemouth.
- May 2, 1989 Rick Davis, all-time leader in U.S. National Team caps, joins the Storm.

SEATTLE STORM HISTORY

It began as an after-hours brainstorm by some of the Northwest's most notable soccer figures. In the six years since, Football Club Seattle has grown from a noble experiment to fledgling club to become the Seattle Storm, the flagship franchise in American soccer.

Today the Storm serves as the model for the emerging ranks of U.S. professional soccer. But back in 1983 the concept was quite novel: a grassroots organization comprised primarily of young, local talent testing themselves against the very best.

Originally the plan was very modest. A group of ex-Seattle Sounders, college coaches and friends got together to form an over-30 entry in the local league. But one night, as pizza after pizza was devoured and the empty beer cans mounted, more and more teams were added.

With Bellevue businessman Bud Greer's blessing and funding, FC Seattle set out on a mission to develop young local talent, and provide the very best players to test their skills against top-flight competition. So in 1984, after a successful run in the state premier league, FC Seattle, a team of local amateurs, challenged three North American Soccer League clubs and the U.S. National Team in a four-game series.

On June 10, 1984, the idea became reality as FC Seattle met the Vancouver Whitecaps in their inaugural game. And the reality quickly took the shape of fantasy as Seattle scored first, just 45 seconds after the opening kickoff. Even more dramatic was the finish. Behind 2-1 with five minutes remaining, and with some 6,000 fans urging their native sons goalward, Seattle equalized off a corner kick. The objective had been to be competitive and not get blown out. The result was far better than expected, a 2-2 tie with the eventual NASL West champions.

FC Seattle posted its first victory under even more trying circumstances. Playing their first road game at Vancouver's plush B.C. Place Stadium, they defeated the Whitecaps 2-1 on a late goal.

Since that time FC Seattle and the Storm, as they are now known, have fast developed a reputation as giant killers. Among their victims are Santos of Brazil, the Canadian World Cup team and England's Norwich City and Middlesbrough.

Following the demise of the NASL, the Storm spearheaded an effort to re-establish league soccer on a semiprofessional level. In 1985 Seattle was one of four founding members of the Western Soccer Alliance, the forerunner of today's Western Soccer League. The WSL is now in its fifth season of existence, with each of the nine clubs following Seattle's lead and focussing their energies on developing local, homegrown talent.

The Puget Sound area has proven to be a gold mine for young talent, and the Storm has been successful in attracting the top players to their ranks. Eleven Storm players, including six current team members, have experience in the U.S. National Team programs. The Storm's latest acquisition, Brent Goulet of Tacoma, has led Team USA in scoring over the past three years. FC Seattle's women's team, the Cozars, feature eight U.S. internationals.

Besides the Storm and Cozars, FC Seattle actively sponsors several charitable causes, particularly the Cystic Fibrosis Foundation and Special Olympics.

Not only has the Storm concept been applauded, so has their play. They have won 60 percent of the matches versus league opposition, and have never finished lower than second in the WSL standings. Last year they were crowned as WSL Champions for the first time, defeating San Jose 5-0 in the title game before 4,400 fans.

However, Seattle is never content it rest upon its laurels. The Storm has twice toured Great Britain to face professional teams on their own turf. In ten games against Scottish and English opposition, they have earned three ties, including a 2-2 draw with First Division Queens Park Rangers in 1987. Always on the leading edge of American soccer, the Storm is now a moving force behind the development of a nationwide professional league before 1992.

SEATTLE STORM MANAGEMENT



WILLIAM C. (BILL) SAGE
President

Bill Sage begins his fourth season as president of the Seattle Storm, often regarded as the flagship of American soccer. Sage is in his third term as chairman of the Western Soccer League, and also serves on the United States Soccer Federation's ad hoc professional league rules committee.

Sage, 42, has been involved in significant progress on all three fronts. Last year team attendance increased by 103 percent, to nearly 2,400 per game. The Storm also made their second overseas excursion, playing a five-game schedule against English League clubs.

Under Sage's direction the WSL has increased in number and national exposure. The league added three new cities and membership is at an all-time high of nine franchises. The USSF committee is currently paving the way for a new national league, to be in place by 1992.

Sage succeeded Jack Brand as president in 1985, after serving as vice-president for marketing. He joined the organization earlier that year after a nine-year career in politics and law.



DAVE GILLETT
General Manager

Dave Gillett is no stranger to soccer in Seattle, having been involved non-stop with the sport locally since his days as an original Sounder in 1974. A member of the Storm front office team since 1984, Gillett is now in his second season as GM.

Gillett, 38, first became involved in professional soccer at age 16, signing with his local club, Hibernian of Edinburgh, Scotland. He played five years in both the Scottish and English leagues, before coming to the Sounders on loan from Crewe Alexandra. He was with Seattle for seven seasons, and was a stalwart defender for the Soccer Bowl '77 squad.

From 1980-81, he played for a number of teams, both indoors and outdoors. He returned to the Puget Sound area in 1982, and later came aboard the Storm management team. He has previously served as coaching director, ticket manager and camps director.

SEATTLE STORM COACHING STAFF

TOMMY JENKINS
Head Coach



Tommy Jenkins, a member of the Storm staff since its inception, begins his fourth year as head coach, having guided the team to storybook season in 1988. Last year the club set numerous records en route to a 10-2 league record and the Western Soccer League Championship.

Under Jenkins, 41, Seattle has won 15 of 22 WSL games and has qualified for the playoffs each of the past three years. Jenkins's overall record of 21-20-5 includes two victories and a tie with teams from the English First Division. He also devotes his energies to FC Seattle's Special Olympics and Cystic Fibrosis programs.

Jenkins began his playing career in 1967 with England's Reading FC. He played nine years in Britain before being purchased by the Seattle Sounders in 1976. The crafty midfielder played for the Sounders through 1980, then completed his career with three seasons in the Major Indoor Soccer League.

Jenkins has been a member of the coaching staff since the maiden season of 1984, when he directed the FC Seattle Challenge Series squad. After serving as an assistant coach during 1985-86, he succeeded Jim Gabriel as head coach in 1987.

JEFF STOCK
Assistant Coach



Jeff Stock begins his third season as assistant coach after retiring from play following knee surgery late last season. Stock was an all-Western Soccer League choice at defender the past two seasons.

Stock, 28, signed his first professional contract with the Seattle Sounders in 1978, after graduating from Tacoma's Stadium High School. He became a regular starter in 1981 and played for the Soccer Bowl '82 team. In 1984 he joined the Vancouver Whitecaps, and later moved indoors with the Tacoma Stars from 1984-86.

TONY CHURSKY
Assistant Coach



Tony Chursky becomes the newest member of the Storm coaching staff, joining the team this year. He will pay particular attention to the development of the team's goalkeepers.

Chursky, 35, is legendary throughout the Puget Sound area for his goalkeeping exploits with the Seattle Sounders (1976-78) and Tacoma Stars (1983-85). A native of Vancouver, B.C., he also was a regular member of the Canadian National Team in the late '70s.

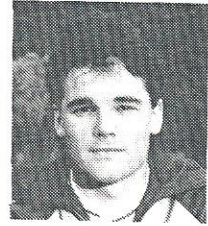

Second team all-WSL that year. **CAREER:** Played two years in outdoor pros with Seattle ('83) and San Jose ('84) of the NASL. Drafted by Sounders in third round in '82. Played three seasons (1984-87) with Tacoma and San Diego of the MISL. San Diego won MISL title in 1986. Joined Memphis of AISA in '87...Attended Federal Way High School. **PERSONAL:** Born August 31, 1964 in Honolulu, Hawaii.

STORM: First season with Storm and first season of outdoor club soccer since 1984...Coming back from second knee operation in six months, the latter performed in February...Will be on loan agreement from U.S. National Team and his status will be subject to availability. **CAREER:** Compiled perhaps the most impressive credentials of any modern day American player during the '80s. Capped a record 41 times by the U.S. National Team, and has been a regular member of that squad since 1977. Also leads USA in career goals with nine. Captain of USA for several years...Member of the U.S. Olympic Team in 1984 and '88...Traveled to over 70 countries during his career. Played in FIFA World All-Star Game in 1982. ..Eleven-year veteran of professional leagues. Began career in 1978 with New York Cosmos. Named North American Player of the Year in 1979...All-NASL in 1983...Played on Soccer Bowl championship teams in '78, '80 and '82...Signed with St. Louis of MISL in 1983. Joined Tacoma in 1986. MISL All-Star in 1984-85 and '88. Has since made the Puget Sound area his home...One-year letterman at Santa Clara before signing with Cosmos. **PERSONAL:** Born November 24, 1958 in Denver. ..Graduated from Damien High School in LaVerne, California in 1977. Starting fullback for Sounders in 1982-83. Converted 8 of 9 penalty kicks in drive to Soccer Bowl '82. Came to Sounders from England's Stoke City, but had earlier stint with St. Louis and California (1977-78). Former England Youth International. Made 390 English League appearances with Tottenham Hotspur, Millwall, Fulham and Stoke. PERSONAL: Born September 20, 1949 in London...Employed in auto sales.

CAREER: Capped five times by the U.S. National Team in 1984. Leading scorer for U.S. youth team in 1982-83... Played four seasons in professional ranks, including seasons with Seattle and Tulsa of the NASL, New York of the MISL (21 games/3 goals) and Fort Wayne and Milwaukee in the AISA...Came off the bench to score his first two professional goals in 1983 at New York, sending the game into overtime. 5-11, 178, Tacoma, Wash.

STORM: Entering his first full tour of duty with Seattle...Played and started five games during 1987 tour of Great Britain, scoring two goals during that brief stay. Sufficiently impressed second division AFC Bouremouth and became first native-born American to sign with English club...Deceptive speed and clinical finishing have made him the most feared striker ever produced in U.S. ..Acquired from Bournemouth and playing on loan from U.S. National Team...Expected to miss portion of season while playing for U.S. in World Cup Qualifiers. **CAREER:** Member of U.S. National and Olympic teams from 1986 on. Has 10 full caps (as of 4/6) and six goals, ranking fourth in U.S. career scoring. Hit for three goals in '87 Olympic qualifier versus Trinidad & Tobago, the first American international hat trick in over 20 years...Spent 1987-88 season with Bouremouth, playing in six first-team games...Loaned to fourth division Crewe Alexandra for three games, scoring three goals...Played for former Sounders Harry Redknapp and Jim Gabriel at Bournemouth...Enters this season as WSL career scoring leader with 15 goals, despite missing past season and a half. First team all-WSL with FC Portland in '86 and '87, and voted Player of the Year the latter season...Set collegiate scoring records with 111 goals in four seasons at Warner Pacific College. Four-time all-conference, twice Player of the Year. Led Warner to third place at NAIA nationals as a sophomore. **PERSONAL:** Brent A. Goulet was born June 19, 1964 in Cavalier, North Dakota...Graduated from Tacoma's Foss High School in 1983.

Co-leader in points that season with 11 points, including two-goal game against San Diego. Got another big score in 2-2 tie with England's Queens Park Rangers in '87 tour. **CAREER:** Four-year starter at University of Washington, all-conference three of those seasons. Voted all-Far West in '88...Member of Sporthaus team in state premier league, and state select team member from 1982-84...Attended Seattle's Blanchet High School. **PERSONAL:** Born January 31, 1967 in Seattle...Older brother Fred was a prep all-American and a member of the Seattle Sounders from 1981-82, and later played for San Jose of the WSL.

5-11, 180, Seattle, Wash. (Seattle Prep)

STORM: Fourth season with club, with his first association dating back to maiden season of 1984...Set season scoring record with eight goals last year, and voted first-team all-WSL. Also holds Storm standards for shots in game, season and career. ranks no. 2 in career scoring and no. 4 in assists...Had two-goal game against Los Angeles, and scored in four straight games at one stretch... Finished fifth in league scoring with 13 points, despite missing first two WSL games...Third-leading club scorer in '86...Saw limited action as a substitute in abbreviated '84 schedule. **CAREER:** Spent a little more than two years with Tacoma Stars, seeing limited action from 1986-87. Earned a starting post early in 1988-89 but was later released... 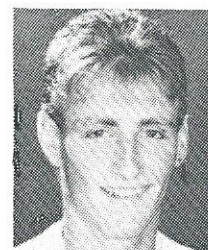

MEDIA INFORMATION

Press Credentials: Press credentials are limited strictly to those writers, broadcasters and photographers who are actually involved in game coverage. Requests for credentials should be addressed to either Frank MacDonald or Joan Rothrock, and should be made well in advance of any given game. Absolute deadlines are one full business day prior to a home game. Parking permits are limited and will be allocated on a space-availability basis.

Photographers: Field photographers may shoot from the sideline area, except in the area of team and official benches. Endline restrictions range from four feet beyond the corner flags to 10 feet behind the goals.

Telephones: Touchtone telephones are located both in the press box and in an area adjacent to the home locker room at Memorial Stadium. Long distance calls are to be billed collect or to a credit card number.

Services: Accredited media will be furnished with lineups, and halftime and final statistics as soon as possible. Game notes, programs and media guides will be available in the press box at least 45 minutes prior to kickoff. A light meal will be available prior to kickoff.

Memorial Stadium: Memorial Stadium is located on the Seattle Center grounds, 500 feet north of the Space Needle, and approximately 25 minutes from Sea-Tac Airport. To get to the stadium, take I-5 North and exit to Fairview/Mercer Street/Seattle Center (a lefthand lane offramp). Media parking is located in the west end of the stadium.

Post-game Interviews: According to Western Soccer League rules, each team is entitled to a 10-minute cooling off period once the entire team party has arrived in the locker room following the game. Each team is to remain available for interviews up to 40 minutes after the game is completed.
