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CAN FIRE GIVE HOTFOOT TO TEXANS?

The World Football League becomes leather popping reality for Chicago fans on Wednesday night, July 10, when the Chicago Fire faces the Houston Texans in Soldier Field.

Ironically, the key word for both infant football teams is experience. There will be plenty of players who know their way around the yard markers at the 8:15 p.m. kickoff.

Quarterback Virg Carter . . . tackle Steve Wright . . . linebackers Ron Porter and Rudy Kuechenberg . . . wide receiver Jim Seymour . . . running back Cyril Pinder . . . center Guy Murdock. These are Fire performers who took the big league football test and were not found lacking. Now they're ready to test the Texans and the rest of the WFL.

For the Texans, coach Jim Garrett has put together a contingent of 25 players with at least one year's experience in the National Football League or Canadian Football League.

Garrett, former defensive coach with the New York Giants, will unveil a front four of Jim Kanicki, Al Dotson, Don Brumm and Joe Robb. That's 44 years of pro experience and the heart of what Garrett calls "the best defensive team I've ever had."

That's tall talk, even for a Texan, because Garrett's New York defense of 1972 limited opponents to 247 points, an average of 17.6 points a game, second lowest total in Giants' history.

Texan quarterbacks are Mike Taliaferro, a nine-year NFL vet, and Harry Theofiledes, a fine passer who had the misfortune of trying to win a spot on teams that already had Sonny Jurgensen and Joe Namath.

Other names familiar to pro football fans are linebacker Garland Boyette, running backs Hoyle Granger and Jim Nance, guard Bob Creech, wide receiver Charlie Frazier and tight end Willie Frazier.

And to go with this talent on the field is entertainment galore in the stands and on the field—before, during and after the game. Cheerleaders, pompon girls, Dixieland bands, an eight-story-tall hot air balloon and many, many surprises.

It should be a football night to remember. $\hfill\Box$

and a stack of road maps. Apples? Maps? What is this?



When Fire head coach Jim Spavital set a National Football League record with a 96-yard run from scrimmage against the Green Bay Packers in




1950, one opponent who missed tackling him was Joe Spencer, now the Fire's offensive line coach . . . From more than 4,000 applicants, the World Football League selected 42 officials to serve during its inaugural season. Included are six former National

Football League officials—Barry Brown, Hunter Jackson, George Kennard, Tommy Miller, Aaron Wade and Bill Wright, with 14-year National Football League whistle-tooter John McDonough serving as a special consultant. McDonough worked 260 NFL games including Super Bowl IV . . . Fire quarterback Virg Carter recalls that in his first season at Cincinnati,



wife Judy helped him learn the Bengals' first eight plays of each game, which were set up in advance. Relates Virg: "One day Judy bet some fellow \$5 what the first play would be. When she called it right, the fellow gave her 3-to-1 odds she couldn't guess on the next play. So she won again. By the time we ran those eight plays she made more money in the stands than I did on the field!"...

Virg is serving as honorary chairman for the Northwest Suburban Council Cub Scout recruitment drive and will host a group of scouts at a clinic in October . . . Quickie trivia quiz: What three Fire players appeared in Super Bowl games? Answer: Ron Porter (1969 with Baltimore, 1974 with Minnesota), Steve Wright (1967 with Green Bay) and Mickey McCarty (1970 with Kansas City). Wright played in three NFL championship games while with the Packers . . . Bob McKay, the 6-5, 260-pound offensive tackle of the Cleveland Browns signed by the Fire for the 1975 season, is spending his off-season continuing his studies at the University of Texas, where he earned All-America honors in 1970 . . . Mel Markon's, an "in" spot on Lincoln Parkway, serves a Chicago Fire drink, which, like its name, is red-hot.

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comes too ashamed and embarrassed to walk out like a man, he should pick up an apple and a map.

"I don't want to worry about you," he says, "So if you have an apple, I'll know you won't go hungry. And, if you have a map, you won't get lost."

You get the message. So do the others around you.

Says Spavital, who spent the last four seasons coaching the Winnipeg Blue Bombers in the Canadian Football League: "The players that survive training camp will be winners. And that's what we want for Chicago.

will pay the price."

When the season starts, Spavital says, he'll ease up on the discipline. He'll still be a stickler for perfection, though, and aims to have the best conditioned team in the league. He'll back his players to the hilt if they work to their capabilities, which is all he ever asks.

At Winnipeg, Spavital took the Blue Bombers from last place and molded it into the winningest, most exciting team in the Canadian Football League.

Vic Grant, α Winnipeg sportswriter, recalls: "Jim gave the people of Winnipeg what they wanted, an entertaining team when they won and an entertaining team when they lost. When first place was out of sight in this first year, he still made it entertaining."

THUMBS DOWN ON TIES

Neither Fire owner Tom Origer nor head coach Jim Spavital like ties. Origer never wears one and Spavital never plays for one.

"I've got to think about winning, nothing else, ever," says Spavital.

The World Football League has taken drastic steps to avoid ties, too.

For instance, there will be a fifth "quarter" (two $7\frac{1}{2}$ -minute periods) to break deadlocks. And the innovative seven-point touchdown, with a one-point run or pass conversion for an eight-point potential, is designed to avoid ties.
