The NASL is proud to give professional players a chance to play in meaningful games while fine tuning their skills and athleticism, and also to provide professional coaches and referees with the opportunity to improve their own abilities and knowledge of the game. At the same time, we want to offer the amateur players in our communities an aspirational example of the sport being played at an even higher level.

We are certain that our sport – whether one calls it soccer, football or fútbol – will reach even greater heights over the years to come, and the NASL intends to be at the forefront of that trend. Our league promises to be competitive, entertaining and innovative – while remaining true to the sport we love.



ABOUT THE NORTH AMERICAN SOCCER LEAGUE

The new North American Soccer League (NASL) was officially founded in November 2009 when a group of 2nd division men's professional soccer team owners banded together to form North American Soccer League, LLC for the purpose of creating a team-owned and operated professional soccer league in the United States, Canada and Puerto Rico.

In February 2011, the NASL received recognition from the United States Soccer Federation as the exclusive second division men's professional league and the inaugural season kicked off on the evening of April 9, 2011, with games in Cary, North Carolina; Atlanta, Georgia; Fort Lauderdale, Florida; and St. Petersburg, Florida.

The NASL is an eight-team league featuring a fully-balanced schedule in which each of the eight teams plays the other seven league members four times (twice at home and twice on the road) during the regular season. The regular season is followed by playoffs featuring the top six teams in the points standings and culminating in a two-game, total goals series for the NASL championship.

2011 NASL member teams are: Atlanta Silverbacks, Carolina RailHawks, FC Edmonton, Fort Lauderdale Strikers, NSC Minnesota Stars, Montreal Impact, Puerto Rico Islanders and FC Tampa Bay. The Montreal Impact have been admitted to Major League Soccer (MLS) beginning with the 2012 season, and they will be replaced in the NASL by the San Antonio Scorpions FC. On June 20, 2011, the NASL announced its expansion into Ottawa, Ontario, pending the completion of renovations to Lansdowne Park.

Every NASL team represents a metro market area not served by a team from the U.S. and Canada's officially-recognized first division, MLS, and thus sits at the top of the men's professional soccer "pyramid" in their home market. Each of the NASL teams play their home games in stadiums (with capacities ranging from approximately 5,000 to 15,000) that allow fans to experience the games in a uniquely intimate setting.

The NASL operates on traditional business practices employed by most of the major national soccer leagues throughout the world. Each team within the league is responsible for its own player investment and development, and is free to scout, trial, sign and transfer players as it wishes in the best interest of the individual team. While there are limits to the size of the active rosters for each team (30) and the number of foreign players permitted per team (7), the league does not impose a salary cap on its members.

Approximately 200 soccer players are currently on the NASL's team rosters, and their backgrounds as players are as diverse as their nationalities. On opening day of the 2011 season, the youngest player in the league was 18 and the oldest was 39. Several have experience playing in Europe and Latin America's

first divisions, as well as at the national team level, while others have MLS experience here in North America. Yet many NASL players are in the early stages of their professional careers, and using the league as a stepping stone to higher professional leagues. While the clear majority of the players hail from the U.S. or Canada, 30 other nationalities were represented on the opening day rosters.

Although the NASL shares its name with the league that operated throughout North America during the period of 1968-1984, there is no official tie to the business structure of the now-defunct NASL. However, with six of the new NASL teams operating in cities with a rich memory of past glory of the former NASL there is more than a hint of the former NASL's heritage to be found in the new NASL of today – two examples being the Joma match ball whose design was inspired by the ball in play some 40 years ago, and the Fort Lauderdale Strikers franchise whose name and jersey are virtually identical to those of the team that graced Lockhart Stadium in the late 1970's and early 1980's and featured George Best, Nene Cubillas and Gerd Müller.

NASL, serving as this region's second division, does not have a system of relegation and promotion with the officially recognized first (MLS) and third (USL Pro) divisions, nor is there an official working relationship between MLS and NASL. However, in addition to the Montreal Impact next year, a number of recent second division men's professional clubs have gone on to compete in MLS after successfully building a team and fan base at the NASL level. The current MLS clubs Seattle Sounders, Portland Timbers and Vancouver Whitecaps all played D-2 soccer prior to entry into MLS. Player movement between the leagues is facilitated by a strong working relationship at the team levels, and the NASL is also working with MLS at the league level to employ standards designed to foster player health and safety.

ABOUT THE BALL

July 4, 2011, marked the launch of the NASL specialized design ball manufactured by Joma. The ball incorporates the stars of the original iconic NASL ball which represents the evolution of the branding of NASL from 1968 through 2011.

In 2010, Joma was ranked as the leading sportswear company in Spain, and is the official outfitter for several leading clubs and national teams worldwide.





THE COMMISSIONER

David Downs has served as NASL Commissioner since April 2011. Previously, Downs served as Executive Director of the USA Bid Committee, the organization created by the U.S. Soccer Federation (USSF) to participate in the bidding process to host the FIFA World Cup™ in 2018 and 2022. Under Downs' leadership, the USA Bid Committee achieved several milestones while increasing awareness and interest in the sport domestically.

Prior to serving as the Executive Director of the USA Bid Committee, Downs was President of Univision Sports. In that role, he was responsible for acquiring the television rights and supervising the production of all sports programming for the three networks in the Univision family.

Downs joined Univision from ABC Sports. During his career at ABC, Downs rose to Senior Vice President of Programming. He was instrumental in the successful negotiations to secure the U.S. television rights to the World Cup beginning with USA '94, as well as countless other major sporting events including Big Ten and Pac-10 college football, the PGA Tour and the Indianapolis 500.

Downs has been involved with soccer in North America for several decades, as a college player, a licensed youth coach, and as the parent of two soccer-playing children. He also currently serves on the board of the USSF Development Academy club FC Westchester.





ATLANTA SILVERBACKS



About the Silverbacks

Founded in 1995 as the Atlanta Ruckus, the club became known as the Silverbacks in 1998. From 1998 until 2008, the Silverbacks competed in the 2nd division of North American soccer, reaching the USL-1 Final in 2007.

After a two-year hiatus, the Silverbacks joined the North American Soccer League (NASL) for the 2011 season. The team plays at the privately funded soccer-specific Atlanta Silverbacks Park which opened in 2006. The team is led by Head Coach José Manuel Abundis, a former Mexican International.

The team's primary owners are Traffic Sports and Boris Jerkunica. Jerkunica, a serial technology entrepreneur, was the co-founder and CEO of NetZIP prior to its sale to Real Networks in 2000. Jerkunica is currently the Chairman of Vocalocity – a VoIP technology company.

The Silverbacks have created a local soccer pyramid with the men's professional team, a reserve team that competes in the National Premier Soccer League (NPSL), a woman's team that competes in the W-League (and won the league championship in 2011) and several affiliated youth clubs.

CAROLINA RAILHAWKS



About the RailHawks

The Carolina RailHawks were established in 2006 and began play in 2007. The team reached the US Open Cup semifinals in its inaugural season. The RailHawks were a founding member of the North American Soccer League (NASL) and play their home matches at WakeMed Soccer Park in Cary, NC, which is considered to be one of the finest soccer-specific stadiums in the USA. The stadium has hosted multiple international friendly matches and several other major domestic soccer events. They are owned by a subsidiary of Traffic Sports USA and Singh Holdings, LLC.

The RailHawks led by Martin Rennie, won the NASL Conference of the 2010 USSF D-2 Pro League and subsequently advanced to the championship series. The club is managed by Curt Johnson, a Raleigh native and former General Manager of the Kansas City Wizards, who serves as President.

In their short history, the RailHawks have had a number of notable players including Caleb Norkus (former US Youth International), Brad Rusin (now with HB Køge of the Danish Superliga), Daniel Paladini (now with the Chicago Fire), Greg Shields (who played in the English Premier League) and Ronald Cerritos (70 caps for El Salvador).

FC EDMONTON



About the Club

FC Edmonton was only founded on February 9, 2010, but the city has enjoyed more than 30 years of professional soccer history, beginning with the Edmonton Drillers of the former NASL (1979-1982).

Tom and Dave Fath of the Fath Group, responsible for bringing Everton and River Plate together in 2009 to compete for the inaugural Edmonton Cup, hired a star-studded coaching staff in then-Head Coach Dwight Lodeweges and Assistants Hans Schrijver and Dave Randall to lead FC Edmonton.

By starting with an experienced coaching staff, FC Edmonton was able to attract players from across the Prairies, South America and Europe, while competing in an exhibition season during 2010.

In the off-season, Lodeweges and Schrijver took coaching jobs in Japan and handed the reins over to Head Coach Harry Sinkgraven and Assistant Coaches Dave Randall and Edwin Petersen. The 2011 season for FC Edmonton kicked off with a 2-1 win against the Fort Lauderdale Strikers on April 9. The team plays its home games at Foote Field, on the campus of the University of Alberta.

The Islanders continued to experience success in the CONCACAF Champions League in successive tournaments, which included eliminating MLS club Toronto FC from the 2009-10 tournament, and MLS Supporters Shield winner LA Galaxy from the 2010-11 tournaments. The Islanders have been coached since 2007 by Northern Irishman Colin Clarke.

The team plays at Estadio Juan Ramón Loubriel, a former baseball stadium that has been converted to a 12,500 seat soccer-specific facility in Bayamón.



About the Scorpions

On October 4, 2010, San Antonio was awarded an NASL expansion team led by Gordon Hartman, a local philanthropist and businessman. In January 2011, the name of the team was officially unveiled as the San Antonio Scorpions FC. The team will begin play in 2012 at Heroes Stadium before moving to a 5,000 seat soccer-specific stadium on land near the STAR Soccer Complex.

Although kickoff is still several months away, the team has been active in the community in 2011. Local soccer fans have participated in contests to name the club as well as to select the jersey design and team logo. Three separate supporters groups have been formed, and the Scorpions have also received substantial season ticket commitments for 2012.

Gordon Hartman is the owner of Morgan's Wonderland, a special needs amusement park. The first of its kind in the world, the ultra-accessible family fun park was designed with special-needs individuals of all ages in mind. Hartman founded Soccer for a Cause, LLC in an effort to further boost the sport's growing popularity in the Alamo City and to expand educational programs and services at Morgan's Wonderland. All profits earned from operating the Scorpions have been pledged to benefit Morgan's Wonderland.



The Scorpions plan to construct a 5,000-seat playing facility on privately-owned land near the STAR Soccer Complex in time for the 2013 season. In the interim, the team will play 2012 NASL home games in North East Independent School District's 11,000-seat Heroes Stadium.

RULES AND REGULATIONS

Structure: The 8 active NASL teams compete in one table consisting of all 8 teams: Atlanta Silverbacks; Carolina RailHawks; FC Edmonton; Fort Lauderdale Strikers; Montreal Impact; NSC Minnesota Stars; FC Tampa Bay and the Puerto Rico Islanders.

Schedule: Each team will play a 28-game regular season schedule. Each team will play 14 home and 14 away games. Each team will play each of the other 7 NASL teams twice at home and twice away.

Point System: Teams will receive three points for a win, one point for a tie and zero points for a loss.

Referees: All referees for NASL matches played in the United States are nationally certified referees assigned by the U.S. Soccer Federation (USSF). The Canadian Soccer Association (CSA) assigns referees for all matches played in Canada. The Federación Puertorriqueña de Fútbol (FPF) will assign referees for all matches played in Puerto Rico.

Game Clock: The official game time for all NASL games will be managed on the field by the referee. If necessary, the referee may also allot extra time (a.k.a. "stoppage time") at the end of each period (first half, second half, and if applicable, first overtime period and second overtime period during playoff games) to allow for injuries, time-wasting or other disturbances.

Note: The stadium clock will display the time from 0:00 to 45:00 and from 45:00 to 90:00 (plus stoppage time where applicable in each half). For statistical purposes, the minutes for goals, substitutions, yellow cards, etc., will be listed from the first minute until the 90th minute. A goal scored at 15 minutes 10 seconds will be listed as having been scored in the 16th minute. Events occurring during stoppage time will follow the international norm by being demarcated with a "+" sign. For example, a goal scored three minutes into first half stoppage time will be officially identified as happening at "45+".

Roster Composition: Each NASL team's full roster shall be no less than 20 and no more than 35 total players. Players can compete on a maximum of 2 teams per season.

Active Roster and Inactive Roster: At no time may any team name more than 30 eligible players on its Active Roster. Only players listed on an Active Roster are eligible to play in any game. Once a player is listed on a team's Inactive Roster, that player must remain on the Inactive Roster for at least 30 days. In order for a team to change a player from the Active Roster to the inactive roster or vice versa, the team must notify the NASL Registrar, in writing, at least 48 hours prior to the game for which the team intends for such change to take effect. The League Office will make the final determination on whether players are on each team's Active Roster or Inactive Roster for any game.

Domestic Players: A domestic player for teams based in the United States and Puerto Rico is either a U.S. citizen, a permanent resident (green card holder) or the holder of other special status (e.g. refugee or asylum status). A domestic player for teams based in Canada is either a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident, or qualifies as a domestic player in the United States as set forth in the guidelines above.

International Players: Each team may list up to 7 non-domestic players on its roster.

Game Day Rosters: Each team may nominate 18 players from its Active Roster for a game day roster. Teams are allowed 3 substitutions per game.

Cautions and Suspensions: A player will be suspended for one game upon receiving his fifth yellow card – regardless of the nature of the infraction which resulted in his being awarded the yellow card. After a player has accumulated 5 yellow cards, he will earn an additional one-game suspension for each additional 3 yellow cards he accumulates. A player receiving two yellow cards in the same game will be suspended for the next game; however for the purposes of accumulated yellow cards he will be considered to have received just one red card. A player receiving a direct red card will automatically be suspended for the next game, and the NASL Disciplinary Committee has the power to suspend him for additional games depending upon the severity of the offense which led to the red card issued by the referee.

Card Suspensions: Red card and yellow card accumulation suspensions earned in regular season games will be served in that player's next regular season game. Any suspension for yellow card accumulation earned in a player's last regular season game will carry over into that season's first playoff game for his team.

Any player who receives a red card in his team's last game of the season (NASL regular season match or during playoff games), will serve the one-game suspension during their next game (whether it comes during a playoff game, championship series game, or in the first regular season game of the following season). All card suspensions will, if necessary, follow a player to a new team.

Suspension Manipulation: Players suspended from NASL games (regular season and playoff games) that are called in for national team duty will have their suspensions held in abeyance until they return to their NASL team. Teams will be responsible for informing the League Office of a player's selection to national team duty. Failure to provide the League Office with such notice or to withhold the use of a suspended player when appropriate is subject to sanctions.



PLAYOFF FORMAT & QUALIFICATION

Playoff Qualification: The top 6 teams in the league standings at the conclusion of the regular season will compete in the NASL playoffs

Tie-breaking Procedure for Standings and Playoff Qualification:

The team with the highest position in the standings at the conclusion of the regular season will be the team with the greatest number of points (3 points for a win, 1 point for a tie, 0 points for a loss). In the event that two teams finish the regular season with an equal number of points, the following system will be used to break the tie:

1. The highest position shall be awarded to the team with the best win/tie/loss record in regular season games against all other teams equal in points (head-to-head competition).
2. If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team with the greater goal difference against all other teams during the regular season (goal differential).
3. If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position shall be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of total goals against all other teams during the regular season (total goals).
4. If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played on the road by each team against all other teams during the regular season.
5. If the teams are still equal in the standings, the procedures described in this section shall be applied only to games played at home by each team against all other teams during the regular season.
6. If the teams are still equal in the standings, the highest position in the standings shall be determined by a toss of a coin.
7. The first tiebreaker in a three-way tie is also head-to-head, but it is determined via points-per-game versus the other two teams; if two teams are tied in points-per-game head-to-head, the next tie-breaker is goals scored.

NOTE: If two clubs remain tied after another club with the same number of points advances during any step, the tie breaker reverts to step 1 of the two-club tie-breaking system

Playoff Format:

The 6 qualifying teams will be given seeds 1 through 6 with the top team in the standings receiving the number 1 seed.

The format of the Playoffs will consist of a Quarterfinal Round, Semifinal Round and a Final Round. The Quarterfinal Round will be a single game while the Semifinal and Final Rounds will each be a 2-game series with each team playing at home once and the team with the greater number of aggregate goals in both games winning each series.

The number 1 seed and the number 2 seed will receive a bye directly to the Semifinal Round while the number 3 seed will host the number 6 seed and the number 4 seed will host the number 5 seed in the Quarterfinal Round.

For the Semifinal Round, the number 1 seed will be paired with the lowest seeded team to qualify from the Quarterfinal Round with the number 2 seed being paired with the highest seeded team to qualify from the Quarterfinal Round.

The winners of each series in the Semifinal Round will meet in the Final Round. In the event of a draw in either Quarterfinal Round game, such game will progress to a 30-minute extra time period (the golden goal rule will not be in effect). If the teams are still locked in a draw following the extra time period, the winner will be determined by a penalty shootout.

In each Semifinal Round series and the Final Round series, if the teams are tied on the number of aggregate goals scored in the series at the conclusion of the second game, the teams will progress to a 30-minute extra time period. As in the Quarterfinal Round, the golden goal rule will not be in effect. If the teams are still locked in a draw following the extra time period, the winner of the series will be determined by a penalty shootout.

Cards in Playoffs: All players will start the NASL playoffs with a zero yellow card total. A player receiving 3 yellow cards in separate games during the course of the playoffs will be suspended for his team's next game. Any suspension for yellow cards received in a player's last playoff game will not carry over into the next NASL regular season.


