A three-year collegiate All-American as a midfielder at Lewis
University near Chicago, Dolinsky has been converted into a forward
because of his speed and dexterity by Coach George Meyer and is responding
notably.

He scored his first American Soccer League goal in the Cat's 3 to 1 victory over the Connecticut Yankees at New Haven May 2 afternoon, after playing a fine game in the 1 to 0 win over Phode Island at Providence the night before.

Johnny was a good all-around athlete at Romeoville (Ill.) High School and has been playing soccer since he was 10 years old. The Cats had a good line on him and knew what they were drafting because, for vears, he has been playing with the Schwaben Club in Chicago soccer. He also had a brief turn with the Maroons.

Of Czech and German descent, Dolinsky made the local all-star teams in 1972 and 1973 and the indoor all-stars this past season. All this was capped by his three years of All-American recognition at Lewis University.

Johnny now resides in Chicago, is married and has a baby daughter seven months old as of May. His goal? To play pro soccer as long as he can and then coach.

PROFILE ON PETE KOURATOS

Big, burly, driving Pete Kouratos, "The Golden Greek", is one of the most feared and respected forwards in the American Soccer League. And he's one of the most popular players with the home fans. Rooters for the opponents also appreciate his power type of play.

Personable Pete led the Cats in scoring last season and ranked high in the league standings. He probably would have been even closer to the top if his unrelenting hard play hadn't drawn him more than his share of oustings.

But that's the only way Pete knows how to play--hard and to win, but clean. Off the field, he's a pleasant, gentle and well-liked person. Single, but, **so**rry girls, more or less spoken for.

In his native Athens, young Kouratos naturally started playing soccer as a youth and "organized ball" from the age of 15. A year later he was doing well with such clubs as Olympiakos and Ionikos in Pereas. A few years later he put in two big seasons with the Greek National Army Team.

The Chicago Olympics brought him to this city, and, except for a brief stint with the pro Mustangs, he spent seven years with them. It is believed that he along with Willi Roy have scored more goals than any other players in National Soccer League history.

The former Chicago Mustangs coach considers this one of the biggest challenges of his years in the sport, and is enjoying every minute of it. "Our great city of Chicago needs a major sports champion and I hope we can be the ones to bring a title here," he said when signed by Dr. Ernest Panos.

Meyer is a native Chicago, 53 years and old, married and the father of four. He has been dedicated to soccer for 35 years. He began his playing career as a student at Carl Schurz High School and the Chicago Schwaben Juniors as a fullback.

Starting his coaching career in 1954 for the Schwaben major club, he soon gained the respect of everyone in the league and the prestige carried him to many honors. He coached Schwaben until 1967, and, all those years, also was head coach of the Chicago All-Star Teams.

From 1957 through 1967 he was U.S.A. national coach, responsible for preparing American teams for the Pan-American Games, Olympic Games and World Cup. His ten-year tenure as the nation's head coach also included heading American
