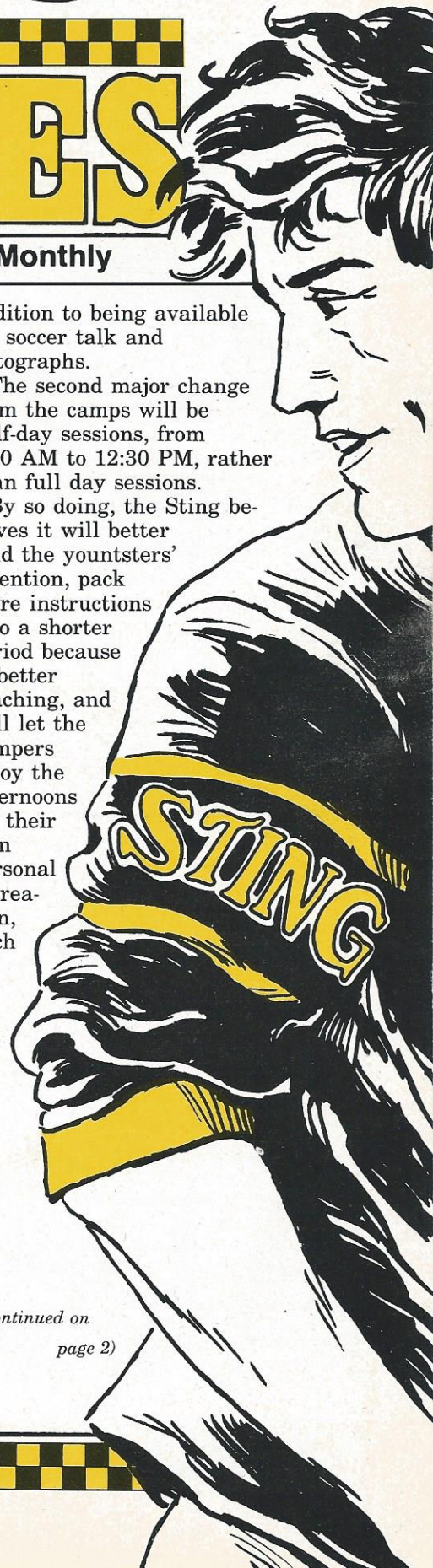

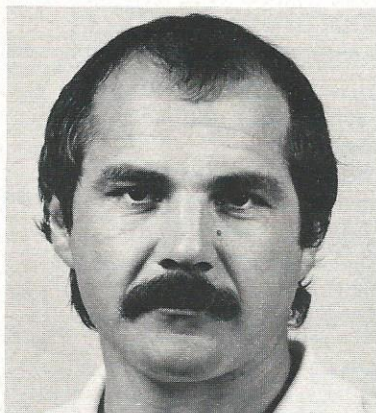

There will be daily individual and group instruction at all levels, from beginner to advanced, as well as full field matches.



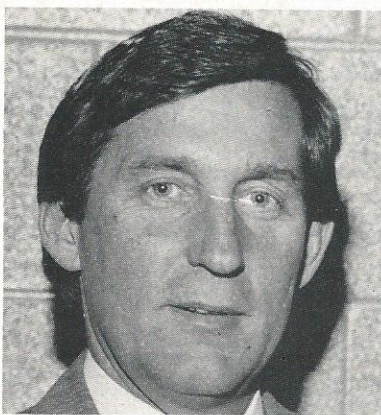

There will be complete coaching on all soccer skills, including specialized instruction in goalkeeping.

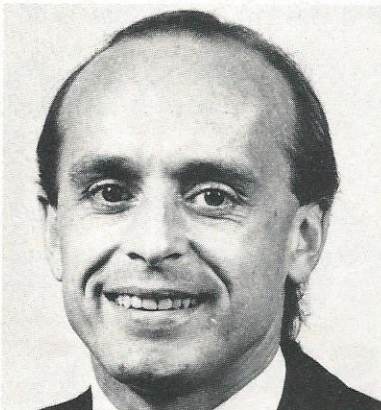

## MISL

### TIE-BREAKING PROCEDURES

According to rule 5.21 of the MISL Regulations, in the event that two or more teams have identical win-loss percentages at the end of the regular season and such teams have played the same number of games against the team(s) with which they are tied, the following tie-breaking procedures shall be used.

**FIRST:** The team having won the most games played with the team or teams with which it is tied shall prevail, if still tied, then...

**SECOND:** the team having the best "goals for" minus "goals against" record in games played between the teams tied shall prevail, if still tied, then...

**THIRD:** the team having won the most games played against all other teams in its division shall prevail.

In the event that three or more teams have identical win-loss percentages at the end of the regular season and have not played the same number of games against the teams with which they are tied, the following tie-breaking procedures shall be used:

**FIRST:** The team having the highest winning percentage in games played against the teams with which it is tied shall prevail, if still tied, then...

**SECOND:** if after applying FIRST above, two teams shall have identical "highest winning percentage" as set forth above, the tie-breaking procedures stated above for two or more clubs will be applied.

## McGAULEY FULFILLS DREAM OF PLAYING IN THE PROS

Pat McGauley has come a long way since he left the campus of Indiana University. In his four seasons with the Chicago Sting, he has played in more than 100 professional games and has scored more than two dozen goals.

It was always a dream for the St. Louis native to play pro soccer after graduating from Indiana University with a degree in Personnel Management and Labor Relations. "The Sting gave me the opportunity to play professional soccer and I've been enjoying it ever since," says the personable McGauley. "I'll continue to play soccer as long as it is enjoyable."

McGauley came to Chicago as a third-round draft choice in 1984. Last season, he played in 40 games for the Sting, scoring 12 goals, one on a power play, and adding six assists for 18 points.

The 6', 160-pound defender finished the season fourth in blocks with 34.

McGauley began kicking the soccer ball at age seven and grew through the ranks of youth soccer. He participated in the President's Cup in Korea and was a member of the U.S. Olympic Developmental Squad.

A star at St. Mary's High school in St. Louis, McGauley was the team's leading scorer and Most Valuable Player. He also played on two Under-19 McGuire Cup national championship teams and was honored as the MVP in the 1983 National Sports Festival.

But it was at IU where McGauley made a name for himself in the world of collegiate soccer. Recruited by

legendary Indiana coach Jerry Yeagley, McGauley became a star as Indiana won two straight NCAA Division I national championships. In the 1984 championship game, McGauley scored the gamewinner as the Hoosiers defeated Columbia, 1-0. For his efforts, he was named the Most Valuable Player in the game. In his four years at the Big Ten school, McGauley became the fifth all-time leading scorer in Indiana history with 124 points.

McGauley thought that winning two NCAA titles were enough in anyone's career. But, 1984 would be

a year that McGauley would never forget. After finishing his brilliant college career, McGauley reported to the Chicago Sting camp ready to begin a pro career which promised to be a bright one. McGauley's first season with the Sting as a pro started in the same fashion as he ended his college career at Indiana—winning another championship. Only this time it was the NASL Soccer Bowl Championship—the greatest reward in all of North American soccer. Also, that same year McGauley was named the Sting's Rookie of the Year.

"That's one year I'll never forget,"

said McGauley. "In sports, everything is winning and losing. When you win everything is wonderful and when you lose, things can get tough.

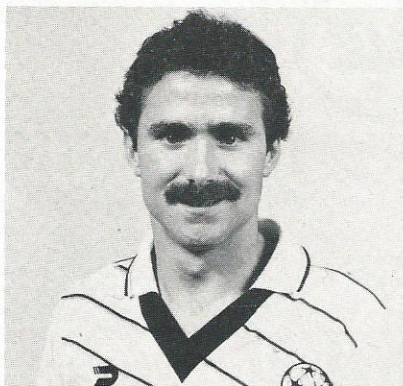
"To say the least, that year I was on cloud nine and I never came down.

McGauley, who married his wife Barb last summer, has been a strong believer in doing community work when he is not playing soccer. He does countless numbers of personal appearances for the Sting on behalf of the State of Illinois' S.T.O.P. Drug Education and Prevention Program. In his free time, McGauley enjoys tennis, golf, carpentry and reading business magazines.

After his playing days are over, McGauley is looking forward to a career in marketing and fulfilling a lifelong dream of vacationing to Hawaii.

## MANNY ROJAS OUT FOR SEASON WITH KNEE INJURY SUSTAINED IN CLEVELAND



The Chicago Sting's fortunes were dealt another setback when Manny Rojas sustained a season-ending right knee injury March 13 in Cleveland.

The popular and powerful forward went down in a mishap as he was racing up the

field on the attack. He had knee surgery later in the week.

Rojas was having an excellent season before he was hurt scoring 10 goals and 21 assists. Last season, he played in 45 games scoring 24 goals and 17 assists. Plus, he had seven power play goals.

Earlier in the season, Frantz Mathieu suffered an achilles tendon injury and later announced that he would be out for the season.

Rojas, who is from Chile, has played in more than 100 games in the Major Indoor Soccer League in two and one-half seasons. He joined the Sting in 1984 in a trade from the Golden Bay Earthquakes.

## KRAFFT NAMED MISL OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK

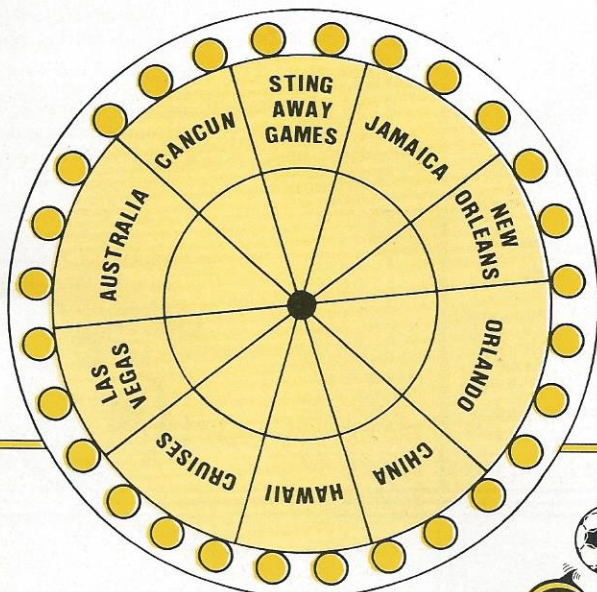

### MISL

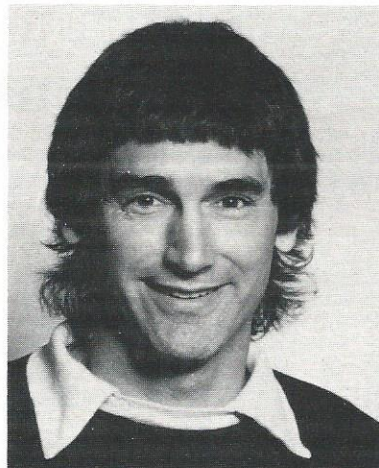
### KANSAS CITY GOALKEEPER MAYER NAMED MISL DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH

Kansas City goalkeeper Alan Mayer, who recorded a 6-0 record with a 2.17 goals-against average during the month, was named the Ma-

jor Indoor Soccer league defensive player of the month for March. The selection of Mayer was made by a panel of members of the Professional Soccer Reporters' Association

Included in his 6-0 record was two victories over Tacoma (4-2, March 1 and 6-3, March 8) and two over San Diego (6-2, March 14 and 5-2, March 20). Mayer was named defensive star of the game on three occasions—12-2 win vs, Los Angeles on March 3 (17 saves); March 14 against San Diego (14 saves; and the 5-2 playoff clincher against St. Louis (10 saves). In his last 407:32 Mayer has allowed only 13 goals for a 1.91 goals-against average. In that same time he set a team scoreless mark of 99:51.

In the Comets' 5-2 win over San Diego, Mayer set a club mark for consecutive wins with six and he became the sixth goalkeeper in MISL history to record 100 victories. During the month Mayer improved his goals-against average to 4.09 while upping his record to 18-13.

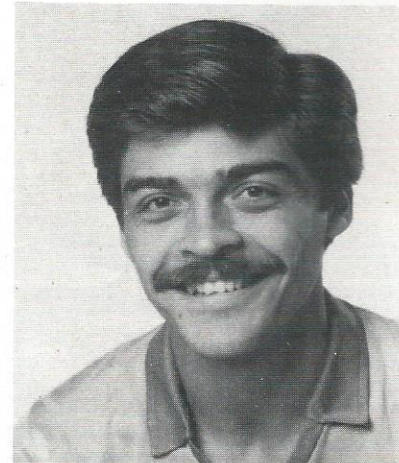

### WICHITA'S BORJA EARNS MISL OFFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE MONTH HONORS

Wichita midfielder Chico Borja, whose 16 goals and seven assists led the Wings to a 7-3 record for the month, was named the Major Indoor Soccer League offensive player of the month for March. Borja was selected by a panel of the Professional Soccer Reporter's Association.

During the month, Borja scored a goal in all 10 games and notched two game-winning goals and two power-play goals. Borja was named the

offensive star of Wichita's 5-4 win over Los Angeles (March 1) as he scored three goals including the game-winner. He scored two goals and had one assist as he earned offensive star honors in the Wings' 5-4 double overtime loss to Kansas City (March 22). Borja had five games where he scored three points or more during the month.

Borja presently leads Wichita in scoring with 41 goals, 30 assists for 71 points and is tied for fourth with Batata in the MISL scoring race.

### MILESTONE

Jan Goosens of the Kansas City Comets has a 41 game scoring streak and also set a personal and Comets' scoring record with 75 points as of March 22.

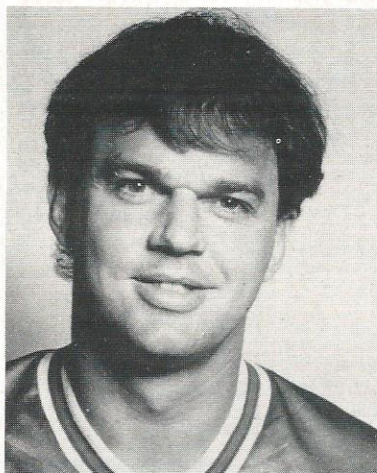

### BALTIMORE BLAST

The Blast's specialty teams have been a key to the club's success so far this season. As of press time Baltimore's penalty killing unit was ranked first in the MISL, with a 74.2% efficiency. The Blast's power play team, at the top of the league for most of the season, has dropped to fifth.

The Blast will take a 4-hour sabbatical from their Eastern Division title chase later this month to take part in the annual Easter Egg Hunt at the White House on Monday, April 20. Fourteen members of the Blast will attend the Easter Egg Hunt, and assist the children who will hunt for eggs on the White House lawn. Other sports figures expected to participate are, tennis pro Pam Shriver, Washington Bullets guard Jeff Malone, and Washington Redskins quarterback Jay Schroeder.

"It goes without saying that we are extremely excited about taking part in this event", said Blast General Manager Dan Counce. "The MISL has worked hard to attain national media attention, both on and off the field, and this is certainly a positive step in that direction."

The festivities begin at 10:00 AM.

### CLEVELAND FORCE

The Cleveland Force Traded second-year midfielder Chris Chueden to the Los Angelesazers for seven-year veteran Paul Kitson in a trade that included exchanging visas and a second round draft choice.

Several days of negotiating resulted in Cleveland obtaining Kitson, theazers' second round draft choice in 1988 and a Canadian visa. In exchange, the Force send Chueden and a foreign visa to theazers. Cleveland is leading the MISL in total attendance and averaging over 14,000 fans per contest. The Force is averaging 14,153 at the Richfield Coliseum, while the road attendance has been an average of 7,543.

### DALLAS SIDEKICKS

Tatu scored twice in the Sting's 7-2 win over

the Sidekicks on March 20 to give him a goal in 13 straight games. The streak was snapped on March 24 when the Minnesota Strikers shutout the sidekicks, 8-0, in Bloomington.

### KANSAS CITY COMETS

The Comets had their 10 game winning streak stopped at Cleveland on March 25. The Force rallied from behind to defeat the Comets, 6-5, at the Richfield Coliseum. Jan Goossens scored his 35th assist of the season, a Comets single season record. The Comets have signed coach Dave Clements to a multi-year contract. Since taking over the Comets on February 5, he has guided the Comets to a 12-4 record.

### ST. LOUIS STEAMERS

The Steamers announced plans to move their offices into the St. Louis Arena. A move to the Arena will bring all front staff under one roof in addition to easing game-day operations.

### SAN DIEGO SOCKERS

The San Diego Sockers, who have won three MISL championships and two NASL championships, have come up with a slogan for the 1987 playoffs: the Joy of Six. The Joy of Six campaign will be highlighted by the release of six video messages tracing the success of the Sockers.

### MINNESOTA STRIKERS

Striker goalkeeper Tino Lettieri has been hot lately as he has collected two shutouts, 7-0 over Cleveland on March 18 and an 8-0 win over the Dallas Sidekicks on March 24. Both shutouts came at home. Lettieri has three career shutouts.

### WICHITA WINGS

Kevin Kewley joined an elite group of players on March 17 in the Sting/Wings game when he became a member of the "300 Club". It was Kewley's 300th MISL game. Only five other players have accomplished this feat. Dave MacKenzie played in 353 for Pittsburgh and Hartford; Sam Bick had 329 games with St. Louis; Fred Grgurev played in 327 games with Philadelphia, New York Arrows, New Jersey and Memphis; Val Tuksa played in 304 games for New York Arrows, Las Vegas and Pittsburgh; and Steve Zungul, the "Lord of Indoor Soccer" has played in more than 300 career games for the New York Arrows Golden Bay, San Diego and Tacoma.

# COACHES CORNER

## SET PIECES OR RESTARTS

Set pieces or restarts are an important part of indoor and outdoor soccer. It is not uncommon that over a good part of a professional outdoor season, that half of the goals scored are a result of set plays. Therefore, it is quite evident that the offense potential in developing set play patterns and defending them are so important to the winning or losing of a soccer game.

The indoor game, which the Chicago Sting in the MISL is a participant in, also is very dependent on the proper execution in the offensive and defensive strategy of set play restarts.

The Sting spends a good deal of time practicing and perfecting set plays. Restarts are situations which results from stoppage in play. A goal kick, corner kick, kick-in, free kick (direct or indirect) and kick offs are all re-starts. The offense has the advantage from this dead ball situation to run designed plays and the defense must be a minimum of 10 feet away. It is the only time in the game that the offense is at such an advantage. The offense must be prepared to

either keep possessions or penetrate the defense and create a goal-scoring opportunity.

It is estimated that 30 to 40 percent of all goals scored outdoors result from re-start situations. In indoor soccer, because of the smaller field, and because re-starts occur so close to the goal, free kicks are even more dangerous. The successful teams spend time on re-starts at each practice sessions.

In order to benefit from re-starts,

the offense must be organized. It should be prepared to put the ball into play immediately. The team should have proper initial set up and the team should have some sort of movement in order to create panic or turmoil on the defensive team or create a shot that will result in a goal.

There are two other specific points that should be made regarding re-starts. Select a basic alignment with options for the various players. This will minimize confusion, as it is more effective to have one play with a few options down pat than to have many plays with many options with many confused players. Also, in designing the re-start, remember to maintain the balance.

In corner kick situations, we have the midfielder take the corner kick and he must, through his vision, determine the best way to put the ball back in play. Corner kick re-start provide good opportunities for a team to score a goal from designed plays. In all re-starts, the offense have five seconds to start the play. So the offense has to prepare quickly.

In defending against re-starts, players have assigned roles. The defense must protect the goal by blocking shooting paths, and closing down the passing lanes. The defense

initially stays compact, thus congesting the area around the goal.

Once the ball is played, defensive players must react and apply pressure where needed.

In defending against corner kicks, a team must concentrate its players in the goal area and in the penalty box.

In defending against set plays, it is important for teams to spot tendencies and be aware of the opponents on the field to see who are the dangerous players.'

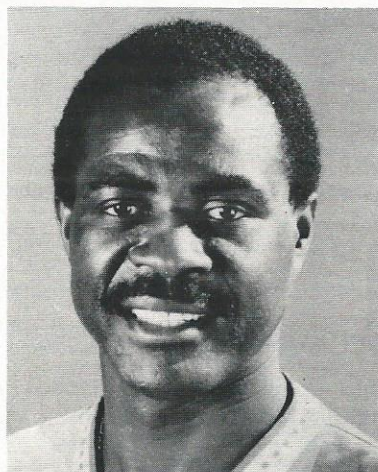

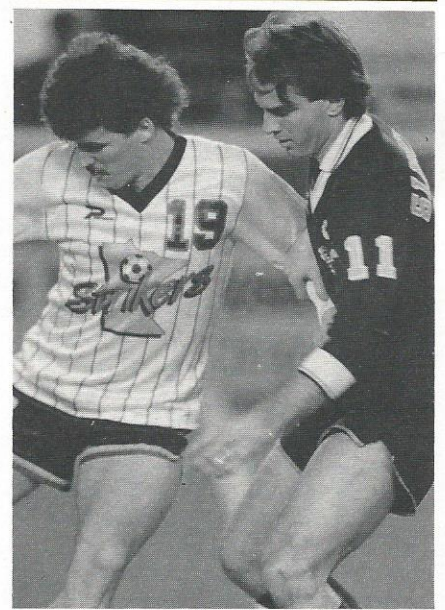

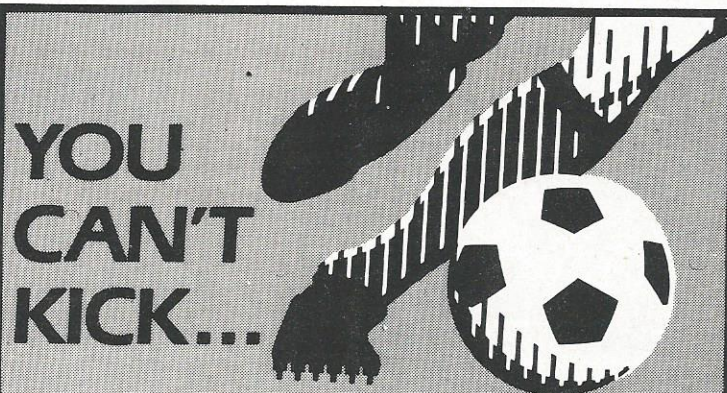
