Crutial games are over-played in pro sports, but that is exactly what Ron Newman's first place Los Angeles Skyhawks face on their three-game swing to the east.

Starting in Hartford on Saturday, the Skyhawks face the top three ASL teams in the east during the next six days. After tangling with Connecticut's Yankees, the Skyhawks travel to New York for a June 9 game and wrap things up on June 11 in Rhode Island.
