## **FLASH PREVIEW**

The Rochester Flash game at Buffalo last Sunday night recalled the adage that any team can beat any other team on any given day. The Flash was handled by the Storm 3-0 at All-High Stadium, and Buffalo leapt back into second place in the Northern Division of the United Soccer League.

Rochester (5-9, 40 points) had a three-game winning streak going into the game. Just two nights earlier the Flash blanked the division leading New York Nationals 2-0 in Mt. Vernon. The orange and black was the second hottest team in the league; Ft. Lauderdale is currently enjoying a five-game winning streak. In contrast, Buffalo had never been anything more than a consistently mediocre team.

However, the Storm had no intentions of getting beaten by the Flash the way their first encounter ended, 3-1 at Holleder on June 10. Buffalo proved it by scoring four minutes into the game. Despite recording 15 shots in the game, the Flash tested the shot blocking skills of opposing goalkeeper Peter Grillo and his backline only a few times during the game.

For the second time in as many games, Head Coach Joe Horvath altered his team's formation when he substituted in the second half. As Rochester makes its rounds of the league, Horvath is finding that the ever-changing Flash has not found the line-up that enables the team to take a game by the throat.

The addition of midfielder Don Tobin and forward Dave Pierce forced a resetting of the team's pace. The long ball was replaced by touch passing with an occasional fast break. The team must find a happy medium between the two if it is to please the anticipated young crowd at the stadium tonight.

For Rochester to win its fourth in five games, it will be done on Youth Night. An abundance of free admission youth tickets were distributed in Monroe County and surrounding areas via the city, town and village recreation departments. The Rochester Flash appreciate the work of these recreation departments and would be honored if they make the Flash a part of their programs of summer entertainment.

Tonight's game will be the fourth to be taped for delayed broadcast on American Cablevision's "Sportscope 5" on channel five. Josh Lewin will call the game from the booth and at his side Orrie Capone will do the color commentary. The primary airing of the game is 7:30 p.m. Monday, July 16. There is a second running at 1:30 p.m. Tuesday, July 17 and a final showing at 9:30 p.m. Friday, July 20.

The next Flash home game is 7:35 p.m. next Wednesday against the Buffalo Storm. With possible misfortune of the New York Nationals on their upcoming road trip to strong Southern Division territory, the Rochester-Buffalo game could very well have first place implications in the wild Northern Division.
