Dominiques, only 22 and 5-10, has come into his own in recent games which is no surprise to Manfred.

"I feel Tino is improving each time he plays. The experience is going to make him a better player and increase his value to the team," says the 0's field boss.

Using his quickness to thwart enemy forwards, Dominigues, who like Pires lives in the Newark, N.J. area, has been a strong aid to Goalie Arnold Mausser. The latter has an amazing 0.66 goals against average, having allowed but four goals in 540 minutes of the ASL action.

Pires and Dominigues will be counted uopn heavily on Sunday (June 23) when the unbeaten Oceaneers go on the road again, playing the Delaware Wings in Wilmington.

Leading the Midwest Division of the ASL, and the only team unbeaten in the league, the Oceaneers are currently going through the toughest part of their 1974 schedule.

The team played last Saturday at Indiana. Following the tilt at Delaware, the Oceaneers have a home game against the Connecticut Wildcats, June 28. That one will be followed by two more successive road games at Boston and Cincinnati.

"Playing four out of six games on the road is not easy," Manfred pointed out, "but we are simply forgetting the tough slate and taking each game as it comes along. We have won three on the road already."
