Career Transactions

Selected by Minnesota in the 2nd round (16th overall) of the 2008 WNBA Draft... Signed first professional contract on April 20.

WNBA Career Capsule

One of the league's most dominating centers in just her third year in the WNBA... Earned All-Star honors in 2009, becoming - along with teammate and 2008 third-round selection Charde Houston - the first later-round draft choice to enter the league since 2001 to make it to the All-Star Game... Among the best rebounders in the WNBA, Anosike finished 7th in the league in rebounds per game in just her second year in the league, averaging a franchise-record 7.4 rpg... Improved her scoring from 9.2 ppg her rookie year to a team-leading 13.2 ppg in 2009... Has already set and broken the team record for most steals in a season twice, breaking her own record of 75 set her rookie year in 2009 (81 steals)... **2009:** Completed her second season in Minnesota by leading the team in all five major counting categories -- scoring (13.2 ppg), rebounding (7.4 rpg), assists (2.7 apg), steals (2.70 spg) and blocked shots (0.93 bpg) -- while logging 29.9 mpg... She becomes just the second player in WNBA history to accomplish that feat; Tamika Catchings has led Indiana across the board four times (2002, 2003, 2004 and 2006)... Her rebound and steal averages both set club records; she edged out Tamika Williams (7.4 rpg in 2002) on the former and shattered her own mark for steals (2.21 spg in 2008)... Played 30 games, missing the season's final four contests due to soreness in her left knee... Came off the bench Aug. 19 at Los Angeles, the first reserve appearance of her career following 58 starts... Ranked 2nd in the WNBA in steals, 7th in rebounds, 10th in FG accuracy (49.1%), 12th in blocks, 18th in scoring and 23rd in assists (3rd among post players) while shooting 69.6% from the FT line... Posted seven double-doubles on the season, boosting her career total to 12 and breaking franchise records in both categories (previously held by Svetlana Abrosimova and Nicole Ohlde, respectively)... Pulled down a career-high 16 rebounds Aug. 13 vs. Indiana, topping the club single-game record (15) she shared with Abrosimova... Tied her career high with the 24-point effort Aug. 9 vs. San Antonio (also July 7 vs. Washington), her fifth 20+ night of the season and one of seven times she led; she sank a game-tying three-pointer with :20.1 left in the game, the first trey of her career... Represented the Western Conference in the 2009 WNBA All-Star Game (held July 25 in Connecticut)... Went to the line 17 times July 7 vs. Washington, one short of Katie Smith's franchise record (at L.A., July 8, 2001); she led the WNBA in FTs attempted (194), and shot 81.4% (57-for-70) after the All-Star Break... Picked off a career-high seven steals June 30 at Atlanta, tying Abrosimova's club single-game record (vs. San Antonio, Aug. 19, 2007) Blocked a career-high five shots June 10 vs. Los Angeles; she finished one steal shy of posting the second "5x5" effort in WNBA history (Candace Parker vs. Indiana, May 29, 2008)... Dealt a career-high eight assists June 6 vs. Chicago, the most by a Lynx center since Ohlde handed out eight vs. Indiana on June 2, 2006... **2008:** Ended her first summer in the WNBA by being named to the league's All-Rookie Team and shattering the franchise single-season mark for steals... Started all 34 games, averaging 9.2 ppg (3rd-best among rookies) and a club-record 6.8 rpg in 27.1 mpg, while shooting 43.8% from the floor and 69.9% from the line... Led the WNBA in steal/turnover ratio (1.79-to-1) and ranked 2nd in steals (2.21 spg), 9th in rebounding and 10th in blocked shots (1.26 bpg); she was the only player in the league to finish among the top 10 in all three of those categories... Her 75 steals match the second-highest total by a center in WNBA history; Yolanda Griffith swiped 83 in 2000 and 75 in 2004... Collected five point/rebound double-doubles, one shy of Svetlana Abrosimova's club single-season record (six in 2001); she was Minnesota's leading rebounder on 19 occasions... Pulled down a season-high 15 rebounds Sept. 3 at Phoenix (one of 15 double-digit board efforts), equaling Abrosimova's franchise single-game mark... Tallied a season-high 20 points and 12 rebounds June 3 at Atlanta, becoming the eighth player in Lynx history with a 20-point/10-rebound night... Also had 20 points (along with a season-high four blocks) May 27 at Houston... Tied her season high with six steals July 25 vs. San Antonio (also July 12 vs. Houston), one of 11 games with 3+ steals... Handed out a season-high five assists June 8 vs. San Antonio, and logged a season-high 37:13 at Los Angeles on July 27... Shot 47.3% (62-for-131) in her final 20 games, after starting the year at 38.9% through 14 contests... Went to the line a season-high 16 times Sept. 3 at Phoenix, and ranked 9th in the WNBA in FT attempts (166).

One of the all-time steals in WNBA Draft history, the Lynx selected Houston with the 30th overall pick of the 2008 WNBA Draft, and the former UConn Huskie has turned into one of the league's ultimate success stories... In just her second year in the league, Houston averaged 13.1 ppg en route to her first WNBA All-Star Game appearance... With that All-Star appearance, along with teammate Nicky Anosike, Houston became the first later-round draft choice to enter the league since 2001 to make it to the All-Star Game... After not attempting a single three-point shot her rookie season, Houston made 23 three-point shots in 2009, which was good for third on the team... One of the league's most athletic and versatile post players, Houston features a dynamic spin move and a nice post game to go along with a deadly outside jumper... **2009:** Celebrated her second season in Minnesota by being selected to play in the 2009 WNBA All-Star Game, held July 25 in Connecticut... She contributed 16 points (on 7-for-10 shooting), six rebounds and three steals for the Western Conference, which took home a 130-118 victory... Played in all 34 games for the Lynx, starting 33; the lone bench appearance came Aug. 19 at Los Angeles... Averaged 13.1 ppg (good for 21st in the league) and 5.5 rpg (23rd) while playing 23.3 mpg; she shot 46.5% from the floor and 72.7% from the FT line... 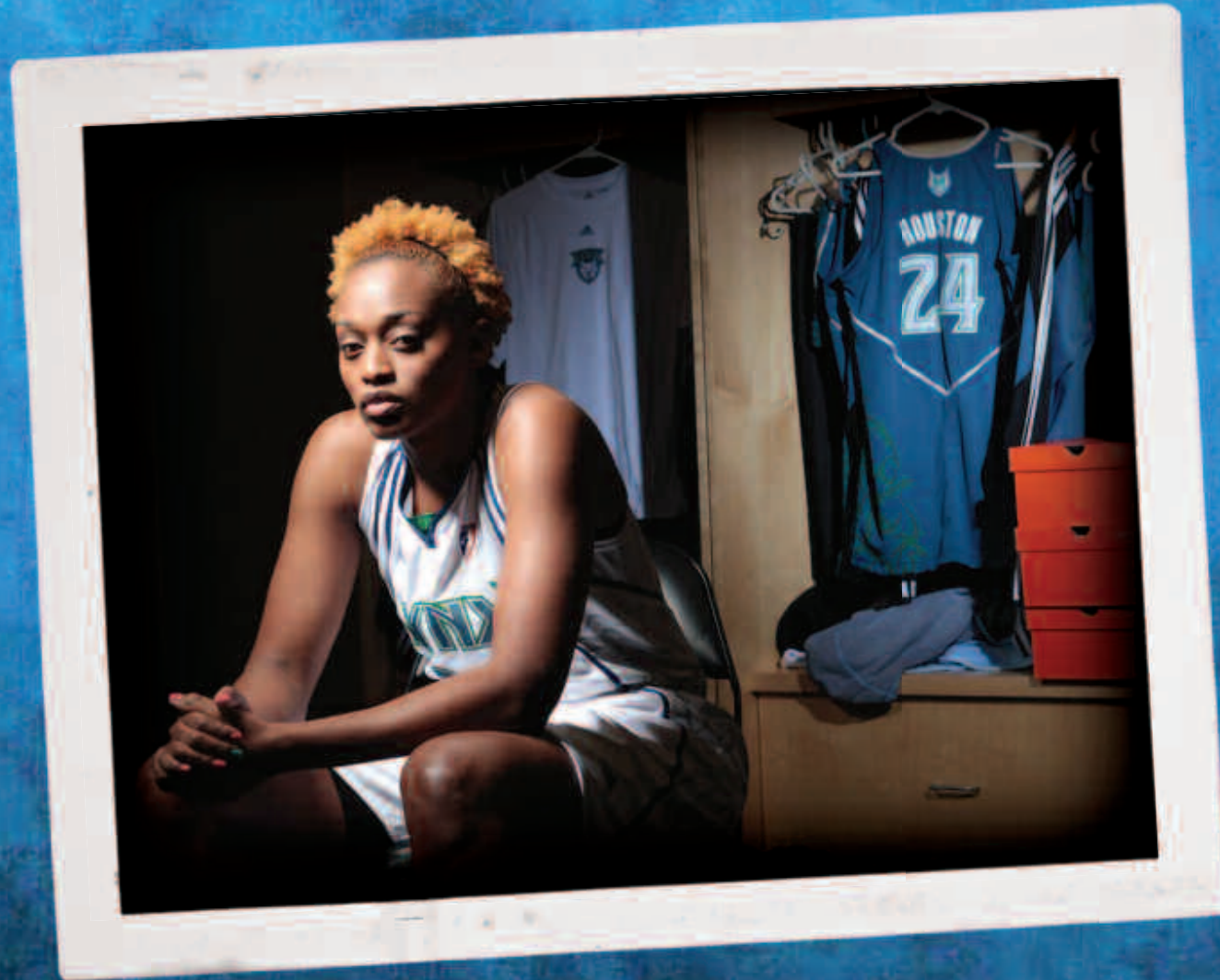

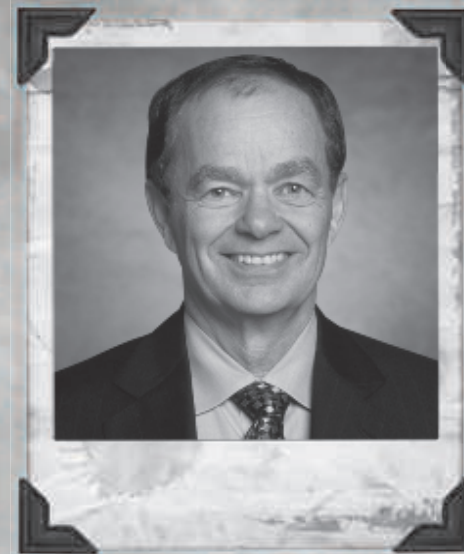

GLEN TAYLOR



Owner

On March 23, 1995, Glen Taylor closed the deal that made him majority owner of the Minnesota Timberwolves. He added the title of NBA owner to a list that already included international businessman, state senator, entrepreneur, philanthropist and executive of the year. In October 2002, Taylor became the majority owner of the WNBA's Minnesota Lynx after a change in the league's ownership structure. Taylor had served as the operating owner of the Lynx for the previous four seasons of the team's existence, beginning with the 1999 inaugural campaign.

Before he even completed his first full season as Timberwolves owner, Taylor set in motion his plan for making a mark on the Minnesota sports scene. Prior to the completion of the sale of the team from Marv Wolfenson and Harvey Ratner, Taylor installed Rob Moor, Roger Griffith and Chris Wright to run the business functions of the franchise. In 1999, Taylor brought women's professional basketball back to the Twin Cities by operating the Lynx and added the duties of Lynx Chief Operating Officer to Griffith's responsibilities. In the winter of 2008, Taylor shifted the balance of power within the Lynx by naming Griffith the company's Executive Vice President and appointing longtime Timberwolves and Lynx Vice President of New Business Development Conrad Smith as the new Chief Operating Officer of the Lynx. During the 2009 off-season, Taylor appointed longtime successful WNBA assistant coach Cheryl Reeve as the franchise's seventh head coach.

Glen Taylor is chairman of the multinational Taylor Corporation, based in Mankato, MN. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota State University, Mankato. During this period, he worked part time at Carlson Wedding Service, a print shop specializing in formal invitations. After graduation he continued to work at the company, developing strategies to cut delivery time, improve service and expand offerings. Taylor purchased the company in 1975, assembled a passionate leadership team and dramatically expanded the firm's capabilities, growing it into one of the largest privately held companies in the United States. Today Taylor Corporation, based in North Mankato, includes more than 80 subsidiaries providing business and personal communications products, technologies and marketing services. Other enterprises owned by Glen are in securities, agricultural, and medical fields.

He continued his education at the Harvard Graduate School of Business. In 1997, Mankato State University awarded Taylor their first honorary doctorate. Taylor received the degree of Honorary Doctor of Laws for his distinguished professional career and volunteer service. In October 2001, Taylor was inducted into the Minnesota State University, Mankato Hall of Distinction.

Taylor's business savvy has been recognized by Corporate Report magazine, which honored him as its Executive of the Year (1987), and the Sales and Marketing Executives of Minneapolis/St. Paul, who awarded him with their Sales Executive of the Year Award (1999). He was also inducted into the Minnesota Hall of Fame (2002) by Twin Cities Monthly Magazine.

Taylor was elected to the Minnesota Senate in 1980, where he served until 1990. He became assistant Senate minority leader in 1982. From 1984 to 1986, he served as Senate minority leader. While in the Senate, Taylor was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of higher education, child care and economic development policies.

He has served on the NBA Planning Committee and has been Chairman of the Audit Committee. In October of 2008, Taylor was named chairman of the NBA's Board of Governors.

Through personal involvement, Taylor has remained active in many community, civic and charitable causes. He has also served on his church's board of deacons and board of trustees and on the Mankato State University Foundation board of directors.

Taylor and his family have provided financial assistance and participated in missions to Africa, Turkey, Egypt and Central America to support the Starkey Hearing Foundation and Common Hope.

Nationally, Taylor has provided expert testimony on business and child care issues to the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives and served as a committee chair on the 1991 Commission on Reform and Efficiency (CORE).

Taylor and his wife, Becky, live in Mankato. Their children and grandchildren enjoy attending many of the Timberwolves and Lynx games.

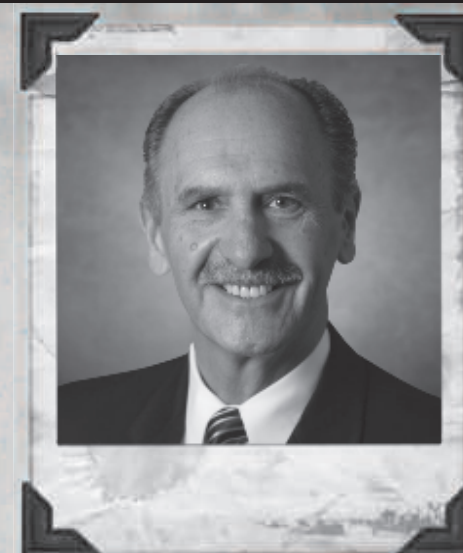

Prior to that, Wright also served as general manager for two Major Indoor Soccer League Teams, the Pittsburgh Spirit (1981-86) and the Minnesota Strikers (1986-87).

Wright, who graduated from Carnegie College of Physical Education in Headingley Leeds, Yorkshire, England, is very involved in and consults with many local charities and youth sports programs. He was elected to and serves on the board of the Minneapolis Downtown Council and the Minneapolis Regional Chamber of Commerce.

He resides in Eden Prairie, Minn., with his wife, Walla, their sons Jeff and Ned, and their daughter, Christy.

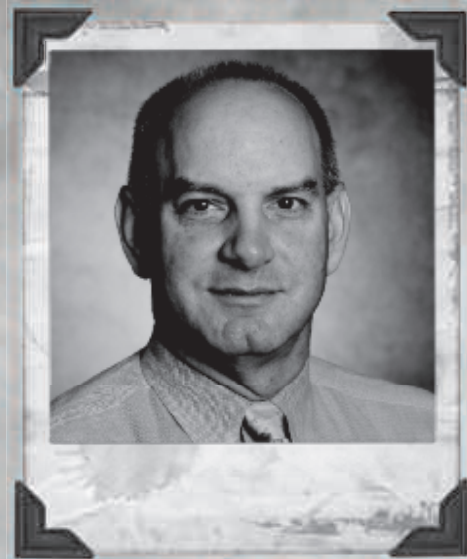

CHERYL REEVE



Head Coach

Cheryl Reeve was named head coach of the Minnesota Lynx on Dec. 8, 2009, taking over for former head coach Jennifer Gillom. Reeve begins her first season as a head coach in the WNBA after spending the past nine years as an assistant.

Reeve's coaching resume includes 21 years as both an assistant and a head coach at the collegiate and WNBA levels. In 2009, Reeve served as an assistant coach with the WNBA's Detroit Shock, and was promoted to the team's general manager position just three games into the season. Hired by three-time WNBA champion head coach Bill Laimbeer, Reeve joined the Shock coaching staff in 2006 and helped the franchise reach the WNBA Finals in each of her first three years, winning WNBA titles in 2006 and 2008. During her four years with Detroit, the team held an 87-49 win/loss record and won at least 18 games each season, including 24 in 2007. Reeve also served as the Shock's director of player personnel in 2008.

Reeve got her start in the WNBA with the Charlotte Sting in 2001 when she joined Anne Donovan's staff as an assistant coach. After posting an 8-24 record in 2000, Charlotte turned things around in Reeve's first year, going 18-14 en route to advancing to the WNBA Finals. Reeve spent the 2002 season again in Charlotte before joining Dan Hughes' coaching staff in Cleveland for the 2003 season. Reeve returned to the Sting in 2004 and 2005 before joining Detroit in 2006. In Reeve's nine years as an assistant in the WNBA, she's compiled a .543 winning percentage (163-137 W/L), including seven post-season appearances and advancing to the WNBA Finals four times.

Before joining the WNBA coaching ranks, Reeve spent 12 years coaching collegiately, including a five-year stint as head coach at Indiana State from 1995-2000. Reeve guided the Sycamores to the program's first postseason berth in 20 years following the 1998-99 campaign.

Reeve also spent five years as an assistant coach at George Washington. During that time, the Colonials posted five 20-win seasons, captured three Atlantic 10 Conference Championships and appeared in four NCAA Tournaments. Reeve got her start in coaching at her alma matter, La Salle, as an assistant coach for two seasons.

As a player at La Salle, Reeve led the nationally-ranked Explorers to a 25-5 record in 1987-1988. She was named All-Metro

Atlantic Conference and was an All-Big 5 selection as a senior. Reeve holds the school record for most games started (110) and ranks fourth on La Salle's career assist leader board (420).

Reeve excelled athletically and academically at La Salle, graduating with a degree in computer science/management information systems. A Rhodes Scholar nominee, Reeve received both a MAAC Scholar-Athlete Post Graduate Award and a NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship in 1988. She went on to earn her master's degree in business administration from her alma mater while also serving two years as an assistant coach for the Explorers.

The 2010 season is Jim Petersen's second as Lynx assistant coach. In 2009, Petersen was hired by then head coach Don Zierden as assistant coach, and remained behind the bench when Jen Gillom took over the reigns prior to the start of the season.

With the Lynx, Petersen is responsible for the team's scouting efforts, talent evaluation, and player development with a focus on the post players.

In addition to his coaching duties with the Lynx, Petersen has spent the past 11 seasons with the Minnesota Timberwolves broadcast staff.

Petersen spent his eight-year NBA career (1984-92) with the Houston Rockets, Sacramento Kings and Golden State Warriors. Petersen finished with career averages of 6.9 ppg and 4.8 rpg in 491 games, 208 starts.

A native of Minneapolis, Petersen won the Minnesota Mr. Basketball award as a high school senior in 1980. Prior to his NBA playing and broadcasting careers, Petersen played four seasons for the University of Minnesota Golden Gophers, winning the Big Ten Championship in 1982.

After leaving the NBA, Petersen worked for the NBA Players Association in their player programs division, facilitating seminars in NBA locker rooms on topics such as AIDS awareness, substance abuse and career/financial planning for life after basketball.

Petersen currently resides in Wayzata along with his wife, Tika, and son, Sanjay.



Manager of Advanced Scouting & Player Development.

The 2010 season will be Patterson's first with the Minnesota Lynx.

A 20-year coaching veteran in both the professional and collegiate ranks, Patterson has spent the past three years on Brian Agler's staff in Seattle. Prior to that, Patterson spent parts of the eight years working in different capacities with five WNBA organizations. Patterson, a native of San Jose, Calif., served as an assistant coach for the Charlotte Sting in 2006 under head coach Muggsy Bogues. Prior to that, Patterson spent the 2005 season on the Los Angeles Sparks bench as assistant coach.

With the Lynx, Patterson will provide support in opponent scout preparation and game planning as well as individual player development.

Patterson began her career in Houston where she served as Director of Basketball Operations and won a WNBA Championship with the Comets during the 1999 WNBA season. She then spent four years (2000-2003) working as an assistant coach with the Indiana Fever before joining the coaching staff of the Phoenix Mercury in 2004.

In addition to her work in the WNBA, Patterson served as head coach for the National Women's Basketball League's Chicago Blaze in 2005 and worked as an assistant coach with the Philadelphia Rage of the ABL during the 1998-99 season. Patterson began her coaching career in 1989 as a recruiting coordinator at Indiana State University and has held positions at Ohio University, the University of Arizona, Wake Forest and Dayton.

As a player, Patterson spent her college career at Washington State University where she still ranks among the school's all-time leaders in assists and steals.



Manager of Basketball Operations & Video

The 2010 season will be Katie Alsdurf's second as the Lynx manager of basketball operations and video. She will also serve as the team's equipment manager in 2010.

Alsdurf originally joined the Lynx staff in September of 2007 as basketball operations coordinator.

In her role, Alsdurf oversees the day-to-day operations of the Lynx front office and assists in the strategic planning processes of player personnel and development.

A native of Forest Lake, Minn., Alsdurf attended Marquette University on a basketball scholarship, where she was named to the Conference USA All-Freshman team in 2002. In 2003, Alsdurf returned to her roots when she transferred to the University of Minnesota. Alsdurf was a member of the 2004 Final Four team, while off the court she was a two-time Academic All Big Ten honoree. Alsdurf recently completed her first season as an assistant coach with the St. Thomas University women's program.

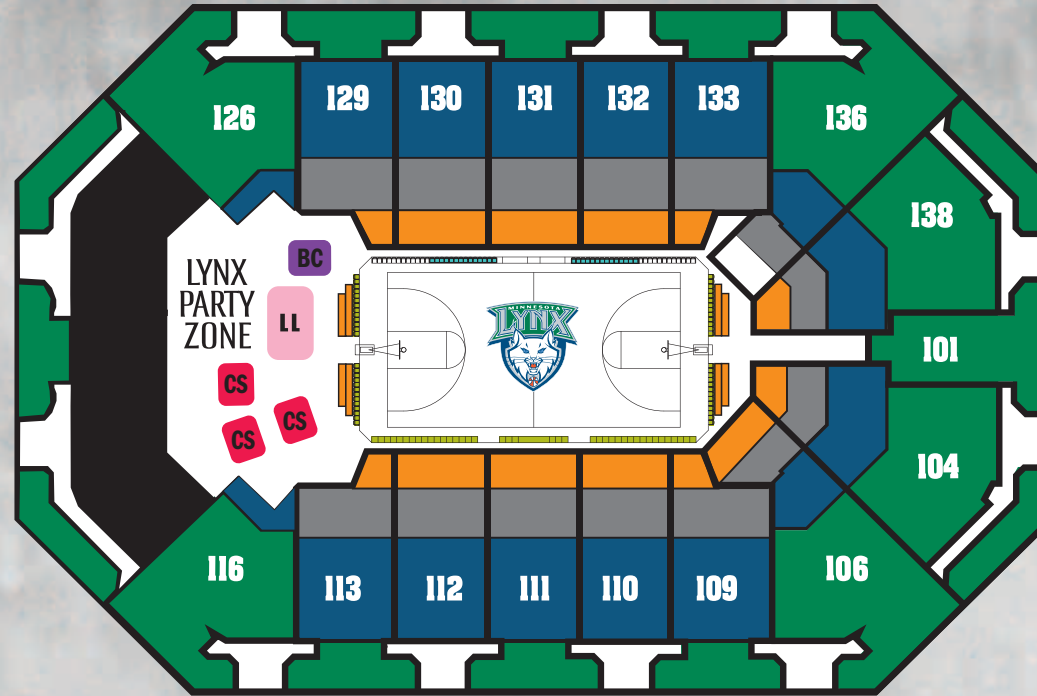

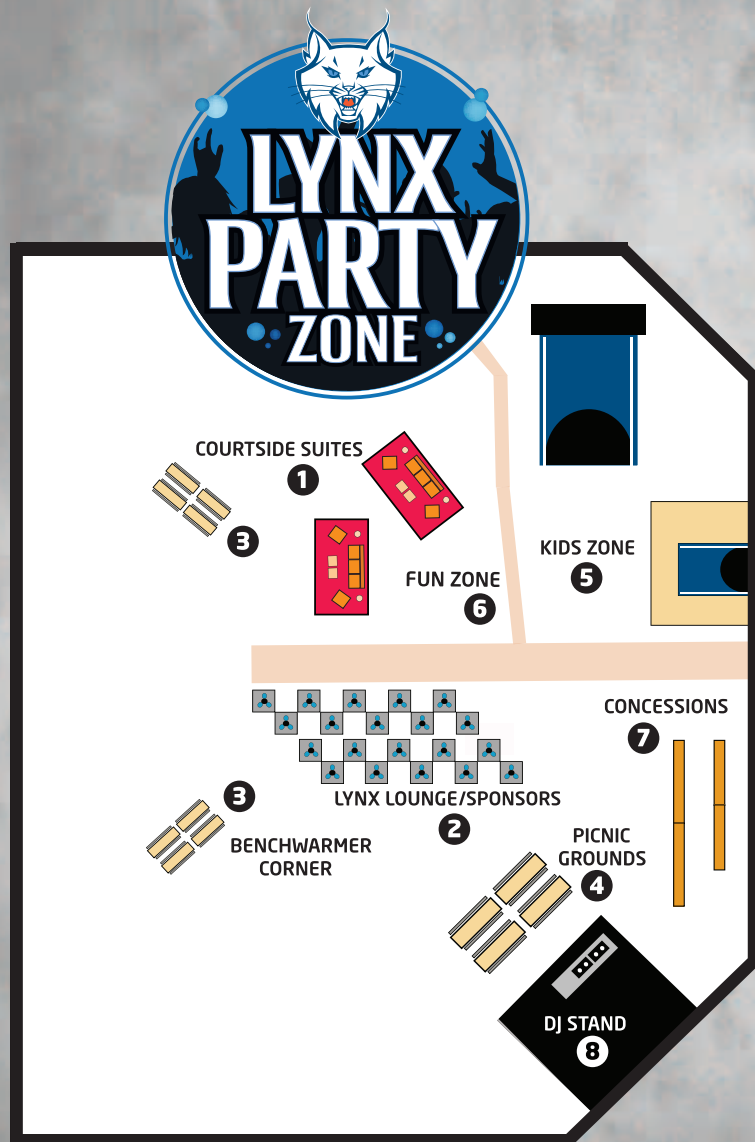

Press seating at Lynx home games at Target Center is available to accredited media at tables located courtside, in the court-level auxiliary media section. Single-game credentials must be requested no later than noon the day before the game (Friday at 5:00 p.m. for Sunday and Monday games). Requests should be made via e-mail to Lynx public relations coordinator Aaron Seehusen, seehusen@lynxbasketball.com. Fax requests will also be accepted at (612) 673-8407. Credentials are good for admittance to Target Center, the arena floor, the locker rooms, the media work room and the media dining room. Those requesting single-game credentials will be seated on a first-come, first-served basis. Those holding Lynx or WNBA season credentials may enter the building through the Target Center Media Entrance located at the corner of Sixth St. and Second Ave. Single-game credentials may also be picked up at the Media Entrance. **ALL MEDIA WILL BE REQUIRED TO PRESENT A PHOTO IDENTIFICATION PRIOR TO RECEIVING THEIR CREDENTIALS. ALL BAGS ARE SUBJECT TO INSPECTION PRIOR TO RECEIVING A CREDENTIAL.** Media members holding season passes should notify the public relations department if planning to cover a game in order to reserve seating. A media credential cannot be used to sit in spectator seating areas.

DINING ROOM

Accredited media is invited to have a complimentary meal before each game in the Minnesota Lynx media dining room located on the arena bowl level. The dining room opens two hours before each game. Dining room usage will be limited to members of the media with valid Lynx or WNBA media passes. It is impossible to accommodate family members, friends, guests or others. **ANY ABUSE OF DINING ROOM PRIVILEGES WILL CAUSE FORFEITURE OF YOUR MEDIA PASS.**

SERVICES

Complete statistics, along with pregame media notes, lineup information regarding injuries and other pertinent facts, will be furnished by the Lynx public relations department. Play-by-play sheets, halftime and final box scores and postgame coach/player quotes will be delivered to working media areas. There are sufficient electrical outlets available, and telephones are located at various points along press row and in the media work room. Preference for telephone use will be given to writers and broadcasters filing stories on deadline. The Lynx also provide one fax machine, which is available for complimentary use by working media.

PHOTOGRAPHERS

Only those photographers on assignment will be allowed space on the floor, and their media credentials must be worn prominently at all times. Credentials are good for admittance to Target Center, the arena floor, media work room and media dining room. Photographers are only allowed within the designated photographers area at each end of the court, unless permission is granted through the Lynx public relations department to shoot in other areas of the arena. Spaces will be reserved for local dailies and wire service photographers. Other spaces are available on a first-come, first-served basis. Positions may be switched or rotated upon agreement of all parties involved. Professional courtesy should apply in all cases. **ALL BAGS ARE SUBJECT TO INSPECTION PRIOR TO RECEIVING A CREDENTIAL.**

LOCKER ROOM

Both the Lynx and visitors locker rooms will be opened 90 minutes before game time and will remain open until 30 minutes before the contest begins. SEASON SUMMARY

JUNE (7-3, 7-3)

The Lynx opened their 11th season with an 11-player roster after a long and busy off-season. The opening day roster included 11 players, just four of which returned from the 2008 season. The Lynx brought in defense specialist LaToya Pringle and veteran guards Roneeka Hodges and Kelly Miller to compliment a strong draft that included three of the first fifteen picks. Renee Montgomery (4th overall) went first to the Lynx followed by Quanitra Hollingsworth (9th overall) and Rashanda McCants (2nd round, 15th overall). The Lynx opened their 2009 (June 6) season routing the Chicago Sky 102-85 at home, improving to 7-4 all-time on opening day. Seimone Augustus led all scorers with 23 points. The 102 points scored was only the second time in team history the Lynx had scored 100 or more points in a game. Charde Houston scored 23 points the following night (June 7), as the Lynx moved to 2-0, defeating the Indiana Fever 96-74 at Conseco Fieldhouse. The 198 points scored on consecutive night was a franchise record for most points scored on back-to-back nights. Three nights later, the Lynx improved to 3-0 for the second consecutive season, topping the Los Angeles Sparks 87-76 at Target Center. Augustus led all scorers with 30 points. The Lynx would suffer their first loss of the season to the Seattle Storm on June 12. The Storm went on a 10-0 run in the first quarter and never looked back as Lauren Jackson recorded a double-double with 18 points and 11 rebounds in the Storm's 88-71 win. For her efforts through the first week of the season, Augustus was named the Western Conference Player of the Week for games played from June 6 to June 14. The following week the Lynx went west for their first extended road trip of the season, which featured stops in Sacramento, Phoenix and Seattle. The Lynx outlasted the Monarchs 86-83 on June 16. The victory included 18 lead changes. Five Monarchs scored in double figure points but it wasn't enough for Augustus who matched her season high with 30 points on 12-of-18 (.667 FG%) shooting. The season would take a turn for the worse the following night (June 17) however when Augustus, Minnesota's leading scorer and MVP candidate, went down with a torn ACL in a 104-80 loss to the Phoenix Mercury. The Seattle Storm handed the Lynx their second straight loss two days later (June 19) 90-62. Lauren Jackson made her presence felt again recording 26 points and six steals. The Lynx returned home four days later to beat the New York Liberty 69-57 behind Candice Wiggins' 25 points. Nicky Anosike also recorded her 100th career steal in her 42nd career game, making her the fifth fastest player in league history to record 100 career steals. The Lynx would get revenge on Phoenix later that week (June 27) as they routed the Mercury 109-80 scoring 28 points on 19 Mercury turnovers. Wiggins led the Lynx with 22 points, and would be named Western Conference Player of the Week for her efforts. The Lynx closed out the month of June in Atlanta (June 30) on national television (ESPN2. The Lynx, behind double-doubles recorded by both Nicky Anosike (20 points, ten rebounds, and eight steals) and Charde Houston (18 points and 10 rebounds), cruised to a 91-85 victory to improve to 7-3 on the season.

JULY (3-7, 10-10)

The Lynx started July on the wrong foot, losing to the last-place Sacramento Monarchs at home, 74-68 (July 2). The Lynx would rebound quickly the following week (July 7) in a thrilling 96-94 overtime victory over the Washington Mystics. Lynx center Nicky Anosike recotrded a career-high 24 points. Next up for the Lynx was a home-and-home matchup with the San Antonio Silver Stars. In the first contest, the Silver Stars held the Lynx to a season low in scoring en route to claiming a 77-61 victory. The Lynx got revenge two days later back in San Antonio, defeating the Silver Stars 83-76 behind Charde Houston's career-high 26 points. The Lynx came home to play their annual day game against the Atlanta Dream on July 15. Charde Houston recorded her second double-double of the season (15 points, 12 rebounds), but the Dream would outlast the Lynx 91-77 led by Chamique Holdsclaw's 28 points. Four night's later, the Seattle Storm used a late fourth-quarter rally to slip past the Lynx at KeyArena, 72-69. Nicky Anosike added another double-double (12 points, 11 rebounds) in defeat. With the loss, Minnesota dropped to 9-6. The Lynx finished the first half of the season on a strong note three days later in Phoenix, edging the Mercury 99-86 (July 22). Five Lynx players scored in double-figures, including newly-acquired Tasha Humphrey (17 points). The Lynx kept busy during the All-Star break as well this season. While second year players Charde Houston and Nicky Anosike were representing the Lynx in the All-Star game, the front office was busy making more moves bringing in Spanish veteran Anna Montañana (Lynx waived LaToya Pringle to make roster space for Montañana). The Lynx returned home to welcome the Los Angeles Sparks to begin the second half of the season. Both teams struggled throughout the game, until Tina Thompson found her shot, scoring 15 of her 30 points in the fourth quarter as the Sparks went on to win 76-70. Minnesota would close out July in Detroit (July 31), taking on the defending WNBA Champions. Five Lynx players scored in double-digit points, four of which came off the bench, but they couldn't keep up with the Shock as the Lynx fell 91-83.

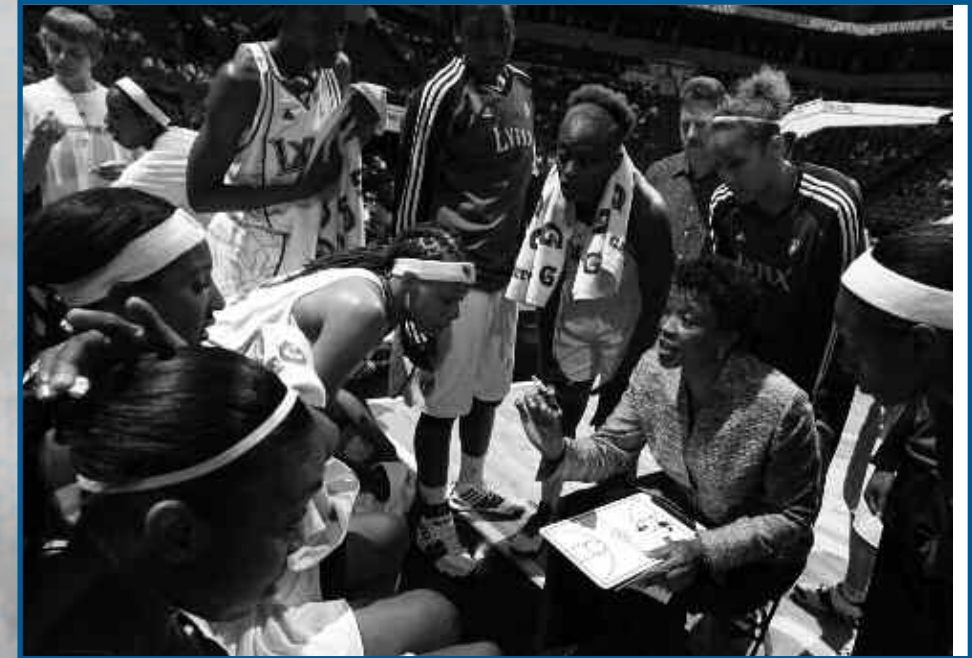
AUGUST (2-8, 12-17)

The Lynx began August at home, facing off against the Phoenix Mercury (August 1). The Mercury jumped out early and never looked back, beating the Lynx 87-74 to stretch the Lynx's losing streak to a season-high three games. Six days later, Connecticut and Lindsay Whalen paid a visit to Target Center. The Sun took an early lead, but the Lynx rallied behind Nicky Anosike and Charde Houston to claim a 95-88 victory. For the second time this season Anosike (19 points, 12 rebounds) and Houston (16 points, 10 rebounds) both recorded double-doubles; it's the fifth time in franchise history two Lynx teammates recorded double-doubles in the same game. Two nights (August 9) later the San Antonio Silver Stars came back to Target Center, trailing the Lynx by 1.5 games for third in the Western Conference standings. The Lynx trailed by as much as 17 in the second half before going on a late game run, tying the game on Nicky Anosike's first career three-pointer with 20 seconds to play. The Silver Stars were able to come away with the win 89-87 after Ann Wauters made the game-winning basket as time expired. Anosike led the Lynx that night with 24 points. The Lynx finished their four-game home stretch against the Eastern Conference leaders, the Indiana Fever (August 13). The Fever went on an 18-2 run in the fourth quarter to run away with a 91-81 win. Candice Wiggins led the Lynx with 23 points and Nicky Anosike hauled in a franchise record 16 rebounds. The Lynx hit the road (August 15) for the first time all month to take on the Chicago Sky. Roneeka Hodges scored 25 points shooting 5-10 (.500 FG%) from outside, but it wasn't enough as the Lynx dropped their third straight, 79-76. Minnesota made their first trip to Los Angeles to take on a rejuvenated Sparks team (August 19). The Lynx were able to keep up with the Sparks in the first half, but Lisa Leslie would make her presence felt as Los Angeles outscored the Lynx 25-9 in the third quarter. The Sparks would walk away with a 78-63 victory behind Leslie's season-high 28 points. Minnesota held a 10-point lead at halftime three days later against Connecticut, but the Sun fought back to steal a 98-94 win over the Lynx. Tasha Humphrey recorded a season-high 21 points, 18 of which came in the first half. Candice Wiggins also had 21 points and Renee Montgomery added 18 points as well. The following night (August 23) the Lynx traveled to New York to play the back end of their third

back-to-back series of the season. Once again the Lynx jumped out to an early lead scoring 30 points in the first quarter, but could only muscle up 20 points in the second and third quarter combined as the Liberty went on to win 80-67. The Lynx returned home August 28, posting a franchise- and all-time WNBA-high 64 points in the first half of a 100-95 win over the Sacramento Monarchs. The win snapped a six game losing streak. The Lynx closed out August with a trip to Washington. The Lynx held a four-point lead at halftime but couldn't fight back after being outscored 33-16 in the third quarter. The Mystics would go on to win 81-75.

SEPTEMBER (2-3, 14-20)

September began with a crucial game in San Antonio (September 1). The two teams came in to the game tied for the fourth and final playoff in the West, both sitting at 12-17. Both Nicky Anosike and Charde Houston recorded double-doubles, but it wasn't enough as Becky Hammon scored 29 for the Silver Stars to lift them to an 84-82 double-overtime win. Playing without All-Star center Nicky Anosike, the Lynx returned home to host the Seattle Storm (September 5). After allowing a franchise-low five points in the first quarter, the Lynx fell behind in the fourth, only to outscore the Storm 20-9 in the fourth quarter to win 76-68. The playoff hunt continued September 9 as the Lynx hosted the Detroit Shock who came in winning seven of their previous eight games. The Lynx were out-rebounded 43-27 by a physical Detroit team, but would rally behind its bench to win their third straight home game, 75-72. Rookies Rashanda McCants, Renee Montgomery, and Anna Montañana led the Lynx with 12 points each of the bench. Needing to win their two remaining regular season contests, the Lynx traveled to Los Angeles on September 11 to play the Sparks in Lisa Leslie's final home regular season game. The Sparks jumped on the Lynx quickly and would never look back as they led the entire game, eventually claiming a 90-61 win, which eliminated the Lynx from the playoffs. Two nights later in Sacramento, Charde Houston led the Lynx with 18 points and six rebounds, but it wasn't enough to slow down Nicole Powell as she scored 29 points and grabbed 10 rebounds as the Monarchs won 88-66.

2003
JAN. 21 Hired Suzie McConnell Serio as head coach.
FEB. 21 Named Nancy Darsch assistant coach.
APR. 24 Selected forward Sheri Sam (Miami Sol) in the 2003 WNBA Dispersal Draft.
APR. 25 Selected three players in the 2003 WNBA Draft: Georgia guard Teresa Edwards (second round, 14th overall), New Mexico center Jordan Adams (second round, 18th overall) and Drake center Caria Bennett (third round, 29th overall); hired Carolyn Jenkins as an assistant coach.
JUNE 1 Minnesota posted its first-ever win over Houston with a 68-64 overtime triumph, ending a 13-game drought.
JUNE 10 Guard Katie Smith connected on a three-pointer with 3:43 to play in the first half at Los Angeles was the 300th of her WNBA career, making her the first player in league history to reach that milestone.
JUNE 14 Guard Katie Smith matched league records for three-pointers made in a game (seven) and a half (five, first half) at Seattle.
JUNE 27 Guard Katie Smith recorded the 500th three-pointer of her U.S. professional career (ABL/WNBA) vs. Phoenix.
JULY 1 Guard Katie Smith scored the 2,500th point of her WNBA career (in her 139th game) at Houston, the seventh player in league history to reach that plateau; only Cynthia Cooper (117 games) achieved 2,500 points faster.
JULY 2 Guard Katie Smith was named to the Western Conference team for the 2003 WNBA All-Star Game on July 12 at Madison Square Garden in New York, her fourth consecutive selection.
JULY 12 Guard Katie Smith played in her fourth straight WNBA All-Star Game in New York City, scoring two points in 15 minutes.
JULY 16 Guard Katie Smith moved past Cynthia Cooper (2,601 points) into fifth place on the WNBA's all-time scoring chart vs. San Antonio.
JULY 20 The Fifth Annual Minnesota Lynx "Great Basketball Dribble" was held following the Lynx game against Seattle Storm. The 2003 GBD raised \$15,000 for breast cancer research in the state of Minnesota. In five years, the Lynx have helped raise over \$500,000 for breast cancer research.
JULY 25 The Lynx set a franchise record for largest winning margin with an 81-54 triumph over San Antonio at Target Center.
JULY 26 Guard Katie Smith became the first player in league history to reach the 350 career trey mark at Indiana.
AUG. 2 Guard Katie Smith hit a game-winning basket with no time remaining vs. Seattle, marking just the third time in franchise history that the Lynx have won a game in the final five seconds - and the first at Target Center.
AUG. 4 Guard Katie Smith went 0-for-2 from three-point range vs. Phoenix, snapping her WNBA-record string of 32 consecutive games with a made trey (dating to July 29, 2002 at Phoenix).
AUG. 4 With a win over Phoenix, Minnesota recorded their club-record seventh straight victory at Target Center. The 11 home wins overall is the best single-season total in franchise history; Minnesota compiled 8-8 records in both 1999 and 2000.
AUG. 4 The Lynx made all 20 of their free-throw attempts (including 18-for-18 in the second half) vs. Phoenix, equaling the fourth-highest single-game total without a miss in WNBA history.
AUG. 9 Minnesota established a franchise record by winning its 16th game of the season at Sacramento (77-73).
AUG. 14 Forward Sheri Sam became the 25th player in league history to score 2,000 points in her WNBA career (vs. Los Angeles).

AUG. 20 With a 69-66 win at Phoenix, Minnesota clinched its first-ever playoff berth. The Lynx also recorded their 18th victory of the season, the most wins in club history.
AUG. 23 Forward Tamika Williams finished the regular season shooting 66.8%, a WNBA single-season record for FG percentage.
AUG. 28 Minnesota won its first-ever WNBA Playoff game with a 74-72 win against the LA Sparks at Target Center. Tamika Williams' steal and layup with 7.4 seconds remaining capped a monumental rally for the Lynx. The Lynx set a WNBA Playoff record for largest comeback after trailing by as many as 21 points.
SEPT. 1 Minnesota falls to Los Angeles 74-64 at STAPLES Center and drops its best-of-three first-round playoff series to the Sparks (1-2).

APR. 17 Selected five players in the 2004 WNBA Draft: Kansas State forward Nicole Ohlde (first round, sixth overall), Florida center Vanessa Hayden (first round, seventh overall), Tennessee guard Tasha Butts (second round, 20th overall), Boston College guard Amber Jacobs (third round, 33rd overall) and West Virginia guard Kate Bulger (third round, 38th overall).
JUNE 5 Forward Tamika Williams shot a perfect 7-for-7 from the field in a 76-68 victory over the Phoenix Mercury, setting a franchise single-game record for most field goals with out a miss (one shy of the WNBA mark).
JUNE 11 Guard Katie Smith became the fastest player to reach 3,000 career points (167 games) with 14:13 left in the first half of a 69-55 loss at Los Angeles.
JULY 3 Guard Katie Smith, the WNBA's career leader in three-pointers made and attempted, drilled her 400th three-pointer with 15:33 left in the second half of a 78-70 win over Detroit.
JULY 9 Set a franchise record with the biggest regular-season comeback (down 20 with 6:30 remaining) in team history against Phoenix, winning the game 61-59 at Target Center.
JULY 14 Defeated the Connecticut Sun 66-63 in front of a franchise-record crowd of 16,227 at Target Center.
JULY 15 Center Nicole Ohlde blocked three shots against New York to bring her season total to 30 on the season and breaking the franchise single-season record set by Erin Buescher in 2001.
JULY 22 Defeated the Connecticut Sun 68-52 at the Mohegan Sun Arena, setting a club record with their sixth consecutive win.
SEPT. 10 Defeated the Seattle Storm 64-61 in the regular-season home finale at Target Center, finishing the season with an 11-6 home record, tying the team record for most home wins in a season.
SEPT. 7 Defeated Los Angeles at STAPLES Center 78-66 to clinch a second consecutive WNBA playoffs berth and tie a team record with 18 regular season victories. The win also tied a franchise record for single-season road victories.
SEPT. 19 Lost to Sacramento in the regular season finale 72-63, but secured the No. 3 seed in the Western Conference Playoffs due to holding the tie-breaker advantage over the Monarchs.

JUNE 4 Center Vanessa Hayden blocked six shots in a win over Charlotte, a franchise record.
JULY 9 Guard Katie Smith played in her fifth straight WNBA All-Star Game in Uncasville, Conn., scoring 16 points on 4-of-9 shooting.
JULY 13 Guard Katie Smith scored the 5,000-point of her career, becoming the first player in the history of United States women's professional basketball to reach the plateau.
JULY 17 Center Vanessa Hayden broke Nicole Ohlde's franchise single-season block record with her 46th block of the season. Hayden finished the season with 68.
AUG. 7 Defeated Los Angeles 76-72 for the 100th regular-season win in franchise history.
AUG. 9 Head Coach Suzie McConnell Serio won career game 49, moving past Brian Agler for the most coaching victories in franchise history.
AUG. 16 Head Coach Suzie McConnell Serio became the 11th coach in league history to reach the 50-career win plateau as the Lynx defeated Houston.
2006
MAY 19 The Lynx opened the 2006 season with a 69-81 home loss to Connecticut. Seimone Augustus scored a team-high 21 points in her regular season debut and center Vanessa Hayden recorded her 100th career block.
MAY 31 Minnesota scored a league-record 114 points in its first win of the 2006 WNBA campaign, defeating the Los Angeles Sparks by 43 points at Target Center. The final point spread ties the second-largest margin of victory in league history. They also set the WNBA record for points in a quarter with a 33-point explosion in the third and tied the league record for three-pointers made with 15. Seimone Augustus led a team-record six Lynx players in double-figures with 26 points.
JUNE 5 Guard Seimone Augustus was named WNBA Player of the Week for games played May 29-June 4. She averaged 25.7 ppg. for the week in leading the Lynx to a 2-1 record.
JUNE 11 The Lynx defeated Houston 75-62 for their third consecutive home win of the season. Their 13-point margin of victory was Minnesota's biggest win vs. the Comets. Forward Adrian Williams scored her 1500th career point.
JUNE 14 Guard Seimone Augustus scored a career-high 32 points as the Lynx beat the Phoenix Mercury 94-82 at Target Center. The 94-point output is the second highest in team history.
JUNE 28 Guard Svetlana Abrosimova played in the 150th game of her career in a 78-81 loss at Phoenix.
JULY 8 Guard Seimone Augustus was named to the Western Conference team for the 2006 All-Star Game at Madison Square Garden.
JULY 9 In their last game before the All-Star Break, the Lynx rallied to beat the San Antonio Silver Stars 85-80 at home. The second-largest regular-season comeback in team history. Forward Tamika Williams reached 150 games for her career.
JULY 12 Guard Seimone Augustus scored a team-high 16 points (7-11 FG) for the Western Conference in the 2006 WNBA All-Star Game at Madison Square Garden. Augustus is the fourth Lynx player to appear in the contest. The East won 98-82.
JULY 16 Forward Nicole Ohlde grabbed her 500th career rebound in a 78-90 home loss to the Los Angeles Sparks.
JULY 19 Guard Amber Jacobs scored a career-high 24 points on perfect shooting from the field (7-7) and the free-throw line (7-7) to lead the Lynx over the Chicago Sky 90-82. The Lynx annual Kid's Day game was the second-highest attendance in franchise history (14,793).
JULY 22 Guard Seimone Augustus scored her 500th point in a loss to Sacramento. She became the second-fastest player in WNBA history to reach the mark (23 games). Cynthia Cooper took 22 games in 2001.

JULY 25 Forward Nicole Ohlde scored her 1000th career point and center Vanessa Hayden tallied her 500th career point in a 70-62 win at Charlotte. The win was also Carolyn Jenkins' first as a head coach.
AUG. 8 Forward Nicole Ohlde reached 100 games for her career in a 99-68 loss at Phoenix.
AUG. 10 Guard Seimone Augustus scored 31 points in a 74-66 loss at Sacramento. It was the sixth time Augustus tallied 30+ points on the season, breaking Katie Smith's club record of five in 2001.

APR. 5 Selected four players in the 2007 WNBA Draft: UCLA guard Noelle Quinn (1st round, 4th overall), USC guard Eshaya Murphy (2nd round, 15th overall), Stanford center Brooke Smith, (2nd round, 23rd overall) and Boston College forward Kathrin Riss (2nd round, 24th overall).

JUNE 8 Guard Seimone Augustus set a WNBA record for field-goal accuracy when she made all 11 of her shots for 28 points in a 90-87 loss at the Los Angeles Sparks.
JUNE 9 Minnesota falls, 90-76, at the Seattle Storm to fall to 1-9, which is the worst start to a season in franchise history.
JUNE 16 Seimone Augustus becomes the second-fastest player in WNBA history to record 1,000 career points in an 83-58 win over Los Angeles. The feat was accomplished in 46 games, one more than Cynthia Cooper.
JULY 9 Guard Seimone Augustus was named to the Western Conference team for the 2007 WNBA All-Star Game at Verizon Center in Washington, D.C.
JULY 25 Lynx drop a 103-79 loss to the Phoenix Mercury at Target Center to match a franchise record 10th straight loss.
AUG. 16 The Lynx made a season-high 13 three-pointers against the Detroit Shock, including a WNBA-record-setting 7-for-7 effort in the first quarter.
AUG. 19 Noelle Quinn handed out a franchise-record 14 assists as the Lynx closed out 2007 with an 81-55 victory over the San Antonio Silver Stars. With her 14 assists, Quinn also tied the franchise record for assists in a season (148), which was held by Teresa Edwards (2003). With her 14 points, Seimone Augustus closed out the season with a Lynx-record 769 points, which was also the second-highest mark in league history (Diana Taurasi, 860, 2006).

Game One at Target Center - Saturday, Sept. 25

Seattle 70, Minnesota 58

Lauren Jackson and Sheri Sam combined to score 23 of their 25 points in the second half as Seattle handed the Lynx a 70-58 defeat in Game 1 of their WNBA Playoff series on Sept. 25 at Target Center. The Storm held Minnesota without a basket for the opening five minutes to grab an eight-point lead. Trailing 15-7 midway through the first half, the Lynx rattled off 13 unanswered points over a four-minute stretch. Amanda Lassiter fueled the outburst with three 3-pointers, but after Tamika Williams' layup made it 22-16, Seattle responded with a 12-0 run of its own. Minnesota committed turnovers on seven consecutive possessions, helping the Storm build a 32-24 halftime lead. Two Svetlana Abrosimova baskets cut Seattle's lead to four early in the second half, and the Lynx were within 40-35 before Jackson erupted for 10 points in a span of 3:30 that doubled the Storm's lead to 54-44. After Nicole Ohlde cut the lead to six, Seattle used an 11-4 spurt to grab its biggest lead of the night at 65-52 with 5:40 to play. Tully Bevilacqua's trey capped the run, and Minnesota could get no closer than nine the rest of the way as the Storm picked up the first playoff victory in franchise history. Jackson finished with 14 points, while Sam tallied 11 points, a playoff-career-high 10 rebounds and seven assists. Ohlde's 17 points and six assists led the Lynx, with Williams adding 16 points and eight rebounds, and Lassiter scoring nine points.

Game Two at KeyArena - Monday, Sept. 27

Seattle 64, Minnesota 54

Lauren Jackson scored 18 points and Seattle advanced to the Western Conference finals with a 64-54 victory over the Lynx on Sept. 27, sweeping the best-of-three series. Nicole Ohlde's three-point play triggered a 7-0 spurt that gave Minnesota a 13-10 lead midway through the first half. The Storm, having lost Sue Bird earlier in the contest due to a broken nose, battled back in front when Alicia Thompson converted a three-point play at the 10:16 mark. The Lynx then used a pair of Stacey Lovelace-Tolbert jumpers to reclaim a four-point margin, but after Vanessa Hayden's layup put Minnesota in front 22-19, Seattle held the Lynx without a basket for more than five minutes and Jackson's basket helped the Storm build a 28-27 halftime edge. Down five early in the second half, Minnesota got nine points from Svetlana Abrosimova in a four-minute stretch to jump ahead 45-41. Seattle rallied to tie before Amber Jacobs struck from 3-point distance for a 48-45 Lynx lead with 9:47 to play, but Minnesota endured a seven-minute drought without a field goal as the Storm took control with a 14-1 run. A Janell Burse layup capped the uprising, which left Seattle ahead 59-49 with 2:51 to play. Abrosimova finally ended the scoring lull, but the Lynx did not threaten down the stretch in suffering their second straight first-round playoff ouster. Abrosimova led Minnesota with 14 points while Ohlde added 11 and Tamika Williams grabbed nine rebounds.

Game One at Target Center - Thursday, August 28 Minnesota 74, Los Angeles 72

Tamika Williams' steal and layup with 7.4 seconds remaining capped a monumental comeback as the Lynx handed Los Angeles a 74-72 setback in Game 1 of the best-of-three WNBA Playoff series on Aug. 28 at Target Center. The Sparks stormed out to a 17-6 lead less than five minutes into the contest, hitting eight of their first nine shots. Lisa Leslie poured in 17 points in the first half, which ended with Los Angeles on top 49-32 after Tamecka Dixon's three-pointer in the closing seconds. A jumper by Dixon gave the Sparks a 21-point advantage early in the second half, but Katie Smith ignited a 9-0 burst that sliced Minnesota's deficit to 53-41. Trailing by 10 with under nine minutes remaining, the Lynx outscored Los Angeles 13-2 to take their first lead of the night at 62-61 on a Williams layup. Leslie answered with a three-point play to reclaim the lead for L.A., but Teresa Edwards put Minnesota back in front 69-68 with a three-pointer at the 2:42 mark. Baskets by Mwadi Mabika and Leslie gave the Sparks a three-point edge in the final minute, setting the stage for a game-tying Smith trey that made it 72-72 with 24.4 seconds left. Williams then stole Mabika's inbound pass and drove for the go-ahead score. Edwards and Janell Burse combined to knock the ball loose from Mabika as time expired. Leslie finished with 24 points and Dixon added 18 for Los Angeles, which lost Nikki Teasley to injury midway through the first half. Smith's 23 points topped the Lynx in their first-ever playoff game, while Williams chipped in 16 points and Edwards handed out nine assists. Minnesota set a WNBA playoff record for largest comeback after trailing by as many as 21 points.

Game Two at STAPLES Center - Saturday, August 30 Los Angeles 80, Minnesota 69

Lisa Leslie had 20 points and nine rebounds as Los Angeles squared its first-round series by downing the Lynx, 80-69, on Aug. 30 at STAPLES Center. Janell Burse's three-point play gave Minnesota its only lead of the night at 5-3, before Mwadi Mabika sank a three-pointer to put the Sparks on top. Leslie's jumper capped a 10-0 surge that stretched L.A.'s lead to 13 midway through the first half. Trailing 30-15, the Lynx used a 9-2 spurt to close within eight on a Svetlana Abrosimova trey. The half ended with Los Angeles in front 36-26, taking advantage of 15 Minnesota turnovers for 16 points. The Sparks reeled off 10 unanswered points - four each by Leslie and Mabika - to open up the biggest lead of the night at 54-32 with 13:17 remaining. Minnesota battled back to within 73-65 when Teresa Edwards connected from long distance at the 3:05 mark, but the Lynx misfired on a pair of three-point attempts that would have sliced the deficit to five. Leslie answered on L.A.'s next possession, and the Sparks sank five consecutive free throws to seal the win. All five Los Angeles starters reached double figures, with DeLisha Milton and Tamecka Dixon tallying 17 points apiece and Milton grabbing 10 rebounds. Katie Smith's 18 points topped Minnesota, while Tamika Williams added 17 points and seven boards.

Game Three at STAPLES Center - Monday, September 1 Los Angeles 74, Minnesota 64

Lisa Leslie tallied 22 points and five blocks, and all five Los Angeles starters reached double figures in the series-clinching 74-64 win over the Lynx at STAPLES Center. Leslie scored the final two baskets of a 12-2 surge that gave the Sparks a 28-15 lead with 6:06 left in the first half. Minnesota chipped away with a pair of Katie Smith baskets sandwiched around Teresa Edwards' three-pointer to close within seven, but L.A. outscored the Lynx 6-1 down the stretch to take a 38-26 lead at intermission. DeLisha Milton had 12 first-half points to top the Sparks, who shot 50 percent from the floor while holding Minnesota to 32 percent. A three-point play by Leslie in the second half's opening minute gave Los Angeles its biggest lead of the night at 43-28. The Lynx rallied to within eight on a three-point play by Smith with 8:01 remaining, and Kristi Harrower's trey with 6:10 to play narrowed the deficit to 62-55. However, Mwadi Mabika answered on the Sparks' next possession and Leslie followed with a layup to push the margin back to 11, spoiling the second-half effort of Minnesota's Tamika Williams, who scored all 17 of her team-high points after intermission. Smith chipped in 11 points for the Lynx, while Edwards netted eight points and eight assists. Sheri Sam had seven points, eight rebounds and five steals. Tamecka Dixon scored 14 points for Los Angeles, with Milton and Nikki Teasley adding 13 apiece. Teasley also registered eight assists.

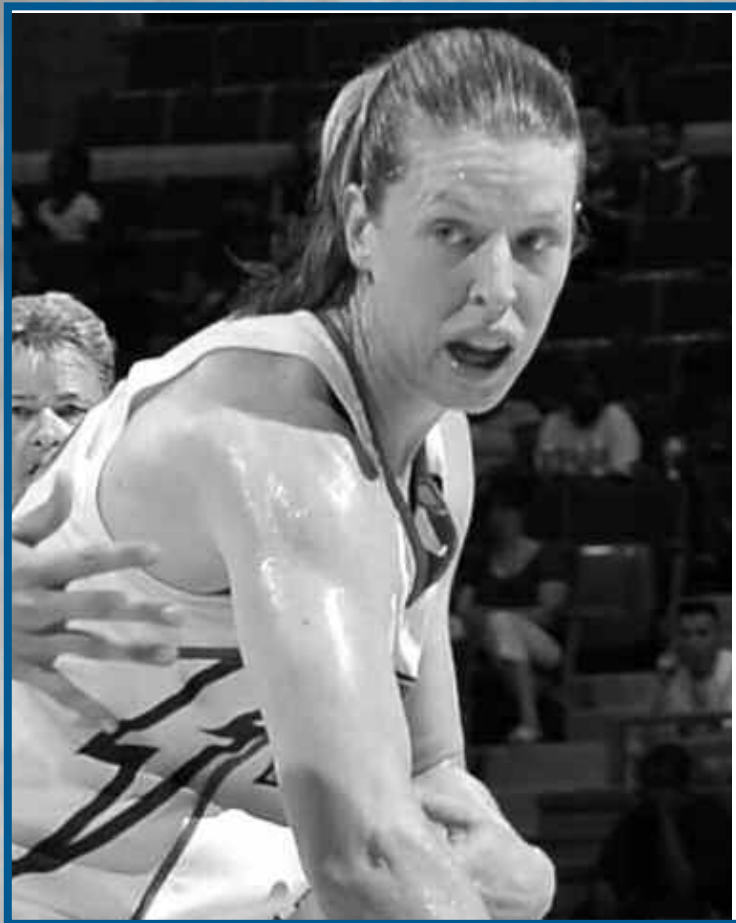

History:

On April 24, 1996, women's basketball announced "We Got Next" as the NBA Board of Governors approved the concept of a Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) to begin play in June of 1997.

Since that day in 1996 there have been many firsts for the WNBA: Val Ackerman -- the first president of the WNBA; Sheryl Swoopes -- the first player signed to the WNBA; Cynthia Cooper -- the league's first Most Valuable Player; Houston Comets -- the first WNBA Champions; Lisa Leslie -- the first WNBA player to dunk (7/30/02 vs. Miami); Lauren Jackson -- the first international player to win MVP (2007); Candace Parker -- the first rookie to earn the league's MVP honor (2008); Sylvia Fowles -- the first goaltending call (vs. LA 6/3/2008)

The inaugural WNBA season tipped off on June 21, 1997, with the New York Liberty taking on the Los Angeles Sparks at the Great Western Forum in Inglewood, California. A crowd of 14,284 watched as Sparks' guard Penny Toler scored the first basket in WNBA history. The Liberty defeated the Sparks, 67-57.

A Growing Game:

The influence of the WNBA can be seen in the explosive growth of organized women's basketball over the past 12 seasons. An estimated 100 million women play basketball worldwide, and our league reflects this trend, featuring 23 international players from 16 countries and territories at the end of the 2008 season. Female AAU youth basketball participation has increased +277 percent since 1990 (from 28,840 to 108,758 players). Female high school basketball participation has increased 18 percent since 1990 (from 387,802 to 456,967 players). And female NCAA basketball participation has increased 43 percent since 1990 (from 10,551 to 15,096 players).

All-Star Game:

This summer's marquee event "WNBA vs. USA Basketball: The Stars at the Sun" will showcase the world's best female basketball players under one roof when the WNBA's top talent faces the USA Basketball Women's National Team. This special event, hosted by the WNBA and the Connecticut Sun, will take place at the Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, CT on Saturday, July 10. ESPN will broadcast the game with tip-off set for 3:30 p.m. ET. The USA Basketball squad will be coached Geno Auriemma.

The 2009 WNBA All-Star Game was held at Mohegan Sun Arena in Uncasville, Conn. on Saturday, July 25. It was the ninth such game in league history, and second played at Mohegan Sun, and was played in front of a sellout crowd of 9,518. The West beat the East 130-118 in the highest scoring All-Star Game in WNBA history. Swin Cash of the Seattle Storm claimed MVP honors. Cash, who tallied an All-Star record 22 points on 10-of-16, was one of five former UConn Huskies who were participating in the game.

Inspiring Coach:

The Inspiring Coach Award is an annual honor introduced in 2007 to honor coaches who have positively influenced athletes across numerous levels and whose achievements leave an indelible mark on sports as a whole. The University of Tennessee's Pat Summitt earned the honor in 2009 for her profound impact on female athletes and her demonstrated commitment, passion, and dedication to work, family, and community. Previous winners include Kay Yow and Jody Conradt.

Inspiring Women:

The Inspiring Woman Award is an annual honor that celebrates an individual who, on a daily basis, demonstrates her ability to inspire others through her commitment, passion and dedication to work, family, and community. Past honorees include Emmy-award winning journalist Cokie Roberts, Good Morning America's Robin Roberts, Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice, and the WNBA All-Decade Team.

Dawn Staley Award:

The Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award was announced in 2006 and is now presented annually to the player who best exemplifies the characteristics of a leader in the community and reflects Staley's contagious leadership, spirit, charitable efforts and love for the game. Tamika Catchings won the inaugural award in 2007 while Tamika Raymond was named the winner for 2008. A member of the WNBA's All-Decade Team, Staley, who retired following the 2006 season, established herself as one of the greatest ambassadors in women's basketball history, while also demonstrating outstanding leadership qualities as a coach on the collegiate level and as a philanthropist and humanitarian.

Marketing:

The WNBA maintains marketing, promotional, and media partnerships with a variety of top companies, each with varying levels of activation and integration in league operations.

New partners in 2008 included such major companies as Kia Motors, IHOP and Pitney Bowes. HP, Starwood Hotels and Resorts and "Got Milk?" all joined the WNBA as partners for the 2009 season.

The WNBA's marketing partners utilize the league to support women's sports and reach its strong fan base of women, families, and young girls through advertising in WNBA nationally televised games, national promotions, player endorsements, and special events. Through the WNBA's extensive, highly integrated relationship with adidas, the sporting goods and apparel giant not only serves as the official outfitter of the WNBA - having unveiled new uniforms across the league in 2007 - but also as the presenter of the 2007, 2008, and 2009 WNBA Drafts and in 2008 became the first-ever presenting partner of the WNBA's entire postseason, including both the playoffs and Finals.

Two WNBA teams entered the 2009 season as forerunners in the league's Marquee Partnership program, which includes multiyear deals featuring branded sponsorship of game jerseys - the Phoenix Mercury partnering with LifeLock, a giant in the identity theft industry, and the Los Angeles Sparks partnering with Farmers Insurance Group.

Attendance:

TV Ratings: The WNBA concluded the 2009 regular season with its third consecutive year of increased attendance and second consecutive year of increased viewership on ESPN2. The WNBA regular season on ESPN2 concluded with an average of 269,000 viewers, up 8 percent versus 2008 (248,000 viewers). Regular-season games on ESPN2 saw increases in key demographics, including men 18-34 (+9 percent), men 18-49 (+14 percent), and men 23-54 (+23 percent).

For the 2009 WNBA Finals presented by adidas, average viewership on ESPN2 jumped 76 percent from 2008. The five-game series featuring the Indiana Fever and Phoenix Mercury also featured three sellouts and the highest total attendance figure (82,018) in WNBA Finals history.

The WNBA has one of the top five Facebook fanbases among sports leagues, with more than 275,000 fans (www.Facebook.com/wnba).

The WNBA's broadcast coverage in 2009 included live national telecasts of 29 regular-season and postseason contests on ESPN2 and ABC, and another 50 games on NBA TV, as well as games streamed on ESPN360.com.

In addition, fans watched more than two million streams of live and archived games through WNBA LiveAccess, a new feature on WNBA.com that provided fans with free access to more than 200 live game Webcasts - the league's most comprehensive offering - throughout the season.

In July 2007, the WNBA signed a new, eight-year TV deal with ESPN that tips off in 2009 and runs through 2016, the WNBA's 20th season. The agreement, which calls for ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 to telecast WNBA games, includes rights fees, a first for any women's pro team sports league in the U.S.

Global Reach:

Now in its second decade, the WNBA has a wide impact on overseas markets. In 2009, for the third straight year, WNBA games and programming reached a record 203 countries in 32 languages, surpassing the previous total of 198 countries. Included were television agreements in six new countries: Argentina, Bulgaria, Jamaica, Pan Africa, South Korea and China. In addition, for the fourth consecutive year, fans in China were able to view WNBA action via live Webcasts on NBA.com/china.

WNBA rosters for the 2009 season featured 18 international players from 11 countries and territories. Among the league's international contingent are the Seattle Storm's Lauren Jackson (Australia), Indiana Fever's Tammy Sutton-Brown (Canada), San Antonio Silver Stars' Sophia Young (St. Vincent), and Los Angeles Sparks' Ticha Penicheiro (Portugal).

Ownership:

Seven WNBA teams now fall under the independent ownership model: the Atlanta Dream, Chicago Sky, Connecticut Sun, Los Angeles Sparks, Seattle Storm, Tulsa Shock and Washington Mystics.

With the announcement on Oct. 20, 2009 that the Detroit Shock would relocate to Tulsa, Okla., Tulsa Pro Hoops L.L.C. will begin play in 2010 and is led by Bill Cameron and David Box. Force 10 Hoops, L.L.C., the entity owned by Seattle businesswomen and civic leaders Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau, purchased the Seattle Storm on Feb. 28, 2008. In October, 2009, Kathy Betty purchased the Atlanta Dream. In addition, the Los Angeles Sparks opened the 2007 season with new ownership after Kathy Goodman and Carla Christofferson, two long-time season ticket holders, bought the Sparks on Dec. 7, 2006. They joined Sheila Johnson's Washington Mystics, Michael Alter's Chicago Sky, and the Mohegan Tribe's Connecticut Sun as independently owned WNBA franchises.

Seven women serve as owners of WNBA teams: Dr. Sheila Johnson (Washington Mystics); Kathy Goodman and Carla Christofferson (Los Angeles Sparks); Kathy Betty (Atlanta); and Anne Levinson, Ginny Gilder, Lisa Brummel and Dawn Trudeau (Seattle Storm). An eighth, musical artist Michelle Williams, formerly of 'Destiny's Child,' is a minority owner of the Chicago Sky.

Johnson, a co-founder of Black Entertainment Television, became the WNBA's first African-American female owner on May 24, 2005 when she joined Ted Leonsis Lincoln Holdings LLC, which in turn purchased the Washington Mystics from Washington Wizards owner Abe Pollin.

Key Highlights:

Diana Taurasi won both the 2009 WNBA MVP award and the 2009 WNBA Finals MVP award. Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks became the first WNBA player to capture the regular-season, All-Star and Finals MVP awards during the 2001 season.

In 2008, Candace Parker became the first WNBA player to win Rookie of the Year and Most Valuable Player of the Year in the same season. The first selection in the 2008 WNBA Draft, she earned both honors after leading the league in double-doubles and rebounds per game, while also ranking second in blocks per game and fourth in points per game. She also became just the second player (Lisa Leslie), to dunk in a WNBA game.

While Diana Taurasi of the Phoenix Mercury won her first WNBA MVP award in 2009, there have been several repeat honorees. Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks earned the award in 2006, 2001, and 2004. Leslie joined the Houston Comets' Sheryl Swoopes as the only players in WNBA history to capture MVP honors three times. Two players have won the award twice in a career: Houston's Cynthia Cooper (1997, 1998) and Seattle's Lauren Jackson (2003, 2007). The others to capture MVP honors are Yolanda Griffith (then with Sacramento in 1999) and Los Angeles' Candace Parker (2008, when she became the first rookie in league history to earn the award).

Taurasi rewrote the WNBA scoring records in 2006 when she led the league with 25.3 points per contest, became the first WNBA player to top 800 points in a single season (860), and the single-season mark for three-point field-goals (121) and the single-game mark for points (47, a number later equaled by the Storm's Lauren Jackson in 2007).

There is only one player who has reached 6,000 points in her WNBA career. Lisa Leslie, who retired following the 2009 season, ranks at the top of the WNBA's all-time scoring leaders with 6,263 points. The players who have passed the 5,000 point plateau are Tina Thompson, Katie Smith, and Lauren Jackson.

Lauren Jackson became the youngest (26 years, 77 days) and fastest (209 games) to score her 4,000th career point on July 27, 2007. However, that record was broken when Diana Taurasi reached the same milestone on July 27, 2009 in just 197 games.

Sheryl Swoopes, who earned MVP and Defensive Player of the Year honors in 2000 and 2002, made WNBA history with the league's first triple-double (14 points, 15 rebounds, 10 assists) vs. the Detroit Shock on July 27, 1999.

WNBA Cares:

Through the WNBA Cares initiative, the league is deeply committed to creating programs that improve the quality of life for all people, with a special emphasis on promoting a healthy lifestyle and positive body image, breast health awareness, youth and family development, and education. WNBA teams and players donate countless dollars and hours each year through league programs including Breast Health Awareness, WNBA Green Week, Go Red For Women, WNBA Fit, and Read to Achieve.

- AUG. 7** **Val Ackerman** is named the first president of the WNBA.

- APR. 19** The WNBA and Spalding introduced the league's official orange-and-oatmeal game ball at the WNBA Pre-Draft Camp at Disney's Wide World of Sports complex in Orlando, Fla.
- APR. 8** The Houston Comets selected USC forward **Tina Thompson** as the No. 1 draft pick in the inaugural WNBA Draft.
- JUNE 21** The New York Liberty and Los Angeles Sparks participated in the first WNBA game at the Great Western Forum in Inglewood, Calif. Sparks guard **Penny Toler** scored the league's first basket at 19:01. New York won 67-57.
- JUNE 23** The Utah Starzz became the first team to surpass the 100-point mark in a 102-89 victory against Los Angeles.
- JULY 2** New York forward **Rebecca Lobo** won her 100th consecutive game when the Liberty defeated Houston 70-67. The streak was composed of Lobo's 35-0 senior season at UConn, 60-0 mark as a member of the U.S. Olympic Team and 5-0 record as a member of the Liberty. The streak ended at 102.
- AUG. 30** The Houston Comets became the first WNBA champion following a 65-51 win over the New York Liberty at The Summit in Houston.
- OCT. 1** The WNBA announced that franchises in Detroit and Washington would join the league as expansion teams for the 1998 season.

1998

- APR. 22** The WNBA announced the addition of expansion teams in Orlando and Minnesota for the 1999 season.
- JUNE 19** Los Angeles center **Lisa Leslie** set a WNBA single-game record with 21 rebounds in the Sparks' 78-75 victory over New York.
- JUNE 21** Los Angeles center **Lisa Leslie** notched her seventh straight double-double, setting a WNBA record.
- JULY 18** Houston guard **Cynthia Cooper** became the first player to reach 1,000 career points during the Comets' 75-44 rout of Sacramento.
- JULY 29** Sacramento guard **Ticha Penicheiro** dished out a league single-game record 16 assists in a 75-67 loss vs. Cleveland. Penicheiro led the league in assists per game for six consecutive seasons (1998-2003).
- AUG. 29** In Game 2 of the WNBA Finals, Houston, who trailed Phoenix 1-0 in the best-of-three series, erased a 12-point deficit in the final 7:24, forced overtime and won the game. Houston went on to win the series and claimed its second of four titles.

- JUNE 7** The WNBA announced the addition of four expansion teams to begin play in 2000 – Indiana, Miami, Portland and Seattle.
- JULY 14** Whitney Houston sang the National Anthem in front of a capacity crowd of 18,649 at New York's Madison Square Garden for the Inaugural WNBA All-Star Game. The West defeated the East 79-61 as Sparks center **Lisa Leslie** was named MVP.
- JULY 27** Houston forward **Sheryl Swoopes** recorded the WNBA's first triple-double with 15 points, 14 rebounds and 10 assists in an 85-46 win over Detroit at the Compaq Center.
- SEPT. 4** New York guard **Teresa Weatherspoon** nailed a shot from beyond the midcourt line with 2.4 seconds remaining to give the Liberty a 68-67 victory over the Houston Comets in Game 2 of the WNBA Championship. The shot sent the series to a decisive Game 3. The Comets won Game 3 and captured their third straight WNBA title.

- JUNE 7** Cleveland forward **Eva Nemcova** ended her record streak of 66 consecutive free throws made with a miss against Orlando. Nemcova did not miss from the foul line from June 14, 1999 to June 5, 2000.
- JULY 17** The West defeated the East 73-61 at the 2000 WNBA All-Star Game at America West Arena in Phoenix. Houston forward **Tina Thompson** captured MVP honors.
- AUG. 25** Cleveland guard **Suzie McConnell Serio** was the recipient of the first Kim Perrot Sportsmanship Award. The award was named in honor of former Houston guard Kim Perrot, who passed away from cancer in 1999.

2001

- AUG. 26** Houston guard **Cynthia Cooper** turned in a clutch performance to earn her fourth WNBA Finals MVP as the Comets claimed their fourth straight title by defeating the New York Liberty. In Game 1 of the series at Madison Square Garden, Cooper converted a crucial three-point play with 25.4 seconds left to push the Comets' lead to five. In Game 2, she scored six of her 25 points in overtime and nine of Houston's final 18 points. She retired following the season as the WNBA's all-time scoring leader (2,537 points).
- JUNE 2** Houston's **Van Chancellor** became the first WNBA coach to record 100 victories as the Comets defeated the Detroit Shock 74-73.
- JUNE 7** Utah center **Margo Dydek** recorded the WNBA's second triple-double, setting a league record for blocked shots in the process, as her 12 points, 11 rebounds and 10 blocks led Utah to an 82-79 win over Orlando.
- JULY 3** Washington and Seattle battled through four overtime periods – the most in WNBA history – before the Mystics edged the Storm 72-69.

Robinson (Phoenix), **Bernadette Ngoyisa** (San Antonio), **Chelsea Newton** (Sacramento), **Francesca Zara** (Seattle) and **Stacey Dales-Schuman** (Washington).

2006 FEB. 1

The WNBA announces the 2006 WNBA Draft and Pre-Draft Camp will be held in Boston. The WNBA events will conclude a week-long celebration of women's basketball emanating from Boston.

APR. 5

The league holds the 2006 WNBA Draft, and Minnesota takes Louisiana State University guard **Seimone Augustus** as the No. 1 overall pick. It was the first time the WNBA Draft was held outside of the New York area and it concluded a week-long celebration of women's basketball emanating from Boston.

JUNE 13

The WNBA All-Decade Team is selected by fans, a panel of national and WNBA-market media and the league's current players and coaches. The team is comprised of the 10 best and most influential players from its first 10 years of play, including **Sue Bird**, **Tamika Catchings**, **Cynthia Cooper**, **Yolanda Griffith**, **Lauren Jackson**, **Lisa Leslie**, **Katie Smith**, **Dawn Staley**, **Sheryl Swoopes** and **Tina Thompson**. **Van Chancellor**, who led the Houston Comets to consecutive WNBA championships in the league's first four seasons, was named the WNBA's Coach of Decade.

JUNE 12

The 2006 WNBA All-Star Game takes place at New York City's Madison Square Garden. Four rookies – **Seimone Augustus**, **Cappie Pondexter**, **Sophia Young** and **Candice Dupree** – are named All-Stars. The East squad, led by All-Star MVP **Katie Douglas** of the Connecticut Sun, earns its first-ever victory with a 98-82 decision. Off the court, the inaugural All-Star Salute: Celebrating Inspiration Luncheon is a key highlight of the festivities.

JUNE 23

In a game vs. San Antonio, L.A. Sparks center **Lisa Leslie** scores the 5,000th point in her WNBA career, becoming the first player in WNBA history to reach that milestone.

AUG. 10

Diana Taurasi scores a WNBA single-game record 47 points in a triple-overtime game against Houston.

AUG. 30

As part of the League's 10th Anniversary season, the WNBA Greatest Moment presented by AOL.com is unveiled during Game 1 of the 2006 WNBA Finals. Fans, who were able to log on to www.aol.com/wnba, voted **Teresa Weatherspoon's** half-court, buzzer-beater – a shot that propelled the New York Liberty to victory in Game 2 of the 1999 WNBA Finals and on to a deciding Game 3 against the Houston Comets – as their favorite moment in the WNBA's 10-year history.

SEPT. 3

Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks is named MVP of the league for the third time in her career after having also earned the honor in 2001 and 2004. Leslie joined the Houston Comets Sheryl Swoopes as the only players in WNBA history to capture MVP honors three times.

SEPT. 9

The 2006 WNBA Finals saw the Detroit Shock earn their second title when they topped the Sacramento Monarchs in the first Finals matchup ever to reach a deciding fifth game. The historic game featured a sellout crowd of 19,671 at Joe Louis Arena in Detroit, the second highest Finals crowd in WNBA history. **Deanna Nolan** is named Finals MVP.

OCT. 26

The Phoenix Mercury won the sixth annual Draft Lottery and earned the top pick in the 2007 WNBA Draft. It marked the first time that the team whose odds of winning the top pick were mathematically the smallest actually came away with the #1 pick.

NOV. 7

The WNBA announces the creation of the **Dawn Staley** Community Leadership Award. The award will be presented to the player who best exemplifies the characteristics of a leader in the community and will reflect Staley's contagious leadership, spirit, charitable

efforts and love for the game.

DEC. 7

The WNBA Board of Governors approved the sale of the Los Angeles Sparks to an investment group led by **Katherine E. Goodman** and **Carla J. Christofferson**.

DEC. 13

The Charlotte Bobcats Organization announces that it will no longer operate the Charlotte Sting.

JAN. 8

The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft to disseminate the players from the Charlotte franchise. The Chicago Sky select guard **Monique Currie** with the first overall selection.

JAN. 31

The WNBA Board of Governors approved the sale of the Houston Comets to Hilton Koch/Hilton Acquisitions, LLC.

FEB. 16

Electronic Arts announce that six WNBA players are featured in a new videogame NBA STREET Homecourt. **Sue Bird**, **Tamika Catchings**, **Lauren Jackson**, **Lisa Leslie**, **Sheryl Swoopes** and **Diana Taurasi** are the first female professional athletes to ever be featured and go head-to-head with their male counterparts in a videogame.

MAR. 31

Former University of Texas Coach **Jody Conradt** becomes the inaugural recipient of the WNBA Inspiring Coach Award.

APR. 4

The 2007 WNBA Draft presented by adidas takes place in Cleveland, marking the second straight year that the Draft was held immediately following the NCAA Women's Division I Championship Game and conducted in the same city as the Final Four. The Phoenix Mercury make **Lindsey Harding** the top overall pick before trading her to the Minnesota Lynx in exchange for **Tangela Smith**. The fast-paced Draft earned a place in league history when **Jessica Davenport**, the second overall pick, was subsequently traded from San Antonio to New York in exchange for all-star guard **Becky Hammon** and a future selection. It marked the first time in WNBA history that the top two picks were traded on Draft Day.

JULY 15

The 2007 WNBA All-Star Game, the league's eighth such contest, was played in front of a sellout audience on July 15 at the Verizon Center in Washington, D.C. A crowd of 19,487 fans witnessed the East defeat the West, 103-99, as Cheryl Ford of the Detroit Shock clinched the MVP honors.

JULY 15

Signaling a major milestone in its second decade, the WNBA reached an eight-year agreement with ESPN to have ABC, ESPN and ESPN2 televise games through the 2016 season. The agreement extends the WNBA's relationship with ESPN, which began in 1997, to 20 seasons.

JULY 24

Seattle's **Lauren Jackson** scored 47 points in a 97-96 OT loss to the Washington Mystics, tying **Diana Taurasi** for the WNBA record for most points in a single game.

JULY 27

Lauren Jackson scored her 4,000th career point during a 89-75 win over the Indiana Fever, becoming the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone.

SEPT. 5

Lauren Jackson is named WNBA MVP for the second time in her career after having also earned the honor in 2003. Jackson led the WNBA in scoring, rebounding and double-doubles and was also named the WNBA's Player of the Week on five occasions. Jackson joined Lisa Leslie, Sheryl Swoopes and Cynthia Cooper as the only players in WNBA history to capture multiple MVP honors.

SEPT. 16

The 2007 WNBA Finals saw the Phoenix Mercury win their first-ever championship. **Cappie Pondexter** was named MVP. The Mercury defeated the defending champion Detroit Shock in five games. It marked the first time the WNBA Championship has been won on the road, and Mercury head coach Paul Westhead became the first head

- May 17** **Candace Parker** of the Los Angeles Sparks nearly posted a triple-double in her pro debut on vs. Phoenix. She had 34 points, 12 rebounds and 8 assists. Her 34 points broke the record for a rookie in a debut game.
- May 29** On May 29 in a double-overtime loss at Indiana, **Candace Parker** became the first player in WNBA history to record a 5x5, which is total of five or more in five different categories. Parker had 16 points, 16 rebounds, six blocks, five assists and five steals.

PLAYOFF FORMAT & HISTORY



The top four teams from each conference will qualify for the 2010 WNBA Playoffs. Teams in each conference will be seeded one through four based on record. The first two rounds of the 2010 WNBA Playoffs are a best-of-three series, while the 2010 WNBA Finals is a best-of-five series. The team with the better regular-season record will have home court advantage in each round of the playoffs. The WNBA uses a 1-2 format in the first two rounds, in which the team with the better record plays on the road for Game 1 and returns home for Games 2 and 3. In the first round of the WNBA Playoffs, each conference's regular-season champion (#1 seed) will meet the conference's fourth-place team (#4 seed). The conference's second-place team (#2 seed) will meet the conference's third-place team (#3 seed). The winners of the first-round series advance to the Eastern Conference and Western Conference Finals, with the two conference champions squaring off in the WNBA Finals. In the WNBA Finals, the higher seed plays at home in games 1, 2 and 5. The first round of the playoffs begin Wednesday, Aug. 25, 2010.

WNBA FIT

Encourages girls and women of all ages to learn more about their bodies and the importance of physical fitness through programs related to health, fitness, nutrition and self-esteem. Programming inspires girls and women to get started on being fiti through small changes in their daily routine.

The NBA FIT/ WNBA FIT Challenge is free for boys and girls ages 14 and under, and encourages participants to maintain healthy, active lifestyles. The competition will offer more than 100,000 youngsters the chance to demonstrate their physical fitness through a time-based fitness course that includes line sprints, jump rope, speed revolutions, wall passes, and defensive shuffles. The challenge tests participants' speed, strength, agility, and overall physical fitness.

Dribble, Dish & Swish is free for boys and girls ages 7 to 12 and encourages participants to be active and to maintain healthy lifestyles. The competition gives participants the opportunity to showcase their fundamental basketball skills and physical fitness through a time-based, half-court obstacle course. The local champion in each age and gender group will receive an all-expense paid trip to NBA All-Star 2010 in Dallas, Texas, where they will compete in the national finals for the chance to serve as a ball kid at a select NBA All-Star event.



READ TO ACHIEVE

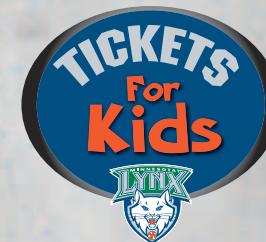

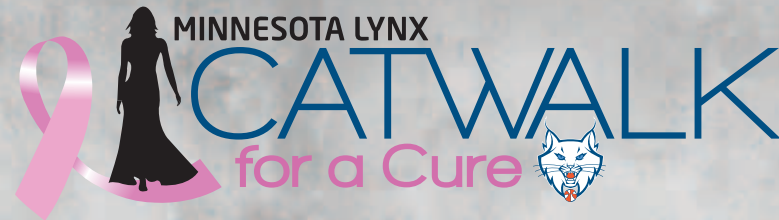

New to the Minnesota Lynx' breast cancer awareness fundraising efforts this year is "Catwalk For a Cure," an event held at the Mall of America aimed at spreading breast cancer awareness throughout the State. The Lynx will transform the Mall of America rotunda into a fashion show to raise funds to support the Jean Stankoski Scholarship Fund and the Minnesota Lynx Foundation.
