On March 23, 1995, Glen Taylor closed the deal that made him majority owner of the Minnesota Timberwolves. He added the title of NBA owner to a list that already included international businessman, state senator, entrepreneur, philanthropist and executive of the year. In October 2002, Taylor became the majority owner of the WNBA's Minnesota Lynx atter a change in the league's ownership structure. Taylor had served as the operating owner of the Lynx for the previous four seasons of the team's exsistence, be ginning with the 1999 inagural campaign.
Before he even completed his first full season as Timberwolves owner, Taylor set in motion his plan for making a mark on the Minnesota sports scene. Prior to the completion of the sale of the team from Marv Wolfenson and Havey Ratner, Taylor installed Rob nesota sports scene. Prior to the completion of the sale of the team from Marw Woifenson and Harvey Ratner, ayylor instaled Roo Masketball back to the Twin Cities by operating the Lynx and added the duties of Lynx Chief Operating Officer to Grififith's responsibilities. In the winter of 2008, Taylor shifted the balance of power within the Lynx by naming Grififith the company's Executive Vice President and appointing longtime Timberwolves and Lynx Vice President of New Business Development Conrad Smith as the new Chief Operating Officer of the Lynx. During the 2009 off-season,Taylor appointed longtime successful WNBA assistant coach Chenl Reeve as the franchise's seventh head coach.
Glen Taylor is chairman of the multinational Taylor Corporation, based in Mankato, MN. He earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Minnesota State University, Mankato. During this period, he worked part time at Carlson Wedding Service, a print shop specializing in formal invitations. After graduation he continued to work at the company, developing strategies to cut delivery time, improve service and expand offerings. Taylor purchased the company in 1975, assembled a passionate leadership team and
dramatically expanded the firmí cond Taylor Corporation, based in North Mankato, includes more than 80 subsidiaries providing business and personal communications products, technologies and marketing sevices. Other enterprises owned by Glen are in securities, agricultural, and medical fields.
He continued his education at the Havvard Graduate School of Business. In 1997, Mankato State University awarded Taylor their first honorary doctorate. Taylor received the degree of Honorary Doctor of Laws for his distinguished professional career and volunteer service. In October 2001, Taylor was inducted into the Minnesota State University, Mankato Hall of Distinction.

Taylor's business savy has been recognized by Corporate Report magazine, which honored him as its Executive of the Year (1987) and the Sales and Marketing Executives of Minneapolis/St. Paul, who awarded him with their Sales Executive of the Year Award (1999). He was also inducted into the Minnesota Hall of Fame (2002) by Twin Cities Monthly Magazine.

Taylor was elected to the Minnesota Senate in 1980, where he served until 1990. He became assistant Senate minority leader in 1982. From 1984 to 1986, he served as Senate minority leader. While in the Senate, Taylor was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of higher education, child care and economic development policies.
He has sevved on the NBA Planning Committee and has been Chairman of the Audit Committee. In October of 2008, Taylor was named chairman of the NBA's Board of Governors.
Through personal involvement, Taylor has remained active in many community, civic and charitable causes. He has also has served on his church's board of deacons and board of trustees and on the Mankato State University Foundation board of directors.
Taylor and his family have provided financial assistance and participated in missions to Africa, Turkey, Egypt and Central America to support the Starkey Hearing Foundation and Common Hope.
Nationally, Taylor has provided expert testimony on business and child care issues to the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives and seved as a committee chair on the 1991 Commission on Reform and Efficiency (CORE).

## CHERYL REEVE

head coach

Cheryl Reeve begins her third season as Lynx head coach in 2012 after guiding the team to a 27-7 record - becoming just the sixth team in WNBA history with $27+$ wins - and the first WNBA title in franchise history last season. Since being named head coach on Dec. 8, 2009, Reeve owns a 40 28 regular season record, including $7-1$ in the postseason.

Reeve's coaching resume includes 22 years as both an assistant and a head coach at the collegiate and WNBA levels. In 2009, Reeve served as an assistant coach with the WNBA's Detroit Shock, and was promoted to the team's general manager position just three games into the season. Hired by three-time WNBA champion head coach Bill Laimbeer, Reeve joined the Shock coaching staff in 2006 and helped the franchise reach the WNBA record and won at least 18 games each season, including 24 in 2007. Reeve also served as the Shock's director of player personnel in 2008.

Reeve got her start in the WNBA with the Charlotte Sting in 2001 when she joined Anne Donovan's staff as an assistant coach. After posting an $8-24$ record in 2000, Charlotte turned things around in Reeve's first year, going 18-14 en route to advancing to the WNBA Finals. Reeve spent the 2002 season again in Charlotte before joining Dan Hughes' coaching staff in Cleveland for the 2003 season. Reeve returned to the Sting in 2004 and 2005 before joining Detroit in 2006. In Reeve's nine years as an assistant in the WNBA, she's compiled a .543 winning percentage ( $163-137 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{L}$ ), including seven postseason appearances and advancing to the WNBA Finals four times.

Before joining the WNBA coaching ranks, Reeve spent 12 years coaching collegiately, including a five-year stint as head coach at Indiana State from 1995-2000. Reeve guided the Sycamores to the program's first postseason berth in 20 years following the 1998-99 campaign.
Reeve also spent five years as an assistant coach at George Washington. During that time, the Colonials posted five 20 -win seasons, captured three Atlantic 10 Conference Championships and appeared in four NCAA Tournaments. Reeve got her start in coaching at her alma matter, La Salle, as an assistant coach for two seasons.

As a player at La Salle, Reeve led the nationally-ranked Explorers to a $25-5$ record in 1987-1988. She was named All-Metro Atlantic Conference and was an All-Big 5 selection as a senior. Reeve holds the school record for most games started (110) and ranks fourth on La Salle's career assist leader board (420).

Reeve excelled athletically and academically at La Salle, graduating with a degree in computer science/management information systems. A Rhodes Scholar nominee, Reeve received both a MAAC Scholar-Athlete Post Graduate Award and a NCAA Post-Graduate Scholarship in 1988. She went on to earn her master's degree in business administration from her alma mater while also serving two years as an assistant coach for the Explorers.

JUNE (6-3, 6-3)
Ater barely missing out on the playoffs in 2010 , Minnesota spent the offseason fine tuning a roster which had closed out the 2010 season $13-21$. Six-time WNBA AllStar and 12 -year veteran Taj McWilliams-Franklin was added through free agency, while Minnesotat's two lottery pick in the WNBA Draft yielded college stars Maya Moore (\#1 overall) and Amber Haris (\#4). The Lynx began their season at STAPLES Center in Los Angeles, facing Candace Parker and the Sparks. Despite 21 points from rookie Maya Moore, Los Angeles outscored Minnesota $45-31$ in the second half en route to dropping the Lynx in the season opener, 82-74. Moore's 21 -point night was just the fifth time a rookie had debuted with a 20 -point performance. Rebekkah Brunson, fresh off of leading the team with 12 double-doubles in 2010 , posted her first of the season with a 10 -point, 12 -rebound performance. The Lynx returned home after the loss for a brief two-game homestand, first finishing a home-and-home with the Sparks before facing the Tulsa Shock. Led by a balanced team effort with six different Lynx players in double figures, Minnesota avenged its sea-son-opening loss to Los Angeles with a decisive 86 -69 victor. Seimone Augustus led all scorers with 17 points, while Rebekkah Brunson posted her second consecutive double-double of the season with 10 points and 15 rebounds. Facing Tulsa two days later, the Lynx opened the game on a $17-3$ run and never looked back, cruising oa 75 -65 victory. Minnesota was led by Rebekkan Brunson's 17 points and 15 rebounds, her third straight double-double to start the season. Next up for the Lynx was atrip to Seatte to foce the defending champion Seatte storn. The Lynx burst out of the gate against the Storn, scoring a rianchise-record 22 consecutive points at Keyarena. Reebekkan Brusson posted her fouth straight double-double with a 22 -point 14 -rebound effort Lindsay Whalen also registered her first double-double of the seasonn with 13 points and 10 assists. After a week offf the Lyxx began a home-and-home with last season's Easter Conference champions, the Altanta Dream. In the first half of their home-and-home at Target Center, the Lynx used a $13-0$ third-quarter run to propel them to a $96-85$ victory over the Dream. Rebekkah Brun-
 nesota continued its hot play two days later in Atlanta, holding the Dream to just $30 \%$ shooting from the floor en route to extending its win streak to five with a $77-64$ win. Rebekkah Brunson (10 points, 10 rebounds) matched a WNBA record with her sixth straight double-double to start the season, which also gave her sole possession of the franchise record for double-doubles (18). The Lynx saw their five-game win streak snapped in Seattle five days later, dropping a $65-55$ decision. The Lynx fell to $5-3$ just two days later with a home loss to Indiana. The Lynx finished off the month on a strong note in Tussa on June 30 , taking a $101-71$ victory thanks to Lindsay Whalen's 21 points and Candice Wiggins' 18 off the bench. For her play during the month, Rebekkah Brunson was named the Western Conference Player of the Month, the first time a Lynx player had earned the honor.

## JULY (7-1, 13-4)

Coming off one of their most successful opening months in franchise history, the Lynx looked to keep their momentum with a hot July. Atter a week off to begin the month, the Lynx defeated the Connecticut Sun $90-67$ on July 9 behind a then-season-high 26 points from Maya Moore, including six three-pointers. Four days later in their annual Camp Day, the Lynx faced off against tival Phoenix Mercury for the first time, dropping a back-and-forth battle, 112-105. Diana Taurasi led all scorers with 27 points, while DeWanna Bonner finished with 24 off the bench. Seimone Auusustus led all Lynx players with 22 , while Rebeekkah Brunson began her noteworthy wards on the Western Conference All-Star team, becoming the first Lynx player to be voted in as a starter. On the heels of the good news, the Lnnx took a trip to Conseco Fieddhouse in Indiana to finish off their season series with the Eastern Conference-leading Indiana Fever. Rebeekkah Brunson led the lynx with 20 points on $10-00-15$ shooting including scoring eight points during a crucial fourth quarter, as the Lynx downed the Fever 80-70. The next night the Lynx faced the Seattle Storm $10-0 f-15$ shooting, including scoring eight points during a crucial fourth quarter, as the Lynx downed the Fever 80-70. The next night the Lynx faced the Seattle Storm
at Target Center in their only back-to-back of the season. Ater a tight first quarter, the Lynx outscored the Storm 24-2 during a 12 -minute span bridging the second and third quarters, eventually finishing with a 69 -62 win. During the game, Lindsay Whalen surpassed the 1,000 -rebound mark, becoming uist the sixth player in WNBA history to record 2,500 points, 1,000 rebounds and 1,000 assits over a career. Rebekkah Bunson scored 16 points and grabbed six rebounds to finish the week averaging 17.3 points and 10.0 rebounds on $61.1 \%$ shooting, good enough to earn her Western Conference Player of the Week honors for the second time in 2011. Minnesota continued its strong play four days later with an afternoon matinee in Phoenix, topping the Mercury 106-98. Seimone Augustus scored a game-high 25 points on 11 -of-15 shooting. With a field goal in the beginning of the fourth quarter, Augustus surpassed Katie Smith's franchise record for career field goals made (1,127). The performance earned Augustus Western Conference Player of the Week honors, the fith such honor of her career and first of the season. Atter the game, Augustus, Rebekkah Brunson, Maya Moore and Lindsay Whalen headed to San Antonio for the 2011 WNBA All-Star Game. Brunson was announced a starter for the West, replacing the injured Lauren Jackson.The four players appeared on the court together at the start of the fourth quarter. Despite a 20 -point, 9 -rebound performance from Brunson, the West dropped the game 117-113. Riding a three-game winning streak, the Lynx returned home after the ell-Star break to face the Los Anggeles Sparks on July 26 . Led by 22 points from Seimone Augustus, the Lynx outscored the Spark $28-16$ during the game's opening quarter en route to an $85-72$ victory. Minnesota continued its hot play three days later, blitining the Seattle Storm with separate $19-2$ and $9-2$ runs to build $a 32$-point lead in the fourth quarter, finishing the game with a 92 -67 win. The win marked Minnesota's first season series victory verer Seattle since 2003 and it its fitth consecutive victor. The Lynx finished off their hot month
with a win in San Antonio two days later, coming back from a 12 -point haltime deficit. Lindsay Whalen's jumper with 1.5 seconds remaining lifted the Lynx to the 70 69 victoy.The win finished of Minnesota's first winning July since $2004(8-3)$ and matched the single-season franchise record for longest win streak (sis) Ater the month, the WNBA honored Seimone Ausustus for her hot play during suly, naming her the Wester Conference Player of the Month, the first such honor of her career Augustus joined Rebekkah Brunson, who had earned the honor for the month of June.

AUGUST (11-2, 24-6)
Ater finishing July on asixgame winning streak, the Lyxx begana August looking to build on their $13-4$ receor, tops in the Westem Conference. First tor Minesesta

 against San Antonio, Minnesota e edged the Siver Stars $62-60$ thanks to a Taj McWilliams-Franklin jumper with just 1.3 seconds remaining. The game-winner was against San Antonio, Minnesota edged the Stiver Stars $62-6$-6 thanks to a Taj Mcwiliams-Frankiin jumper witf just 1.3 seconds remaining. The game-winner was
Minnesota's second consecutive last-second basket against the Siver Stars, and its fith buzzer beater in franchise histor. The win extended Minesosta's fran-chise-record winning streak to eight games. Three days later, the Lynx began their longest road trip of the season, a three-game trip that took them through Los Angeles, Phoenix and Chicago. Behind a combined 61 points from Seimone Augustus, Rebekkah Brunson and Lindsay Whalen, Winnesota edged Los Angeles 84 78, snapping a six-game losing streak at STAPLES Center and setting a new franchise record for consecutive road wins (five). For her efforts during the week, Sei mone Augustus was named the Western Conference Player of the Week for games played between August $1-8$, her second such honor of the season. Unfortunately, Minnesota's nine-game winning streak would end two days later against the Mercury in Phoenix. In the loss, both Lindsay Whalen and Seimone Augustus surpassed the 3,000 point mark, becoming the first pair of teammates to surpass the milestone in the same game in WNBA histor. Augustus reached the milestone in just 151 games, matching Diana Taurasi as the fastest player in WNBA history to score 3,000 points. Also, Maya Moore scored a season-high 28 points, 18 of which came from beyond the arc. She went 6 -of-6 from the three-point line, tying the WNBA record for most three-point field goals made without a miss. The Lynx got by the Mrer wis days later to face the Tuls Shock Atter beating the Shock by 30 in their last meeting the lynx held Tuss to ist 54 points en route to an 82.54 victon, The 28 point win was the fouth-largest margin of wictor in Lynx history and matched the tean's franchise record for wins in a season (18) TUss's 54 points were the lowest total from a Lynx opponent since holding Indiana to just 45 points on July 19,2005 , and just the fourth time the Lynx had held an opponent to less than 60 points since the league's move to four quarters and a 24 -second clock in 2006. Minnesota had a letdown in their next outing, two days later in Connecticut. The Sun used a 21-7 run to close out the first quarter en route to a 108-79 victor, Minnesota's seventh consecutive loss at Mohegan Sun Arena in Connecticut. Tina Charles scored 16 points and grabbed 18 rebounds, her 16th double-double of the season, to lift the Sun over the Lynx. The Lynx got back to their winning ways two days later in Washington, defeating the Mystics $81-62$ for their franchise-record 19th win of the season. Minnesota shot $57.1 \%$ from the field during the victor, tying the second-best shooting night in franchise history. Wimnesota's starting five shot an impressive $64.4 \%$ during the win. On the verge of clinching a playoff spot for the third time in franchise histor, the Lynx returned home to face the Los Angeles Sparks. Thanks in large part to a 37 -point effort from the bench, Minnesota topped Los Angeles $87-68$ to clinch its first playoff berth since the 2004 season. Three days later, Minnesota finished off a season series sweep of the Tulsa Shock with a 78 - 72 victoy. Taj McWilliams-Frankin matched a season-high with 18 points, one of six Lynx players with seven or more points. The Lynx started a home-and-home series with the San Antonio Siver Stars three days later, besinning with a matchup at Target Center for Maya Moore Bobblehead Night. Behind 18 points from Moore, including four three-pointers, the Lynx defeated San Antonio $85-75$, lowering its "magic number" for the \#1 seed in the Western Confer ence to one game. It wasn't long until the Lynx clinched home court throushout the Western Conference playoffs, as a $72-61$ victory two days later in San Antonio finished off the season series sweep of the Siver Stars and extended Minnesota's winning streak to five games. The next day, the WNBA announced that Seimone Augustus was yet again the Xestern Conference Payer of the Week, ter second such award of the month and tirid of the season..Wrapping up the mont the ner 14.2 points and 5.8 assists during the month, was named the Western Conference Player of the Month for August by the WNBA two days later, while Maya Moore was named the WNBA's Rookie of the Month for the second consecutive month. Minnesota's 11 wins during the month marked a franchise record.

## SEPTEMBER (3-1, 27-7)

Atter locking up the top seed in the Western Conference in Ausust, Minnesota entered September with a "magic number" of one to clinch the best seed in the WNBA. They clinched that spot in their first game of September, despite losing for iust the third time in their last 20 games. An Indiana loss to Connecticut guar anteed the Lynx homecourt advantage throughout the playoffs. In the loss, Leilani Mitchell scored a career-high 24 points for New York, snapping Minnesota's six-game winning streak. Two days later, the Lynx returned the favor to the Liberty, thanks to a game-high 19 points from rookie Maya Moore. In their final home game of the season, Lindsay Whalen became the first player in WNBA history to score 20 points, dish out 10 assists and record zero turnovers, leading the Lyix to a $78-69$ victory over the Chicago sky .The game was the second 20 -point/ 10 -assist game in franchise history, as well as the second of Whalen's career. The win gave Minnesota 14 home wins this season, marking a new franchise record. In their finale three days ater, the Lynx finished the season on a high note, de feating Phoenix $96-90$ behind a season-high 42 points from the bench. Jessica Adair posted the first double-double of her career, a 10 -point and career-high 13 -rebound performance, as the Lynx finished the season with a franchise-record 13 road wins. Minnesota finished the season with 27 wins, becoming the sixth team in WNBA history to record 27 or more wins in a season.

## Game One at Target Center - Thursday, August 28 Minnesota 74, Los Angeles 72

lamika Williams' steal and layup with 7.4 seconds remaining capped a monumental comeback as the Lynx handed Los Angeles 74-72 setback in Game 1 of the best-of-three WNBA Playoff series on Aug. 28 at Target Center. The Sparks stormed out to a 7-6 lead less than five minutes into the contest, hitting eight of their first nine shots. Lisa Leslie poured in 17 points in the first half, which ended with Los Angeles on top 49-32 after Tamecka Dixon's three-pointer in the closing seconds. A jumper by Dixon gave the Sparks a 21 -point advantage early in the second half, but Katie Smith ignited a 9-0 burst that sliced Minnesota's deficit to $53-41$. Trailing by 10 with under nine minutes remaining, the Lynx outscored Los Angeles $13-2$ to take heir first lead of the night at 62-61 on a Williams layup. Leslie answered with a three-point play to reclaim the lead for L.A., but Teresa Edwards put Minnesota back in front 69-68 with a three-pointer at the 2:42 mark. Baskets by Mwadi Mabika and Leslie gave the Sparks a three-point edge in the final minute, setting the stage for a game-tying Smith trey that made it 72-72 with 24.4 seconds left. Williams then stole Mabika's inbound pass and drove for the go-ahead score. Edwards and Janell Burse combined to knock the ball loose from Mabika as time expired. Leslie finished with 24 points and Dixon added 18 for Los ngeles, which lost Nikki Teasley to injury midway through the first half. Smith's 23 points topped the Lynx in their first-ever layoff game, while Wiriams chipped in 16 points and Edwards handed out nine assists. Minnesota set a WNBA playoff record or largest comeback after trailing by as many as 21 points.

Game Two at STAPLES Center - Saturday, August 30 Los Angeles 80, Minnesota 69
Lisa Leslie had 20 points and nine rebounds as Los Angeles squared its first-round series by downing the Lynx, 80-69, on Aug. 30 at STAPLES Center. Janell Burse's three--point play gave Minnesota its only lead of the night at $5-3$, before Mwadi Mabika sank three-pointer to put the Sparks on top. Leslie's jumper capped a $10-0$ surge that stretched L.A.'s lead to 13 midway through the first half. Trailing 30-15, the Lynx used a $9-2$ spurt to close within eight on a Svetlana Abrosimova trey. The half ended with Los Angeles in front $36-26$, taking advantage of 15 Minnesota turnovers for 16 points. The Sparks reeled off 10 unanswered points - four each by Leslie and Mabika - to open up the biggest lead of the night at $54-32$ with $13: 17$ remaining. Minnesota battled back to within $73-65$ when Teresa Edwards connected from long distance at the 3:05 mark, but the Lynx misfired on a pair of three-point attempts that would have sliced the deficit to five. Leslie answered on L.A.'s next possession, and the Sparks sank five consecutive free throws to seal the win. All five Los Angeles starters reached double figures, with DeLisha Milton and Tamecka Dixon tallying 17 points apiece and Milton grabbing 10 rebounds. Katie Smith's 18 points topped Minnesota, while Tamika Williams added 17 points and seven boards.

Game Three at STAPLES Center - Monday, September 1 Los Angeles 74, Minnesota 64
Lisa Leslie tallied 22 points and five blocks, and all five Los Angeles starters reached double figures in the series-clinching 74-64 win over the Lynx at STAPLES Center. Leslie scored the final two baskets of a 12-2 surge that gave the Sparks a $28-15$ lead with 6:06 left in the first half. Minnesota chipped away with a pair of Katie Smith baskets sandwiched around Teresa Edwards' threeDointer to close within seven, but L.A. outscored the Lynx 6-1 down the stretch to take a $38-26$ lead at intermission. DeLisha Miton ad 12 first-half points to top the Sparks, who shot 50 percent from the floor while holding Minnesota to 32 percent.A three-point play by Leslie in the second half's opening minute gave Los Angeles its biggest lead of the night at 43-28. The Lynx rallied to witheight on a three-point play by Smith with 8:01 remaining, and Kristi Harrower's trey with 6:10 to play narrowed the deficit to 2-55. However, Mwadi Mabika answered on the Sparks' next possession and Leslie followed with a layup to push the margin back o 11, spoiling the second-half effort of Minnesota's Tamika Williams, who scored all 17 of her team-high points after intermission. MAY 13 WNBA Live Access, a new feature on WNBA.com that provides fans with free access to more than 200 live game Webcasts, is launched and allows fans around the world to access live game Webcasts on individual team Web sites.

JUNE 1 The Phoenix Mercury announces a groundbreaking marquee partnership with LifeLock to launch the first-ever branded jersey in WNBA or NBA history. The LifeLock name will appear on the front of Phoenix Mercury player jerseys and on warm-up suits through the 2011 season.

JUNE 5 The Los Angeles Sparks reach an agreement with the Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies to become the sec ond team to secure a marquee partnership and wear brand ed jerseys. The Farmer's Insurance Group of Companies name and logo will appear on player jerseys.

JUNE 14 Raymond is named the recipient of the 2009 Dawn Staley Community Leadership Award.

JULY 17 Sue Bird of the Seattle Storm reaches the 3,000-point plateau, becoming just the third player in league history to score 3,000 points and hand out 1,000 career assists (Shannon Johnson and Vickie Johnson).

JULY 29 Cokie Roberts, political commentator for ABC News, senior news analyst for NPR News, and bestselling author, is honored as the recipient of the 2009 WNBA Inspiration Award. Roberts served as the keynote speaker at the WNBA Inspiring Women Luncheon in Chicago.

AUG. 10 Lisa Leslie of the Los Angeles Sparks becomes the first player in WNBA history to record 6,000 career points.

AUG. 15 Lauren Jackson of the Seattle Storm scores her 5,000th point against the Atlanta Dream, becoming the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Jackson joins Lisa Leslie, Tina Thompson and Katie Smith as the WNBAís 5,000 point scorers.

SEPT. 5 Diana Taurasi of the Phoenix Mercury scores her 4,000th point, eclipsing Lauren Jackson as the youngest and fastest player in league history to reach the milestone. Taurasi accomplishes the feat in 197 games.

SEPT. 26 Lisa Leslie tallies 22 points and 9 rebounds in the final game
of her WNBA career as the Los Angeles Sparks are defeated by the Phoenix Mercury in the Western Conference Finals. Leslie had previously announced that 2009 would be her final sea son, and retires as the all-time WNBA leader in points $(6,263)$ and rebounds $(3,307)$.

SEPT. 29 The Mercury's Diana Taurasi wins the WNBA Most Valuable Player Award presented by Kia Motors, marking the first MVP honor of her professional career. Taurasi tallied 20.4 points per game and recorded $20+$ points in 20 games in 2009.

OCT. 9 The Phoenix Mercury defeats the Indiana Fever to clinch the WNBA Championship for the second time in three years. Finals MVP Diana Taurasi, Cappie Pondexter and Penny Taylor led the Mercury and held off a late rally by the tenacious Indiana Fever for a 94-86 victory in the deciding Game 5. The 2009
WNBA Finals also featured three sellouts plus the highest tota attendance figure $(82,018)$ in WNBA Finals history. Overall, average attendance for the 2009 WNBA Playoffs increased $18.5 \%$ over 2008 ( 9,979 vs. 8,420 ).

NOV. 5 The Minnesota Lynx win the ninth annual WNBA Draft Lottery And earned the top pick in the 2010 WNBA Draft. Minnesota had 428 chances out of 1,000 to receive the first overall selection by virtue of owning New York's combinations (261) in addition to its own (167).

NOV. 20 The Maloof Family announces that they will no longer operate the Sacramento Monarchs.

DEC. 4 The WNBA Competition Committee and Board of Governors approves the expanded use of instant replay by game officials in the following situations: 1.) To determine at any
point during the game whether a 24 -second shot clock violation occurred prior to the release of a successful field goal attempt or prior to a foul being committed and 2.) To determine during the last minute of regulation play and the last minute of any overtime period which player last touched the ball prior to it going out-of-bounds or whether the ball was Last touched simultaneously by two opponents.

DEC. 14 The WNBA holds a Dispersal Draft of the Sacramento Monarchs players. The New York Liberty selected Nicole Powell with the first pick while the Minnesota Lynx chose Rebekkah Brunson second and the Connecticut Sun took selected Courtney Paris and the San Antonio Silver Stars

AUG. 15 In a game against Indiana, rookie Tina Charles of the Connecticut Sun sets WNBA single-season records for most double-doubles and total rebounds in a single season.

SEPT. 7 Atlanta's Angel McCoughtry scores a WNBA Playoffs record 42 points in Game Two of the Eastern Conference Finals, a 105-93 victory over the New York Liberty. In that same game, New York's Cappie Pondexter tallies 36 points. Their combined total of 78 points set a WNBA record for most total points by two players in the same postseason game.

SEPT. 16 The Seattle Storm won the 2010 WNBA championship by defeating the Atlanta Dream 87-84 in Game 3 of the WNBA Finals in Atlanta's Philips Arena. The Storm swept the Dream 3-0 in the best-of-five series and Seattle center Lauren Jackson, the league's regular season MVP, was named MVP of The Finals. It is the Storm's second championship and first since 2004.

DEC. 3 Donna Orender steps down as WNBA President to launch her own marketing, media and strategy company.

FEB. 28 As part of WNBA Live - Manchester 2011 - a new, multiyear partnership between the Manchester (Eng.) City Council and the NBA, WNBA and USA Basketball - it is announced that the Atlanta Dream will participate in the first WNBA game to be played in Europe. Th
game is set for May 29,2011 vs. Standard Life Team GB (Great Britain's national team) at Manchester Evening News Arena. The partnership will promote women in sport and encourage participation in team sports.

MAR. 3 At a press conference at the AT\&T Center in San Antonio, the WNBA announces that the Silver Stars will host the 2011 All-Star Game for the first time in franchise history. The contest, set for Saturday, July 23, is to be the second WNBA All-Star Game played in a Western Conference venue and the first since the 2000 game was held in Phoenix.

MAR. 8 In honor of Women's History Month and International Women's Day, the WNBA officially announced plans to celebrate its 15 th season. Among those would be the selection of the Top 15 Players and the Top 15 Moments in league history. Key among other planned celebrations would be a nationally televised game (ESPN2) in which the New York Liberty would visit the Los Angeles Sparks on June 21 , fifteen years to the date of the leagueis inaug ural game in 1997 featuring those same two teams.

MAR. 28 Sheryl Swoopes, 40 , returns to the WNBA, signing to play with the Tulsa Shock after a two-year hiatus. An inaugural member of the WNBA and a member of the league's AllDecade Team selected in 2006, Swoopes resume includes four WNBA championships as a member of the Houston Comets (1997-2000), three league MVP awards (2000, 2002, 2005) and three Defensive Player of the Year honors (2000, 2002, 2003).

APR. 7 The Washington Mystics sign a marquee partnership with Inova Health System, becoming the fifth WNBA team to have such a partnership. Players will wear Inova Hospital Systemís name and logo on the front of their home and away jerseys during the 2011 WNBA season.

APR. 7 The WNBA and partner adidas unveiled new uniforms for all 12 teams featuring Revolution 30 technology and womenís basketball specific TECHFIT base layers.

APR. 11 The WNBA becomes the first professional sports league to conduct its annual Draft at ESPN headquarters in Bristol, Conn. The Minnesota Lynx made Maya Moore the top overall selection of the 2011 WNBA Draft presented by adidas. Australian native Elizabeth Cambage, selected
second by the Tulsa Shock, and Courtney Vandersloot, tapped third by the Chicago Sky, rounded out the top three picks.

APR. 21 Laurel J. Richie, a veteran of more than three decades in consumer marketing, corporate branding, public relations and corporate management, is appointed President of the WNBA, NBA Commissioner David Stern announced. Laurel leaves her post as Senior Vice President and Chief Marketing Officer for Girl Scouts of the USA to join the WNBA.

PLAYOFF FORMAT\& HSTORY


The top four teams from each conference will qualify for the 2012 WNBA Playoffs. Teams in each conference will be seeded one through four based on record. The first two rounds of the 2012 WNBA Playoffs are a best-of-three series, while the 2012 WNBA Finals is a best-offive series. The team with the better regular-season record will have home court advantage in each round of the playoffs. The WNBA uses a 1 2 format in the first two rounds, in which the team with the better record plays on the road for Game 1 and returns home for Games 2 and 3 . In the first round of the WNBA Playoffs, each conference's regularseason champion (\#1 seed) will meet the conference's fourth-place team (\#4 seed). The conference's second-place team (\#2 seed) will meet the conference's third-place team (\#3 seed). The winners of the first-round series advance to the Eastern Conference and Western Conference Finals, with the two conference champions squaring off in the WNBA Finals. In the WNBA Finals, the higher seed plays at home in games 1,2 and 5 . The first round of the playoffs begin Thursday, Sept. 27, 2012.
