Rob Moor became chief executive officer of the Minnesota Timberwolves in 2004 following 10 years as the team's president. While reorganizing the Timberwolves and building a first-class staff, Moor was also involved in securing a WNBA franchise for Minnesota in 1998 and, in 2004, leading the effort to form Midwest Entertainment Group and manage Target Center until the spring of 2007

Carley Knox is entering her fourth season with the Minnesota Lynx and her ninth in the WNBA. In December 2012, she was named the Lynx Director of Business Operations and acts as the primary liaison between the team and WNBA on league-wide business and marketing initiatives. Knox oversees the day to day business operations of the Lynx, including business development, budget management, community relations, scheduling, preseason games, and logistics. Additionally, Knox maintains her role within the development of corporate sales and tickets sales.

## CHERYL REEVE

Cheryl Reeve completed her third season as Lynx head coach in 2012, guiding the team to a $27-7$ record en route to winning its second consecutive Western Conference Championship. Since taking over as Lynx head coach, Reeve owns a career $67-35$ record, the most coaching wins in franchise history. She was initially named head coach on Dec. 8, 2009, taking over for former head coach Jennifer Gillom. On Dec. 6, 2012, Reeve signed a multi-year contract extension with the club.

Under Reeve's tutelage, the Lynx won a league-best 67 games between 2010 and 2012, including reaching the WNBA Finals in both 2011 and 2012. Minnesota's 54 regular season wins over the past two seasons are the second highest two-season win tota in WNBA history ( 56 - Los Angeles, 2000-01). Her . 657 winning percentage ranks second in WNBA history (Michael Cooper, 167-85, .663), one of just four coaches to win at least $60 \%$ of their games in league history (Chancellor, Thibault)
Reeve guided the Lynx to the first championship in franchise history in 2011, being named the WNBA Coach of the Year after leading Minnesota to a league-best 27-7 regular season record. The Lynx made a 14-game improvement from 2010, marking the second-largest single-season win increase in WNBA history

Reeve's coaching resume includes 21 years as both an assistant and a head coach at the collegiate and WNBA levels. In 2009, Reeve served as an assistant coach with the WNBA's Detroit Shock, and was promoted to the team's general manager position just three games into the season. Hired by three-time WNBA champion head coach Bill Laimbeer, Reeve joined the Shock coaching staff in 2006 and helped the franchise reach the WNBA Finals in each of her first three years, winning WNBA titles in 2006 and 2008. During her four years with Detroit, the team held an $87-49$ win/loss record and won at least 18 games each season, including 24 in 2007 . Reeve also served as the Shock's director of player personnel in 2008
Reeve got her start in the WNBA with the Charlotte Sting in 2001 when she joined Anne Donovan's staff as an assistant coach. After posting an 8-24 record in 2000, Charlotte turned things around in Reeve's first year, going 18-14 en route to advancing to the WNBA Finals. Reeve spent the 2002 season again in Charlotte before joinan assistant in the WNBA, she compiled a .543 winning percentage ( $163-137$ W/L) including seven postseason appearances and advancing to the WNBA Finals four times.

Before joining the WNBA coaching ranks, Reeve spent 12 years coaching collegiately, including a five-year stint as head coach at Indiana State from 1995-2000. Reeve guided the Sycamores to the program's first postseason berth in 20 years following the 1998-99 campaign.

Reeve also spent five years as an assistant coach at George Washington. During that time, the Colonials posted five 20 -win seasons, captured three Atlantic 10 Confer ence Championships and appeared in four NCAA Tournaments. Reeve got her start in coaching at her alma matter, La Salle, as an assistant coach for two seasons.
As a player at La Salle, Reeve led the nationally-ranked Explorers to a $25-5$ record in 1987-1988. She was named All-Metro Atlantic Conference and was an All-Big 5 selection as a senior. Reeve holds the school record for most games started (110) and ranks fourth on La Salle's career assist leader board (420).

Reeve excelled athletically and academically at La Salle, graduating with a degree in computer science/management information systems. A Rhodes Scholar nominee, ness administration from her alma mater while also serving two years as an assistant coach for the Explorers.

Minnesota set a franchise single-game record with 44 field goals in the win, as well as scoring 58 points in the paint. After their big win on opening day, the Lynx continued their success the next week with a 80-62 win over New York, led by a 22-point performance out of Seimone Augustus and a double-double (10 pts, 10 reb ) from Taj McWilliams-Franklin. Augustus had another big game back at Target Center two days later, scoring 25 points on 11-of 17 shooting to give Minnesota a 92-84 win over Los Angeles and improve to $3-0$. The Lynx posted another win against Seattle the following Sunday, thanks to a team-high 19 points from Maya Moore and double digit performances off the bench from Monica Wright (11) and Devereaux Peters (10). Minnesota closed out the month with a win in Washington against the Mystics. Lindsay Whalen scored 11 points, including a putback with one second remaining to give the Lynx a 79-77 edge over Washington and improve to 5-0.

## JUNE (8-1, 13-1)

The Lynx continued their hot streak into June, opening the month with an 85-72 win over the Connecticut Sun. Minnesota outscored Connecticut 27-9 in the final eight minutes to claim the victory. It was the Lynx' first road win at Mohegan Sun Arena since 2004 (7/22/04). Minnesota came back to Target Center to beat the San Antonio Silver Stars and the Seattle Storm. The Lynx finished the month of June with an 8-1 record, tying the most June wins in franchise history ( $8-5$ in 2000). It also matches the second-highest total in any calendar month (the team went 11-2 last August).

## JULY (2-3, 15-4)

Coming off a successful start to the season, the Lynx struggled in July, losing their first three games to mark the team's first three-game losing streak since losing five in a row from July 17-29, 2010. Opening the month with a game against the Silver Stars in San Antonio, the Lynx gave up 35 points in the first frame, digging themselves a 13-point hole after one frame. Despite outscoring San Antonio over the next three quarters, Minnesota couldn't make up the difference, allowing seven three-pointers from Becky Hammon (13 from the Silver Stars). Monica Wright scored 18 points off the bench for Minnesota, who shot 49. 2 \% from the floor in the loss. Following the game, Moore, Seimone Augustus and Lindsay Whalen joined Team USA in the 2012 London Olympics, ultimately helping lead the United States to its fifth consecutive Olympic gold medal

The gold was the first for Moore and Whalen, who were appearing in the first Olympics, and the second for Augustus, who had previously represented the United States during the Beijing Olympics in 2008.

## AUGUST (6-0, 21-4)

Coming off of a month's break, Minnesota got off to a hot start in August, posting a 29-point win over the Washington Mystics. The trio of Lynx Olympians had a big game for the Lynx, scoring a combined 47 points and dishing out 16 as sists. Monica Wright had a big game for Minnesota off the bench, scoring 17 points on an efficient 6 -of-7 shooting. The Lynx' winning streak was extended to nine the next week against Los Angeles, thanks to 23-point performances from Augustus and Moore Augustus became the Lynx all-time leading scorer during the game, surpassing Katie Smith $(3,605)$, while Moore notched a career-high with seven steals, matching a franchise record. Next, Minnesota came back from 25 points down against Atlanta, eventually winning $97-93$ in a $20 T$ thriller. The comeback was the largest in franchise history, and matched a WNBA record. Maya Moore led the way with a 23 -point, 12 - rebound performance, including scoring 19 points after halftime. The win was Minnesota's 10th consecutive, becoming only the second team in WNBA history to record two 10+ game win streaks in the same season. It continued two days later in San Antonio, where Minnesota compiled a 19-point win over the siver Stars thanks to a team-high 18 points, 12 rebounds and six assists for Moore. Unfortunately, the strea ended in Chicago two days later, turning the ball over 18 times and giving up a 26 -point performance from Epiphanny Prince. Moore scored a team-high 18 points for the Lynx, while Brunson ( 17 pts, 5 reb) had another strong game. The Lynx rebounded in Indiana later the week, where Lindsay Whalen scored 14 points, including a jumper with 1.6 seconds remaining to give Minnesota a $66-64$ win over the Fever. The buzzer beater was Whalen's second of the season and third of her Lynx career (seventh in franchise history). Minnesota swept the home-and home series with a 86-19 win over Indiana the following Monday, thanks to a career-high 29 points for Maya Moore. Moore scored 15 points rne rid quarter, osing 76-92 despite the first career double-double for Devereaux Peters (17 pts, 13 reb) off the bench and a season-high 19 points for Monica Wright. Minnesota rebounded the next night, posting a 23 -point victory against Phoenix for the third-largest road victory in franchise his tory. Moore scored 21 points in just 24 minutes, while Erin Thorn added a season-high 17 points off the bench (including five three-pointers). The Lynx finished off their season two days later in San Antonio, giving up a season-high 60 points in the first half and dropping the game 84 99. The loss dropped Minnesota to a WNBA-best 27-7 for the second consecutive year, matching the franchise record for wins and clinching homecourt advantage throughout the WNBA playoffs. Minnesota finished the year posting WNBA records in both rebounding margin (+6.9) and (20.8), while falling thousandths of percentage points shy of setting a new WNBA record for field goal percentage (.4729 to 4733).

## Minnesota 74, Los Angeles 72

Tamika Williams' steal and layup with 7.4 seconds remaining capped a monumental comeback as the Lynx handed Los Angeles a $74-72$ setback in Game 1 of the best-of-three WNBA Playoff series on Aug. 28 at Target Center. The Sparks stormed out to a 17-6 lead less than five minutes into the contest, hitting eight of heir first nine shots. Lisa Leslie poured in 17 points in the first half, which ended with Los Angeles on top point advantage early in the second half, but Katie Smith ignited a 9-0 burst that sliced Minnesota's deficit to 53-41. Trailing by 10 with under nine minutes remaining, the Lynx outscored Los Angeles 13-2 to take their first lead of the night at 62-61 on a Williams layup. Leslie answered with a three-point play to reclaim the lead for L.A., but Teresa Edwards put Minnesota back in front 69-68 with a three-pointer at the $2: 42$ mark. Baskets by Mwadi Mabika and Leslie gave the Sparks a three-point edge in the final minute, setting
the stage for a game-tying Smith trey that made it $72-72$ with 24.4 seconds left. Williams then stole Mabika's inbound pass and drove for the go-ahead score. Edwards and Janell Burse combined to knock the ball loose from Mabika as time expired. Leslie finished with 24 points and Dixon added 18 for Los Angeles, which lost Nikki Teasley to injury midway through the first half. Smith's 23 points topped the Lynx in their irst-ever playoff game, while wiliams chipped in 16 points and Edwards handed out nine assists. Minnesota set a WNBA playoff record for largest comeback after trailing by as many as 21 points.

## Game Two at STAPLES Center - Saturday, August 30 Los Angeles 80, Minnesota 69

Lisa Leslie had 20 points and nine rebounds as Los Angeles squared its first-round series by downing the Lynx, $80-69$, on Aug. 30 at STAPLES Center. Janell Burse's three-point play gave Minnesota its only lead of 10-0 surge that stretched L.A.'s lead to 13 midway through the first half. Trailing $30-15$, the Lynx used a $9-$ 2 spurt to close within eight on a Svetlana Abrosimova trey. The half ended with Los Angeles in front $36-26$, taking advantage of 15 Minnesota turnovers for 16 points. The Sparks reeled off 10 unanswered points four each by Leslie and Mabika - to open up the biggest lead of the night at 54-32 with 13:17 remaining. but the Lynx misfired on a pair of three-point attempts that would have sliced the deficit to five. Leslie answered on L.A.'s next possession, and the Sparks sank five consecutive free throws to seal the win. All five Los Angeles starters reached double figures, with DeLisha Milton and Tamecka Dixon tallying 17 points apiece and Milton grabbing 10 rebounds. Katie Smith's 18 points topped Minnesota, while Tamika Williams added 17 points and seven boards.

## Game Three at STAPLES Center - Monday, September 1 Los Angeles 74, Minnesota 64

Lisa Leslie tallied 22 points and five blocks, and all five Los Angeles starters reached double figures in the series-clinching $74-64$ win over the Lynx at STAPLES Center. Leslie scored the final two baskets of a $12-2$ surge hat gave the Sparks a $28-15$ lead with 6:06 left in the first half. Minnesota chipped away with a pair of Katie Smith baskets sandwiched around Teresa Edwards' three-pointer to close within seven, but L.A. outscored the Lynx 6-1 down the stretch to take a 38-26 lead at intermission. The top four teams from each conference will qualify for the 2013 WNBA Playoffs, presented by Boost Mobile. Teams in each conference will be seeded one through four based on record. The first two rounds of the 2013 WNBA Playoffs are a best-of-three series, while the 2013 WNBA Finals is a best-of-five series. The team with the better regular-season record will have home court advantage in each round of the playoffs. The WNBA uses a 1-2 format in the first two rounds, in which the team with the better record plays on the road for Game 1 and returns home for Games 2 and 3. In the first round of the WNBA Playoffs, each conference's regular-season champion (\#1 seed) will meet the conference's fourth-place team (\#4 seed). The conference's second-place team (\#2 seed) will meet the conference's third-place team (\#3 seed). The winners of the first-round series advance to the Eastern Conference and Western Conference Finals, with the two conference champions squaring off in the WNBA Finals. In the WNBA Finals, the higher seed plays at home in games 1,2 and 5. The first round of the playoffs begin Thursday, Sept. 19, 2013.
