## INDIANA FEVER | 2015 WNBA PLAYOFFS

- Adapting to the modified systems of a first-year coach and adjusting to injuries and absences of nine different players, Indiana began the 2015 campaign slowly before ripping through 14 wins in its next 17 games to plant itself firmly into another playoff race.
- Following in the footsteps of her former college coach and coaching mentor Lin Dunn, rookie head coach Stephanie White set a franchise record with 20 wins by a first-year coach. She is one of three rookie coaches in WNBA history to win as many games.
- The Fever won 9 of 10 following the All-Star Break to put themselves in position to capture their 11th straight playoff berth.
- The Fever are third in WNBA history in playoff appearances (12) and fourth in playoff wins (29). Indiana has reached at least the conference finals in four straight seasons and seven times overall, both the second-best figures in league annals. Indiana has won at least one playoff game in a record eight consecutive seasons.
- Tamika Catchings has appeared in every playoff game in Fever history (56). Catchings is the league's all-time leader in playoff points, rebounds, free throws and steals.

## FRANCHISE CONSISTENCY \& EXCELLENCE

## THE FRANCHISE: CONSISTENCY \& EXCELLENCE

- The Fever have become one of the most consistently successful franchises in the WNBA. Through 16 seasons, Indiana has reached the playoffs TWELVE times - including a league-record ELEVEN straight seasons since 2005. The Fever have reached the conference finals SEVEN times, including the WNBA Finals in 2009 and 2012.
- The Fever became the league's eighth different champion in 2012. Indiana joins the Los Angeles Sparks and New York Liberty, a pair of WNBA original franchises, as the only teams to reach the conference finals seven times.
- The Fever championship was the city's first pro basketball title since the Pacers won the ABA title in 1973.
- The Fever secured 21-13 records in 2005, 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2011; and set the club standard with 22-12 records in each of its two seasons reaching the WNBA Finals, 2009 and 2012.
- From 2005-12, Indiana became the only WNBA franchise in history to boast seven 20-win seasons in an eight-year stretch. In 2015, another 20-win season helped Indiana join the Los Angeles Sparks (10) as the only franchises in league history with EIGHT 20-win seasons.
- Indiana also is the only team in WNBA history to amass seven seasons of at least 21 victories.
- From 2002-12, Indiana won 10 or more games at home to establish the longest such streak in WNBA history (11 seasons).
- Indiana enters the 2015 playoffs behind a rookie head coach who is likely the state's biggest women's basketball icon - Stephanie White.

The state's all-time scoring leader upon graduation (still No. 2 with 2,869 points), White was voted Indiana's Miss Basketball and named the national prep player of the year in 1995. She led nearby Purdue to an NCAA title and was earned national college player of the year honors four years later.

In the same year, 1999, she entered the WNBA with the Charlotte Sting and reached the Eastern Conference Finals before being traded to the Fever in what was Indiana's very first trade acquisition after establishing the franchise that summer.

One of the Fever's original players, White played four seasons with Indiana before announcing her retirement as a player.

- As a coach, Stephanie White ascended the ranks as a colllege assistant, then a pro assistant before being named the Fever's associate head coach in 2014. A part of the Fever succession plan following Lin Dunn's reign as coach, White concluded her first WNBA regular season as head coach by joining Michael Cooper and Carol Ross as the league's only rookie head coaches ever to amass 20 wins.
- White's coaching mentor and a staple within the Fever franchise for a decade, Lin Dunn concluded her seventh season as head coach of the Fever in 2014. She retired with the WNBA's longest active run of consecutive seasons as head coach with the same team.
- Dunn's seventh straight season with Indiana made her the longest tenured female coach in the WNBA. At the time of her retirement, her 23 playoff victories ranked third in league history and were more than any other female coach in league history.
- Dunn owned distinction as the only head coach in WNBA history ever to lead teams into the WNBA postseason in seven consecutive seasons (2008-14). Spending four prior seasons as a Fever assistant coach, Dunn played a role in each of the first 10 of Indiana's current 11-year playoff run.
- Dunn ended the 2014 WNBA campaign with a 168-166 (.503) regu-lar-season record, seventh in WNBA history in total wins.
- Fever President \& GM Kelly Krauskopf is the only top executive of a WNBA team that has served in that capacity for 16 consecutive seasons. Moreover, she is the ONLY person ever to serve in the top role with the Fever, named its top executive when the club was established in 1999.
- Prior to her post with Indiana, Krauskopf was the league's director of basketball operations, responsible in part for writing the WNBA's first set of rules. She joins WNBA Chief of Basketball Operations and Player Relations Renee Brown (18 years) as the league's longest tenured top executives.
- Despite Indianapolis' "mid-market" status, the Fever have ranked sixth or higher in WNBA attendance in seven straight seasons (since 2009).
- The Fever have ranked No. 1 in WNBA team sponsorship the past two seasons and this year's revenues will show slight growth again. It was another record year for 2015 season sponsorship sales.
- Sales have more than doubled in 4 years (exceeded $\$ 1 \mathrm{M}$ in 2010) and nearly tripled in 8 seasons ( $\$ 729 \mathrm{k}$ in 20007).
- Indiana's jersey partner, Finish Line, and season presenting partner Community Health Network, have renewed commitments for 2016 and beyond!
- A new multi-year deal with Finish Line commences in 2016 and by the end of its second term, the Fever-Finish Line relationship will be the longest-tenured jersey partnership in WNBA history.



## PACERS SPORTS \& ENTERTAINMENT - OWNERSHIP

HERBERT SIMON
OWNER/CHAIRMAN \& CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER


Herbert Simon is Chairman Emeritus of Simon Property Group, Inc., which owns or has an interest in more than 326 retail properties worldwide. Born in Brooklyn, N.Y., along with brothers Melvin and Fred, and raised in the Bronx, Mr. Simon earned his bachelor's degree at City College of New York.

Mr. Simon, together with brother Melvin, led the company to a leadership position within the industry which it continues to maintain today. Some of the "breakthrough" retail projects that have drawn worldwide industry and media attention under Simon leadership include The Forum Shops at Caesars in Las Vegas, Nev., The Fashion Centre at Pentagon in the Washington, D.C. metro area and Circle Centre in Indianapolis, Ind., one of the key components in the revitalization of the city's downtown. Mr. Simon helped lead the effort to build another key component for downtown, Bankers Life Fieldhouse, which is the Pacers' and Fever's home. It is widely regarded as one of the best indoor arenas in the world.

Mr. Simon, with his late brother Melvin, purchased the Pacers in 1983 to ensure the team would stay in Indianapolis and currently is Owner/CEO of Pacers Sports \& Entertainment.

A firm supporter of professional, environmental and community groups, Mr. Simon has served on the Boards of numerous organizations and served a term as Chairman of the NBA Board of Governors.

Mr. Simon is married and has eight children.

JIM MORRIS<br>VICE CHAIRMAN



Jim Morris is in his eighth year with Pacers Sports \& Entertainment, serving seven as the franchise's president. Morris was named vice chairman in Spring 2015.

Morris joined PS\&E in 2007 as a Special Advisor to then CEO/President Donnie Walsh and was named President, April 16, 2008. A graduate of Indiana University with a master's degree from Butler University, Morris has spent much of his life in Indianapolis in a variety of key positions. He started with American Fletcher National Bank in 1965 and from 1967-73 served former Mayor Richard G. Lugar as chief of staff. In 1973, he went to the Lilly Endowment, serving as its president from 1984-88 and from 1989-2002; he was the chairman and chief executive officer for IWC Resources Corporation and Indianapolis Water Company.

Before joining PS\&E, Morris was the executive director for five years for the United Nations World Food Programme (WFP) where he led the world's largest humanitarian agency. That took him to many struggling parts of the world as he worked on behalf of the hungry and poor, particularly children. He also served as the Secretary General's Special Envoy for the humanitarian crisis in southern Africa during those same years.

Morris has received many honors, including 17 honorary degrees. His public service includes serving as a trustee and board chairman for both Indiana State University and Indiana University. He serves on the National Advisory Board for the Boy Scouts of America, was Treasurer of the US Olympic Committee and currently as Treasurer of the US Gymnastics Federation, Chairman of the Board for Riley Children's Foundation, and has been a member of the Board of Governors of the American Red Cross. He serves on the Boards of One America, Old National Bank, Hulman \& Company and the Indianapolis Motor Speedway, Elanco and the Indianapolis Power and Light Advisory Board.

Morris is happily married to Jackie and they have three children, eight grandchildren, and two wonderful King Charles Cavalier puppies, Buster and Lucy.

## RICK FUSON

PRESIDENT/CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER


Since joining the Pacers' organization in 1984, Rick Fuson has been influential in shaping events within Market Square Arena, Bankers Life Fieldhouse and many other events elsewhere in Indianapolis.

A graduate of Indiana University and a life-long resident of Indianapolis, he joined the staff of Market Square Arena in 1984 as director of special events and was promoted the following year to vice president. Fuson helped oversee the Pacers' move to Bankers Life Fieldhouse in September 2000. He was promoted to Executive Senior Vice President of Pacers Sports \& Entertainment in November 2001. Rick was named Chief Operating Officer in April 2008. In his current role, Fuson is responsible for operation of all aspects of the business and facilities elements of Pacers Sports \& Entertainment.

Through the years, Fuson has been active in pursuing major events for Bankers Life Fieldhouse and the City of Indianapolis. He served as Co-Chair of the 2012 Super Bowl Village Committee. In the past, he was a member of the Executive Committee for the 1991 World Gymnastics Championships and served as chairman for the opening ceremonies. He was co-chairman of special events for the 1991, 1997 and 2000 NCAA Final Four, served on the Local Organizing Committee for the 2006 and 2010 NCAA Final Four. He produced the opening ceremonies of the 2001 World Police \& Fire Games and the closing ceremonies of the Pan American Games in 1987. Fuson also served on the Local Organizing Committee for the 2002, 2004, 2006, 2008-2012 and 2014 Big Ten Basketball Championships, 2002 FIBA World Basketball Championships, and 2004 FINA World Swimming Championship.

Throughout his career, he has received such honors as Recipient of the Indianapolis Ambassadors 1988 Community Service Award, Indianapolis Business Journal's "Who's Who in Hospitality", "Who's Who in Sports" and "Forty Under Forty." He has also been active with the Indianapolis Fellowship of Christian Athletes, the 1985 NBA All-Star weekend, the grand opening of the Indianapolis Zoo in 1988, the White River Park State Games and Indianapolis Downtown Space 2010.

Fuson is a professional member of the International Association of Assembly Managers. He currently serves on the Board of Directors for Indianapolis Downtown, Inc., Greater Indianapolis Chamber of Commerce and Indiana Convention \& Visitors Association. He is an Advisor to the Indiana Sports Corporation Board of Directors and currently serves as Chair of the Pacers Foundation.

KELLY KRAUSKOPF<br>PRESIDENT AND GENERAL MANAGER, INDIANA FEVER



Kelly Krauskopf is in her 16th season as the Indiana Fever's top executive, engineering the franchise from its birth in 1999 and directing the club's business and basketball interests all the way to its first WNBA championship in 2012. The club's chief operating officer through 15 seasons and the past 11 as general manager, she was promoted to President and General Manager in October 2012.

Since the team was established, Krauskopf has been the guiding force of the Fever from building the team roster to building a fan base for Indiana's WNBA franchise. In her role with the Fever, Krauskopf oversees all aspects of the team's operation.

Since moving to Indianapolis and beginning the task of building a WNBA franchise, Krauskopf has engineered numerous player moves enabling the Fever to sustain arguably the highest level of consistency the 19-year WNBA has ever seen.

Krauskopf has guided the franchise to 11 playoff berths in its first 15 seasons - including a run of ten consecutive from 2005 to 2014. Indiana has become one of the WNBA's most successful franchises, joining the Los Angeles Sparks as the only clubs in league history to post seven 20-win seasons. In fact, the Fever is the league's only franchise ever to post seven 20-win seasons in an eight-year span (2005-12).

Under Krauskopf's guidance, the Fever secured identical 21-13 records in 2005, 2006, 2007, 2010 and 2011; and set its club standard with 22-12 records in each of its two seasons reaching the WNBA Finals - 2009 and 2012.

Though Indiana reached the WNBA Finals in 2009 and though the franchise had achieved such consistent, annual success, the Fever had never won the title -- until the 2012 season culminated in a magical playoff run resulting in the city's first professional basketball crown since the 1973 ABA Indiana Pacers.

The Krauskopf-built Fever is the most stable the franchise has ever been, led by perennial All-Star and three-time Olympic gold medalist Tamika Catchings and a mix of young fresh faces such as Briann January and Shavonte Zellous.

The hiring of Lin Dunn as head coach in 2008 only added to the club's stability. Inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame in 2014, Dunn joined the franchise as a scout in 2003, an assistant coach in 2004, and led the franchise to unprecedented playoff success in seven seasons as head coach.

Following Dunn's retirement, Krauskopf tabbed Stephanie White as the club's fifth head coach. White, an Indiana prep and collegiate icon before her own career in the WNBA and later broadcasting and coaching, was Krauskopf's very first trade acquisiton in 1999, joining the Fever for the club's inaugural season.

Annually one of the league's most active GMs, Krauskopf's key trades and free agent signings have re-tooled the Fever roster over the years. Besides a February 2008 deal to land hometown star Katie Douglas, other moves have resulted in the acquisitions of past stars Erin Phillips, Tangela Smith, Natalie Williams, Yolanda Griffith, and Kelly Miller. A midseason move during the 2002 campaign brought veteran guard Coquese Washington to the Fever to ignite a late run to the franchise's first appearance in the WNBA Playoffs.

The cornerstone of the franchise was solidified by the draft selection of Catchings in the 2001 WNBA Draft. The third overall selection in the 2001 Draft and a three-time U.S. Olympian, Catchings was named Rookie of the Year in 2002 and Defensive Player of the Year in 2005, 2006, 2009, 2010 and 2012. The nine-time WNBA All-Star and 10-time All-WNBA selection finally earned a long-deserved MVP honor in 2011, finishing in the top five in MVP balloting 10 times. She won her first WNBA crown while earning Finals MVP honors in 2012.

Krauskopf recently served on USA Basketball's Women's Senior National Team Committee, helping select WNBA players to develop U.S. National Team rosters. Krauskopf joined the committee in 2000, helping select the gold-medal winning roster for the 2004 Summer Olympics in Athens, and again for Beijing in 2008 and London in 2012.

Krauskopf has been in the forefront of the development of the WNBA. In September 1996, she was named the WNBA's first Director of Basketball Operations. In that role, she was involved in all phases of the league's startup operation and initiatives. She also developed the league's first set of playing rules, officiating policies, scheduling and other league standards, while working daily with WNBA team general managers and operations personnel.

Before joining the WNBA, Krauskopf was the Managing Director of League Development for Media Sports Partnership, Limited in Dallas, Tex. From 1990 to 1994, she was Assistant Commissioner for the Southwest Conference. In addition to overseeing league marketing, she was the chief administrator for all eight women's sports programs in the conference. She served from 1986 to 1990 as Texas A\&M's Assistant Athletic Director for Women's Sports/Marketing.

Krauskopf has served on committees for the Women's Sports Foundation, the Women's Basketball Coaches Association, Citizenship for Sports Alliance, and Texas A\&M's Lettermen's Association Board of Directors. She currently serves on the Indiana Sports Corporation Presidents Council.

Recently, she was part of the Local Organizing Committee that hosted the 2011 NCAA Women's Final Four at Bankers Life Fieldhouse where she proudly watched her alma mater win its first national championship in women's basketball. She will be a part of the LOC that brings the Women's Final Four back to The Fieldhouse in 2016.

A 1983 graduate of Texas A\&M University with a bachelor of arts degree in journalism, she was a three-year letterwinner in basketball for the Lady Aggies after transferring from Stephen F. Austin University where she played her freshman year under legendary coach Sue Gunter.

STEPHANIE WHITE
HEAD COACH


An iconic figure in the state's history of women's basketball known for her skill, grit, poise and knowledge of the game, Stephanie White was introduced as the fifth head coach of the Indiana Fever on Sept. 23, 2014.

Taking the coaching reigns from her longtime mentor Lin Dunn, she succeeds Dunn, Brian Winters, Nell Fortner and Anne Donovan as the club's head coach.

In her first regular season as head coach, she did not disappoint, guiding Indiana to a 20-14 record and breaking the club mark for wins by a first-year head coach.

Despite employing a modified offensive system and enduring a rash of consistent injuries and absences with 10 different starting lineups, White became just the third rookie head coach in WNBA history to notch 20 wins.

A local star who joined the Fever as a player during a 1999 trade prior to the team's first season, White completed four seasons with the Fever (200001, 2003-04) before embarking on her coaching and broadcasting career. She returned as an Indiana assistant coach in 2011 and was elevated to the role of associate head coach prior to the 2014 season.

One of the club's original players and a member of the Fever's All-Decade Team announced in 2009, the Fever's 2012 WNBA title had special meaning for White who enjoyed prep, college and pro success in the state of Indiana.

She has coached in the college and pro ranks since 2003. She retired from playing in the WNBA following the 2004 season and her hiring in 2011 marked the first time the Fever had hired an assistant coach with pro playing experience. She was reunited with Dunn, the former Purdue coach who recruited White to its West Lafayette campus.

Prior to re-joining the Fever, White spent four seasons as an assistant coach with the Chicago Sky after previous stints as a college assistant at Ball State (2003-04), Kansas State (2004-05) and Toledo (2005-07).

White also has parlayed her playing and coaching into a prominent broadcasting career with the Big Ten Network, ESPN and FOX Sports Indiana. She appears regularly on BTN's women's basketball studio show and provides game analysis for women's college games on BTN and ESPN. During the 2013-14 NBA season, she began work as a pre- and postgame anchor with FOX Sports Indiana, covering the Indiana Pacers.

After leading Purdue to a national championship in 1999 and being drafted by the Charlotte Sting (2nd round, No. 21 overall), White was eventually acquired by the Fever in December 1999 to lead her hometown team into its first season of existence. White played four seasons with the Fever where she was a teammate of current Fever star Tamika Catchings.

A 5-10 shooting guard, she played five pro seasons between 1999-04, capping her career with the Fever for whom she was one of the club's top playmakers, 3-point artists and free throw shooters. She still ranks prominently among franchise leaders in games played, minutes, 3-pointers, assists, steals, 3-point percentage and free throw percentage. Her 93 percent free throw shooting in 2003 remains a Fever record.

White's legacy as a prep and college star made her one of the state's most popular figures even before she donned a Fever uniform. Beginning at tiny Seeger Memorial High School, in West Central Indiana near the Illinois border, White set early standards for basketball excellence while becoming an Indiana icon. She averaged 36.9 points and 13.1 rebounds per game while being named Indiana Miss Basketball and the 1995 national high school player of the year by Gatorade and USA Today.

Record crowds began following the small-school sensation as she led the Patriots to a 92-7 record over four seasons and finished her prep career with an Indiana record 2,869 points, still the second-best figure in state history.

In Indiana's years of single-class basketball, White and Seeger won sectional and regional titles in all four seasons that she played.
At Purdue, she averaged double-figure scoring in four straight seasons. As a senior she averaged 20.2 points and 4.5 assists per game while earning the 1999 Wade Trophy as the national college player of the year. The Big Ten Player of the Year, she led Purdue to an unbeaten league mark (16-0) and its first NCAA title. She finished her career second in school history in points and assists.

She was inducted into the Purdue Athletics Hall of Fame on April 21, 2006.
Internationally, White competed with USA Basketball as a member of the 1997 Jones Cup Team that won a silver medal in Taipei, Taiwan. The USA lost the gold medal game against South Korea, 76-71, with White finishing the tournament as the second-leading scorer for the U.S., averaging 10.3 points per game.

Born in Danville, III., and raised in West Lebanon, Ind., White gave birth to her first child, Landon Fletcher White, on Sept. 27, 2011 - the morning of Game 3 of the 2011 Eastern Conference Finals. White and partner Michelle welcomed twin boys, Aiden and Avery, on Aug. 3, 2013.

## GAIL GOESTENKORS ASSISTANT COACH



Gail Goestenkors begins her first foray into the WNBA Playoffs as she concludes her first season as assistant coach with the Indiana Fever.

One of the most accomplished women's basketball coaches in the nation, Gail Goestenkors was inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame on June 13, 2015, where she joined former Fever boss Lin Dunn who, ironically, hired Goestenkors to her first full-time coaching position at Purdue in 1986.

Also ironic is that Goestenkors first crossed paths with current Fever coach Stephanie White when White was a young recruit at Purdue. Goestenkors later coached White on the 1997 Jones Cup Team, and in 1999, White dashed Goestenkors' hopes of a national championship at Duke when Purdue downed the Blue Devils in the national championship game.

Further irony is that she is paired with Indiana assistant Gary Kloppenburg, with whom she shared assistant coach duties in 2014 with the Los Angeles Sparks.

But it was at Duke that Goestenkors put the stamp on her hall of fame career.
The head coach at Duke from 1992-07, she led the Blue Devils to an NCAA-record seven consecutive 30 -win seasons while making 13 straight NCAA Tournament appearances. She was named the ACC Coach of the Year a record seven times and, during her final ten seasons at Duke, she led the Blue Devils to NCAA Sweet Sixteen appearances every year, seven Elite Eight appearances, four Final Four appearances, and two appearances in the NCAA Championship game.
In 2001-02, she led the Blue Devils to the first undefeated regular season in ACC women's basketball history, then repeated the feat twice more, in 2003 and 2007, while earning national coach of the honors each time. During her tenure at Duke, her teams won five ACC tournament championships and eight ACC regular season titles. Goestenkors holds the ACC record for fewest games required to achieve 300 wins ( 387 games).

A six-year assistant coach at Purdue under Dunn (1986-92), Goestenkors left Duke to take the reins as the Texas head coach from 2007-12. She briefly stepped away from coaching before venturing to the WNBA for the first time in 2014, as an assistant to Carol Ross in L.A.

In 15 seasons at Duke, Goestenkors was 396-99 (.797). She was 102-64 (.614) in five seasons at Texas, falling just two wins shy of 500 head coaching victories at the college level - 498-163 (.753).

She also has played a significant role with USA Basketball, guiding the United States to medal finishes in each of six international competitions from 1997 to 2008. Since leading a silver-medal finish as head coach of the 1997 Jones Cup team, she was an assistant coach during a pair of gold medal finishes at the 2004 and 2008 Olympics, in Athens and Beijing. She was head coach of the USA at the U-19 World Championships in Tunisia in 2005, and an assistant coach during FIBA World Championships in 2002 and 2006.
Born Feb. 26, 1963 in Waterford, Michigan, Goestenkors attended Saginaw Valley State University, where she played point guard. After graduating in 1985, Goestenkors became a graduate assistant coach at lowa State. After one season, she left to become an assistant coach under Dunn, where she remained until becoming head coach at Duke in 1992.

GARY KLOPPENBURG ASSISTANT COACH


Gary Kloppenburg continues his second stint with the Fever, returning to Indiana where he helped design a trademark defensive unit that has had the Fever among the WNBA's top three scoring defenses every season since 2005.

He has been a part of the WNBA Playoffs in each of five seasons as an Indiana assistant coach.

Kloppenburg coached under Lin Dunn in Seattle (2000-02), spent 2003 with Phoenix, and resumed ties with Dunn in Indiana (2008-11) before embarking on his first head coaching role with Tulsa in 2012 and 2013.

Last season, as an assistant with the Los Angeles Sparks, was Kloppenburg's 11th in the WNBA.

Coaching beside Gail Goestenkors at L.A., and now again in Indiana, Kloppenburg helps form a dynamic bench duo of former head coaches to aid first-year head coach Stephanie White. White and Kloppenburg, in fact, shared the Fever bench in 2011, as assistants to Dunn.

Kloppenburg used his years of WNBA experience to net the Sparks' head position, and helped a three-win Tulsa franchise improve to nine wins in 2012 and 11 in 2013.

Prior to joining Dunn's staff with the Fever in 2008, he was on the staff of the NBA's Charlotte Bobcats, where he served under Bernie Bickerstaff for three seasons. Kloppenburg was hired by Bickerstaff when the Bobcats were founded in 2004 - continuing a family bond established when Bickerstaff was in college, and strengthened when Gary's father Bob coached in the NBA with Bickerstaff in Seattle and Denver.

Kloppenburg has coached at virtually every level of college and professional basketball, ranging from his beginnings at a California community college and intertwined with jobs in the NBA, WNBA, Continental Basketball Association and internationally.

Prior to joining the Bobcats' staff as an assistant coach and advance scout, he was an assistant with the WNBA's Mercury for one season after three years with Dunn in Seattle. He worked for the NBA's Toronto Raptors from 1997-99 after two seasons as an assistant coach and assistant director of player personnel in the CBA - first with the Rockford Lightning and then for the Quad City Thunder. Kloppenburg was the interim head coach for four games in 1999-00 with Rockford where he coached former NBA star Earl Boykins.

In the summer of 1999, he was head coach for Panteras de Miranda of the Venezuelan Professional League, and he has conducted basketball clinics in Greece, Belgium, Iceland and Japan.

After graduating from UC San Diego in 1981, his coaching career began at Lassen Community College (Calif.) where he had successful stints as head coach with both the men's and women's teams. He guided the women's team for five seasons before taking over the men's program for six.

Also fluent in Spanish, Kloppenburg was born Jan. 6, 1953, and has three children - Sonja, lan and Carlotta. Carlotta, a coaching intern with the Fever, played at Point Loma Nazarene College and also is a graduate assistant coach at Winthrop University.

## BACK TO THE PLAYOFFS

Returning to the WNBA Playoffs for an 11th consecutive season in 2015, and for the 12th time in the franchise's 16-year history, the Indiana Fever hope for a return to the WNBA Finals for the third time since 2009.

Indiana enters the Eastern Conference Semifinals in 2015 where it meets the Chicago Sky. The Fever dropped all four outings against the Sky this season, three by margins of 20 points or more.

The Fever and Sky have been paired in playoff matchups each of the past two seasons, with the lower-seeded team prevailing each year.

It is the third time in franchise history that Indiana has entered as the No. 3 seed, falling in the conference semifinals on each of previous two occasions - to Bill Laimbeer's Detroit Shock in 2006 and to a New York squad in 2010.

Since losing consecutive home games between the 2005 and 2006 postseasons, the Fever have lost just six of its last 24 playoff games at Bankers Life Fieldhouse (18-6, .750).

## ALL-TIME PLAYOFF WINS BY FRANCHISE

Indiana's 29 playoff wins are the fourth-most wins by any franchise in WNBA Playoffs history. By percentage (29-27, .518), Indiana is seventh in league history.

Among teams currently in the Eastern Conference, Indiana's wins and percentage are tops among all franchises.

## TRUTH IN SEEDING

Indiana has participated in 20 playoff series during its 11 previous WNBA Playoffs seasons, and in 15 of 20 series, the top seed has advanced.

## REVISITING I-65 PLAYOFF UPSETS

The I-65 series between Chicago and Indiana has seen the lower-seeded team beat its high-er-seeded counterpart each of the past two years.

In the 2014 East Finals, No. 2 Indiana was beaten by No. 4 Chicago as the Sky advanced to their first WNBA Finals.

The Fever captured Game 1 in Indy, but an 8684 overtime decision in Chicago blew momentum in the Sky's direction. Two nights later, Chicago thwarted Indiana's hopes for a repeat championship with a 75-62 win that reflected the Fever's biggest home playoff loss since 2011.
In the 2013 East Semis, Indiana took on top-seeded Chicago in what was the Sky's first venture into the WNBA Playoffs. The No. 4-seed Fever offered a rude welcome.

Indiana won 85-72 at Allstate Arena in Game 1, then captured Game 2, 79-57, in Indianapolis. The two-game blowout was the fifth-largest combined margin of victory of any series in WNBA Playoffs history.

## FINALS OR BUST

Indiana reached the WNBA Finals in 2009 and won its first WNBA crown by reaching the Finals again in 2012.

## ALMOST ROUTINE

Indiana seeks a fifth consecutive trip to the East Finals and its eighth in the past 11 years.

Last year, the Fever matched a WNBA standard for conference finals appearances in a 10-year span (7).

The Indiana Fever and Los Angeles Sparks are the only WNBA franchises ever to reach the conference finals at least seven times within a 10year period.

For sake of comparison, the last NBA team to reach the conference finals at least seven times within 10 seasons was the Chicago Bulls, with eight appearances from 1989 to 1998.

In the NHL, the Edmonton Oilers made eight appearances from 1983 to 1992.

## IN ELIMINATION GAMES

The Fever has won four of its past six elimination games, winning each of those four games during its 2012 run to the WNBA championship.

Overall, Indiana is 11-9 all-time in elimination contests, 8-2 at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

## PLAYOFF-TESTED

Five players remain from Indiana's 2012 championship team, and 10 total players have appeared on past Fever playoff teams. Eleven of 12 players, including trade acquisition Shenise Johnson, boast previous WNBA playoff experience.

Rookie Natalie Achonwa is the only player without WNBA postseason experience.

Tamika Catchings makes her 12th playoff appearance, appearing in every playoff game (56) in Fever history.

## CATCHINGS FOR 1,000

Tamika Catchings enters the 2015 postseason within 51 points of being the first player in league history to score 1,000 points in the postseason.

## DOUBLE-DOUBLES LEADERBOARD

Tamika Catchings is the WNBA's all-time leader in playoff double-doubles.

She has recorded a double-double in nearly 40 percent of her career playoff games, posting 24 in 56 career playoff appearances entering the 2015 postseason.

Even at 35 years-old in the 2014 playoffs, Catchings had double-double efforts in three of five games.


## ERLANA IN THE PLAYOFFS

Prior to 2012 with Indiana, Erlana Larkins had appeared in six playoff games with New York in 2008 - with no starts, no double-figure scoring and no double-digit rebounds.

Fast forward to the present, in three playoff seasons (19 games) with Indiana, she totals an AVERAGE of 9.8 points (187) and 10.6 (202) rebounds.

Larkins had three double-doubles in four games in 2013 and another in 2014. She has seven in 19 postseason games overall.

MOST IMPORTANTLY - Indiana is 12-6 in the playoffs with Larkins in the starting lineup, entering the lineup for the first time in Game 2 of the 2012 East Semis at Atlanta on Sept. 30, 2012.

## ABOVE THE AVERAGE

Both Tamika Catchings and Erlana Larkins rank in the top 5 all-time in career rebounding average in WNBA Playoffs history.

Notably, since arriving in Indiana, Larkins has averaged 9.84 boards per game ( 187 in 19 games) with the Fever in past three postseasons. That figure would rank No. 2 on the list.

## ‘WHITE’ HOT FEVER

In her first season as head coach, Stephanie White won more games (20) than any first-year head coach in Fever franchise history. Lin Dunn went 17-17 in her first season as head coach in the 2008 season.
The Fever have featured 10 different starting lineups this season, have entered only two games this season with all 12 players in uniform (July 28 at Connecticut and August 28 vs. Atlanta) and have never ended a game with all 12 players healthy.

White became the third rookie head coach in WNBA history to record at least 20 wins in his or her first year. Michael Cooper set the record with 28 wins during his first year as head coach of the Los Angeles Sparks in 2000.

## WINNING WAYS

After beginning the season 3-6, the Fever won 17 of their final 25 games, including a 12-6 mark after the All-Star break. The Fever recorded the third-longest winning streak in team history as they won six consecutive games from August 7-23.

The Fever posted their first winning record during the regular season and won 20 games for the first time since 2012. This season marks the eighth time in franchise history the Fever won at least 20 games.

Indiana set a franchise record with five straight wins by double-figure margins from August 11-21.

The Fever won eight consecutive home games from July 2 through August 23, the third-longest streak in team history.

Over the four wins from August 16-23, Indiana held opponents to just 6-for-46 shooting (.110) from three-point range.

## OFFENSIVE BEHAVIOR

Indiana finished the regular season ranked fourth in the league in scoring, first in three-point percentage and sixth in free throw percentage. The Fever shot 50 percent or better from the field in four consecutive games (June 30-July 10) - a new franchise record - and were 5-0 this season making at least half of their field goal attempts.

## 'MOE'-ST IMPROVED?

In her first season with the Fever, Shenise 'Moe' Johnson revitalized her WNBA career as she averaged 10.9 points, a career-high 4.9 rebounds and 2.4 assists per game this season.

She finished third among all qualified players this season in three-point percentage, shooting a career-best 41.3 percent from long distance, and a career-high 46.7 percent from the field overall, 15th in the league.

Johnson is the ONLY WNBA player among the league's top ten BEST IMPROVEMENTS in points per game (6th, 10.9), rebounds per game (7th, 4.9 rpg ), field goal percentage (2nd, $46.7 \%$ ) and 3 -point field goal percentage (5th, 41.3\%).

She fell one point shy of her career high as she tallied a season-best 19 points in the win over New York, 7/29, and against Atlanta, 8/28.

Johnson recorded the second double-double of her WNBA career as she scored 16 points and pulled down a career-high 11 rebounds in the win over Washington, 7/2.

## ACING HER INTRODUCTION

After sitting out the entire 2014 WNBA season while rehabilitating a torn left ACL, Natalie Achonwa made her presence known early in her career. The ninth overall selection in 2014 out of Notre Dame, Achonwa led all WNBA rookies in field goal percentage (.550), finished fourth in scoring (8.0) and tied for fourth in rebounding (3.5).
Achonwa ranked third overall in the WNBA in field goal percentage before leaving for her latest stint on the Canadian National Team on August 7.
She became the first Fever player in franchise history to be honored as the WNBA's Rookie of the Month after she led all rookies with 10.2 points per game to go with 4.6 rebounds per game during the month of June.

## BENCH BOOST

Indiana used a deep rotation to maximize its fast-paced style of play this season. Utilizing all 13 players that were on the roster this season, a healthy Fever player in uniform did not record a DNP-CD until the 18th game of the season against New York, 7/29.
As a result, the Fever developed the top-scoring second unit in the WNBA this season. Indiana's bench outscored its opponents in 17 of the 20 wins this season and 25 of 34 games overall.

## KIZER CASHES IN

Seeing a larger role while Erlana Larkins missed an extended period of time this season, Lynetta Kizer responded by setting new career highs in nearly every statistical category. She averaged 8.3 points and 3.5 rebounds in 17.9 minutes per game while playing in 33 games and making 14 starts. She scored in double figures a career high 14 times and finished ranked 10th in the WNBA while shooting 49.1 percent from the field and 13th at 87.9 percent from the free throw line.
Kizer tied her career high as she scored 19 points on 8 -for- 15 shooting in the victory at Phoenix, 8/16.

## LETHAL LUCAS

## FEVER CENTURY CLUB

With 106 points against the Atlanta Dream on August 7, the Fever posted their second-largest scoring total in franchise history. It marked the sixth time in franchise history the team topped 100 or more points and the first since 2010.

Indiana finished with 59 points in the second half against the Dream, tied for the most points scored in any half in team history. The Fever also set franchise records and WNBA season-highs with 40 free throws on 44 attempts in the victory.

Indiana's 106-point effort tied for the highest scoring total in the WNBA this season with the Chicago Sky, who posted 106 points against the Fever three nights prior.

## FRANCHISE MARKS ON D

The Fever limited Washington to season-lows with 50 points on 29.3 percent shooting and earneda 73-50 win over the Mystics on July 2. The Mystics finished with 16 points in the second half with nine points in the third quarter and seven in the fourth.

Against Connecticut on Sept. 1, the Fever allowed only 15 points in the first half, the sec-ond-fewest points allowed in a half in franchise history and the fewest by an opponent in any half at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

According to Elias Sports Bureau, this is the second time in WNBA history that a team has held opponents to two single-digit quarters in a game, twice in one season. The only other team to accomplish that feat was the Fever in 2008.

## ENDING ROAD WOES AT THE CASINO

Indiana shot 55.4 percent from the field and led by as many as 23 points as the Fever snapped Connecticut's seven-game winning streak over the then-first place Sun on June 30. The victory also snapped a seven-game regular season road losing streak to the Sun, as the Fever earned their first victory at Connecticut since July 28, 2011.

## STOPPING THE STORM

Indiana limited the Seattle Storm to just 45 field goal attempts on July 8, the fewest in the WNBA this season and fewest against the Fever since May 27, 2012.

## PACKING THE HOUSE

Consistently in the top half of the WNBA in attendance every season, numbers once again ranked among the best in the league this season.

A crowd of 9,034 was welcomed for the home opener on June 6. A Kids Day crowd of 12,189 on July 8 was the 10th largest regular season crowd in franchise history and largest since 2003

The Fever wrapped up the regular season against New York on Sept. 13 in front of a crowd of 9,210 , bringing the season average to 7,485 for the season.

It is the seventh consecutive season that Indiana has finished among the league's top half of home attendance rankings.

Fever fans ignited their way into the history books as 3,712 glowsticks were lit simultaneously before the team's home opener against the Minnesota Lynx.

9,034 total fans in attendance witnessed the home opener as the Fever fell 69-78 to the Lynx.

Opened on Nov. 6, 1999, the building "takes a step into the future while taking a walk back into history."

It played host to the 2002 FIBA World Basketball Championships, the 2004 FINA World Short Course Swimming Championships and the United States Gymnastics Championships. In April 2011, it was host to the NCAA Women's Final Four. In 2012, the Fieldhouse provided a border to the east side of the Super Bowl Village for Super Bowl XLVI. It has been an annual host to Big Ten Conference men's and women's basketball tournaments and has been a gathering point for the National FFA Convention - the nation's largest annual youth gathering.

ROSEMONT, III. - Elena Delle Donne scored 31 points and the Chicago Sky beat the Indiana Fever 95-72 to win their fourth consecutive WNBA opener.

The Sky raised their Eastern Conference championship banner prior to the tip, took a double digit lead 5 minutes into the game and led by 13 at intermission, 51-38. Chicago outscored Indiana 22-14 in the final 10 minutes.

Delle Donne was 11 of 20 from the field, 9 of 10 from the free throw line and had eight rebounds, four blocks and three steals.

Courtney Vandersloot added 13 points for Chicago, which got points from every player on its roster and shot 36 of 78 from the field ( 46.2 percent).

Marissa Coleman scored 18 points to lead Indiana and Natalie Achonwa added 10. The Fever shot just 26 of 66 from the field ( 39.4 percent). They hit 7 of 203 -points, but committed 20 turnovers.

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## GAME 2 - MINNESOTA 78, INDIANA 69 <br> June 6, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - When Shenise Johnson hit a 3-pointer with seven minutes left in the fourth quarter, slicing the Indiana Fever deficit to three, she was feeling good. She wanted the ball. Again and again.
"(Coach Stephanie White) let everybody know: If somebody has it going, let's try to get her shots," Johnson said. "We're all about making each other better, making the extra pass. I just happened to be open and feeling it."

But despite Johnson's heroics, the Fever rally lost its steam. Against the Minnesota Lynx, a favorite to win the WNBA championship in 2015, Johnson's 15 points - including nine in the fourth - weren't enough. Sixteen from Indiana's Marissa Coleman, 14 from Natalie Achonwa and 11 from Briann January weren't enough.

The veteran Lynx departed Bankers Life Fieldhouse with a 78-69 victory. The Fever, dealing with injuries and working to implement a new offense, knew there would be some hard landings in the early going this year. This felt like one of them.

The Fever are 0-2 after back-to-back games against Chicago and the Lynx. But Stephanie White, Indiana's first-year coach, struck an optimistic tone the Saturday night loss. She liked her club's resilience and focused effort after Friday's 95-72 setback at Chicago.
"I'm just really proud of the way this team bounced back," White said. "It's really a 180-degree turnaround from where we were last night."

The Fever reduced their turnovers from 20 against Chicago to 12 against Minnesota. They held Minnesota to 38.7 percent field-goal shooting after Chicago recorded a 46.2 mark. The Fever improved their own shooting to 42.4 percent from 39.4.

But after Johnson's 3 early in the fourth quarter made it a 60-57 game, the Lynx began building their margin again. When Rebekkah Brunson grabbed a deflected ball and scored on a putback, Minnesota took an eight-point lead with only 46.2 seconds remaining.

The Fever played a second consecutive game without veteran forward Tamika Catchings (bruised knee). Veteran center Erlana Larkins has been limited by injuries in the early season. Achonwa, after sitting out last season following knee surgery, is seeing plenty of action as a rookie and capitalizing.

Achonwa, who collected 10 points and six rebounds at Chicago, earned her first WNBA start against Minnesota. She quickly went into what she called "attack mode."
"Given the opportunities I was when they were switching on our screen and rolls, I just looked to square up and go to the rim," said the Notre Dame graduate.

Johnson took over the scoring load in the second half. Indiana trailed by as much as 14 early in the half. Johnson used Indiana's fast-paced offense to her advantage, looked for open shots and hit 6-of12 from the field, including 2-of-4 from the 3-point arc. She also grabbed five rebounds.

The night began with 3,712 spectators simultaneously lighting a glowstick, which painted a pic-ture-perfect radiance at The Fieldhouse and also broke the Guinness World Record for the most people creating such illumination. The afterglow didn't quite last long enough to produce a Fever victory.

## GAME 3 - NEW YORK 86, INDIANA 79 <br> June 9, 2015 - Madison Square Garden

NEW YORK - Tina Charles scored 21 points and Essence Carson added 14 to lead the New York Liberty to an 84-74 win over the Indiana Fever. The Liberty (2-1) earned its second straight home win at Madison Square Garden while Indiana fell to 0-3.

Despite a rebounding edge and outscoring the Liberty in three of four quarters, Indiana's 16 turnovers contributed to 24 Liberty points and New York shot 49 percent from the floor to send the Fever to its third straight defeat, matching an identical start in 2014.
"It all comes down to our turnovers," said first-year head coach Stephanie White who received her first technical foul with 1:26 left in the game. "You can't give away free possessions. [New York] took advantage and made it tough on us to come back."
"We had a rough third quarter again," she added. "We came out flat, without any sense of urgency on either end of the court. We had four straight turnovers on offense, and that got us out of sorts on the defensive end."

The Fever led most of the first half and clung to a 41-38 lead at intermission, but New York doubled the Fever in the third quarter, 24-12, beginning with a game-changing 20-4 run out of the locker room.

Indiana closed the gap to 8 on a 3-pointer by Shenise Johnson with 28 seconds left in the third, but the Liberty pushed their lead to $14,68-54$, on a hook shot and three-point play by Charles with 8:33 in the final quarter. Maggie Lucas' 3-pointer with 5:25 remaining narrowed the gap to 6, 71-65, but six straight Liberty points pushed New York ahead by double figures again.

Tanisha Wright added 12 points for New York, and Kiah Stokes pitched in 11.
Indiana's 41 points at the half were a season-high in one half for the Fever, but the 13 points in the third were a season-low for a quarter.

The loss overshadowed a career scoring high of 14 points by Layshia Clarendon and the 2015 debut of three-time Olympic gold medalist and nine-time WNBA All-Star Tamika Catchings. Catchings, the WNBA's active leader in points, rebounds, steals and free throws, scored seven points in the first quarter and finished with 13 points and seven rebounds.

Johnson, Lynetta Kizer and rookie Natalie Achonwa also added 13 points apiece for the Fever who played without veteran center Erlana Larkins (right knee).


## GAME 4 - INDIANA 77, PHOENIX 74 <br> June 12, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - It ranked as a memorable night for Stephanie White - and not just because she collected her first victory as a head coach. It was special for White because of the Indiana Fever's full-bore effort. Special because of their perseverance. Notable because of their clutch plays in the waning moments against the defending WNBA champions.
"I'm really proud of how we gutted it out," said White, the Fever's first-year coach, whose team knocked off the Phoenix Mercury, 77-74, and lifted its record to 1-3. "We know it's going to be looseball, tough, scrappy types of plays that are going to win us ball games.

Nobody executed better than Fever star Tamika Catchings, who finished with 27 points and 13 rebounds at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. She scored 12 in the fourth quarter on 4-of-6 shooting from the field and 4-of-5 from the line.
"Was she 25 again?" White said about the 35 -year-old veteran. "She looked like she was young. ... She dominated in every aspect of the ball game. She had control of our team. She had control of the ball. She controlled the moment.
"She picked and chose her spots on when to have her foot on the brake and when to have it on the accelerator."

With 5:54 left in the game, Catchings accelerated a little too hard and was called for a personal foul and then a technical foul. Three Phoenix free throws tied the game at 64 . White quickly sat Catchings down for about $1 \frac{1}{2}$ minutes.

Catchings returned, totally locked in. She converted a three-point play with 2:59 left, then added another free throw and a layup.

With 58 seconds remaining, Catchings unleashed a 75 -foot pass that hit Natalie Achonwa in stride for a layup, sending the Fever up 73-69. With 23.9 seconds remaining and Indiana's lead at only two White called a timeout and set up a pick-and-roll play with Briann January handling the ball and Catchings as the screener.
"We wanted Bri to attack," White said, "and we wanted Catch to be the one that (January) was in the pick-and-roll with. We knew in that situation, (Phoenix) would probably have to switch and one of them would get a shot."

It worked to perfection. The Mercury left a lane for January, who drove for a bucket that sent Indiana ahead by four.

The Fever needed it. The Mercury's Leilani Mitchell, who scored 25 points and hit a Fever-opponent record of seven 3 -pointers, buried a trey with 7.3 seconds remaining. Mitchell barely missed tying the game at the buzzer with a desperation try from nearly half-court.

For Indiana, Marissa Coleman, with 11 points, was the only player other than Catchings in dou-ble-digit scoring. Shavonte Zellous, who returned from Croatia on Thursday night, found enough energy to help the Fever with seven points, three rebounds and three steals in $26 \frac{1}{2}$ minutes.


## GAME 5 - CHICAGO 98, INDIANA 72 <br> June 14, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Missed shots and missed opportunities engulfed the Indiana Fever in the first half. By the time they recovered, it was too late.

The Fever found themselves trying to climb from a 41-point hole. The Chicago Sky went on to capture a 98-72 victory at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The Fever departed The Fieldhouse knowing things must improve.

Stephanie White, the Fever's first-year coach, left no doubt about it.
"Obviously, very disappointed in how we started the game, really embarrassed at how we started the game," White said. "We had no pride, didn't compete, didn't have any energy. And we let Chicago run over us.
"We have to learn from the way we started this ball game," White added. "There is absolutely no excuse for that. ... There will not be days where we don't compete. We didn't compete."

Indiana fell behind by 20 points halfway through the second quarter. Fell behind by 30 with 1:50 left in the second quarter. Fell behind by 40 after Chicago opened the third quarter on an 8-0 run.

The Fever righted the ship thereafter and outscored Chicago, 51-37, the rest of the way. But the damage was done.

The Fever played the game without three of its inside players. Tamika Catchings sat out because of a one-game league suspension for making contact with a game official in a Friday game. Catchings' backup, Natasha Howard, was out with an injured hand and will likely miss a week. Erlana Larkins has played only sparingly this season with an injured knee.

With Indiana using a small lineup, Chicago scored 46 points in the paint.
"That's part of it," White said about Indiana's lack of size resulting in Chicago's inside dominance. "But I think the other part is our positioning, our attention to detail, our coverages. Our one-on-one contain defense was not good."

Also injured for Indiana was Shavonte Zellous, who sat out the second half with a lower-back problem. The Fever had only eight players available after halftime.

But White made it clear she didn't want her team sulking about injuries or any other difficulties.
"You don't have time to feel sorry for yourself," she said. "You have to fight for your job every single day."

The Sky shot 56.7 percent from the field and outrebounded the Fever, 46-27. Six Sky players scored in double digits, led by Elena Delle Donne with 24. Chicago's starting backcourt of Cappie Pondexter and Courtney Vandersloot combined for 29 points on 11-of-20 shooting.

Marissa Coleman led Indiana with 16 points and added six rebounds.


## GAME 6 - INDIANA 90, ATLANTA 79 June 16, 2015 - Philips Arena

ATLANTA - Rebounding from a 26-point home loss on Sunday, the Indiana Fever ran away with a 90-79 afternoon victory over the Atlanta Dream at Philips Arena. The Fever, long known as a defensive stalwart that grinded for points, showed off the new-look transition game heralded by new head coach Stephanie White by blasting the Dream over two quarters then holding off a valiant Dream rally in the fourth.

Indiana scored a season high in points despite playing without injured stars Natasha Howard, Erlana Larkins and Shavonte Zellous. The Fever took control early in the second period and only briefly looked back while recording its third straight road win over the Dream.

After trailing by as many as 29, Atlanta awoke in the final period to rally within 10, 79-69. Free throws by Sancho Lyttle cut the margin to 9, and another pair by Roneeka Hodges trimmed the lead to 7, 84-77, with under two minutes remaining. Under a minute, though, the Fever's Briann January stopped the momentum with a steal and four free throws of her own to preserve the win.

Marissa Coleman paced five Fever players in double figures with 18 points, and was largely credited with containing Dream All-Star Angel McCoughtry on the defensive end. Maggie Lucas matched career highs with 17 points and four 3-point field goals. She and Coleman combined to shoot 7-of-11 from 3-point range.

The Fever made 9-of-18 3-pointers overall and shot 50 percent from the floor. As part of its up-tempo offense, Indiana posted 23 assists on 30 -of- 60 shooting overall, with January dishing six assists and Layshia Clarendon adding a career-high seven.
"The biggest factor for us was getting back to details and playing with energy," said White. "We needed to bounce back from Sunday. I thought we played well. I was proud of our team, but you're never in control against Atlanta because, the way they play, they make runs and they make big runs."
"We made some of the hustle plays when we needed them, though," she added. "We got some big rebounds and we got up and down the floor well, consistently."

Rookie center Natalie Achonwa shot 5-of-6 from the floor for 12 points. Returning from a league-imposed suspension on Sunday, Tamika Catchings contributed 11 points and Lynetta Kizer had 10 as Indiana posted its first road win.

Sancho Lyttle led Atlanta with a game-high 19 points and Angel McCoughtry netted 15. Rookie Erica Wheeler came off the bench to register a career-best 13 points, and Erika de Souza added 10 as the Dream lost their second straight game.

Trailing 18-16 after the opening quarter, Indiana blitzed the home team with a 33-point second quarter while taking a 49-35 lead into halftime. It was the Fever's highest scoring half of the season and the second-highest scoring quarter in Fever history - a stark contrast to a nine-point second period two days earlier against Chicago.

The Indiana onslaught continued into the third quarter as the Fever scored the first six points, then added another 12-0 run for a 73-44 advantage with 2:03 left in the quarter that was the club's largest lead in two seasons.


GAME 7 - INDIANA 80, NEW YORK 63

## June 19, 2015 - Madison Square Garden

NEW YORK - Maggie Lucas scored career highs with 23 points and five 3-pointers to lead the Indiana Fever past the New York Liberty, 80-63, at Madison Square Garden.

Lucas and Marissa Coleman combined for 39 points and seven 3-pointers as Indiana avenged a road loss to the Liberty just 10 days ago at The Garden. Indiana raced to a 22-point lead before halftime and staved off steady pressure from New York in the second half.

Indiana (3-4) won its second road game in three days, winning back-to-back road games by double figures for the first time since its championship season in 2012 - and just the second time in its history. New York (3-3) lost its second straight.

Indiana got 14 points from Maggie Lucas in a furious first period that saw the Fever begin the game on a 14-4 run, and end the period with an 18-3 streak. The Fever led 32-12 after the first period, eclipsing 30 points in a quarter for the third straight game

In the third, the Liberty used a 7-2 run to pull within 10 points, 50-40. New York chipped into the Indiana lead and pulled within 70-63 on a bucket and free throw by Sugar Rodgers with 6:24 remaining in the contest. But the Liberty never scored again and managed just eight points in the final period.

Meanwhile, Indiana responded to Rodgers' three-point play with three consecutive baskets by Lynetta Kizer and Briann January, pushing the Indiana lead to double digits with 3:30 to play.

Indiana's offensive flow produced a 48-point first half and the 32-point first quarter. Since held to a 9-point second quarter last Sunday against Chicago, the Fever has reeled off 10 consecutive periods with at least 15 points. Its three 30-point quarters in the past five days match all that Indiana had last season.

Lucas, a second-year star from Penn State was the beneficiary of Indiana's new free moving offense, finding open looks and firing. "I just try to keep battling," said Lucas. "When my teammates keep finding me, it helps us all be successful. I think Marissa hit me on at least three of them."

Indeed, Coleman also added a career-high seven assists in the win.
"I can't say enough about the toughness of Marissa Coleman," added White. "She's playing well. She had seven assists and six rebounds. She's seeing the floor well and I know she hit Maggie a bunch of times tonight."

Uncharacteristic for Indiana was a " 0 " in the scoring column for Tamika Catchings. For just the second time in her lengthy All-Star career, the former MVP, 0-of-10 shooting, was held scoreless. Ending a string of 168 consecutive games in the scoring with points, her only other scoreless occurrence was on July 23, 2009.

Indiana played without Natasha Howard and starters Erlana Larkins and Shavonte Zellous, all absent due to injury. The Liberty played without starting guard Epipphany Prince who was competing in the European Championships.


## GAME 8 - WASHINGTON 87, INDIANA 75 <br> June 20, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - As Indiana Coach Stephanie White analyzed the Fever's defensive inconsistencies, a look at the visitors' shooting statistics amplified her words.

The Washington Mystics opened with 71.4 percent shooting in the first quarter. They cooled some before halftime, but their 51.7 percent marksmanship in the second half proved too much for Indiana to overcome. The Fever stumbled, 87-75, at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

The Mystics also totaled 51.7 percent (31-of-60) for the game. They were at 45.5 percent (10-of22) from 3-point range. Ivory Latta led the Mystics with 24 points, hitting 7-of-12 overall and 6-of-8 on 3-pointers.
"I thought we were a step slow early in the ball game and really established a soft tone on the defensive end in that first quarter," White said. "We tried to fight and claw our way back.
"Washington, give them credit. They made every big play. Latta made every big shot. They got every loose ball. They made all the hustle plays, the ones we made last night to come away with a victory in New York."

One night earlier, Indiana (3-5) captured a satisfying 80-63 triumph at New York. The Fever didn't get back to Indianapolis until about noon Saturday. An element of fatigue played into their performance a few hours later.

But Washington, too, came into Saturday night's game after playing Friday night. And the Mystics were still hitting shots in the final minutes, including eight straight points by Latta at the end that locked up the victory.
"We have to find a way to fight through that mentally," White said about fatigue. "We can't be late to our coverages. We can't miss our coverages. We have to be there. We might be a step slow, but we have to get there. And we weren't getting there tonight."

Washington (4-2) hurt the Fever with inside stuff as well as treys. Post players Emma Meesseman and Stefanie Dolson combined for 12 -of-18 shooting and 27 points.
"We just really let them drive middle," said Fever veteran Tamika Catchings. "That's not in our defensive plan at all. They got a lot of middle penetrations, which we were trying to figure out."

Added Fever guard Briann January: "We allowed them to gain some momentum and feel comfortable on offense. They hit some big shots and they got rolling."

January and Lynetta Kizer led the Fever with 14 points apiece. But Indiana's shooting, like its defense, looked out of synch at times. The Fever were at 36.1 percent overall (26-of-72) and just 25 percent (5-of-20) from 3-point range.

Still, Indiana made it a six-point game (76-70) when Kizer scored at the 3:30 mark of the fourth quarter. But Indiana had no answer for the Mystics' outside gunning, which resulted in three clinch ing 3 -pointers over the next two minutes.

## GAME 9 - CHICAGO 83, INDIANA 77 June 26, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - The Indiana Fever departed Bankers Life Fieldhouse harboring feelings of regret. Squandering an opportune situation will do that to a team.

The Fever opened impressively against Chicago before they unraveled amid late turnovers and defensive lapses. They let a potential victory against the Sky slip away. It was a game that Indiana led by 11 points in the first half and by various margins through most of $31 / 2$ quarters.
"No question about it: definitely a missed opportunity," Fever Coach Stephanie White said after the 83-77 setback to Chicago. "This was our ball game to win. And we started playing not to lose, instead of playing to win."

The triumph was Chicago's third of the young season against Indiana. The first two came by margins of 23 and 26 points.

Clearly, the Fever (3-6) played better this time, much better, but the game broke down into a tale of two halves - and the second half didn't favor the home team.

The Fever's fast-paced offense was at its best in the first two quarters, leading to a 56.3 percent first-half shooting mark from the field, with 11 assists on 18 buckets. The second half flipped, with Indiana taking its foot off the gas pedal, hitting only 28 percent from the field and recording only two assists on seven total buckets.

Also, 11 second-half turnovers sabotaged a lot of what the Fever wanted to do. And the miscues led to 13 points for Chicago, which outscored the Fever 40-25 after halftime.
"I felt like we competed," White said. "Yet when things got a little tough, we had too many breakdowns - too many breakdowns on both ends."

Indiana's turnovers played a large part in changing the complexion of the game.
"Not to take anything away from Chicago, a lot of it was unforced, just losing the ball, fumbling the ball," Indiana's Johnson said. "There's no defense for that. If we're giving them the ball and they're getting layups, we can't cover that. We have to be better."

Johnson had 15 points and seven rebounds for the Fever. Marissa Coleman totaled 16 points and eight boards. Catchings added 13 points, seven rebounds and three steals.

Cappie Pondexter led Chicago with 23 points, Allie Quigley had 17 and Courtney Vandersloot added 13. Elena Delle Donne, the WNBA's leading scorer who totaled 45 in Chicago's overtime victory at Atlanta on Wednesday, had 14 points and 14 rebounds against the Fever.

In the second half, Indiana's defense struggled against Chicago's pick-and-roll. Sometimes, the Fever were late on rotations. Other times, as White said, a nice defensive possession didn't get finished with a box-out and the Fever lost the rebound.

With 5:25 left in the fourth quarter, Chicago (5-3) took a 73-72 lead on a Vandersloot 3-pointer. Indiana never led again. When Delle Donne took a pass from Jessica Breland and laid it in with 27.4 seconds remaining, Chicago opened an 81-77 margin.


## GAME 10 - INDIANA 92, CONNECTICUT 84 June 30, 2015 - Mohegan Sun Arena

UNCASVILLE, Conn. - The Indiana Fever certainly have enjoyed playing on the road. So much so that perennial All-Star Tamika Catchings was nearly perfect during a 92-84 Fever victory over the Connecticut Sun.

Indiana (4-6) won its third straight road game, nearly running away with a third straight dou-ble-figure road margin until Connecticut staged a comeback in the final period.

The 35-year old Catchings played in the 400th game of her WNBA career and became the fourth player in league history with 3,000 rebounds. She finished with game highs of 26 points and 10 rebounds to register the 93rd double-double of her career. Remarkably, she didn't miss a shot until 8:06 remained in the contest, finishing 9-of-10 from the floor with four 3-pointers.

Deadlocked at 31 with nine lead changes and seven ties by the early moments of the second quarter, the stage was set for a 40-minute nailbiter. From that point though, Catchings and Indiana outscored the home team 43-20 over the next 17 minutes to command a 23-point lead, $74-51$, with 1:48 left in the third.

The Fever maintained a 76-55 advantage early in the fourth when the Sun awoke to swing the pendulum. Seven minutes and a 24-7 spurt later, the Sun had raged within 83-79 with still 2:23 to play. Kelsey Bone scored 10 during the period for Connecticut and Indianapolis native Alex Bentley contributed nine.

Who else would play hero for Indiana, but Catchings? The former MVP calmly pocketed a baseline jumper for a six-point advantage. Bentley pulled the Sun within three, 85-82, on a 3-pointer with 1:05 left but on the same play, Bone was whistled for a flagrant foul that resulted in her ejection and a pair of free throws by Natalie Achonwa.

Achonwa's free throws, plus two more from Catchings and a steal by Catchings, helped put the game on ice for Indiana to halt the Sun's seven-game win streak.

Bentley capped an 18-point evening with a layup in the final minute, but free throws from Layshia Clarendon and Shenise Johnson sealed the first road win by either team in the Sun-Fever series since 2012. Bone paced the Sun with 21 points. Also in double figures for Connecticut were Jasmine Thomas, with 14, and Alyssa Thomas and Camille Little, each with 12.

Johnson added 13 points and Achonwa had 10 in a balanced scoring effort for Indiana. Lynetta Kizer, Natasha Howard and Maggie Lucas each pitched in nine off the bench, combining to shoot 11-of-16 among them. Lucas was forced out of the game with an injured hip with 44 seconds remaining.

Tied at 31, Johnson scored six points during an 8-0 Fever run to command a 39-31 advantage and eventually take a 49-44 lead into the locker room. And at that time, Catchings was still perfect -12 points, 5 rebounds, 2 assists at the break, while perfect on 5 -of- 5 shooting with two 3-pointers.

Catchings' near perfection and Indiana's new up-tempo offense produced a season-high 92 points. The Fever shot a season-best 55 percent from the floor, including 8-of-13 ( 62 percent) from 3 -point range.

## GAME 11 - INDIANA 73, WASHINGTON 50 July 2, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Coach Stephanie White left no doubt after her Indiana Fever team captured a rousing 73-50 victory over the visiting Washington Mystics.
"No question, best performance of the year," White declared.
Robust offense. Stout defense. Unrelenting effort. The Fever produced the whole package in dominating Washington.
"My challenge to our team was to compete at a high level, execute at a high level, for 40 minutes," said White, whose $5-6$ squad played the first of four straight home games. "I felt like we did that. There's no question that we took a huge step forward."

Offensively, the Fever committed a season-low eight turnovers, hit 50 percent from the field (29-of-58) and outscored the Mystics by a whopping 38-14 margin in the paint. Shenise Johnson led Indiana with 16 points and a career-high 11 rebounds, recording the second double-double of her four-year WNBA career.

On the defensive end, Indiana looked especially strong. Washington's total of 50 points represented the fewest Indiana has allowed in a game since September 2012. The Mystics hit just 29.3 percent of their field goal tries (17-of-58) and committed 18 turnovers.

Washington's rhythm offense looked out of synch, especially after halftime. Indiana held the visitors to 16 second-half points, the fewest ever allowed in a half by the Fever at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
Indiana hands seemed to be everywhere, harassing the Mystics, with the home team's total of deflected passes easily reaching double digits. The Fever turned back the clock to a few years ago when they won consistently with hard-nosed defensive efforts.
"Now we just have to maintain that," said White, who has emphasized the Fever need to avoid lunging for steals and focus more on deflections. "The way we played defense tonight is the way we have to play defense to win ball games."

Indiana's Johnson, acquired from San Antonio before this season, said she didn't know about her double-double until teammate Shavonte Zellous informed her from the bench. It was the fourth consecutive game in double-figure points for Johnson, who also contributed a career-high four steals.

White likes what she is seeing from Johnson. The coach praises her often for an ability to create her own shots. White also has said Johnson owns the potential to be a WNBA All-Star.

Johnson's single-handed steal and fast-break layup early in the second quarter, followed by Marissa Coleman's steal and layup, started the Fever on a 9-0 run. It was the Fever defense and fast-paced offense at their best, setting the Mystics (6-4) back on their heels.

Washington recorded shooting marks of only 25 percent in the second quarter, 18.2 percent in the third and 12.5 percent in the fourth. When Tamika Catchings scored on a layup with $21 / 2$ minutes left in the game, Indiana opened a 21-point margin.

Catchings produced double-digit scoring for Indiana with 15 and added seven rebounds and a game-high five assists. Nine players appeared in the game for the Fever. Each scored at least four points.


## GAME 12 - INDIANA 88, SEATTLE 63 <br> July 8, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Lynetta Kizer took her turn as the Indiana Fever's center of attention.
Kizer, the Fever's backup center, scored a game-high 17 points - just two off her career high - and combined with some strong team defense to propel Indiana to an $88-65$ victory over the Seattle Storm at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The matinee game drew a crowd of 12,189 - the highest total for a regular-season outing at the Fieldhouse since 2003.

The triumph was Indiana's third in a row, squaring the home team's record 6-6. It also marked the second straight victory of a dominating nature for the Fever, who also beat Washington by 23 points late last week.

For Kizer, her performance served as further proof of Indiana's multifaceted and multiple-player talents at the center position.

Natalie Achonwa, who was just named the WNBA's Rookie of the Month, usually starts at center, with Kizer coming off the bench. Achonwa had nine points and three rebounds Wednesday to go with Kizer's 17 and six. Combined, the two are shooting 53 percent from the field this season and averaging 19.0 points and 9.6 rebounds. That's some hearty production from the "five" position.
"One comes out, the next one goes in, with no dropoff," said Fever forward Marissa Coleman, who had 15 points and six rebounds in the victory. "That's something that I think we'll be able to utilize, especially down the stretch."
"Offensively, I've never been worried about Kizer," coach Stephanie White said. "Her skill set is tremendous. She's got the skills of a guard, really. She can handle the ball. She can shoot the ball. She has great hands and really good touch. She wants the ball, so we have to give it to her when she's out there, because she's very effective."

Indeed, that was the case against the Storm. Seattle's defenders usually positioned themselves behind the Fever's low-post players and Kizer capitalized. She demanded the ball, muscled her way to the basket and connected on 7-of-10 shots.

Once Indiana established itself inside, the perimeter players opened up. The Fever totaled 50 percent shooting from the field ( 36 -of- 72 ), including 33 percent ( 7 -of-21) from 3-point range.

Seattle (3-10) shot 42.2 percent from the field (19-of-45) in a game that could have gotten away from the visitors even sooner if they hadn't hit 22-of-26 free throws. Indiana forced the Storm into 23 turnovers, which led to 24 Fever points.

In the last two games, Indiana has scored 45 points off of 41 opponent turnovers. According to White, the Fever's speed and athleticism could help the 2015 team become one of the franchise's best defensive groups. Indiana has built its reputation and resume - with a WNBA-record 10 consecutive playoff berths - as a defensive club.

The Fever bench totaled a season-high 38 points as White subbed extensively within Indiana's fast-paced scheme. Indiana's 88-point total represented the third-highest of the season. During its current three-game winning streak, Indiana is averaging 84.3 points and outscoring opponents by 18 per game.
"I feel momentum," said Fever forward Tamika Catchings, who scored 12 points. "I'm excited to see just how good we can consistently get."

## GAME 13 - INDIANA 83, SAN ANTONIO 76 July 10, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - After the Indiana Fever played a less than stellar first half, they needed inspiration. Marissa Coleman provided it in resounding fashion.

Coleman scored a career-high 25 points, including 20 after halftime, to boost the Fever to an 8376 victory over the visiting San Antonio Stars. Coleman's former University of Maryland teammate, Lynetta Kizer, contributed 13 points with 5 -of- 5 shooting from the field.

Coleman is averaging 13.3 points - tied with Tamika Catchings for the team lead - and might be headed to her first appearance in the WNBA All-Star Game on July 25 in Connecticut. She is also averaging 4.3 rebounds and is Indiana's top scorer from the arc with 18 made 3-pointers on 46 attempts.
"If she's not an All-Star, something is wrong," Fever Coach Stephanie White said. "She's just had a terrific year."

The 6-foot-1 Coleman was at her best when the Fever needed it most - after they missed nine of their last 12 shots of the second quarter and saw San Antonio grab a 38 -all tie at the half. Coleman ramped up her aggressiveness in the third quarter, churning, slashing and spinning to get to the bucket.

> "The first half," Coleman said, "I was settling for a lot of jump shots. I was frustrated with a couple of transition 3 s that I took when I could have gotten to the rim. I just wanted to make it a point in the second half to get to the basket, get to the (foul) line."

Said White: "Her defensive energy in the second half really got her going offensively."
The triumph was the Fever's fourth straight, pushing them to $7-6$ and above .500 for the first time this season. When Tulsa visits Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Wednesday, the Fever will seek their first five-game streak since the 2012 WNBA championship season.
The Fever have shot 51.4 percent from the field and averaged 84 points in their four-game winning string.
"We're setting one another up very well," White said. "We're very unselfish. We don't really care who puts the ball in the hole as long as it goes in the hole."

However, it wasn't going in the bucket as the second quarter ended. And a halftime talk by White made it clear to the Fever that the coaching staff wasn't satisfied with a lot of things.

Coleman quickly changed that, burying 12 points in the third quarter. Indiana's defensive effort rose, too, holding San Antonio to 28.6 percent shooting (4-of-14) in the period.

By the fourth quarter, Indiana led by 13, but the Stars weren't surrendering. They cut the margin to seven with 2:42 left, and to six with 30.4 seconds remaining.

But a nifty, left-handed hook shot by Catchings and a 15 -foot jumper by Coleman helped to hold San Antonio (3-9) at bay. Catchings and Shenise Johnson each added 11 points for Indiana. Sophia Young-Malcolm led San Antonio with a season-high 27 points.


## GAME 14 - INDIANA 83, TULSA 80 <br> July 15, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Their performance looked frayed around the edges at times, but the Indiana Fever's winning streak remains intact. Tamika Catchings made sure of it.

The Indiana forward totaled 11 points and 11 rebounds - the 94th double-double of her illustrious WNBA career - and lifted the Fever to an 83-80 victory over the visiting Tulsa Shock.

One rebound for Catchings stood out above the rest. With 10.9 seconds remaining and Indiana clinging to a two-point lead, she maneuvered around Tulsa's Plenette Pierson to grab a missed free throw by the Fever's Marissa Coleman.

Catchings' hustle, extending the possession, helped to save the Fever on a night when they nearly frittered away a 15 -point first-half lead. Indiana's high-energy start lost some steam after halftime, and Tulsa mounted a 16-6 run in the fourth quarter.
"It's absolutely what she's all about," said Fever Coach Stephanie White, admiring Catchings' late heroics. "It's why she's one of the greatest players ever to put on a jersey."

With 3,022 rebounds, Catchings moved into third place on the WNBA's career list.
And her team owns a five-game winning streak - its longest since the WNBA championship season in 2012 - as it begins a three-game road trip before the All-Star break.

The common thread in the Fever streak, according to White, is defensive tenacity. The Fever have held opponents to 71 points a game and 41 percent shooting in the past five. Tulsa hit 40 percent from the field ( 30 -of-75).
"You're finding out about the identity of your team," said White, who saw her club lock down the Shock (10-5) in the final minute after some earlier defensive lapses. "I thought we showed tremendous toughness. I thought we showed great fight. Finding ways to win: I think that shows the growth of our team."

Catchings hit one of two free throws with 7.1 seconds left to extend Indiana's margin to 83-80. After a timeout, Tulsa's Riquna Williams, who totaled 31 points in the game, missed a 3-point attempt from the corner. Indiana's Layshia Clarendon rebounded to wrap up her team's eighth triumph in 14 games.

Shavonte Zellous, who missed eight games with a back injury, came off the bench to lead Indiana with 16 points. Clarendon scored 13 and added a team-high four assists.

The Fever played without guard Shenise Johnson, who had a sprained ankle, and center Natalie Achonwa, who is with the Canadian national team for a few weeks. Ten players saw action. The five who came off the bench totaled 35 points for the Fever, whose reserves are the top-scoring subs in the WNBA.
"It's going to be huge for us all season long," White said about bench production. "We have to do it collectively. ... Everybody on our team knows you are going to get an opportunity."

Indiana's Natasha Howard contributed a career-best 11 rebounds off the bench.

## GAME 15 - WASHINGTON 68, INDIANA 50 July 17, 2015 - Verizon Center

WASHINGTON, D.C. - LaToya Sanders had career highs of 14 points and 10 rebounds, and Emma Meesseman added 14 points with a career-high 13 rebounds to help pace the Washington Mystics to a 68-50 rout of the Indiana Fever.

The Mystics snapped a three-game losing skid while Indiana ended a five-game win streak.
While the lead traded hands in the first half, it was all Mystics after halftime. Washington held a 34-29 lead at intermission, but blew the game open in the third quarter, limiting Indiana to a single 3 -point field goal and three free throws. It was the Fever's lowest-scoring quarter of the season, outscored 23-6 as the Mystics took a 22-point advantage into the fourth quarter.
"Washington played like it was a team with its back against the wall," said Fever coach Stephanie White. "They did everything they had to do to win."
"They are one of the most difficult teams to guard because they have five skilled players on the floor at all times. They did a good job reading mismatches and they took advantage on offense. And defensively, they turned up their intensity and bothered us up and down the floor."

Indiana, averaging 79 points per game, was limited to 18 -of- 57 shooting ( 31 percent) while scoring its fewest points since a 50-48 defeat seven years ago on the same floor, falling 50-48 to the Mystics, July 8, 2008. Adding to the Mystics' command was a 43-34 rebounding edge.

Indiana got double-figure scoring from a pair of University of Maryland alums, Marissa Coleman and Lynetta Kizer, who both returned to their hometowns near the nation's capital. Coleman scored 11 points while Kizer contributed 10 points and eight rebounds.


## GAME 16 - SAN ANTONIO 80, INDIANA 62 July 21, 2015 - Freeman Coliseum

SAN ANTONIO - Danielle Robinson paced four double-figure scorers Tuesday afternoon while leading the San Antonio Stars to an 80-62 victory over the Indiana Fever. Robinson shot 6-of-8 from the floor and was 6-of-7 at the free throw stripe.

San Antonio won for just the second time in its last six games while sending the Fever to a second straight road defeat as both teams ended the first half of the season prior to Saturday's WNBA AllStar Game.

The defeat spoiled a 20-point effort from Fever All-Star Tamika Catchings ( 6,720 career points) who closed within two points of Diana Taurasi $(6,722)$ as the No. 2 all-time scorer in WNBA history. Catchings shot 6-of-12 from the floor and made 8 -of-10 free throws. Catchings already is the league's all-time leader in steals and free throws, and is currently the league's third-leading career rebounder.

Catchings was the Fever's only double-figure scorer. Indiana shot just 34 percent from the floor while San Antonio shot 60 percent. San Antonio also manhandled the Fever on the boards, 34-18.
"We let our lack of efficiency on offense affect us on the defensive end," said Fever coach Stephanie White. "And [the Stars] hurt us. San Antonio made us pay. I was disappointed in our energy."

Robinson used six points to spark an 8-0 San Antonio run late in the first half, extending the Stars lead to 18, 46-28. Indiana managed six straight points in the third quarter and two free throws from Briann January brought the Fever within 53-43. The Stars answered with their own 6-0 spurt, however, and Indiana never got closer.

Sophia Young-Malcolm added 15 points and 10 rebounds for the Stars. Kayla McBride added 14 and Danielle Adams scored 12, all on 3-point shots.

The lead changed hands on five straight baskets early in the game, until San Antonio pulled ahead 18-14 after the first period. San Antonio shot 70 percent from the floor (16-of-23) in the first half and outrebounded Indiana 20-8 to lead by as many as 18 and carry a 48-32 advantage into the halftime locker room.


## GAME 17 - INDIANA 75, CONNECTICUT 73 (OT) July 28, 2015 - Mohegan Sun Arena

UNCASVILLE, Conn. - Tamika Catchings' fadeaway jumper with 6.5 seconds left in overtime was the exclamation point to a $75-73$ victory as the Indiana Fever withstood a second-half rally to defeat the Connecticut Sun.

The Fever snapped a two-game losing slide while beating the Sun on the road for the second time this season, but it was Catchings' first and final buckets that grabbed headlines.

Just 38 seconds into the contest, she passed Diana Taurasi as the WNBA's second-leading regular season scorer as her 3-pointer helped Indiana streak to an early 11-0 advantage.

Already the league's career leader in steals and free throws, Catchings had 15 points and finished with eight rebounds to pull within 33 of passing Tina Thompson as the league's No. 2 all-time rebounder. Her five steals were a season-high.

Catchings and Shavonte Zellous guided the Fever into their first overtime contest of the season, snapping the Sun's unbeaten streak of three overtime wins. The Sun, after starting the year 7-1, lost for the seventh time in eight games, including twice to Indiana.

Off the bench, Zellous paced Indiana with 19 points on 9-of-17 shooting.
Overcoming a Connecticut defense that limited Indiana to seven fourth-quarter points and forced shot clock violations three times in the last three minutes of regulation, Zellous twice beat the shotclock buzzer in overtime to stake Indiana to a 71-67 lead. Kelsey Bone's three-point play brought the Sun within 71-70 and Camille Little's 3-pointer put the home team into the lead for just the second time of the game, with 1:52 remaining in OT.

Catchings scored the game's final two buckets, though. First, she knotted the score with a reverse layup, then, after corralling a defensive rebound, she cradled the ball for a timeout with 33 seconds left.

Zellous appeared on the verge of extending the narrow lead with free throws when she was fouled on an offensive rebound and tip with 18.6 seconds to play, but a common foul on Jasmine Thomas was ruled before her shot. It was Zellous' only rebound of the game, but perhaps the game's largest.

Indiana retained possession with a 14 -second shot clock and Catchings canned her game-winner as she entered the lane and knocked down the 8-foot jumper for the 6,735th point of her career.

With the win, Indiana (9-8) leap-frogged past the Sun (8-8) into fourth place in the Eastern Conference standings.

Indiana matched a season high with 13 offensive rebounds, leading to 21 second-chance points compared to just four by Connecticut. The Fever's $35-31$ rebound advantage was led by Catchings and another eight from Erlana Larkins, who also added four steals. Shenise Johnson added 13 points and seven rebounds in her first game since July 10.

Indiana led from the opening tip, but Connecticut used an 18-7 streak to knot the score at 63 with 6:14 remaining. Connecticut forced the Fever into consecutive shot clock violations, then took its first lead of the contest on Bone's layin with 3:50 left in regulation. Larkins knotted the score for Indiana 11 seconds later and Natasha Howard put the Fever back into the lead, 67-65. Bone tied the score again at 67 with 1:10 left. The Sun forced another shot clock infraction with 4.7 seconds left, but Alex Bentley's 3 -point attempt was off the mark as regulation came to a close.]

Bone led the Sun with 14 points and Shekinna Stricklen added 12. Alyssa Thomas and Camille Little each had 10 points.

## GAME 18- INDIANA 84, NEW YORK 72 <br> July 29, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Implementing team toughness and receiving outstanding performances from Shenise Johnson and Briann January, the Indiana Fever snagged a convincing victory over the hottest team in the WNBA.

Johnson contributed a season-best 19 points in Indiana's 84-72 triumph over the visiting New York Liberty, which had won five straight games. January turned in 12 points, all in the second half, and added a season-high eight assists while taking control at the point down the stretch.

Indiana lifted its record to 10-8, extending its post-All-Star break winning streak to two. New York, the Eastern Conference leader, lost for just the sixth time in 18 games.

The Fever weren't happy with the way they finished the season's first half, mounting a five-game winning steak only to see it detour into a pair of losses before the All-Star Game. They talked about it. They vowed to make things right.
"We were able to kind of just let it go, refocus and come back refreshed," January said. "We really talked about attention to detail and not settling and holding each other accountable. I think we've come back and responded really well off of All-Star break."

Johnson - whom White describes simply as "a playmaker" - did her part, scoring in double digits for the seventh time in her last eight games. Johnson, acquired in an off-season trade with San Antonio, finished one point away from her career high. She totaled a team-high eight rebounds.
"It takes a while to transition," Johnson, who is averaging 11.1 points, said about adapting to her new club. "I have great teammates, and I'm still learning. At the same time, you just become a little more aggressive and confident as you start to understand it. I can play through my instincts now ... and that was kind of like a turning point for me."

January turned to her instincts, too, especially in the second half as she shifted into attack mode. The point guard committed only one turnover as Indiana held its total to 15 - compared to 21 for the Liberty. Indiana scored 24 points off of Liberty turnovers.

January's nifty pass to Maggie Lucas for a 3-pointer with 6:10 left in the game put the Fever up by 14 points. New York cut the margin to four with 4:19 left, but January's 4 -of- 4 shooting from the foul line helped keep the Liberty at bay in the final minutes.
"In the second half, down the stretch (it was January) stepping up and basically taking over," said Indiana's Tamika Catchings, who had 11 points.

Said White about January: "Her poise, her composure, her decision-making was really the best it's been all year. She was the catalyst and one of the main reasons that we could control the tempo for a majority of this game."

The Fever finished the month of July with a 6-2 record, their best monthly mark since going 6-1 in August of their WNBA championship season in 2012. Consistent effort and hard-nosed rebounding have played a big part.

Indiana outrebounded the Liberty, the WNBA's top rebounding team, by a 32-27 margin.
"... That doesn't happen very often," said Liberty Coach Bill Laimbeer. "We gave them way too many second shots. They had 19 points on second shots. That doesn't happen against us."


## GAME 19 - INDIANA 83, CONNECTICUT 70 August 2, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Her balky right knee still gets sore at times, but that didn't stop Erlana Larkins from producing her breakout game of the 2015 season.

The 6 -foot-1 forward, a rebounding phenom during the Indiana Fever's WNBA championship run in 2012, played like the Larkins of old Sunday. Her game-high 13 rebounds and 10 points off the bench provided a spark for an Indiana team that struggled mightily before pulling out an 83-70 victory over the visiting Connecticut Sun.
"I'm not sure if she'll be 100 percent this season," Indiana Coach Stephanie White said about Larkins, who sat out eight games with soreness earlier this season. "But what she showed tonight is exactly why she is such an important piece of what we do.
"(It is) her toughness, her mentality that she won't be denied. ... She's just a huge piece of the puzzle for us."

Larkins said she hurt her knee late during her season in Turkey - just before reporting to Indiana's training camp. She still deals with occasional soreness and is uncertain of her off-season plans if the knee problem persists. Meantime, Larkins knows she must play through the pain.

Seldom has Larkins been better than what she showed in the fourth quarter against Connecticut. She totaled six rebounds in the period, including three on successive possessions while the Fever were locking down the Sun with a 15-0 run in the final three-plus minutes.
"Tonight, you could tell she was so much more comfortable, so much more confident. A monster on the boards," Fever forward Tamika Catchings said.

Fever rookie center Natalie Achonwa, a standout all year, left the game in the first quarter after banging her surgically-repaired knee. She returned in the second half, but wound up playing only 7 minutes.

Achonwa did nothing wrong. The lineup of veterans Larkins, Catchings, Briann January, Shavonte Zellous and Shenise Johnson was simply playing too well to replace, especially late in the fourth quarter. The Fever outscored the visitors, $28-13$, in the fourth while holding them to $3-\mathrm{of}-13$ shooting.
"We wanted those experienced players on the floor," White said, adding that her team "made every hustle play down the stretch."

Five Indiana players hit double-digit scoring, led by Johnson's 16 points. On a night when the Fever needed to ramp up its effort after falling behind by 11 in the first half, it turned into a true "team" victory after halftime.
"We just had to channel our inner toughness and go out there and get it done," Johnson said.
It was Indiana's third straight victory and eighth in the last 10 games. The Fever are 11-8 and in fourth place in the Eastern Conference - a half-game behind Chicago.

Kelsey Bone led Connecticut (9-9) with 20 points and Alyssa Thomas had 18.
Thanks in large part to Larkins, the Fever outrebounded the Sun, 37-20 - Indiana's largest advantage of the season. The Fever also established a new season high by making 28 free throws in 30 attempts - a season-best 93.3 percentage.

## GAME 20 - CHICAGO 106, INDIANA 82 <br> August 4, 2015 - Allstate Arena

ROSEMONT, III. - Elena Delle Donne led six double-figure scorers and the Chicago Sky recorded WNBA season highs for points and 63.2 percent shooting while racing past the Indiana Fever, 106-82, at Allstate Arena on Tuesday.

The Sky rode Delle Donne to a first-quarter lead, then buried Indiana by outscoring the Fever 5335 over the second and third quarters.

The WNBA's leading scorer, Delle Donna finished with 19 points while Cappie Pondexter and Jamierra Faulkner had 16. Tamera Young and Betnijah Laney added 14 and 12 points, off the bench, and Erika de Souza finished with 10 in her fourth game in Chicago since being traded last week from Atlanta.

Eclipsing 70 percent shooting in both the first and second quarters, the Sky became the third team in WNBA history to shoot at least 70 percent in both quarters of a half. The Sky's 71.9 percent shooting in the first half ( 23 -of-32) was the WNBA's best shooting half since July 4, 2013.

Maintaining a lead over Indiana in the Eastern Conference standings, Chicago swept its series with the Fever for the first time in its 10 -year history and snapped the Fever's three-game win streak. In four victories over Indiana, the Sky won by margins of 23, 26, 6 and tonight's 24-point difference.
"They're a very talented team and good enough they could return to the WNBA Finals again," said Fever coach Stephanie White about the Sky, who beat Indiana in the 2014 conference finals to reach the league championship series.
"When we play with a tough defensive mentality, we can be a very good team," added White. "But when we don't, we struggle. Tonight was a combination of us lacking energy and them being really, really good."

Indiana led 18-14 in the early going before the Sky ended the first period with a 17-4 spurt to record the highest-scoring period, 31 points, the Fever had allowed all season. Delle Donne triggered the run with eight points of her own, then the Sky scored the first eight points of the second quarter.

The Sky took a 57-40 lead into halftime, then scored the first nine points of the third quarter to lead by 26, 66-40, before Maggie Lucas hit back-to-back 3-pointers for the Fever. Indiana used Lucas' spark for a 10-4 mini-run to cut the difference to 20, but after an offensive foul and double-technical foul called on Indiana's Shavonte Zellous - and a breakaway layup by Faulker - the Sky's lead reached 77-50.

Zellous was ejected at the 2:44 mark of the third quarter. The Sky's lead ballooned to 32, 100-68, on Faulkner's three-point play with $4: 33$ left in the contest.

Lucas paced the Fever with 14 points, all in the second half on the strength of four 3-pointers. Marissa Coleman and Natasha Howard each scored 13 and Shenise Johnson added 11 for Indiana which returns to Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Friday to host the Atlanta Dream (7:00 p.m.) on Breast Health Awareness Night.

## GAME 21 - INDIANA 106, ATLANTA 77 <br> August 7, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Goal No. 1 for the Indiana Fever was to slash and drive to the rim for high-percentage baskets. If that didn't work, maybe goal No. 2 could be realized: drawing fouls with their aggressive approach.

The Fever found success on both objectives - and thrived in various other ways, too - in a resounding 106-77 victory over the Atlanta Dream at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Indiana thumped the Dream with 40 inside points. The Fever also set franchise records for made and attempted free throws, hitting 40-of-44
"We came in with an attack mindset and our players executed it," Fever Coach Stephanie White said.

Indiana entered the game as only the WNBA's ninth-best free throw club at 77.4 percent. The Fever picked a fortuitous night to improve that mark with 90.9 percent foul shooting - against an Atlanta team that ranked No. 1 in fouls committed.

The Fever lifted their season record to 12-9 ahead of four straight games on the road. They have won seven consecutive home games, tying the third-longest streak in franchise history.
"When you have the energy of the crowd behind you, if you're struggling, they give you an extra boost," White said about the Fieldhouse fans, who numbered 7,869 for Friday's Breast Health Awareness game. "If you're celebrating, it takes you to another level

The Fever, wearing pink uniforms in honor of the evening's festivities, played aggressively but not always with smarts in the first half.

They led by just seven at halftime, but the first nine seconds of the third quarter provided a window to the rest of the night. Shenise Johnson swiped the ball from Atlanta's Shoni Schimmel and zoomed to a fast-break bucket. It ignited a 20-8 run for Indiana.
"I think her coming in and setting the tone right off the bat was great for us offensively," Fever forward Tamika Catchings said about Johnson. "And defensively, I think we all got energized from that and just kept it going."

An 11-0 Fever run to start the fourth quarter led to an 88-64 lead and shut the door on Atlanta, which lost its sixth straight game for a 7-14 record. It was a performance the Fever needed ahead of their road trip and after a 106-82 loss at Chicago earlier this week.

Indiana's 106 points against Atlanta ranked as the second-highest total in franchise history.
Five Fever scored in double figures: Coleman with 19, Catchings 18, Johnson 15, Lynetta Kizer 11 and Briann January 10. Johnson led Indiana with seven rebounds.


## GAME 22 - INDIANA 73, WASHINGTON 62 <br> August 11, 2015 - Verizon Center

WASHINGTON - Tamika Catchings scored a game-high 20 points, 10 in the fourth quarter, to pace the Indiana Fever to a 73-62 win over the Washington Mystics.

Catchings shot 9-of-18 from the floor and also finished with six rebounds to match Tina Thompson as the second-leading rebounder in WNBA history $(3,070)$. She already is the league's second-leading scorer and its all-time leader in steals and free throws.

Overall, Indiana owned a 37-26 rebounding edge and used a dominant third quarter to overcome an early deficit to win for the fifth time in six games since the All-Star Break. Indiana evened the season series with Washington (2-2) and pulled into a third-place tie with Washington in the Eastern Conference, both at 13-9.
"I looked at this game like a playoff game," said Catchings, avenging a 2-point performance and a 68-50 loss here on July 17. "As a team, we left here with a bad taste in our mouths the last time."

Asked of tying Thompson on the league's all-time rebounding chart, Catchings quipped, "I'm old That's what that means."

The 36-year old All-Star added, "It's important for me to go hard every time I step on the floor. It's the way I play.

Playing hard is how the Fever overcame its 12-point deficit midway through the second period.
"For us to come back like we did, with all our energy and hustle plays just to get back in the game by halftime, that was special," said Fever coach Stephanie White.

Indiana led 11-9 early, but surrendered an 11-2 run to lose the lead. Back-to-back-to-back 3-pointers by Tierra Ruffin-Pratt, Tayler Hill and Ivory Latta staked the Mystics to a 29-17 lead with 6:20 left in the first half.

Remarkably though, Indiana led at the break and never looked back.
The Fever outscored the Mystics 15-2 to close the second quarter, then opened the third period with a 10-4 run. After three successive offensive rebounds, a driving layup by Tamika Catchings put the Fever ahead 44-35 with 5:11 left in the third.

Indiana dominated Washington 20-6 in the third period and enjoyed its largest lead at 52-37 on a short jumper by Lynetta Kizer. Washington scored the last seven points though, to pull within 52-44 entering the final quarter.

But the Mystics never got closer. Catchings made 4 of 5 shots in the fourth quarter and iced the game with a pair of free throws in the final minute.

Former University of Maryland and Mystics star Marissa Coleman added 11 points for the Fever, as did offseason trade acquisition Shenise Johnson who scored in double figures for the 11th time in the past 12 games, coinciding with a streak that has seen the Fever win 9 of 12.

Washington was led by Ruffin-Pratt's 17 points. Latta added 13 and Hill pitched in 12.


## GAME 23 - INDIANA 75, PHOENIX 63 August 16, 2015 - US Airways Center

PHOENIX - If injuries can spark a team to inspired play, the Indiana Fever may have downed the Phoenix Mercury with just that inspiration.

The absence of both its centers, and first quarter stitches to starting guard Shenise Johnson, were the backdrop to a 75-63 Indiana blowout at US Airways Center.

Lynetta Kizer scored a career-high 19 points in her fourth start of the season, replacing Erlana Larkins who remained in Indianapolis with an injured left leg that required further evaluation from Fever medical personnel. Indiana was already playing without 16-game starting center Natalie Achonwa, who remained absent while helping the Canadian National Team earn a berth in the 2016 Olympics.

Minus Larkins and Achonwa, Indiana responded by outrebounding Brittney Griner and the taller Mercury, 37-33. The Fever used 19 assists on 31 field goals to shoot 44 percent from the floor to race past the defending champions.

Indiana's bench, averaging a WNBA-high 29 points per game, finished with 26 points. Six players scored at least seven points and the Fever defense limited Phoenix to 38 percent shooting. The Mercury, third in the WNBA in 3-point shooting percentage, missed all 13 attempts outside the arc.

It may have been a brief absence by WNBA Most Improved Player candidate Shenise Johnson that lit the Fever's fire.

The Fever trailed 9-8 when Johnson exited after an elbow to the left side of her forehead late in the first period. Seven minutes later, she returned after receiving stitches, but not after a 10-0 Indiana spurt led by Layshia Clarendon put the Fever in the lead.

Clarendon, Johnson's replacement, ignited what would become a 20-6 Indiana streak, forcing Phoenix to call timeout when the Fever lead ballooned to 24-15. Clarendon scored six of her eight points during the early run, shooting 3 -of- 3 from the floor and setting the tone for Indiana the rest of the way.

Indiana took a 39-29 advantage into the halftime locker room, and saw its lead reach 19, 50-31, on a jumper by Kizer with 7:28 in the third. The Fever led by 23 with $3: 52$ in the third, 59-36, when a Johnson steal produced a sprinting layup and subsequent free throw by Shavonte Zellous.

The Mercury never posed a serious challenge thereafter, getting only as close as 12 at the final buzzer.

In a return to her college hometown where she played at Arizona State, Briann January finished with 12 points and four assists while becoming the third-leading scorer in franchise history. Her perimeter defense was largely responsible for the Mercury's long-distance shooting woes.

Johnson snapped a streak of seven straight games with double-figure scoring, but added seven rebounds, five assists, four stitches and a steal to her five points. Zellous scored 11 points, Marissa Coleman added nine points and five rebounds, and Tamika Catchings had four points and nine boards.

The first of Catchings' rebounds, at the 7:34 mark of the first quarter, was the 7,031st of her career, pushing her past Tina Thompson as the second-leading rebounder in WNBA history. She also added two assists to become just the seventh player in league history with 1,400 assists.


## GAME 24 - INDIANA 79, LOS ANGELES 68 <br> August 18, 2015 - Staples Center

LOS ANGELES - In a wild turn of events, the Indiana Fever used a season-high 10 3-point field goals to fuel their biggest comeback of the season, upending Los Angeles 79-68 at Staples Center.

It marked only the third Indiana road win over L.A. in 16 seasons, but it was the Fever's third straight road win to match a franchise record - for the 11th time in club history and the second time this season. Indiana won its fourth straight game overall, capturing its seventh victory in eight games and its 12 th in the past 15 after beginning the season 3-6 under first-year coach Stephanie White.

Tamika Catchings, who paced the Fever with 20 points, staged a gutty head-to-head individual matchup with another former University of Tennessee star, Candace Parker. In the end, Catchings got more from her Fever teammates.

Undeterred by its 14 -point deficit at the half, Indiana raced back by outscoring L.A. 24-6 in the third. The Fever got six points from Marissa Coleman and five from Catchings in the period, while limiting the Sparks to 2 -of- 10 shooting in the quarter and taking advantage of nine L.A. turnovers.

Shavonte Zellous erased the deficit with a 3-pointer for a 48-48 tie score with 1:19 in the period.
A Coleman layup tied it again at 50 , and her four-point play with 0.8 seconds left in the quarter may have been the most dramatic play of the game. Coleman buried a fallaway 3 -pointer that fell through the net after the buzzer sounded and after the Sparks' Marianna Tolo was whistled for a foul. Officials reviewed the last-second shot and ruled it good with time still left on the clock. Coleman sank the subsequent free throw to give Indiana a 4-point lead after entering the period down 44-30.

Coleman's big plays were matched only by the dual between Catchings and Parker in which big play after big play featured one of the two former Tennessee forwards. The Catchings-Parker matchup was a heavyweight subplot. In the fourth quarter alone, the Lady Vols duo combined to shoot 6 -of-10 from the floor, 11 -of- 12 at the line with seven rebounds and a pair of steals. Parker scored 12 of her 25 in the quarter, Catchings netted 11 of her 20.

Parker posted Catchings-esque numbers while approaching a quadruple-double. She finished with 10 rebounds, six assists and a Sparks-record eight steals. Catchings, the WNBA's No. 2 career scorer and rebounder and its all-time leader in steals and free throws, finished with a stat line including seven rebounds, three assists and two steals. All seven of her free throws came in the fourth quarter.

Parker, though, also contributed seven turnovers, five in the second half, in what was a key stat that defined the game's tale of two halves. After 10 Indiana miscues led to 17 Sparks points in the first half, 13 L.A. turnovers produced 15 points for the comeback-minded Fever in the second half.

Los Angeles knotted the score at 54 on Temeka Johnson's jump shot 30 seconds into the final quarter, and the Sparks led 58-57 on a layup by Tolo. The Fever captured the lead for good, however, on Briann January's 17-foot jumper with 7:30 to play to spark a 6-0 run and give Indiana what was then its biggest lead. Parker cut the lead to 3 on a driving layup and free throw that was matched by a nearly identical three-point effort by Catchings. A turnaround jumper by Parker made it 66-63, but the Sparks never got closer as Indiana controlled the glass with 11 of the game's last 13 rebounds while pulling away.

Kizer's offensive rebound with 3:44 remaining led to a layup by Shenise Johnson. After another Parker free throw, a Catchings layup staked Indiana to a six-point margin and spurred an end-of-game rally in which the Fever outgunned the Sparks 11-4 in the last three minutes.

## GAME 25 - INDIANA 75, SEATTLE 63 August 21, 2015 - Key Arena

SEATTLE - The third quarter has become friendly to the Indiana Fever. And deadly to its opponents.
The Fever came back from a 6-point halftime deficit to throttle the Seattle Storm 30-9 in the third period en route to a 75-63 victory at Key Arena in Seattle. Indiana established a franchise record with its fourth consecutive road win, eclipsing 11 previous three-game streaks. The Fever won their fifth straight game overall, captured their eighth win in nine games, and their 13 th in the past 16 since opening the season 3-6.

More importantly, Indiana kept pace in the Eastern Conference, maintaining sole possession of second place just two games behind front-running New York (18-7) whom the Fever play Sunday in Indianapolis.

It was the second time in three nights and two West Coast cities the Fever trailed at the intermission, only to take the lead after a dominant third quarter. At Los Angeles on Tuesday, the Fever turned a 14-point deficit into a 24-6 third-quarter run and an eventual 25 -point turnaround that resulted in an 11-point win, just Indiana's third ever at Staples Center.

The win marked just the Fever's fourth ever in Seattle, but the seventh time in eight meetings the Fever has beaten the Storm. Indiana swept the series for the second straight season and swept a three-game West Coast trip for the first time in its history.

Indiana opened its overwhelming third period with a 7-0 run capped by Briann January's 3-pointer that gave the Fever the lead at 44-43. Scoreless in the first half and returning to her home state, January finished with nine points and paced Indiana with seven in the pivotal quarter, while Tamika Catchings and Lynetta Kizer both pitched in six.

Moments later, Indiana took the lead for good on Kizer's bucket for a 46-45 lead. Catchings made it a three-point margin and Shenise Johnson made it six with a 3-pointer at the 5:23 mark. Free throws by Catchings pushed the opening run to $16-2$ as the Fever opened an 8 -point margin. The third period onslaught received exclamation points from Shavonte Zellous and Jeanette Pohlen, each adding 3-pointers in the final minute as the Fever led 67-52 heading to the final frame.

The key to the game-changing surge after intermission? Rebounding and defense. The Storm had enjoyed 68 percent shooting and a 17-9 rebounding edge in the first half, but the Fever harassed the Storm into just 3 -of- 15 shooting ( 20 percent) and corralled 12 of 16 caroms in the third quarter.
"As the game progressed, I thought our depth wore [Seattle] down," said coach of the year candidate and Fever coach Stephanie White. "They read and space the floor so well that they got whatever they wanted in the first half. But we turned up the intensity and got some easy buckets, and that led to being more aggressive on offense, too."
"We attacked more and that got [Seattle] on their heels."
Johnson led all Indiana scorers with a game-high 16 points, while Catchings and Kizer each finished with 14. Seattle got 15 points from rookie Jewell Loyd, with Sue Bird, Alysha Clark and Ramu Tokashiki each adding nine.

## August 23, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - The hottest team in the WNBA just kept pushing, kept climbing ahead in the Eastern Conference.

The Indiana Fever made another move Sunday night - a bold and important move. Indiana knocked off the conference's first-place team, the New York Liberty, in a stirring 80-79 outcome at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. The Fever chiseled New York's lead to one game with eight regular-season outings remaining.

That makes six consecutive victories and wins in nine of the last 10 games for the Fever (17-9). They are 14-3 since a 3-6 start to the season.

Not that it has been easy. The Fever defied WNBA norms by winning four consecutive road games recently, including three that tested their stamina against far West teams. The Fever traveled all day Saturday from Seattle, tried to get their body clocks back on Eastern time and prepared for the Liberty's visit.

It boiled down to mental toughness, something the Fever have stockpiled in recent weeks, according to Coach Stephanie White.
"I think it starts with Tamika," White said of All-Star Tamika Catchings. "Our team embodies her mentality. She wills us to victory."

Sunday, the Fever went right to work, opening a 12-point lead with some nifty first-half shooting. But New York chipped away, tying the game at 65 early in the fourth quarter. Game on.

With 1:30 remaining in the final quarter, Shenise Johnson connected from the wing to give Indiana its 80-79 edge. Defense took over from there for both clubs, and the outcome came down to New York's final possession with 19.6 seconds left.

White and the Fever suspected the Liberty would want either guard Epiphanny Prince or forward Tina Charles to get the ball. Those two combined for 33 points Sunday night. The Fever talked about their defensive plan during a timeout.

When play resumed, Prince kept the ball on the perimeter. She tried to burst past Fever guard Briann January once, twice, three times. January fought successfully to stay in front of her.
"We just wanted to try to make whatever shot they got as difficult as possible," White said. "We wanted to try to get the ball out of Prince's hands, but she did a good job of maintaining it, and Bri did a heckuva job with her one-on-one defense."

With about one second left, Prince lofted up a 16 -footer that missed. Layshia Clarendon rebounded for Indiana.

Said Catchings: "Bri is probably one of the best on-ball defenders, period, in this league. To get by her one-on-one is hard."

Catchings led Indiana with 14 points and seven rebounds. Natalie Achonwa and Maggie Lucas came off the bench for 11 points apiece. Johnson and Lynetta Kizer each scored 10 as the Fever guaranteed themselves at least a . 500 regular-season mark for the first time since 2012.

Charles scored 18 points and Prince had 15 to lead New York. Brittany Boyd added 14 points.


## GAME 27 - LOS ANGELES 81, INDIANA 79 August 26, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - Gary Kloppenburg, an Indiana assistant coach, mentioned something after Wednesday night's difficult loss that resonated with Fever Head Coach Stephanie White.
"I think Klop said it best: It's a humbling league," White said. "It really is."
The Fever learned that the hard way as they saw some positive streaks take a hit in an 81-79 defeat to the Los Angeles Sparks at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Their overall winning string ended at six games. Their home winning streak was snapped at eight.

The second-place Fever (17-10) dropped to $1 \frac{1}{2}$ games behind New York in the WNBA Eastern Conference.

Perhaps the Fever's worst sin Wednesday night was allowing the visitors - who trailed by 12 in the first half after Indiana opened with a myriad of successful driving layups - to keep the game close in the second half.

The Fever, as White said, played "with energy but not necessarily focused energy." The Indiana lead began to dissipate amid some hurtful turnovers - nine in the second half - along with missed boxouts and defensive assignments. And the Sparks, who had four starters in double-figure scoring, refused to wilt.

Also, Los Angeles' Candice Parker started to heat up, scoring 11 in the second half to wind up with 15 points, 10 rebounds and nine assists. One more assist and she would have collected only the sixth triple-double in WNBA regular-season history.

Los Angeles (11-17) took its first lead, 59-57, on a Crystal Bradford's 3-pointer with 2 minutes left in the third quarter. The Sparks grabbed their biggest lead, 78-71, on Ana Dabovic's trey with 4:52 remaining in the game.

However, with 28.9 seconds left, January buried a 3-pointer to tie it at 79 . After a timeout, the Sparks' Dabovic hit a 15 -footer, making a nice shot with January in her face. Los Angeles led by two.

With 6.1 seconds remaining, the Fever had one possession to score. They called a play with three potential options: Getting the ball to Tamika Catchings, finding January on the perimeter or freeing somebody to drive to the bucket.

Parker blanketed Catchings, and January couldn't get loose. Shavonte Zellous drove to the basket and was fouled with 1.9 seconds remaining. But she missed the free throws.

The Fever, whose slashing style led to 12 first-half layups, began settling for jumpers in the second half and field goals became harder to find.

Three Fever players scored in double figures, led by Shenise Johnson, who surpassed 1,000 points in her career with 16. Lynetta Kizer scored 12. Catchings had 10 points and 10 rebounds for the 95th double-double of her career.

Catchings also collected five steals to give her 1,002 for her career. That made her the first WNBA player to hit 1,000.


GAME 28 - ATLANTA 90, INDIANA 84

## August 28, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - A growing unease settled over the Indiana Fever on Friday night after the team's second consecutive loss at home.
"I'm really disappointed in this one," Indiana Coach Stephanie White said after her club fell by a $90-84$ count to the Atlanta Dream. "I felt like Atlanta outworked us. They played - and I mean this .. as a compliment - with reckless abandon.
"They got every loose ball. They got every hustle play. They wanted it more than we did, and they deserved to win."

Also, turnovers eroded any hopes the Fever had, especially in the fourth quarter when they com mitted seven, leading to 13 Dream points. Indiana totaled 19 turnovers in the game, from which Atlanta scored 24 points.

The loss to Atlanta, on the heels of Wednesday's defeat to Los Angeles, left the Fever at 17-11 and in a second-place tie with Chicago in the WNBA Eastern Conference. Indiana, the league's hottes team when the week started, must travel for a Sunday game at Tulsa, which has won four in a row.

Forward Tamika Catchings, who led Indiana with 24 points and seven rebounds against Atlanta, said teams saw a Fever club that won 14 of 17 games at one point and began making adjustments
"We have to keep getting better," Catchings said.
It didn't help Friday night that the Fever lost point guard Briann January in the first half with a sore knee. Reserve Layshia Clarendon played well - a career-high 17 points on 8 -of- 16 shooting - but January's experience might have aided the Fever in some difficult situations.
"I think her absence was key and not only offensively because of the turnovers," White said. "She's our defensive anchor. She sets the tone for us on the defensive end."

Indiana turned in spurts of strong play but couldn't maintain it. They burst to a 10-0 lead at the start and led by 12 later in the half. However, Atlanta (12-16) played like a "desperate" team, as White phrased it, and never let up.

When Catchings made a pair of free throws with 2:15 left in the game, the Fever trailed by one But the Dream went on a 5-0 run that closed out the victory. On two different possessions during that stretch, Atlanta missed shots but got offensive rebounds to keep the ball from the home team.
"I'm not saying we didn't play hard," White emphasized. "I'm saying that (the Dream) wanted it more. You have to sacrifice everything at that point to put a body on somebody and box out. ... To me, it was more of a lack of discipline than a lack of effort."

Shenise Johnson joined Catchings and Clarendon in double figures for Indiana, tying her season high with 19 points.

Tiffany Hayes led Atlanta with a career-best 28 points, including a 14-of-15 mark from the free throw line.

## GAME 29 - TULSA 76, INDIANA 70 August 30, 2015 - BOK Center

TULSA - Odyssey Sims scored 30 points and Karima Christmas had 18 to lead the Tulsa Shock to a 76-70 win over the Indiana Fever while clinching the team's first spot in the WNBA playoffs since moving from Detroit in 2010.

Tulsa won its fifth straight game while clinching a Western Conference playoff spot for the first time in its history sending Indiana to a third straight defeat.

With playoff spots on the line for both teams, the contest came down to the final period. But not until after Tulsa shot 79 percent for a 17-point lead in the first quarter; and not until after Indiana erased that deficit just seconds into the second half. Fittingly, the game was tied at 57 after three quarters.

In the fourth quarter, Tulsa took a 61-57 lead before Tamika Catchings got the Fever on the board with a 3-pointer with nearly four minutes gone by in the period. Plenette Pierson added a 3-pointer for Tulsa, then another putback to push the advantage to 66-60. Jeanette Pohlen's 3-pointer kept the Fever within striking distance with 3:23 remaining, and another by Catchings with 2:13 to play kept Indiana within two possessions.

The Fever cut the gap to two on a driving layup by Layshia Clarendon as the clock fell under a minute, and Indiana had the chance for a tie on a 3-on-2 fastbreak with 20 seconds remaining, but a mishandled pass produced a costly turnover.

On the ensuing possession, Shenise Johnson fouled out of the game and Sims hit the first of six free throws to ice the Tulsa victory in the game's final 20 seconds.

Sims scored eight points in the game's final 2:24, after exploding for 13 in the first quarter.
Sims and the attacking Tulsa offense overshadowed a solid effort from the 36-year old Catchings collected 22 points and 13 turnovers for the 96th double-double of her career. She also added a season-high three blocked shots.

She was Indiana's only double-digit scorer as the Fever played for the first time this year without starting point guard Briann January, who remained in Indianapolis nursing a sore left knee.

Catchings' efforts couldn't compensate a Fever team that allowed 19 points off turnovers and 17 Tulsa free throws, 12 from Sims who didn't miss from the charity stripe. Catchings shot 7-of-10 from the floor, but the rest of her Indiana teammates were 20-of-60.

Tulsa scored quickly and forced a four-minute scoring drought by the Fever to command a 28-15 lead after the first period. But the Shock shot just 3-of-12 in the second quarter and Indiana used nine different scoring options to chip away and pull within 38-36 at intermission.

With 1:27 gone in the third quarter, Layshia Clarendon's driving layup gave the Fever their first lead since 4-3 in the opening minutes. A Tamika Catchings jumper moments later gave Indiana its largest lead of the contest, 44-41, then added another layup for a 46-41 advantage with 7:42 in the third.

The deficit overcome by Indiana reflected its largest comeback since 2011 and matched the fifth-largest in its history, but it was not enough to secure the victory.

## GAME 30 - INDIANA 81, CONNECTICUT 51 <br> September 1, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - With a night's dominating victory over Connecticut, the Indiana Fever collected a WNBA record that speaks volumes about their preparedness, toughness and longevity as one of the league's best franchises.

The Fever's 81-51 triumph over the Sun at Bankers Life Fieldhouse wrapped up an 11th consecutive playoff berth. No other team in WNBA history has enjoyed such a string of postseason appearances.

Tamika Catchings, the Fever's 36 -year-old star, has been a part of all 11. She smiled afterward, calling it "a cool record" for her team. She said the franchise's "core values" have made it all possible.
"It's that tradition," said Catchings, whose club is 18-12 with four regular-season games left. "It's that expectation, the way we play offensively and defensively. It's a credit to everybody on the team."

Stephanie White, the Fever's first-year head coach, pointed to the role that team President and General Manager Kelly Krauskopf has played. Krauskopf has led the franchise since its inception in 1999. White also praised the indispensable contributions of Catchings.
"I think (the record) says a lot about what Kelly has done, bringing in players who made this franchise not only an attractive place to be but made it consistent," White noted. "And I think it says a lot about Tamika. Her personality and how she plays is what this franchise is really built on.
"I think it's incredibly difficult to maintain the consistency that this franchise has maintained, and those two are really cornerstones of it."

Catchings, with 13 points against the Sun, led four Fever players in double-figure scoring. Maggie Lucas and Natalie Achonwa each scored 11. Natasha Howard added 10, hitting double digits for only the second time this season.
"(Howard) really did a good job," White said about the Fever's second-year forward. "She didn't try to over-think things. She played, she hustled, she did a good job of executing in our coverages. I felt like her energy was very good."

Eleven Indiana players got into the game and 10 scored. Erlana Larkins was the only non-scorer, but she did her part with a game-high eight rebounds.

The Fever held Connecticut (13-18) to 15 first-half points, the second-fewest that Indiana has allowed in a half in franchise history. The Sun connected on only 20 percent of their first-quarter field goal tries (3-of-15) and 10.5 percent in the second quarter (2-of-19).

With 1:28 left in the third quarter, Achonwa hit a pair of free throws to provide Indiana with a 30-point lead. The winning margin of 30 points represented the Fever's biggest victory of the season and the eighth in franchise history by 30 or more.


## GAME 31 - MINNESOTA 81, INDIANA 65 September 4, 2015 - Target Center

MINNEAPOLIS - Sylvia Fowles and Rebekkah Brunson led five players in double figures as the Minnesota Lynx kept pace for the best record in the WNBA, beating the Indiana Fever 81-65 at Target Center.

Fowles and Brunson both nearly tallied double-doubles in the first half alone, accenting a 22-13 rebounding margin at intermission. Fowles finished with 18 points and 14 rebounds. Brunson added 14 and 11.

Renee Montgomery scored 13 points for the Lynx who shot 53 percent for the game. Anna Cruz added 12 and Maya Moore contributed 11.

Indiana, which never threatened after a back-and-forth first quarter, was led by Marissa Coleman's 14 points. Tamika Catchings added 10 points and nine rebounds.

Teammates on recent U.S. Olympic teams, Catchings commented on Fowles' dominance: "She got on the boards. She got her open looks. She's tough to stop when she gets on a roll."

The Lynx delighted an audience of 9,034 with their second straight win while sending the Fever to their fourth loss in five games. The Lynx, whose 21 wins match New York with the most in the WNBA, extended their regular season win streak over Indiana to nine games, dating to 2011.

A three-point play by Moore capped a 7-0 scoring streak for Minnesota to begin the second half and the Lynx never looked back, enjoying its largest lead, then at 50-34.

The Fever trailed 64-40 after three quarters and outscored the home team 13-7 to begin the final stanza, creeping within 67-59 on a jumper from Shenise Johnson. But Indiana never got closer.
"Minnesota is one of the premier teams in the league," said first-year Fever coach Stephanie White. "They execute offensively and do all the little things that matter. They have great discipline. Defensively, they pressure you and then you add Fowles to the mix and it's no wonder they are exceptional."

The Fever were held scoreless for a 3:39 stretch in the second quarter which produced an 8-0 Minnesota run to separate the clubs after a nip-and-tuck first quarter. Indiana led for just 5.8 seconds of the game, 20-19, after a free throw by Natasha Howard broke one of three first-quarter ties with 6.6 seconds left in the first period. But Montgomery's 3-point heave with 0.8 seconds left beat the buzzer and the Lynx never trailed thereafter.


## GAME 32 - WASHINGTON 76, INDIANA 72 (OT) September 8, 2015 - Verizon Center

WASHINGTON - Ivory Latta scored a season-high 25 points to spark the Washington Mystics to a 76-72 overtime win over the Indiana Fever to clinch a playoff spot in the WNBA Eastern Conference.

It was Latta's three-point play that capped a fourth-quarter comeback that sent the contest to overtime, and her free throw with 24.6 seconds to play forced Indiana to shoot from beyond the arc in its final possession.

Washington welcomed a return to its home arena by snapping a four-game losing skid since last playing at home Aug. 28. While securing a playoff berth for the third straight season, the Mystics moved within a game of the Fever in third place in the East standings.

Indiana held second-half leads of 11 and 9 points, and scored the first four points in overtime but couldn't seal their 19th win and a victory that could have clinched at least the No. 3 seed in the upcoming playoffs.

In the overtime, Tayler Hill tied the score at 72 before LaToya Sanders' putback layin with 49.3 seconds left gave Washington the lead it never relinquished. A miss by Indiana's Lynetta Kizer and a rebounding foul by Shavonte Zellous gave the Mystics the ball again with 24.6 seconds left.

Latta, fouled on the ensuing inbounds play, went to the line and hit the first of two free throws After a Tamika Catchings missed 3-pointer with 14 seconds left, Tierra Ruffin-Pratt iced the scoring with a final free throw with 8.6 seconds left.

Hill and Sanders came off the bench to score 14 and 13 points, respectively, for the Mystics. Lynetta Kizer added 12 points for the Fever and Tamika Catchings, despite 2-of-13 shooting, finished with 10.

Indiana trailed 38-35 at the break, then got 12 straight points as part of a 16-2 run to begin the second half. Back-to-back 3-pointers from Marissa Coleman and Shenise Johnson catapulted the Fever to a 51-40 advantage and their largest lead, with 5:56 to go in the third.

Desperate for a playoff spot, the Mystics answered. Washington used an 8-2 mini-run to climb within 5, and got within a single possession when Kia Vaughn's free throw made it 54-51 with 37 seconds left in the period.

Catchings, after missing her first seven shots, nailed a deep jumper to beat the third-quarter buzzer and help Indiana head to the fourth up 56-51. A pair of free throws by Lucas and another jumper from Catchings staked the Fever to nine-point lead in the opening minute of the fourth, but in a game with playoff positioning at stake, Washington made another push.

This time, Washington came back from a 62-53 fourth-quarter deficit to pull within one, 64-63, on a bucket from Sanders. Latta's driving baseline layin and subsequent free throw capped a 13-2 run that gave Washington its first lead, 66-64, since a brief 40-39 lead early in the second half.

Clarendon knotted the game at 66 with 45 seconds to play in regulation and the Mystics missed twice within the last 1.6 seconds to force the extra session.



## GAME 33 - INDIANA 75, ATLANTA 67 <br> September 11, 2015 - Philips Arena

ATLANTA - Playing without starters Tamika Catchings and Briann January, the Indiana Fever put five players in double figures and used a key fourth quarter stretch to get past the Atlanta Dream, 75-67.

Indiana scored 10 straight points after a 61-61 deadlock midway through the fourth, getting four points from rookie Natalie Achonwa and a 3-pointer from Jeanette Pohlen to spark the run. Shenise Johnson's free throw gave the Fever their largest lead of the game, 10, with just over two minutes remaining.

The Dream got within 5 , but Indiana escaped to halt a two-game slide and maintain sole possession of third place in the WNBA's Eastern Conference.

Shavonte Zellous shot 5-of-8 from the floor and was perfect on four free throws to pace Indiana with 14 points off the bench. Achonwa came off the bench to score 10 with a career-high nine rebounds. Johnson scored 13 for the Fever while former University of Maryland stars Marissa Coleman and Lynetta Kizer each scored 10.
"We got production from everybody that stepped on the floor," said Stephanie White who became the fifth rookie head coach in WNBA history with 19 or more wins. "What really stood out for me was that we got 20 assists on 29 baskets. That's sharing the basketball and playing well as a team."

Rebounding from consecutive losses, she added, "Tonight was a good first step. We got better defensively and a whole lot of people produced. Shenise played well and Zellous gave us a big game. Achonwa stepped up and Pohlen gave us some good minutes and hit some big shots."

After trailing early while using its 10th different starting lineup this season, Indiana took its first lead on Pohlen's first 3-pointer with 3:26 left in the first half, and after Angel McCoughtry tied the score in the half's final minute, Johnson hit a trey of her own for a 3-point Fever margin at intermission, 38-35.

Sancho Lyttle led the Dream with 19 points and eight rebounds. McCoughtry added 11 and Matee Ajavon had 10.


## GAME 34 - INDIANA 81, NEW YORK 76

## September 13, 2015 - Bankers Life Fieldhouse

INDIANAPOLIS - When the curtain closed on the WNBA's regular season, the Indiana Fever quickly shifted into playoffs mode.

The 2015 postseason begins for Indiana on Thursday, when the third-seeded Fever travel to Chicago for the opener of a best-of-three series in the Eastern Conference semifinals. The Fever lost all four of their regular-season games to second-seeded Chicago. But as the Indiana players will emphasize That was then, this is now.
"We know what's at stake right now," said Fever guard Shavonte Zellous. "We can't worry about what they did to us during the regular season. This is a whole new season right now."

If confidence proves to be a factor for postseason play, Zellous should be brimming with it.
The veteran came off the bench to score a season-high 22 points and lead Indiana to an 81-76 triumph over the New York Liberty at Bankers Life Fieldhouse. Eighteen of Zellous' points came in the second half, and the Fever simply rode that scoring to victory.

It was something of a milestone victory, too, lifting Indiana to 20 for the season against 14 losses. The Fever finished with 20 regular-season wins for the first time since their 2012 squad recorded a 22-12 mark and went on to the WNBA championship. Also, Indiana Coach Stephanie White became just the third rookie head coach in league history to win at least 20.

It helped, too, that Briann January returned to the lineup for Sunday's game. After missing five straight games with a sore knee, the veteran point guard scored 13 points with a couple of assists in 20 minutes.

The Fever, as a group, found their rhythm in the second half against New York. After shooting just 25.8 percent from the field in the first half, the Fever hit 53.3 percent in the second. They had four assists in the first half, 10 in the second.

Better passes, improved execution, better team play. White talked about it all at the half, when the Fever trailed by a 33-31 count.
"I just really challenged our team at halftime to come out and make each other better," White said.

A wave of fourth-quarter scoring from Zellous - who during one spell totaled 10 points in about 2 minutes - helped immensely. And with the score tied at 76-all with 1:55 remaining, Indiana took control.

Rookie Natalie Achonwa hit a layup after an assist from Erlana Larkins. Achonwa, who finished with 13 points, connected on another driving shot after a post feed from Zellous. Zellous capped the closing run with a free throw.

Sugar Rodgers had 15 points to lead the Liberty, who enter the playoffs with the WNBA's best record (23-11). Indiana won four of five games against New York this summer. Also, the Fever defeated New York for the seventh consecutive time in regular-season games at the Fieldhouse.

Tamika Whitmore's 41 points for Indiana in a 98-83 playoff loss at Detroit, 8/19/06, was a WNBA Playoff record until 2010. Whitmore made 15 -of-22 shots and added 10 rebounds in what was one of the greatest playoff performances in league history. Pacing the Fever while Tamika Catchings was lost for the second half due to a concussion, Whitmore scored 25 points in the second half, including 15 in the third quarter.


Shavonte Zellous' 30 points in Game 3 of the 2012 WNBA Finals matched the third-highest scoring output in Indiana playoff history. Zellous hit $10-\mathrm{of}-17$ shots in the game while staking the Fever to a stunning 37-point third-quarter advantage (7033), which is the largest lead in Finals history. Zellous shot 18-of-18 from the FT line during the series and closed the 2012 campaign with 19 straight free throws made.


Erlana Larkins established a new Fever record with 109 rebounds during the 2012 playoffs season. She matched a league standard with nine offensive rebounds and grabbed 20 boards overall in Game 3 of the East Semis to match Tamika Catchings' mark which is second in league playoffs history. She twice registered 15 rebounds in the Finals which fell one shy of the single-game mark in a championship series.

## 2002 WNBA Playoffs First Round

## Game 1 - Indiana 73, New York 55

INDIANAPOLIS - The New York Liberty became the latest team that was unable to "Catch" the Indiana Fever.
Rookie Tamika Catchings had 29 points and 11 rebounds as the Fever drew first blood in their Eastern Conference first-round series with a $73-55$ victory over the Liberty in the opener.
Indiana, one of the league's hottest teams, captured its first playoff game in franchise history and won for the seventh time in eight games. Top-seeded New York had made it past the first round in each of its four playoff appearances but faced elimination with the loss.
Catchings, who was named Rookie of the Year earlier in the day, came out on fire by making 6-of-8 shots, including three 3 -pointers, and scoring 18 points in the first half. She drilled back-to-back 3-pointers and Olympia Scott-Richardson added a basket for an early 12-4 edge.

Indiana built a 35-24 halftime edge and continued to expand it in the second half. Coquese Washington drilled a 3-pointer for a 44-28 bulge and added another with 14:47 remaining to give the Fever a commanding 49-30 advantage.
Washington, a former member of the Liberty, was acquired from Houston after a loss to New York on July 19 and the Fever have won nine of 12 games since the trade. She scored 11 of her 13 points in the second half.
Tamika Whitmore led New York with 18 points. The Liberty lost for the fifth time in six games.


## 2002 WNBA Playoffs First Round

Game 2 - New York 84, Indiana 65
NEW YORK - The New York Liberty rebounded from the worst playoff loss in franchise history in impressive fashion.
Tamika Whitmore paced a balanced attack with 24 points as the Liberty routed the Indiana Fever 84-65 to even their best-of-three Eastern Conference semifinal series at a win apiece.
New York, 5-0 all time at home against Indiana, earned the right to host the decisive third game of the series.
Whitmore scored 14 points in the second half, including 10 in an 18-5 spurt that gave the Liberty a 69-46 lead with $7: 19$ left. New York led by as many as 24 .
It took a while, but the Liberty finally contained Tamika Catchings, the WNBA Rookie of the Year who collected 29 points and 11 rebounds in Indiana's $73-55$ Game 1 victory.
Catchings recorded another double-double with 20 points and 14 rebounds, but she was held to just five points in the second half when the Liberty stepped up their defense.
After Catchings made two free throws to open the scoring, New York reeled off 10 straight points and never trailed thereafter.
Tari Phillips added 20 points for the Liberty, who pulled away in the second half after taking a 38-31 lead at the intermission.

## 2002 WNBA Playoffs First Round <br> Game 3 - New York 75, Indiana 60

NEW YORK - The New York Liberty taught the Indiana Fever it's not how you start but how you finish. Crystal Robinson and Vickie Johnson drilled 3-pointers during a decisive second-half run as the Liberty retumed to the Eastem Conference finals with a $75-60$ come-from-behind victory over the Fever.
New York took the last two games of the best-of-three senies at home and earned the right to face the Washington Mystics in their fifth consecutive appearance in the conference finals.

Appearing in the playoffs for the first time in team history, Indiana raced to a 17-2 lead less than 5 1/2 minutes into the decisive third game. But the Fever struggled after halftime as Rookie of the Year Tamika Catchings had just four points over the final 20 minutes.

Johnson scored 19 points to lead five players in double figures for the Liberty, who shot nearly 62 percent (21-of-34) after the break while holding the Fever to 44 percent (11-of-25).

Tamika Whitmore added 17 points and Tari Phillips, Teresa Weatherspoon and reserve Becky Hammon contributed 10 apiece for New York
Nikki McCray led Indiana with 14 points and Olympia Scott-Richardson had 10 on 5-of-6 shooting. But the Fever were unable to overcome 21 tumovers.

## 2005 WNBA Playoffs First Round

## Game 1 - Indiana 63, New York 51

NEW YORK - Tully Belivaqua's big basket gave the Indiana Fever a big edge in its first-round playoff series. Belivaqua's 3 -pointer with $1: 33$ remaining keyed a closing 14-2 run as the Fever took control of its best-of-three Eastern Conference series with a 63-51 victory over the New York Liberty.
Tamika Catchings had 19 points and 12 rebounds for the Fever, who is one win away from its first postseason series win, with the luxury of the next two games at home.

Indiana erased a nine-point first-half decicit, then blew a 10-point second half lead. A 3 -pointer by Elena Baranova capped a 16-6 surge by New York and forged a 49-49 tie with $3: 22$ to go.

Deanna Jackson and Catchings each made two free throws to give the Fever the lead for good. With the shot clock running down, Bevilaqua buried a 3 -pointer for a $56-49$ lead.
"We try to establish an inside game, but we're in confident taking those shots," said Bevilaqua, who made three 3 -pointers. "We're going to keep taking them."
Cathrine Kraayeveld sank two foul shots with 1:07 left, but the Liberty did not score again. Bevilaqua, Jackson and Catchings each made a pair from the line in the final 62 seconds for the Fever, who made 13 of their last 14 free throws.
"When it counts, we're really starting to knock them down now," Bevilaqua said. "That's really what we have to focus on."

Belivaqua scored 14 points and Jackson added nine for the second-seeded Fever, who held a 27-20 advantage on the glass.
Vickie Johnson scored 17 points but was the only player in double figures for the thirdseeded Liberty.

## 2005 WNBA Playoffs First Round

Game 2 - Indiana 58, New York 50
INDIANAPOLIS - Tamika Catchings and Kelly Miller led the Indiana Fever to its first postseason series win. Catchings and Miller combined for all the points in a decisive second-half surge as the Fever regrouped for a $58-50$ victory over the New York Liberty and a sweep of its best-of-three Eastern Conference semifinal series.
The Fever avenged a conference semifinal loss to the Liberty in 2002, then its only other appearance in the postseason.
The Liberty were eliminated in the opening round for the first time in their history. An original WNBA franchise, they have made the playoffs every year except 1998 and 2003.
Named WNBA Defensive Player of the Year earlier in the day, Catchings collected 19 points and 12 rebounds. Miller, whose late 3-pointer was a dagger in Indiana's Game 1 win, added 11 points.
Indiana squandered a 14 -point first-half lead and trailed, 37-35, after a basket by New York's La'Keshia Frett with $7: 47$ to go. The hoop capped a $21-8$ run to open the second half after an awful first half by the Liberty.
Catchings sank a 3-pointer and Miller made a jumper and 3-pointer to give the Fever a 43-37 advantage with 5:57 left. It was at least a two-possession game thereafter.
Natalie Williams added 13 points and 10 boards for the Fever, who won despite shooting just 28 percent ( 16 -of-57) from the field. They made 21 -of- 25 free throws and held a 38-25 advantage on the glass.
Becky Hammon scored 14 points and Frett added 13 for the Liberty, who trailed, 27 16, after a first half in which they had five baskets and 11 turnovers.

 Game 1 - Connecticut 63, Indiana 58INDIANAPOLIS - The WNBA title hopes of the Indiana Fever took a shot to the head from the Connecticut Sun.
The effectiveness of All-Star Tamika Catchings was limited by a mild concussion and the Fever never led in the second half of a 73-68 loss to the Connecticut Sun, who moved one win away from returning to the WNBA Finals.
Taj McWilliams-Franklin scored 24 points for the top-seeded Sun, who grabbed Game 1 of the Eastern Conference finals and host the next two games of the best-of-three series.

Catchings, Indiana's top scorer and rebounder and a WNBA MVP candidate, left the game with $13: 48$ remaining in the first half. She went to the floor and her head was fallen on by Connecticut's Brooke Wyckoff.
The WNBA Defensive Player of the Year, Catchings did not return until the second half. She was diagnosed with a mild concussion and clearly was not herself, finishing with 10 points on 2-of-11 shooting.
Without Catchings as a threat, the Fever struggled to stay with the Sun, who built a 4540 lead behind 15 points from McWilliams-Franklin. Connecticut pushed the margin to 12 points early in the second half.
Indiana closed to 63-62 with 3:22 left on a 3-pointer by Kelly Miller, who scored 14 points. But the Fever went more than three minutes without a point as Tully Bevilaqua missed a 3-pointer and ran the baseline for a traveling violation.
With the shot clock running down, Katie Douglas banked in a 3 -pointer from the left wing to give the Sun a 68-62 lead with 30 seconds left.
Nykesha Sales scored 14 points, Lindsay Whalen added 13 and Douglas nine for the Sun, who shot 48 percent (22-of-46) and limited the Fever to 38 percent (23-of-61).
Miller scored 14 points and Kelly Schumacher and Deanna Jackson added 12 each for Indiana.

In a tight contest throughout, the Sun grabbed a 60-56 lead with 1:31 left in regulatior on two free throws by Lindsay Whalen. After Kelly Miller made 1-of-2 free throws Tamika Catchings followed a miss by Connecticut with a 3-pointer that tied it, 60-60, witt 18 seconds left.
The Sun had a chance to end the game in regulation, but Game 1 star Taj McWilliams Franklin missed a layup as time expired.
In the overtime, Connecticut did not appear hesitant as Dydek buried a jumper from just inside the arc. Sales hit a 3 -pointer and Dydek made a follow shot to highlight a $7-6$ run that opened a 69-62 lead with $1: 54$ remaining.
Catchings followed with a layup, but the Sun made 8 -of-12 free throws down the stretch to seal the win.
McWilliams-Franklin scored 15 points, Whalen had 14 and Asjha Jones chipped in 1 § for Connecticut. An MVP candidate, Catchings bounced back from a miserable firs game that included a mild concussion, scoring 21 points and grabbing four steals.

## 2006 WNBA Playoffs First Round

## Game 1 - Detroit 68, Indiana 56

INDIANAPOLIS - The Detroit Shock used a 13-0 run in the second half to break open what had been a close game before coming away with a $68-56$ win over the Indiana Fever in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference Semifinals in Bankers Life Fieldhouse.
Tamika Catchings, who was honored as the league's Defensive Player of the Year prior to the game, led Indiana with 17 points, six rebounds and five assists. Tamika Whitmore had 12 points, while Ebony Hoffman contributed 10 points, three rebounds and a career-high three blocked shots for the Fever (0-1).

Deanna Nolan scored a game-high 18 points on 9-of-11 shooting for Detroit (1-0). Katie Smith finished with 17 points, including four 3's, to go along with seven rebounds and four assists.
The Fever scored seven unanswered points to cut what had been a double-digit Shock lead down to four points with $2: 24$ left in the fourth quarter. Catchings' step-back jumper made the score $58-54$, Detroit. Moments later, Smith netted a 3 -pointer from the top of the key to extend Detroit's lead to seven. The Shock led by as many as 12 down the stretch, which proved to be the final margin.
The officiating was tight early with ten fouls called in the game's opening four minutes. After falling behind midway through the first quarter, Detroit pulled in front on the strength of a $7-0$ run. Nolan's jumper gave Detroit the lead, and pair of free throws from Smith then made the score 13-9
Detroit led by as many as seven in the second quarter. Indiana, though, kept pace with Detroit, tying the score at 28 following a $7-0$ run. Whitmore's 3 -pointer from the left wing tied the score for the first time since it was 13-all. A Nolan steal and fast-break lay-up with 13.2 left in the second gave the Shock a 30-28 edge at the half.
The Fever enjoyed its first lead since early in the first quarter on a 3-point play from Whitmore. Indiana moved in front $36-34$. The lead changed hands eleven times in the third quarter. However, Detroit led 47-44 after three.
Detroit scored the first nine points of the fourth quarter to race to its largest lead of the game. A Nolan jumper gave the Shock a $56-44$ lead with $6: 10$ left in regulation.

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## 2006 WNBA Playoffs First Round Game 2 - Detroit 98, Indiana 83

DETROIT - Tamika Whitmore scored a WNBA playoff-record 41 points as the Indiana Fever attempted to even its first-round playoff series with the Detroit Shock. Whitmore's career night, though, would come in a losing effort as the host Shock bested the Fever 98-83 in the Palace of Auburn Hills.
With the win, Detroit swept Indiana in the best-of-three series and advanced to the Eastern Conference Finals. Detroit's 98 points was its highest postseason output in franchise history.
Whitmore's 41 points came on 15 -of- 25 shooting and 10 -of-10 from the free throw line. She tied a playoff record with the most free throws without a miss, and her 25 secondhalf points were also a playoffs record.
Tamika Catchings finished with 11 points and six rebounds for Indiana. Catchings suffered what was called a mild concussion after hitting her head on the floor while fighting for a lose ball midway through the third quarter. She did return, however was not able to help her team erase a double-digit fourth quarter deficit.
Cheryl Ford paced Detroit with 23 points and 10 rebounds. Swin Cash added 17 points, nine rebounds and eight assists, while Plenette Pierson netted 20 off Detroit's bench.
Detroit outscored Indiana 18-6 in first four minutes of the fourth quarter before racing out to an $81-70$ lead. The Shock led by as many as 17 late in regulation before coming away with its third consecutive win over Indiana.
After trailing for much of the first half, Detroit took its first lead of the game midway through the second quarter. A Kara Braxton lay-up made the score 25-24, Detroit. The Shock would go on a 7-2 run in the closing minutes of the second before leading 38-34 at the half.
Whitmore kept Indiana close, scoring 16 points in a first half that saw neither team lead by more than six points.
Following a Catchings bank-shot that regained the lead for the Fever, Detroit went on a $10-3$ run to pull in front 57-52. The Fever responded with a run of its own, outscoring the Shock 9-1 to lead by three late in the third quarter. Indiana led 64-63 heading in the fourth quarter.

## 2007 WNBA Playoffs First Round Game 1 - Connecticut 93, Indiana 88 (3OT)

UNCASVILLE, Conn. (AP) - Nykesha Sales scored 25 points to lead the Connecticut Sun to a 93-88 triple-overtime victory against the Indiana Fever in the first triple-overtime playoff game in WNBA history. The Sun took a 1-0 series lead in the best-of-three firstround playoff series.
Anna DeForge had a season-high 31 points for the Fever, while Tamika Whitmore added 24. Tamika Catchings, playing in her first game since tearing a muscle in her foot on July 20, had 14 points and 20 rebounds.
Asjha Jones, who missed the firral three games of the season with an ankle sprain, returned to give the Sun 20 points and 10 rebounds.
The Sun held Indiana scoreless in the final $21 / 2$ minutes of the third overtime. Jones scored the first basket of the period for Connecticut, but Whitmore answered with seven straight points to give Indiana an 88-83 lead. Those would be the Fever's final points of the game.
Sales hit a pair of free throws, followed by layups by Lindsay Whalen and Kristen Rasmussen to put the Sun up 89-88.

Tamika Whitmore added 12 points for the Fever.
Katie Douglas, Connecticut's leading scorer during the regular season, led the Sur with 11 points. She is shooting 9 -for- 33 from the field in the series. Nykesha Sales was held to five points after scoring 25 on Thursday.
Indiana held Connecticut to 37 percent shooting. The Fever shot 46 percent anc scored 21 points off turnovers.
Indiana's starters outscored Connecticut's 58-34. It was just the fourth playoff win ir Fever history, and it ended a five-game postseason losing streak.

 Game 3 - Indiana 93, Connecticut 88 (OT)INDIANAPOLIS - Tamika Catchings had 30 points and 13 rebounds, and the Indiana Fever made the biggest comeback in WNBA playoff history to defeat the Connecticut Sun 93-88 in overtime and advance to the Eastern Conference finals.
The Fever overcame a 39-17, second-quarter deficit to win the series 2-1. The previous biggest deficit overcome was 21 points, by Minnesota in a $74-72$ win on Aug. 28, 2003, against Los Angeles.
Katie Douglas led Connecticut with 27 points and Lindsay Whalen and Asjha Jones both added 21. The Sun won their first five games against the Fever this season, but lost the two that mattered most.
In overtime, Catchings hit a 3-pointer with 31 seconds left to give the Fever an 89-86 lead. Douglas missed a 3-pointer, and Indiana rebounded with 15.1 seconds left.
Tamika Whitmore made the first of two free throws with 14.4 seconds left to bump Indiana's lead to 90-86. Nykesha Sales scored on a layup with 5 seconds left to cut the Fever's lead to 90-88.
Catchings was fouled on a dead ball and made the one shot. Catchings was fouled again on the subsequent inbounds pass. She made both free throws with four seconds left to seal the win for Indiana.

Connecticut led 64-48 in the fourth quarter when an 11-0 run by the Fever cut the deficit to $64-59$ with $6: 40$ to go. Sheri Sam had five points in the run.

Indiana chopped the lead to $66-64$ on a 3-pointer by Whitmore with $3: 05$ left, then took the lead on a 3-point play by Whitmore with $2: 30$ to go.
Indiana took a 73-72 lead on two free throws by Catchings with 45.5 seconds left. Connecticut took possession, but Indiana tipped the ball out of bounds with 8 seconds left on the shot clock. Whalen shot an airball on a fadeaway mid-range jumper with the shot clock winding down, and Indiana rebounded with 21.5 seconds to go

Catchings made two free throws with 20.3 seconds left to give Indiana a 75-72 lead. Douglas missed a 3 -pointer, but Connecticut got the loose ball, and Sales made a 3pointer to tie the game at 75 .
Douglas fouled Catchings as she brought the ball upcourt, and Catchings made two free throws with 5.8 seconds left to give the Fever a $77-75$ lead. Connecticut quickly moved the ball downcourt, and Douglas redeemed herself with a layup with 1.5 seconds left that forced overtime.

Game 1 - Indiana 75, Detroit 65
INDIANAPOLIS - Tamika Catchings had 22 points and 11 rebounds to help the Indiana Fever beat the Detroit Shock 75-65 in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference Finals.
The win puts the Fever one win away from its first trip to the Finals.
Catchings set a franchise record with her fourth consecutive double-double. She is averaging 20.3 points and 14.3 rebounds in the playoffs.

Tamika Whitmore scored 18 points for the Fever and Tammy Sutton-Brown, the AllStar who all but disappeared in the first round of the playoffs, added 11 points, eight rebounds and six blocks for Indiana.

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - The Detroit Shock got 24 points from Deanna Nolan and evened the Eastern Conference Finals at 1-1 with a $77-63$ win over the Indiana Fever.

Nolan hit all five of her shots in the quarter, and the Fever managed just four field goals while looking confused by the Shock's defense.
That let Detroit take a 41-32 lead into intermission despite 13 turnovers.
Cash didn't score in the first half, but had three baskets early in the third quarter as Detroit opened an 18-point lead midway through the period.
Detroit led $68-47$ going into the fourth quarter, but Indiana got within 71-59 before their rally stalled.

## 2007 Eastern Conference Finals

Game 3 - Detroit 81, Indiana 65
AUBURN HILLS, Mich. - The Indiana Fever had two chances in 29 hours to advance tc their first WNBA finals. Deanna Nolan wouldn't let it happen.
A day after scoring 15 points in the second quarter of Detroit's victory in Game 2 of the Eastern Conference finals, Nolan had a franchise playoff-record 30 points as the Shock advanced to the championship round with a 81-65 victory in Game 3.
The Fever led by as many as 13 points in the first quarter, but Nolan scored 20 points in a 14-minute span to pull Detroit back into the game. She was 7 -for- 9 on 3 -pointers.
Nolan's 54 points in two days helped the defending champs improve to $7-0$ wher facing elimination in the past two seasons. The Shock advanced to seek their third title ir five years.
Indiana lost both the lead and All-Star forward Tamika Catchings in the seconc quarter. Catchings, who missed the final 13 regular-season games with a left-foot injury strained her right Achilles' tendon in the last minute of the first half and did not return.
Catchings left the arena immediately after the game to fly back to Indiana for ar examination and did not speak to the media.
Cheryl Ford, playing her third game in four days on a bad knee, had 15 rebounds ir just 18 minutes.
Tammy Sutton-Brown (17) and Tully Bevilaqua (14) were the only Fever players ts reach double figures. Tamika Whitmore, who had a league-record 41 points agains Detroit in a first-round game a year earlier, finished with nine on 3 -for-10 shooting.
The Shock, known for their slow starts, trailed 16-3 just four minutes into the game witt Ford on the bench in foul trouble, but Nolan's surge helped the Shock tie the score at 28 Plenette Pierson's jumper then gave the Shock their first lead, drawing a standins ovation from the previously silent crowd.
Detroit used a 28-10 run over a 13 -minute stretch to take a $35-30$ lead at the half, anc scored the first six points of the third quarter to go up by 11.
Indiana came back, pulling within 44-43, but two straight put-backs by Ford helped the Shock build a safer margin.
Ford had nine rebounds and a blocked shot in the period, and Detroit took a 57-47 lead into the fourth. The Shock led by as many as 20 in the fourth.

Detroit, which swept Indiana in three regular-season games and had won five straight over the Fever - including the last two games of the 2007 conference finals - put itself in position to wrap up the best-of-three series at home in Game 2.

Deanna Nolan had 22 points, and Plenette Pierson scored 11 for the Shock.

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - The Indiana Fever have been knocked out of the WNBA playoffs by the Detroit Shock the last two seasons. The Fever delayed Detroit's hat trick, at least for a day.
Tamika Catchings had 27 points and 10 rebounds and the Fever won 89-82 in overtime to force a decisive third game in the Eastern Conference playoff series.
Indiana came into the game with a 0-4 record against the Shock, including Detroit's win in Game 1.
The Shock were more upset about a fourth-quarter incident that left Plenette Pierson with a shoulder injury that is expected to rule her out of Game 3.
Pierson and Ebony Hoffman got their arms tangled while battling for position on a rebound, and Pierson ended up crumpled on the floor in obvious pain.
Laimbeer immediately asked the officials to eject Hoffman, but they decided to give both players technical fouls. Hoffman then hit two key 3-pointers to help Indiana win the game.

Pierson was suspended for four games earlier in the season after a fight with Los Angeles' Candace Parker, and Laimbeer practically demanded that Hoffman also get suspended. The controversy threatened to overshadow a memorable finish.
The teams made the first 43 free throws of the game before Tammy Sutton-Brown's miss with 24.8 seconds left. That left Detroit down three, and Katie Smith could only split a pair from the line at the other end.
Katie Douglas then hit one of two, leaving the Fever up 73-70 with 13.8 seconds to go. Yinka Sanni's layup made it 73-72, but Catchings made two more free throws to restore the three-point edge.

Deanna Nolan, though, came back down the floor and hit a 3-pointer with 6 seconds to play to force overtime.
The Shock, though, struggled to hit inside, and Indiana clinched the game with consecutive 3 -pointers by Hoffman and Tully Bevilaqua.

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - The Detroit Shock played angry in Game 3 of the Eastern Conference Semifinals. It turned out pretty well for them.
Detroit led Indiana 41-10 midway through the second quarter and cruised to an 80-61 victory to advance to its third straight Eastern Conference final.
Detroit, which got 21 points from Deanna Nolan and 15 from Katie Smith, will face New York in the conference finals. Last season, the Shock beat New York and Indiana in the first two rounds before losing the WNBA finals to Phoenix.
The Shock were furious about an incident in Game 2 that saw star forward Plenette Pierson suffer a dislocated shoulder after being flipped to the court by Indiana's Ebony Hoffman. The Shock's outrage only grew when Hoffman was fined, but not suspended, by the league.
That meant she was on the floor for Tuesday's opening tip while Pierson was on the Detroit bench with her right arm in a sling.
The fired-up Shock scored the game's first 12 points, led $30-7$ at the end of the first quarter and continued to pour it on in the second.
"I think we were stunned," Indiana's Tamika Catching said. "There was a point where you looked up at the scoreboard and we were down by 30 in the first half, and they were still coming at us on both ends of the floor. I just wanted us to wake up."

The half might have been summed best by the final 20 seconds. Indiana held the ball for a last shot, despite trailing by 30 points, and Tammy Sutton-Brown hit a layup with 7.1 seconds to play.

## 2009 Eastern Conference Semifinals Game 1 - Indiana 88, Washington 79

COLLEGE PARK, Md. (AP) - Tamika Catchings said the Indiana Fever had a simple mantra as they walked off the court trailing after three quarters in their playoff opener: "Pick It Up."
From their offensive pace to their defensive intensity, the top-seeded Fever did exactly that as they opened the fourth quarter with a 17-3 run on the way to an 88-79 victory over the Washington Mystics in their Eastern Conference first-round series.

Katie Douglas added 19 points and Briann January was a spark off the bench with 16 all in the second half - for the Fever, who entered the fourth quarter down 58-56.
Indiana came into the playoffs having lost seven of its last 10 games, but the Fever turned up their noted defensive pressure late and improved to $5-0$ against the Mystics this season and 17-4 in their last 21 meetings.
Trailing by 12 points midway through the fourth quarter, the Mystics rallied behind two 3 -pointers from Marissa Coleman and a three-point play by Chasity Melvin to pull within 79-76.
On the Fever's next possession, Catchings converted a three-point play after being fouled while hitting a running floater. January, the sixth pick in the 2009 WNBA draft, was perfect on eight free throws, including four in the final 42 seconds to seal the win.
For the Mystics, which sports the youngest roster among the playoff teams, the second-half collapse has been an unwanted but common theme this season overall and specifically against the Fever, who outscored them 134-91 in the final quarter of their five meetings this season.
Crystal Langhorne led Washington with 18 points and 10 rebounds. Coleman finished with 16 points and Matee Ajavon had 10 for the Mystics, who were making their first playoff appearance since 2006.
The game was played in front of a sparse but energetic crowd at the University of Maryland's Comcast Center, hours after President Obama spoke about the ongoing health care debate at a campaign-style rally in front of about 15,000 students. The game was moved from the Verizon Center, where the Mystics play their home games, due to a scheduling conflict.

Game 2 - Indiana 81, Washington 74 (OT)
INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The Indiana Fever has found a winning combination - Tamika Catchings' dominating offense and Tully Bevilaqua's scrappy play.
The two led the Fever to a 81-74 overtime victory over the Washington Mystics to sweep their best-of-three Eastern Conference semifinal series.
Catchings had 24 points, 16 rebounds, five assists, four steals and four blocked shots before a noisy Bankers Life Fieldhouse crowd of 9,655 . Point guard Bevilaqua scored six of her 13 points and had three rebounds in overtime to spark the Fever, who draw Detroit to start the conference finals.
"I call her Mighty Mouse," Catchings said of 5 -foot-7 Bevilaqua. "Lindsey Harding had five fouls. We wanted to get her out. We didn't get her out, but Tully attacked her, took away some of her offense."
Tammy Sutton-Brown scored 16 points and Katie Douglas 13 for Indiana, which made five of its first seven shots and then just 18-of 65 the rest of the way to finish at 32.4 percent.
"We did not shoot as well as we have in the past, but we found a way to win," Fever coach Lin Dunn. "Tully Bevilaqua sparked us with her defense, had rebounds and showed toughness. Tammy Sutton-Brown was a warrior out there. Tamika Catchings had a magnificent. MVP performance."
Crystal Langhorne scored 11 of her 15 points in the second half to keep the Mystics in the game. Harding and Alana Beard scored 10 each for Washington, which lost Chastity Melvin and Nakia Sanford to fouls in the game's waning minutes.
Catchings, driving the lane, drew a foul and made two free throws to tie it at 69 all, with 2.6 seconds remaining in regulation.

Beard shot a 10 -foot airball from the left side as the fourth quarter expired.
In the overtime, Sutton-Brown scored on a layup with $1: 18$ to play to break a tie, and the Fever scored the final five points.

AUBURN HILLS, Mich. (AP) - For 17 minutes, the Indiana Fever looked like the best team in the Eastern Conference.
After that, they regressed back to the group that has been eliminated by the Detroit Shock in each of the last three postseasons.
After leading for the entire first half, the Fever only scored 19 second-half points as Detroit rolled to an easy 72-56 victory in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference Finals.
"I thought Detroit played like a team that wanted to win the game more than we did," Indiana coach Lin Dunn said. "We didn't match their energy or their intensity in the second half, and that's very disappointing."

Rookie Shavonte Zellous scored 16 of her game-high 23 points in the first half, including 12 in the second quarter.
The Shock kept the momentum after the break, scoring the first six points of the third quarter. They held Indiana to six thirc-quarter points to take a 52-43 lead into the fourth. The Fever missed 13 of 16 shots in the period and turned the ball over six times.
The Fever cut the margin to four, but Deanna Nolan scored the next six points and Zellous added a three-point play to put Detroit ahead 63-50 with 5:09 to play. Nolan, who received a trophy before the game for her All-WNBA second-team berth, finished with 22 points.

Two years ago, the Fever were in the decisive Game 3 of the Eastern Conference Finals - also against the Detroit Shock - when Catchings went down with a torn righ Achilles' tendon. A competitive game turned into a blowout, and Detroit cruised into the WNBA finals.
In Game 2 of the East Finals, Catchings was sprawled on the ground for severa minutes with trainers around her. This time, she got up and made Detroit pay.
Catchings scored 22 points, and the Fever avoided elimination with a $79-75$ win forcing a decisive Game 3 at Bankers Life Fieldhouse:
Catchings said her neck already was hurting before she was hit with 3:06 left in the third quarter. The foul on the play was charged to Alexis Hornbuckle.
Catchings felt the contact was excessive.
Catchings not only got up, she never left the game. She dusted herself off and made one of two free throws to cut Detroit's lead to $50-49$. On Detroit's next possession Catchings stole a pass, then found an open Briann January for a 3-pointer that gave the Fever a $52-50$ lead.
Indiana never trailed again. Indiana outscored Detroit 31-25 after Catchings wen down.
Catchings, who earlier in the day was named the league's defensive player of the year also had nine rebounds, six steals and five assists.
Now, the Fever will have a chance to play for a spot in the WNBA finals, and ar Indiana legend is trying to help them pack the home arena,
Katie Douglas added 14 points and five steals for the Fever, who will host the decisive Game 3. Deanna Nolan led Detroit with 23 points and Shavonte Zellous added 19 points and nine rebounds.
Indiana set a postseason record with 18 steals and scored 28 points off Detroit's 24 turnovers.

## Game 3 - Indiana 72, Detroit 67

INDIANAPOLIS -- Tamika Catchings ripped the ball out of the air after Detroit's final miss, and Indiana's players jumped into each other's arms.
Finally, the Fever will play for a championship.
The Fever advanced to the WNBA finals for the first time, beating the defending champion Shock 72-67 in Game 3 of the Eastern Conference Finals.
"Finally!" Catchings said. "I've been waiting for this for eight years. I don't want to get too excited; I want to finish it off."

The Fever, who were eliminated by the Shock the last three seasons, advanced to the finals to meet either Phoenix or Los Angeles.

The Fever and their Bankers Life Fieldhouse crowd, listed at 18,165 after Pacers president Larry Bird bought the entire balcony and gave the tickets away, roared at the finish.
Tammy Sutton-Brown led the Fever with 17 points. Katie Douglas scored 14, and Ebony Hoffman and Catchings added 10 apiece. Catchings also had eight rebounds, five assists and three steals.
The Fever made their last 16 free throws, all in the fourth quarter.
Deanna Nolan had 16 points for Detroit. Alexis Hornbuckle scored 15 before fouling out with 18 seconds to play. Cheryl Ford finished with 12 points and 11 rebounds.
Hornbuckle drove the lane for a layup, trimming the deficit to $68-67$ with 19 seconds left. Hornbuckle fouled Hoffman on the ensuing inbounds pass, and she swished both free throws for another three-point margin.
Nolan missed a 3 -pointer, and the ball went to the Fever after it was tipped out of bounds. Nolan fouled Douglas on the inbounds pass, and she swished both free throws for the final margin with 8.5 seconds left. Nolan missed a 3 -pointer and Catchings grabbed an emphatic rebound as time expired.
With Catchings guarding Nolan, the Shock missed four of their last five shots.
The Fever scored the last seven points of the first quarter and the first two of the second to build a 28-21 lead. But Nolan hit back-to-back 3-pointers to fuel a 12-0 run by the Shock that put the visitors ahead $33-28$ with six minutes to play in the period.


## 2009 WNBA Finals

## Game 1 - Phoenix 120, Indiana 116 (OT)

PHOENIX (AP) - The WNBA finals was supposed to feature Phoenix's offense against Indiana's defense. After one game, it was all offense.
Cappie Pondexter missed a game-winning tip-in at the fourth-quarter buzzer then scored seven of her 23 points in overtime to help the Mercury beat the visiting Fever 120-116 in the highest-scoring game in WNBA history.
"If you didn't like women's basketball," Phoenix coach Corey Gaines said, "I think you do now."
Pondexter, frustrated and in foul trouble in the first half, scored the final five points to close out Game 1 of the best-of-five series. Penny Taylor scored 23 points and newly crowned league MVP Diana Taurasi had 22 for Phoenix.
Katie Douglas tied it with a 3 -pointer for Indiana with 7.1 seconds left in regulation, then scored eight in overtime for the Fever to reach a career playoff high 30 points. Ebony Hoffman had a career-high 27 on 12 of 14 shooting as the Fever set a franchise scoring record in just the second 100-point game in the club's history.
The Fever, though, are supposed to be built on defense. Did Indiana coach Lin Dunn think her team had that much offense in it?
"Sure I did," she said. "When the ball goes in we're really good."
Indiana's Tamika Catchings had just eight points before fouling out with 2:42 left in overtime but harassed Taurasi into a 5 of 17 shooting night.
Rookie DeWanna Bonner's two free throws put Phoenix ahead 105-102 with 14.2 seconds left in regulation, then after a timeout, the Fever got the ball to the open Douglas, who sank the 3 that tied it.
The Mercury pushed downcourt, where Bonner missed a driving layup, but Pondexter went up for the uncontested tip-in. Her shot bounced off the rim to send the game into overtime.
The lead changed hands six times in overtime. Douglas' 15 -footer gave Indiana its final lead at 116-115 with 1:40 left. Pondexter scored on a drive to put the Mercury ahead 117-116 with $1: 27$ to go, then sank a 16 -footer with 20.2 seconds to go to make it 119116. She finally finished off the Fever by making one of two free throws with 3 seconds to play.

## Game 2 - Indiana 93, Phoenix 84

PHOENIX (AP) - The Tamika Catchings-Diana Taurasi matchup is at the heart of these WNBA Finals. Give Game 2 to Catchings, on offense AND defense.
The Indiana star fell one rebound shy of the first triple-double in WNBA finals history and the Fever beat the Phoenix Mercury 93-84 to square the best-of-five series 1-1.
After scoring just eight points and fouling out in Game 1, Catchings had 19 points, 11 assists (tying a finals record) and nine rebounds to help the Fever steal home-court advantage in the series with the next two games in Indianapolis.
The WNBA defensive player of the year for the third time, Catchings also harassed the league MVP Taurasi into a 7 -for- 22 shooting night. Taurasi finished with 20 points, going 2 of 10 on 3 -pointers.
There hasn't been a triple-double in any WNBA game since 2005 and it's happened only once in the playoffs. When Catchings, runner-up to Taurasi in the MVP voting, needed only two rebounds in the final six-plus minutes, it looked as if she would get there. But her ninth didn't come until there was just 28 seconds to play.
The cold-shooting Mercury were without supersub Penny Taylor most of the second half. The Aussie, who scored all 14 of her points in the first half, took an elbow from Indiana rookie Briann January and left with a cut lip with $3: 33$ to play in the third quarter.

January, a standout at nearby Arizona State, finished with 16 points on 5 -of-7 shooting, 3 of 4 on 3 -pointers.
The Mercury struggled on offense two nights after a 120-116 overtime victory in Game 1 , the highest-scoring contest in WNBA history. Phoenix shot 39.7 percent for the game and was just 5 of 20 in the third quarter, when the Fever built a 17 -point lead.
Catchings led six Indiana players in double figures. Ebony Hoffman scored 16. Katie Douglas and Tammy Sutton-Brown each scored 14, and Jessica Davenport had 10.
Temeka Johnson had 14 for Phoenix. Pondexter shot 5 of $16-0$ of 4 on 3 s - en route to 12 points. Tangela Smith also scored 12 for the Mercury.
The Fever, in their first WNBA finals, took control with a 12-2 run, going up 71-55 after Catchings made two free throws with $21 / 2$ minutes left in the third quarter. Davenport scored the first five points of the run.
A late 14-5 run cut the Fever's lead to $85-80$ on Taurasi's layup with $1: 23$ to play. But Sutton-Brown responded with a basket inside, then January and Douglas put the game away with free throws.

## Game 3 - Indiana 86, Phoenix 85

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Ebony Hoffman's two big plays put the Indiana Fever one wir away from their first WNBA title, She hit the jumper that gave her team a one-point leac with 57 seconds left, then blocked Tangela Smith's shot with a second remaining to helf Indiana defeat Phoenix 86-85 in Game 3 of the finals. The Fever took a 2-1 lead in the series and can clinch the championship with a win at home in Game 4.
Indiana forward Tamika Catchings said Hoffman has been a force since going througr a slump at the end of the regular season.
"In the playoffs, she's stepped up her game and done such big things, especially in the Phoenix series, playing unbelievable, out of her mind, " Catchings said. "That's awesome to see that, especially with the hard work she's put in over the years."
Hoffman, who led Indiana with 18 points, did it all with a sprained right shoulder. She left the game with $7: 21$ left and returned with $3: 40$ to play.
Catchings had 14 points, 12 rebounds and seven assists, Briann January scored 17 points, and Katie Douglas had 15.
Cappie Pondexter led Phoenix with 23 points and Le'coe Wiilingham added 17. Diana Taurasi, the league's MVP, scored 18 points but shot 6 -for-16 from the field.

## The lead seesawed throughout the fourth quarter

Hoffman's long shot from the left corner put Indiana ahead in the final minute. The officials reviewed it to determine if she was behind the arc and concluded it was a 2 . pointer, giving Indiana an 86-85 lead.
Pondexter rushed downcourt and missed a layup, and Catchings rebounded. Ther Indiana missed twice in close, but got the offensive rebound. January dribbled the bal out of bounds with 22 seconds left, though, to give Phoenix a final chance.
Phoenix wasn't looking for Smith on the play. "It was designed for Penny (Taylor),' Pondexter said. "I think I overthrew the pass and it ended up in Tangela's hands Tangela got a decent look, and Ebony blocked the shot. We had numerous chances tc get a good-looking shot. We didn't execute. Sometimes, that happens."
There were seven lead changes and three ties in the second half.
The series has been tight throughout, with Phoenix winning Game 1 in overtime anc Indiana taking Game 2, 93-84.

## Game 4 - Phoenix 90, Indiana 77

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The high-scoring Phoenix Mercury saved their season with defense. The Indiana Fever led the WNBA finals series 2-1 and had a chance to clinch their first title in front of an active sellout crowd that included local celebrities such as Indianapolis Colts players Peyton Manning and Reggie Wayne. None of that mattered as the Mercury beat the Fever 90-77 to tie the series and force Game 5 in Phoenix.
Indiana shot 2-for 13 in the fourth quarter, stifling any chance it had of overcoming the $72-65$ deficit it faced going into the period. The Fever scored 12 points in the quarter, the third-lowest total in a fourth quarter in finals history.
While Phoenix defended well, Indiana's stagnant offense helped. Tamika Catchings led Indiana with 24 points and 12 rebounds. She shot 11 -for-17 and Ebony Hoffman scored 17 points on 7 -for- 10 shooting. The rest of the team shot 11 -for- 44 .
All-Star Katie Douglas, who was hoping to celebrate a clinching win in her hometown, scored seven points on 2 -for- 14 shooting.
Indiana's bench, which both coaches had said was the reason the Fever were leading the series, struggled on Wednesday. The Fever bench shot a combined 2-for-16 from the field.
Indiana rookie reserve Briann January, whose quickness had been a matchup nightmare for the Mercury, shot 1 -for- 9 and finished with eight points.
Phoenix's offense was in tune as usual. Cappie Pondexter scored 22 points, Penny Taylor added 17 points and Taurasi and Smith each scored 16.
Phoenix shot 72 percent from the field in the first quarter to jump out to a 33-22 lead. The Fever held the Mercury to 16 points in the second quarter and cut their deficit to 49 47 at the half.
Indiana tied the score at 59 on a layup by Catchings with $4: 30$ left in the third quarter, but Phoenix went on a quick $6-0$ run to force a timeout and put the fans, who had been standing in anticipation of a Fever lead, back in their seats. The Mercury extended their lead to $72-65$ at the end of the third quarter.
Indiana trimmed its deficit to 72-68 on a steal and layup by Catchings, but the Fever went cold and the Mercury pulled away with a 12-2 spurt. A 3-pointer by Taylor made it $84-70$ with $2: 33$ to go.

## 2009 WNBA Finals

## Game 5 - Phoenix 94, Indiana 86

PHOENIX (AP) - The Phoenix Mercury held off a late rally by the tenacious Indiana Fever for a 94-86 victory in a deciding Game 5.
League and finals MVP Diana Taurasi scored 26 points, Pondexter had 24, and Taylor made two crucial free throws with 37.7 seconds left for the Mercury, who won the last two games to take the intense series 3-2.
Tammy Sutton-Brown scored 22 points, and Jessica Davenport had a career-high 18 for Indiana in its first finals appearance. Tamika Catchings added 16 points and nine rebounds for the Fever.
Sutton-Brown pointed to the crucial home loss in Game 4.
"We had an opportunity to close it out at home, and we let that one slip away," she said, "but I think we came out and fought hard tonight. Phoenix is a great team. I think it was a great series. It was great for the WNBA."
Indiana rallied from 10 down in the second half to tie it at 80 on Sutton-Brown's layup with $4: 29$ to play, then Tangela Smith made two 3-pointers, her only field goals of the night, to put the Mercury ahead for good.
Her second, after Davenport scored for Indiana, put Phoenix ahead 86-82 with $3: 34$ to go.
Pondexter's 9 -footer made it 88-82 with $2: 22$ left, but the Fever - who had led the series 2-1 - weren't finished. Davenport's inside basket cut it to $88-84$, then Catchings' rebound basket made it 88-86 with 2:07 to play.
On the Mercury's next possession, Taylor took the ball and drove the lane into a crowd of defenders. Davenport was called for the foul, and Taylor's two free throws made it $90-$ 86. Two free throws apiece by DeWanna Bonner and Taurasi provided the final margin.

Taylor added 14 points and Bonner 13 for Phoenix. Katie Douglas had her second straight rough shooting night. The Indiana star was 4 of 14 for 13 points after going 2 of 14 in Game 4. The Mercury made 10 of 17 3s.
After a cold-shooting first quarter, the Mercury turned it on with one of their best 10 minutes of the season, shooting a finals record 76.5 percent (13 of 17) - and they even missed their last two shots - in a second-quarter blitz.

Phoenix also set a finals second-quarter record for points, outscoring Indiana 35-19 to take a 51-42 lead at the break.

Taurasi, after struggling with her shot against Catchings' defense in the first four games, was 5 for 5 in a 13 -point second quarter, three of them 3-pointers.

## Game 1 - New York 85, Indiana 73

NEW YORK (AP) - Cappie Pondexter scored 23 of her 28 points in the first half, Essence Carson scored nine of her 17 in a big fourth-quarter run and the New York Liberty beat the Indiana Fever 85-73 in the opening game of their Eastern Conference semifinals series.
Taj McWilliams-Franklin had 15 points and 10 rebounds, and Nicole Powell added 13 points for the Liberty, who closed the regular season with 15 wins in 18 games after the All-Star break.
Tamika Catchings scored 18 points, Ebony Hoffman had 13 and Tammy Sutton-Brown added 10 for the Fever, who were in first place heading into the final week but lost their last three and finished one game behind Washington and New York.
Pondexter topped the Liberty's previous postseason record of 24 points, set by Tari Phillips against Houston in Game 1 of the WNBA finals on Aug. 24, 2000. Pondexter tied the team's playoff record for 3-pointers, set by Vickie Johnson on Aug. 24, 2002, in Game 2 of the conference finals against Washington.

Powell's jumper with $2: 15$ left in the third quarter gave the Liberty the lead for good as they closed the period with a 9-2 run to take a 66-59 advantage heading to the fourth. The Liberty outscored Indiana 17-12 in the quarter and outshot the Fever 40 percent (8 for 20) to 31 percent (4 for 13).
Carson had nine points in a 17-2 spurt that extended New York's lead to 83-63 - its biggest of the game - with 2:40 left.
Hoffman's 3-pointer 14 seconds later - the Fever's third field goal of the fourth quarter ended their scoring drought of $4: 39$.

Indiana shot 53 percent (17 for 32) in the first half, but just 30 percent ( 9 for 30 ) over the final 20 minutes.

The Fever opened the second quarter with an 11-2 run to take a $33-23$ lead on Catchings' layup with $7: 40$ to go in the first half.
The Liberty scored the next seven points, pulling within four on Pondexter's 3 about a minute later. She hit another 3 and Carson had a layup cut the deficit $38-36$ with about 4 $1 / 2$ minutes to go in the second quarter.
Pondexter's fifth 3 of the game tied the score at 43-all with 2:05 to go in the half.
Mitchell made two free throws with less than a second left to give New York a 48-47 lead at the break.

## Game 2 - Indiana 75, New York 67

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - After picking up some individual awards earlier in the day Tamika Catchings led the Indiana Fever to a big win.
Catchings started the day by being selected the WNBA's defensive player of the yea and earning the league's sportsmanship award, and then was picked for the all defensive team.
She ended it with a 17-point, 13-rebound effort to help the Fever beat the New Yorh Liberty 75-67 to tie their best-of-three Eastern Conference semifinal series.
Catchings had her 14th double-double in 30 career playoff games to help the Fevel fight off elimination and earn one more chance to defend their Eastern Conference crown.

Tammy Sutton-Brown scored 14 points and former Liberty player Jessica Davenpor had 10 points and eight rebounds for the Fever.
Carson scored 10 of her 12 first-half points in the second quarter to give New York's offense a boost, but Indiana still led 39-27 at the break.

## Game 3 - New York 77, Indiana 74

## Game 2 - New York 87, Indiana 72

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) After losing the opener of their playoff series against Indiana, the New York Liberty relied on their strength in Game 2: their defense.
Nicole Powell scored 19 points, Plenette Pierson had 15 and the Liberty beat the Fevel 87-72 Saturday to even the best-of-three Eastern Conference semifinals.
Cappie Pondexter scored 14, Essence Carson had 12 and Kia Vaughn 10 for NeM York, which had 11 steals, blocked five shots, and scored 28 points off Indiana's $1 \varepsilon$ turnovers.

## 2011 Eastern Conference Semifinals

## Game 3 - Indiana 72, New York 62

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Katie Douglas dominated her matchup with Cappie Pondexter.
More than anything else, that was why the Indiana Fever clinched their Eastern Conference semifinal series with a $72-62$ win over the New York Liberty on Monday. The Fever advanced to host Atlanta on Thursday in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference Finals.
Douglas handled Pondexter on both ends of the floor. The Fever guard scored 21 points in Game 3, just under her average of 22 points in the series. She also helped hold Pondexter, one of the league's top scorers, to 11 points on 4 -for- 14 shooting.
Pondexter shot 15 -for-44 in the series. Indiana coach Lin Dunn praised Douglas' effort.
Douglas' size and smarts were the key elements that forced the explosive Pondexter into numerous bad shots or prevented her from getting the ball at all.
Pondexter had been a thorn in the Fever's side the past two years. She averaged 20.8 points in the 2009 WNBA finals and led Phoenix to a $3-2$ win. She went to New York and averaged 27.3 points last year in the East semifinals against Indiana, a 2-1 win for the Liberty.
Douglas got help from her teammates against Pondexter - five different players guarded her at some point during the game.
Indiana's Tamika Catchings, limited to two points on 1-for-8 shooting in Saturday's loss in Game 2, came back with an all-around effort that included 17 points, eight rebounds, four assists and three steals.
The Fever led $59-54$ with 4 minutes to play when Catchings took over. She hit a 3pointer, then scored on a putback on Indiana's next possession to push the lead to 10.
Indiana led 40-36 at halftime during a chippy affair that saw Powell and Catchings get called for double technicals.

The Fever opened the second half with an aggressive driving layup by Catchings and a baseline jumper by Phillips to take a 44-36 lead. New York went scoreless for the first 3 minutes of the second half, allowing Indiana to take a 49-36 lead.
New York closed the third quarter strong and cut Indiana's lead to 54-48. The Liberty got as close as three points in the fourth quarter, but the Fever responded with their traditional shutdown defense.

## Game 1 - Indiana 82, Atlanta 74

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) -.Tamika Catchings finished her special day the right way.
After being announced as the league's most valuable player earlier Thursday, she had 12 points and 13 rebounds to help the Indiana Fever defeat the Atlanta Dream 82-74 in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference finals.
Catchings sealed the win with one of her signature late-game gems. She stole the ball from Atlanta's Angel McCoughtry, then drove more than half the length of the court, spun through contact and made a behind-the-head layup off the backboard that gave the Fever a 74-66 lead.

It was the kind of play that has earned Catchings a rare level of respect from her peers.
McCoughtry, second in the league in scoring during the regular season, was held to 11 points - about 10.5 below her average. She played just 17 minutes and was in foul trouble throughout. Atlanta had swept the regular-season series with the Fever 4-0, and McCoughtry averaged nearly 24 points in those games.
McCoughtry had words for the officials as the game ended, and Atlanta coach Marynell Meadors wasn't happy with them, either.
Lindsey Harding scored 17 points for Atlanta, but she shot 1 for 5 from the field in the final 10 minutes with Indiana's Shavonte Zellous guarding her.
Lyttle scored 14 points, Armintie Price had 13 and Erika DeSouza had eight points and 13 rebounds for the Dream.
Catchings' late-game heroics were possible, in part, because of Smith's performance. She made 5 of 7 3-pointers and had nine rebounds and four blocks. She didn't score more than 16 points in any regular-season game this year.
Indiana balanced Smith's outside shooting with an aggressive approach. The Fever made 23 of 27 free throws while Atlanta made just 9 of 17.
The score was tied at 57 at the end of the third quarter.
McCoughtry was called for a charge with 5:35 left, her fith foul of the game and the third time Catchings drew a charge from her. Moments after McCoughtry went to the bench, Smith made another 3 to put the Fever ahead $68-62$ midway through the fourth quarter.

Castro Marques said she had the option to join de Souza on Brazil's national team.
Castro Marques had 13 points in the third quarter, filling the scoring void left by the loss of de Souza, who was averaging 12 points and 10.7 rebounds in the playoffs.
Douglas joked that it's not to late for Castro Marques to join de Souza.
Atlanta never trailed, but Indiana closed to 57-55 early in the second half. The Dream answered with a 12-2 run capped by McCoughtry's three-point play.

The Dream stretched the lead to 85-69, when Bales made a jump shot over Catchings, who took a few steps and then collapsed to the floor.
McCoughtry, held to 11 points while limited by foul trouble in the opening game, regrouped with 13 points in the first period. McCoughtry had four points in a 10-0 run late in the period to push the Dream's lead to 34-23.

## Game 1 - Atlanta 75, Indiana 66

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The Atlanta Dream knew they wanted to get off to a fast start in their playoff opener against the Indiana Fever.

Lindsey Harding scored 23 points to help the Dream take a double-digit lead in the first quarter and they went on to a 75-66 win over the Fever in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference semifinals on Friday pight.
Atlanta led 25-15 after one quarter and was up 13 heading to the fourth,
"We definitely wanted to punch first." Harding said. "This is a team that usually has very good first and third quarters with running. We knew that we had to not just match it, but overpower (them).
WNBA scoring leader Angel McCoughtry added 16 points and nine rebounds for Atlanta, which beat Indiana in three games in the East finals a year ago. The Dream, who reached the WNBA Finals each of the last two years, opened the playoffs with a road win for the third straight year.
The Dream scored 44 points inside against the Fever, only the second time in franchise history Indiana has given up 40 in the paint. Atlanta also had 14 steals, one short of the playoff record by a Fever opponent - set by the Dream last year.
Katie Douglas scored 13 points and Tamika Catchings had 10 points and 11 rebounds - her 19th career playoff double-double-for the Fever Indiana led just once, at 2-0.

The Dream led by nine at the break as they scored 11 points off 11 Indiana tumovers in the first half. Atlanta also had a 26-16 rebounding edge in the first 20 minutes and finished with a $40-29$ advantage.
Indiana went on a 13-0 run late in the fourth quarter to pull within three with 136 to go. However, the Dream responded with an 8-2 run that included a 3-pointer and three free throws by Harding a steal and layup by rookie Tiffany Hayes to seal the win
The Fever was the top 3-point shooting team during the regular season at 40 percent but finished 3 for 13 against the Dream Catchings and Douglas shot a combined 6 for 23 from the field.
Catchings received her record-iifth WNBA Defenslve Player of the Year aw ard before the game.
Starting guards Briann January and Shavonte Zellous retumed to the Fever lineup after missing the last three games of the regular season due to concussion-like symptons. January was hit in the chest with an errant elbow from McCoughtry just before haliftime. She returned at the 6:26 mark of the fourth quarter.


## 2012 Eastern Conference Semifinals Game 2 - Indiana 103, Atlanta 88

ATLANTA (AP) - After losing the opener of the Eastem Conference semifinals at nome against Atlanta, the Indiana Fever were determined to return the favor,
Tamika Catchings had 25 points and 13 rebounds, Briann January scored 24 points and the Fever beat the Dream 103-88 in Game 2 to even the series.
"I can't say enough about Catchings and January," Indiana coach Lin Dunn said. "They just willed this tearn to come back from the loss Friday night. Now we're even."
January scored 11 points in the third quarter to help Indiana extend a two-point halftime lead and Catchings had 18 in the fourth - one short of the W/NBA record for a quarter.
The deciding Game 3 will be Tuesday in Indianapolis, where the Dream eliminated the Fever in Game 3 of the East finals a year ago. Indiana, which was 13-4 at home this season, won the previous four postseason games at home before losing the last two.
The Fever, who lost the series opener 73-66 in Indianapolis, outscored Atlanta 31-20 in the third quarter to pull away from a 47-45 lead at the break. Larkins, who got her first career start in the playoffs, had eight points in the quarter to back January.
The Drearn scored 10 straight points to cut pull to 82-75 early in the fourth. However, Catchings hit back-to-back 3 -pointers and then cut through the defense for a layup as the Fever regained control.
Catchings made five of six shots in the fourth quatter after making just one of her first 11 shots from the floor
Erlana Larkins had 16 points, Shavonte Zellous added 15, Tammy Sutton-Brown 11 and Erin Phillips 10 as the Fever had six players in double figures for the first time this season. Indiana shot 53 percent from the field and had a $36-32$ edge on the boards after being out-rebounded in the first garne.
Angel McCoughtry scored 22 points to lead Atlanta. Lindsey Harding added 17 and Sancho Lyttle 15.
Catchings, who had missed her first seven shots, hit a 3 with 1.8 seconds left in second quarter to give Indiana the halftime lead.
After starting 1 for 8 and falling behind 14-6, Indiana made six straight shots. But Ketia Swanier banked in a 30 -footer at the buzzer to give Atlanta a 24-22 lead at the end of the first quarter. McCoughtry and Lyttle each scored 11 points in the first half for the Drearn, who shot 41 percent
A total of 50 fouls were called in the game. The Fever finished 28 for 41 while the Drearn were 25 for 28

## 2012 Eastem Conference Semifinals Game 3 - Indiana 75, Atlanta 64

INDIANAFOLIS - One of the last players to make the Indiana Fever roster in May has developed into one of the team's toughest and most reliable players in September and October.

Erlana Larkins, who wasn't part of a WNBA mster for two seasons before signing with Indiana in 2012, is known as "Larkins the lion" among her teammates. Tuesday night, she showed why, battling her way to 20 rebounds and 16 points as the Fever defeated visiting Atlanta, $75-64$, and closed out the Dream in the third game of their best-of-three series in the Eastern Conference semifinals.
Indiana advanced to the conference finals for the fifth time in eight seasons
Larkins' 20 rebounds tied Indiana's playoff record, set by Tamika Catchings in a tripleovertime loss at connecticut in 2006. It also tied for second-most in league postseason histary behind the 23 grabbed by Detroit's Cheryl Ford in 2007.
"People can score 30 points a game. But getting 20 rebounds, that's better than anything, I think," Fever guard Erin Phillips said about Larkins. "It's relentlessness. It's sacrificing your body, your energy, your effort to go for the rebounds and get extra possessions for the team,"

Fever Coach Lin Dunn moved Larkins into the starting lineup after a series-opening loss to Atlanta and the 6-foot-1 forward responded. She collected 16 points and seven rebounds in the second game at Atlanta. In Game 3, she moved into the limelight.

Larkins had the first double-double of her career by the second quarter
Katie Douglas scored 24 to lead Indiana. Her big game at Bankers Life Fieldhouse came after struggling in the Fever's Game 2 victory at Atlanta, getting just three points on 1-of-6 shooting. In Game 3, Atlanta slightly altered its defense, ylelding Douglas some open opportunities. She capitalized, hitting 9-of-19 shots from the field, including 3-pf-6 from 3-point range
Catchings and Briann January each contributed 16 points. January had seven points and an assist in the fourth quarter when the Fever applied the knockout punch. Catchings gamered four points and six rebounds in the quarter
Using a 10-0 run, Indiana bolted to a 16 -point bulge at $75-59$ with 1:07 remaining.
A long 3-pointer by Atlanta's Angel McCoughtry tied the game at 39-all just before halftime. McCoughtry, the WNBA's leading scorer in the regular season, finished with 16 points. She hit only $1-0 f-9$ shots in the second half and was whistled for a technical foul when she slapped the ball aw ay from January during a stoppage in play.

UNCASVILLE, Conn. (AP) - A pair of Olympians took control on both ends of the court in the second half to help the Connecticut Sun pull away from Indiana in the opene of the Eastem Conference finals.
Tina Charles scored 18 points, grabbed 15 rebounds and blacked four shots to leac Connecticut to the 76-64 win. Meanwhile, Asjha Jones played lock-down defense or Tamika Catchings, holding the Fever's star to just two field goals and seven points.
Charles, the WNBA's MVP, had just four first-half points but came alive in the thir quarter, scoring 10 points and grabbing six rebounds as the Sun broke open a 30-30 game.

She brought the crowd into the contest with an offensive rebound, putback and free throw to highlight a 14-2 run that gave the Sun control Connecticut led 54-43 after three quarters and by as many as 16 in the fourth
Kara Laws on had 16 points and Tan White added 13 for the Sun, who swept New York in the opening round and won for the eighth time in nine games

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - Indiana lost a star early in Game 3 of the Eastern Conference finals. The Fever never lost their confidence. Tamika Catchings scored 22 points and grabbed 13 rebounds to lead the Fever into the WNBA Finals for the second time in four seasons with an 87-71 win over the Connecticut Sun.

The Fever, who won their fourth game while facing elimination during the playoffs, routed the Sun even after leading scorer Katie Douglas went down with an ankle injury just 5 minutes into the game.
"When Katie went down, you could just see the fire in everybody's eyes," coach Lin Dunn said. "We just took it to a whole nother level We could have folded up our little tent and gone home when one of our bigguns got hurt. But we didn't."
Douglas had been the team's leading scorer in the playofts, and had 51 points in the first two games of this series. The bench picked up the slack with 32 points, led by Erin Philips who had 15. The Fever hit 10 3-pointers, including their first seven.

League MVP Tina Charles led the Sun with 18 points and 10 rebounds. Kara Lawson added 16 points.

The Fever were up 9-4 when Douglas missed a driving off-balance jumper in the lane came down on the foot of the Sun's Tan White and rolled her left ankle. She was taken to a hospital for X -Rays
But Indiana only expanded its lead. Phillips had 10 first-half points, and hit three of her four 3-point shots Indiana led 18-10 after the first quaiter, and used a $12-0$ run to stretch that to 32-16.

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) The Minnesota Lynx entered the WNBA Finals with a banner already nanging in Target Center and a loaded roster that had visions of becoming the league's next dynasty.
Erlana Larkins had 16 points and 15 rebounds and the Fever stunned defending champion Minnesota with a 76-70 victory over the Lynx in Game 1 on Sunday night.
"We've made it to this point, what's there to fear?" Larkins said. "We know they're the defending champions and they're going to bring their 'A' game. ... So what, they're the defending champs? We're here to take one."

Tamika Catchings scored 20 points for the Fever, who played without leading scorer Katie Douglas because of a sprained left ankle. They scored 15 points off of 17 Minnesota turnovers and outscored the Lynx $38-24$ in the paint to become just the second visiting team this season to win at Target Center. Briann January added 11 points and six assists and Erin Phillips scored 13 for Indiana.
Seimone Augustus scored 23 points and Rebekkah Brunson added 10 points and 10 rebounds for the Lynx, who are looking to become the WNBA's first repeat champion in 10 years

Maya Moore had 14 points and 10 boards but made just 4 of 14 shots and Lindsay Whalen managed 12 points on 4 -for- 12 shooting. Now they've lost homecourt and trail in a series for the first time since their title run started last year.
Indiana led by 10 in the second quarter and withstood a furious opening to the second half by the Lynx. Minnesota looked to be taking control with an 8-0 run midway through the third that gave them a 54-50 lead and put the Fever on their heels.

They were just as strong in the finals opener early, using superior ball movement to find wide open shots on the perimeter and cutters to the basket for easylayups. Indiana opened up a 10-point lead in the second quarter and some hard-nosed play had the Lynx flustered.
Catchings leveled guard Monica Wright with a screen and Augustus picked up a technical foul after Wright was called for a foul on the play
"We are not here to just be in the finals," Catchings said, "We are here for a great opportunity, and both teams, we both want it bad So every game is going to be just like this game It's going to be tough, it's going to be hard-nosed."

The 6 -foot-1, 205-pound center bullied her way around the paint all night, out-muscling the Lynx frontcourt for position and keeping possessions alive grit and hustle. Her putback with 3:20 to play gave the Fever a 72-62 lead, and now the Fever have the view from the driver's seat for the first time this postseason as they go for their first title.

## Game 2 - Minnesota 83, Indiana 71

MINNEAPOLIS (AP) These W/NBA Finals are not for the feeble, Seimone Augustus and the Minnesota Lynx toughened up after a rare loss and a soft performance at home in the opener by wearing down the Indiana Fever.
Maya Moore pitched in 23 points and the defending champion Lynx forced the Fever intc 24 turnovers, 15 after halftime. Tamika Catchings led the way as usual with 27 points and eight rebounds, but the Fever's defense faded after a dom inant start that forced the Lynx to miss 11 of their first 14 shots.
They let the Lynx score 29 points in the third quarter and bring an already-loud crowe into the game even more. Catchings offered an alternate theory, though.
"Seimone Augustus went against us. That's what happened," she said.
Lynx reserve guard Monica Wright had five steals, and coach Cheryl Reeve said she changed the game with her defensive intensity. Inside, Rebekkah Brunson and Ta McWiiliams-Franklin limited Erlana Larkins to three points on 1 -for-6 shooting. She hat 16 points and 15 rebounds in the opener. Indiana's play did the talking on Friday. The Fever's lead of $70-33$ with 1:58 left in the third quarter was the largest lead by any team in WNBA Finals history. The extent of the blowout left Reeve seated with her hand on her chin for much of the second half.

## Game 4 - Indiana 87, Minnesota 78

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) The Indiana Fever made it their mission to get Tamika Catchings a WNBA championship
"When you come into this league, your goal and dream is to win a WNBA championship," said Catchings. "Twelve years later it's so sweet right now."
Phillips had 18 points and eight rebounds, while Shavonte Zellous and Briann January each had 15 points
Indiana led 63-58 at the end of the third quarter. Minnesota cut Indiana's lead to 70-67 on a jumper by Maya Moore, but Phillips scored on a drive past Moore, got a defensive rebound, then found Zellous for a 3-pointer from the left comer to give the Fever a $75-67$ lead with $4: 58$ remaining.
Indiana led by at least five points the rest of the way. A 3-pointer by danuary gave Indiana an 80-72 lead with $1: 18$ to play. Reeve was called for a technical with 57.6 seconds remaining, Catchings made the free throw and the Fever took an 81-74 lead. Zellous made two more free throws with 27.2 seconds to play, and Fever fans began celebrating.

Seimone Augustus, Minnesota's leading scorer in the playoffs, was held to eight points on 3 -for-21 shooting. She shot 6 -for-30 in the final two games of the series after the Fever switched January over to guard her
Whalen scored 22 points and Moore added 16 points for the Lynx, who were vying to become the first team to win consecutive titles since Los Angeles in 2001 and 2002.
Moore picked up her third foul with $6: 13$ left in the second quarter. Reeve, who was fined for her jacket-tossing tantrum in Game 2, became animated again while disagreeing with the call. As the crowd erupted, Reeve waved hello and made the motion for a technical foul.

This time, Reeve's antics didn't help much as in Game 2, when her team pulled away from a tight contest for a convincing win. Minnesota tied the game three times in the second quarter, but the Fever closed with a 7-2 run, including a 3-pointer by Phillips, to take a 47-42 lead at halftime. Whalen scored 14 points in the first half to keep the Lynx in the game, often scoring on uncontested drives. Minnesota hung tough, despite Augustus shooting 2 for 13 in the first half.
"Coming into halftime, we said we have 20 minutes and we're not trying to go back to Minnesota to close this thing out," Zellous șaid.
Indiana started the second half on a 9-4 run, including bwo buckets by Catchings, to take a. 56-46 lead

## 2013 Eastern Conference Semifinals Game 1 - Indiana 85, Chicago 72

ROSEMONT, II. (AP) The defending champion Indiana Fever had a losing record while struggling through an injury-plagued season, were without one of their best players, and their offense was among the worst in the WNBA.
Shavonte Zellous scored 20 points to lead the Fever in an $85-72$ victory over the Chicago Sky in the opener of their Eastern Conference semifinal series. Briann January and Karima Christmas had 16 points each, Erlana Larkins added 12 points and 11 rebounds, and Tamika Catchings scored 11 points
Indiana was in control for most of the night against the conference's top seed, The Fever led 50-37 at haltitime and extended the advantange to 19 on Catchings' basket with $5: 36$ left in the third quarter. The Fever were without injured star Katie Douglas, who is day to day with a different back injury than the one that limited her to just four games during the season, but playing short-handed in big games is pretty much the norm for Indiana.
The Fever had the league's lowest shooting percentage at 39.8 , but made 51 percent of their shots. In the first half, Indiana shot 56.7 percent from the floor, including 66.7 percent on 3-pointers, and led by 13 at halftime.
For Chicago, it was a disappointing start to the franchise's first playoff appearance. In their eighth season, the Sky had a team-record 24 wins and led the East by seven games. How ever, they lost to Indiana for the fourth time in five meetings this year,
Elena Delle Donne scored 20 points to lead Chicago after receiving the league's Rookle of the Year award before the game. Epiphanny Prince had 19 points and Sylvia Fowles, selected as the Defensive Player of the Year, added 16 points and 10 rebounds.
None of that, however, helped Chicago earn its first playoff win.
"There were several defensive shortcomings," Chatman said. "When there's too many to remember you know it's been a tough night.
Delle Donne only scored four points after halftime, and said the Sky "weren't able to get into a flow."But much of that was because their defense struggled

"I'm looking at some areas of play where we were absolutely dominated," Sky coacr Pokey Chatman said, also mentioning rebounding. "It manifests itself in stagnating offensively"
Tamika Catchings had 18 points and 12 rebounds to lead the Fever - her 20th double double in 49 tareer playoff games. Catchings also moved into second on the league's all-time list for playoff rebounds. She is already the WNBA's leader in playoff free throws and steals and is third in scoring.
It was the first playoff series for the Sky franchise.
"They're going to be a team to deal with in the future," Dunn said
Chicago missed it first six shots from the field and still jumped out to a 6-3 lead thanks ti six free throws, but Catchings answered with a 6-0 run of her own that put Indiana aheac for good.
Elana Larkins added 14 points and 11 rebounds for the Fever, and Zellous, the WNBA" most improved player, scored 10.

Catchings, who had seven defensive rebounds, became the league's career leader in defensive rebounds in the playoffs.
She has 350 to surpass Lisa Leslie's mark. She trails Leslie's playoff record of 471 total rebounds by just 11 .
Catchings said they were hurt by the Drearn's small lineup.
"They rely on steals and turnovers, which sparks their offense," Catchings said. "We didn't do a good enough job moving the ball quickly. We didn't take the open shots and didn't drive the ball into the defense. But we'll be better come Sunday"
Trailing 56-53, the Dream went on a 9-0 run to close out the third quarter.
Hayes made a 3-pointer, McCoughtry had a running layup, Hayes scored on a layup and Alex Bentley made a jumper to close out the quarter strong for Atlanta.
Despite the Dream's third-quarter surge, they had a tough time pulling away from the Fever. Indiana stayed in the game with timely baskets from Catchings and a couple of 3pointers from Erin Phillips.

## 2013 Eastem Conference Finals <br> Game 2 - Atlanta 67, Indiana 53

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) Angel McCoughtry is back for another shot at her first WNBA title.
McCoughtry powered Atlanta to its third Eastem Conference crown in four years, scoring 27 points in the Dream's 67-53 victory over the indiana Fever. Atlanta swept the best-ofthree series and will face Western Conference champion Minnesota, which swept Phoenix.
The short-handed Fever were trying to become the first franchise to win consecutive titles since Los Angeles in 2001 and 2002. Tamika Catchings led Indiana with 24 points and six rebounds, but the Fever never got going offensively, shooting 28.1 percent. AllStar Shavonte Zellous was held to six points, nearly nine below her regular-season average.
McCoughtry willingly played a decoy role at times. Coach Fred Williams designed sets that had her run away from the ball. Those actions helped Atlanta dominate inside in Game 2 to the tune of 14 layups, 48 points in the paint and a 43 - 33 edge on the glass.
"Angel really sacrifices a lot to get our teammates open," Williams said. "When Angel cuts, that takes two (defenders) away. I'm going to slide somebody in there on the weak side. I compliment Angel for making that happen."
McCoughtry scored 11 points in the thind quarter to help the Dream break open a game they led $34-33$ at halftime. Riding suffocating defense, Atlanta cruised from there.
Indiana started the year 1-7 before finishing 16-18, lost former All-Star Katie Douglas for most of the season and all of the playoffs to a lower back injury and ultimately fell victim to fatigue.
"We had to overcome an enormous amount," Dunn said "For us to get this far was huge. This season to me was like a test of your character. We just want to reload our gun and have a few more bullets."
Atlanta center Erika de Souza added 12 points and eight rebounds; overcoming a right ankle injury sustained midway through the second quarter.

## 2014 Eastern Conference Semifinals Game 1 - Indiana 78, Washington 73

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - After struggling for nearly three full quarters, Tamika Catchings came through when the Indiana Fever needed her most.

Catchings scored 14 of her 22 points in the fourth quarter, including several clutch baskets down the stretch, to lead the Fever to a $78-73$ win over the Washington Mystics on Thursday night in Game 1 of the Eastern Conference semifinals.

Catchings, who endured a lengthy scoring drought from midway through the first quarter to midway through the third, also finished with 10 rebounds and seven steals.
"You have to bring more than just scoring. For me starting off the game slow, even though I wasn't hitting my shots, they were good shots," Catchings said. "Once I started getting more aggressive, we all started getting more aggressive."

Her clutch play late included a timely steal and several free throws that kept the Mystics at bay, preserving home-court advantage for the Fever in the best-of-three series. Game 2 is Saturday at Washington.

Behind runs of $10-0$ and $9-0$ in the second quarter, Washington erased a 10 -point first quarter deficit to take a $36-30$ halftime lead. The Mystics maintained their lead throughout the third quarter before Catchings regained her touch and the Fever turned up their intensity and urgency.

After watching the nip-and-tuck action for the first seven minutes of the final quarter, Catchngs took over. In the final three minutes of the game, Catchings scored eight points, including two free throws that helped seal the game for the Fever.

Her seven steals matched a WNBA playoff regulation record. She went 14 for 14 from the foul line, the second-best perfect foul shooting performance in league playoff history.

Catchings needs 21 points to become the league's all-time playoff scoring leader. Her 10 boards helped her pass Lisa Leslie as the WNBA's career leading rebounder in the postseason.
"The thing that's so special about her is that she's so multidimensional," Fever coach Lin Dunn said. "She's doing something everywhere. She's a once-in-a-lifetime player and I'm privileged and honored that l've gotten to coach her."

Ivory Latta scored 17 points to lead the Mystics. Emma Meesseman had 17 points and six rebounds, and Monique Currie added 11 points.
"We've got to give ourselves a chance," Thibault said. "If we can win on Saturday at home, who knows what happens on Monday (in a potential Game 3)."


## 2014 Eastern Conference Semifinals <br> Game 2 - Indiana 81, Washington 76 (OT)

WASHINGTON (AP) - Tamika Catchings again did just about everything for the Indiana Fever, except for praising herself following a record-breaking night against the Washington Mystics

Catchings had 26 points and 11 rebounds as the Fever beat the Washington Mystics 81-76 to sweep the best-of-three series and advance to the Eastern Conference finals

Catchings' 3 -pointer with 1:34 remaining in overtime put the Fever ahead for good, 75-74 With that basket, she surpassed Lisa Leslie as the WNBA's career leading scorer in the postseason.

In the 78-73 Game 1 win, Catchings had 22 points, 10 rebounds and seven steals. She also moved past Leslie to become the top career rebounder in the playoffs.
"It's a tribute to our organization and to the great players I've been able to play with along the way," the 13 -year veteran said of her records.

As the unassuming talk continued, Indiana coach Lin Dunn interrupted her star player.
"Let me elaborate because she's too modest," Dunn said. "I think the records she's set so far in the playoffs indicate to me that you may be watching one of the greatest players to ever play our game."

Kara Lawson scored a season-best 20 points for the Mystics, who led 62-57 with 3:57 remain ing in regulation. Including the regular season, Washington lost five of its final six games.
"It's never fun to lose in a playoff series especially when you have a chance to win," Mystics coach Mike Thibault said. "I guess I can say we got beat by a great Hall of Famer. (Tamika) was terrific.'

Briann January scored 13 for Indiana. Her two free throws with 19.7 second remaining in regulation tied it 66-66. Marissa Coleman and Karima Christmas both added 10 points.

The Fever offset poor shooting from the field by making 22 of 26 foul shots. Catchings, now with 514 career playoff points, sank 9 of 10 including four in the final 21 seconds after making all 14 of her attempts in Game 1.

Indiana held Washington's leading scorer Ivory Latta without a 3-point basket for the first time this season. Latta scored 12 points on 2 of 13 shooting, including seven attempts from beyond the arc.
"I thought everything we did tonight (defensively) was focused on Ivory Latta," said Dunn, who previously announced she will retire following this season.

Indiana won all three games in Washington this season. The Fever also swept the Mystics in 2009. Washington last won a playoff series in 2002.

Tianna Hawkins scored nine of her 13 points in the fourth quarter for the youthful Mystics.

## Game 1 - Indiana 77, Chicago 70

INDIANAPOLIS (AP) - The Indiana Fever had to have thoughts of the Chicago's historic comeback win four days ago in Atlanta.

But, unlike Tuesday night, Indiana fended off the late-charging Sky and held on to beat Chicago 77-70 on Saturday night in the opener of the Eastern Conference finals.

Indiana took a 60-48 lead into the fourth quarter, but the Sky stormed back with a 14-3 run to open the final period.
"We need a basket," Shevonte Zellous said. "Whether it was someone penetrating or a twopoint jump shot, we just needed a basket at a crucial time because Chicago had cut the lead to one."

It was a pair of 3-points that Zellous hit that give the Fever a 69-63 lead late in the fourth quarter. Indiana's separation on the scoreboard came when Chicago missed six straight shots following the fourth quarter surge. The Fever then made five trips to the free-throw line during the final 33 seconds, making 8 of 10 free throws.

Indiana shot nearly 43 percent from 3, while Chicago struggled making just 1 of 8 .
"The difference in the game was we got 3-point shooting tonight," Fever coach Lin Dunn said. "I though (Briann) January and Zellous and Maggie Lucas stepped up in crunch time, hit some really big 3 's for us."

January scored 19 points and Zellous added 18 for the Fever on a night when Tamika Catchings struggled to find a shooting rhythm for the Fever.
"It is not an individual sport, it is a team sport," Zellous said. "When (Catchings) was struggling, everybody played their part. The bench played really well tonight and that was one of our keys."

Catchings did finish with 10 points, six of which came from the free-throw line. Lucas led Indiana's reserves with eight points, including five straight on back-to-back possessions late in the third quarter.

Sylvia Fowles and Allie Quigley led Chicago's comeback effort with each scoring five points in the late game run. Fowles led the Sky with 20 points and 14 rebounds. Elena Delle Donne and Quigley added 14 apiece.
"I think we showed a lot of fight," Delle Donne said. "Indy was able to make some really clutch shots at the end."

Indiana trailed Chicago only in the first two minutes of the game.

Game 2 - Chicago 86, Indiana 84 (OT)
ROSEMONT, III. (AP) - Courtney Vandersloot and her Chicago Sky teammates would prefer to take the lead early on. Instead, they have been rallying from big deficits in the WNBA playoffs.

In their latest game, Sylvia Fowles scored 27 points to help the Sky overcome a 14-point deficit to outlast the Indiana Fever 86-84 in double-overtime on Monday, evening the best-of-3 Eastern Conference finals.

The Sky rallied from 14 points down in Game 1 before falling to the Fever 77-70. Chicago also beat Atlanta in the decisive Game 3 of the first round after trailing by 20 points.

Vandersloot had 18 points and Allie Quigley added 16 for the fourth-seeded Sky, who earned their first home playoff victory. Both of Chicago's victories in the first round against Atlanta came on the road.

All-Star Elena Delle Donne had just nine points on 4-for-11 shooting but her layup gave the Sky a four-point lead with 1:41 left in the second overtime. Chatman said Delle Donne dealt with tightness in her back.

Shavonte Zellous scored 20 points, Tamika Catchings had 16 and Erlana Larkins added 15 for the second-seeded Fever, the 2012 WNBA champions who are trying to reach the finals for the third time in six years.
"All they lack is playoff experience, and they're getting that now," Fever coach Lin Dunn said.
Though Fowles overcame early foul trouble and was dominant against a smaller team, backcourt play proved the difference for Chicago. While the Fever's guards won the matchup in Game 1, the Sky's guards triumphed in Game 2.
Indiana's Briann January had eight points after scoring 19 in Game 1. For Chicago, Quigley and Vandersloot combined for 34 points on 11 -for- 25 shooting and 10 assists.

Fowles picked up her third foul with 6:34 left before halftime. With Fowles out, the Fever extended their lead from six to 14 . She scored 21 points after halftime.
"She didn't melt on screens, she didn't disappear. She stayed aggressive," Chatman said. "We fed the monster. She was in beast mode in every aspect of it.'
The Sky went on a 10-0 run to pull within one in the third. Delle Donne hit a three with 6:15 left in regulation for the Sky's first lead since the first quarter.

Delle Donne's jumper rattled in and out with under 4 seconds left in regulation, but Tamera Young rebounded and scored to tie it with 1 second left.

In the first overtime, Catchings' jumper tied it at 79 with 58.1 seconds left. Fowles was called for an offensive foul about 9 seconds later. After a miss by Catchings, she stole the ball, but January missed a jumper before the buzzer.

In the second overtime, January made two free throws with 12.2 remaining to cut the lead to one before Fowles hit a free throw for the final margin with 8.8 seconds left. Zellous missed a jumper before time expired.


## 2014 Eastern Conference Finals <br> Game 3 - Chicago 75, Indiana 62

RDIANAPOLIS (AP) - With a trip to the WNBA Finals on the line, Allie Quigley came through when her Chicago Sky teammates needed her the most.

Quigley scored 24 points and hit several big shots to help lead the Sky to a $75-62$ victory over the Indiana Fever on Wednesday night in Game 3 of the Eastern Conference finals.

She had 10 of her points in a key second quarter stretch that gave Chicago the lead for good. And with the Fever still hanging on late in the fourth quarter, Quigley drained a 3-pointer and hit free throws that led to a Sky celebration on Indiana's home court, ending the coaching career of Hall of Fame Fever coach Lin Dunn.
"It came down to hitting shots in the moment, relishing the moment," said Quigley, who was the WNBA sixth woman of the year. "I just wanted to be aggressive and if it was going to be my night to be the big player, I was ready for it."

Now the Sky, who made the playoffs for the first time ever last season before getting knocked out by Indiana in the first round, will face Phoenix in the Finals.

Chicago dropped the first game in Indiana before winning the last two. Quigley said the Sky's game plan was simple for the decisive game - contain Tamika Catchings and avoid falling behind early. They succeeded on both accounts, limiting Catchings to nine points and using a pressuring defense from the outset to prevent Indiana from finding an early offensive flow - or any flow.

Indiana struggled to put together solid offensive stretches outside the one that put the Fever ahead 17-16 on a Marissa Coleman 3-pointer with 7:06 left before halftime. That was the Fever's only lead of the night, and they held it for just 14 seconds.

Executing the game plan early set the tone for the Sky. But Chicago wasn't overly impressive outside keeping Catchings at bay and riding its defense to a victory.

The Sky simply took advantage of 11 Indiana turnovers that they turned into 14 points, and they also capitalized on timely mental errors from the Fever.

On the final play of the first half, Courtney Vandersloot scored with 1.3 second to go on a layup in transition off an Indiana giveaway. That pushed Chicago's advantage to 37-29 at the break.

Chicago was able to maintain its lead in the third quarter, despite not having Elena Delle Donne on the floor for most of the period. She began getting attention from the Sky trainer with 5:15 left in the first half, and a lingering back injury sidelined her to begin the second half.
Even with Delle Donne on the bench, Indiana's struggles continued. Trailing 39-33, Briann January committed a foul that lead to two Tamera Young free throws with 4:09 left in the third, stalling the momentum Indiana appeared to be gaining.

## Queen of Indy sports putting final touches on legacy

This was a long time ago. She was a little girl then, trying to find a way to stop the other kids from making fun of her hearing aids and speech impediment. She could not wish away the impairment in both ears. She was born with that. But she could find a way to be respected. She could do things that lots of other girls did—but do them better.

So Tamika Catchings was off to the soccer field, the softball diamond, the volleyball game. Even the baritone section of the band. And the basketball court. Places where the scoreboard or musical instrument didn't care how well you could hearonly how well you could play. Just look at the little girl now: all grown up, a WNBA giant on the cusp of retirement, and the rest of her life.

Tamika Catchings is the queen of Indianapolis sports by every measure. Longevity, accomplishment, renown. The Indiana Fever will soon begin their 11th consecutive late summer in the WNBA playoffs, and Catchings has played in all of them, as constant a sight downtown as Monument Circle.

Fifteen years a pro, and every last second spent with one team in one city. Not many franchises-no matter sport or genderget a story a like that. The most senior Pacer at the moment is Paul George, starting his sixth season. When Catchings was drafted by the Fever in 2001, George was 10 years old.

She is the heart and soul of an organization. Few athletes can say that and truly really mean it.
"Her personality and the way she plays is what this franchise is really built on," Coach Stephanie White said. "When she's talking in the locker room, everyone listens because she doesn't just talk it, she walks it. Every single day."

At 36, Catchings is still leading the team in points, rebounds and steals. By the way, she's only two years younger than her coach. So this is a tale of how far work can take you. And perseverance.
"I can't imagine life," Catchings said, "without playing basketball."
Her love for the game? "It's never faded," she said. "But the body's gotten older. That's faded."
Nothing lasts forever, and this won't. The 2016 season is to be her last. The idea is to go out with her fourth Olympic gold medal, and another deep playoff run for the Fever, be it this year or next, or both.
"A championship run, how about that?," she said. "It would be a sweet ending to everything that we started."
She will leave with her name plastered all over the WNBA record book. No. 1 in career steals, No. 2 at the moment in points and rebounds, No. 7 in assists. All done as a transplanted Hoosier, who came from Tennessee as a four-time All-American in 2001, knowing only of Indiana, "They liked to play basketball on barns, and stuff like that."

That was OK with her. She is the daughter of NBA player Harvey Catchings. But she would learn that Indiana was something a bit more, and now you ask her what 15 years here have meant, and she has a list.
"Loyalty for one. And then just what this city has done for me and my family and my foundation. They literally wrapped their arms around me and embraced me."

There has not only been the WNBA legacy built in Indy, but the long overseas career in places such as Poland and Russia and Turkey and Korea. Not only the foundation work in her adopted hometown, but representing the U.S. State Department from Southeast Asia to the Middle East. Also, how many Hall of Fame athletes do you know with a master's degree?

If the masses of Indiana have not been paying attention to what she has done, maybe they should before it is too late. Treasures are so often not duly appreciated until they are gone.

The vision of her exit next summer is in her mind. A championship and gold medal won, she is standing, looking at the court that has been home for so long, with one final thought. "It has been a great ride."

And then what?
"I pray about that a lot," she said. "That I will figure out what I'm supposed to do next."
She doesn't want to coach. But there will still be her Catch the Stars Foundation, which helps empower children with programs that promote literacy, fitness and mentoring. There's her yearning for a front-office position in basketball.

And something else. She's engaged, with plans to marry next spring, which begs the question whether she is eager to start a family.
"Very. I've always dreamed about having kids. When I was young, I wanted to have five. Now that I'm older, we'll see what happens."

One day, she can tell those kids about all the years Mom spent in Indianapolis. All the points and rebounds and victories. But she'll want them to understand the records came from passion, and passion came from the fire of a little girl who wanted something different than the cards dealt.
"She was born with it," White said, "I saw her play in the seventh grade. We were playing in the same AAU tournament, and she had a lot less control over her emotions than she has now. I saw this girl throw the ball up in the stands because she was upset with herself for not making a play. She just has a passion that doesn't come along very often. It's a characteristic of her core values."

This time next year, there will be goodbyes to be said. Catchings has already decided how she wants Indiana-particularly the kids of Indiana-to remember her.
"I want them to see a little girl that had to fight a lot of adversity growing up, just like a lot of them have to, and never gave up. I think a lot of kids don't have that fire now. I want them to see a little girl that grew up with a dream, and nobody could tell her no. I'm going to fight until I get what I want, in a good way. And here I am."

## Indiana Fever thriving behind rookie coach Stephanie White

Tamika Catchings looks around Bankers Life Fieldhouse these days and sees a completely different world.
The 2011 league MVP is surrounded by new teammates, younger players and a familiar face playing an unfamiliar role. Yes, Stephanie White is calling the shots from the bench.

At times, the thought of playing for an ex-teammate makes Catchings chuckle, but the seamless transition White has made from WNBA player to broadcaster to assistant coach and now to successful head coach also has the 13-year veteran taking notes.
"It's fun to see her put her own twist on this team and the expectations she has," Catchings said. "I don't want to coach, but the steps she has taken to put herself in position to be successful, those are the things you take away from it and try to make your own."

White has surprised many by turning what was expected to be a rebuilding team into a playoff-bound team for a WNBArecord 11th consecutive season.

Sure, there were reasons to doubt White \& Co.
Four key players opened the season battling injuries. Longtime stalwarts such as Catchings and point guard Briann January tried to get acclimated to playing with newcomers such as Shenise Johnson and Natalie Achonwa. The 36-year-old Catchings had to accept spending more time on the bench, and everyone had to buy into White's revamped up-tempo style.

Even during a rugged start, White stayed true to her principles. The woman who left high school as the highest-scoring girl in Indiana history and who left Purdue with a national championship stuck to her plan. Now, she's in contention for the coach of the year award, but not yet satisfied.
"I think we can get better, be more efficient at both ends of the floor," she said. "We've put together a stretch that's pretty good because of our sheer will. But there are areas we can be better in and we want to be better in."

White also realizes she's still growing as a coach.
She constantly seeks advice from her predecessor, Hall of Famer Lin Dunn, Pacers coach Frank Vogel or even outsiders. She often breaks down game tape to see where she can improve.

White brings a different perspective to the game. After four seasons as a college assistant, four years on the staff of the WNBA's Chicago Sky and five years as a broadcaster, she returned to her home state as one of Dunn's assistants in time to celebrate the Fever's 2012 championship run. So when Dunn announced she would retire at the end of last season, White was the obvious replacement and players - including a certain former teammate - quickly jumped on board.
"As a player, she was always like 'I'm tired of her (the coach) harping on me about this stuff.' Now, it's like 'I'm tired of telling you about this stuff," Catchings said, laughing. "But when you look at our team and a lot of teams that have coaching changes, drastic changes like we have, a lot of people didn't think we'd be very good. I think a lot of people dismissed her and dismissed us, as a team."

Opponents that dared to discount White and the Fever in May now realize they made a big mistake. Indiana turned around its season with a six-game winning streak in August, a span that included a franchise record four straight wins on the road.

Those in the locker room aren't surprised.
"She's a total player's coach. She wants everyone to be successful and she does a great job of holding us accountable," January said. "She understands because she's been on both sides of it and she wants to communicate."

Catchings is not about to disagree.
"I think she's the best coach in the league right now," Catchings said.

## Tamika Catchings, Fever headed back to postseason

When Indiana left Tulsa on Sunday after its third loss in a row, you got the feeling that the Fever were seriously annoyed, but not in a self-destructive way. Indiana was intent on finishing some business that has become practically mandatory for a Fever team: making the postseason.

The mission was clear: A win against Connecticut on Tuesday would put Indiana in the playoffs for a WNBA-record 11th consecutive season. The Fever didn't want any suspense for this one -- and they didn't allow any.
After Indiana's 81-51 victory, the only player who has been part of every Fever playoff appearance (2002, and then 2005present) put into perspective what 11 in a row means.
"It comes with everybody believing in the system," Tamika Catchings said, "and rising to the occasion. Getting through injuries, adjusting to a coaching change, and adding a few different players.
"It's really about getting the best out of everybody, no matter who's in the lineup. Just playing with the people who are available."

And it's also about the amazing consistency of Catchings. She has been the franchise's constant since she first took to the court in 2002, a year after being drafted with a knee injury that kept her out of what would have been her rookie season.

Catchings will say goodbye to her playing career after the 2016 season. But she's not going to slow down and just coast into retirement, like a boat cutting its motor entering a quiet cove.

Nope, Catch will be Catch right until the horn sounds on her final game. However, what she and coach Stephanie White have done this season is find ways to get the 36 -year-old star more rest.
"We started that from the beginning of the season," Catchings said. "Especially early on, I was trying to get used to it, but sometimes sitting on the bench too much doesn't really work for my body, either. But we kind of figured out a way to make it work.
"A lot of it is off the court, too, just making sure I'm taking care of my body. Seeing the nutritionist to make sure I'm eating right. Sleeping more. Adding it all up, it makes a big difference."

After a few road games this year, Catchings has been able to take earlier flights home than the team does, letting her get more quality rest in her own bed. She hasn't changed the relentlessness with which she plays, but she's more aware of ways she can conserve energy.

Like most WNBA teams, the Fever have had injury issues to juggle, along with the ups and downs of playing in a compact league where every team has good players. It's hard to get on an extended roll. But the Fever did that, winning six in a row and nine of 10 going into last week, when Indiana had two games at home.

And then, just like that, the Fever's surge stalled. Momentum, a great friend to have around until it mysteriously disappears on you, left early at Bankers Life Fieldhouse when the Fever lost to the Sparks by two and the Dream by six.

Then at Tulsa, Indiana rallied from a 17-point deficit, only to lose by six again as the Shock punched their playoff ticket.
White, in her first season as head coach after taking over for the retired Lin Dunn, didn't overact to the losses, though.
"At this point in the year, everybody is playing with a sense of urgency. Everybody is desperate," White said. "It becomes less about effort, and more about execution-related aspects of the game. We've at times had slippage in both our offensive and defensive execution, and at this point in the year, those details are the difference between winning and losing games."

Tuesday back home in Indianapolis, the Fever didn't necessarily play a great game in Catchings' view, despite it being a blowout. But she's a harsh critic. The Fever did a lot right, shooting 47.7 percent from the field and making all 15 of their free throw attempts. Ten players scored for the Fever, led by Catchings with 13. Natalie Achonwa, a rookie of the year candidate, had 11.

Because of injuries and other absences, such as when Achonwa was helping Canada earn an Olympic berth, White has had to improvise with personnel. She has used nine different starting lineups this year. Right now, guard Briann January is day-today with soreness in her back and knee. Post player Erlana Larkins is hobbled with a leg injury, but is getting minutes.

The heartbeat of the Fever, of course, remains Catchings. She has won just one league MVP award, but she has been a perpetual candidate for than honor. Catchings has led Indiana to the playoffs under four different coaches: Nell Fortner, Brian Winters, Dunn and White, who by the way, is just two years older than Catchings.
Or, to put it in another perspective, when Catchings was in her first WNBA playoffs, the youngest of her current teammates, Achonwa, was only 9 years old.

The Fever go back on the road again now, with games at Minnesota, Washington and Atlanta before the regular-season finale at home against New York. The Liberty also won Tuesday -- holding off Atlanta in overtime -- and are the East's top team with a 21-8 record. Indiana and Chicago are both at 18-12; White now has the most victories by any Fever coach in her/his first year in charge of the team.

There's still a lot of basketball to be played, but the Fever know they'll be competing -- yet again -- in the postseason.
"I still don't feel like we've touched our potential on how good we can be," Catchings said. "One thing that we continue to focus on is to finish strong. You think about wanting to put your team in the best playoff position possible, and I think because of how the East is so tight, every night is like a playoff-intensity game."

## Game Recap: Fever 81, Sun 51

With Tuesday night's dominating victory over Connecticut, the Indiana Fever collected a WNBA record that speaks volumes about their preparedness, toughness and longevity as one of the league's best franchises.

The Fever's 81-51 triumph over the Sun at Bankers Life Fieldhouse wrapped up an 11th consecutive playoff berth. No other team in WNBA history has enjoyed such a string of postseason appearances.

Tamika Catchings, the Fever's 36-year-old star, has been a part of all 11. She smiled afterward, calling it "a cool record" for her team. She said the franchise's "core values" have made it all possible.
"It's that tradition," said Catchings, whose club is 18-12 with four regular-season games left. "It's that expectation, the way we play offensively and defensively. It's a credit to everybody on the team."

Stephanie White, the Fever's first-year head coach, pointed to the role that team President and General Manager Kelly Krauskopf has played. Krauskopf has led the franchise since its inception in 1999. White also praised the indispensable contributions of Catchings.
"I think (the record) says a lot about what Kelly has done, bringing in players who made this franchise not only an attractive place to be but made it consistent," White noted. "And I think it says a lot about Tamika. Her personality and how she plays is what this franchise is really built on.
"I think it's incredibly difficult to maintain the consistency that this franchise has maintained, and those two are really cornerstones of it."

Catchings, with 13 points against the Sun, led four Fever players in double-figure scoring. Maggie Lucas and Natalie Achonwa each scored 11. Natasha Howard added 10, hitting double digits for only the second time this season.
"(Howard) really did a good job," White said about the Fever's second-year forward. "She didn't try to over-think things. She played, she hustled, she did a good job of executing in our coverages. I felt like her energy was very good."

Eleven Indiana players got into the game and 10 scored. Erlana Larkins was the only non-scorer, but she did her part with a game-high eight rebounds.

The Fever held Connecticut (13-18) to 15 first-half points, the second-fewest that Indiana has allowed in a half in franchise history. The Sun connected on only 20 percent of their first-quarter field goal tries (3-of-15) and 10.5 percent in the second quarter (2-of-19).

With 1:28 left in the third quarter, Achonwa hit a pair of free throws to provide Indiana with a 30-point lead. The winning margin of 30 points represented the Fever's biggest victory of the season and the eighth in franchise history by 30 or more.

The Fever are tied with Chicago for second place in the Eastern Conference - 3.5 games behind leader New York. Indiana has three games on the road and one at home remaining, starting with Friday night's matchup at Minnesota.

The Fever want their team to be healthy and fresh for the playoffs, but they also know that work remains over the next $1 \frac{1}{2}$ weeks. The victory Tuesday night completed a season-series sweep of Connecticut, but it came after three consecutive losses by Indiana.
"We want to be playing our best at playoff time, and we're not there," White said. "We're not close. We'll be smart with our minutes ... but at the same time, we have to find a rhythm. We have to learn to execute. We haven't executed our defensive coverage well the last five games."

## White's Year Echoes Larry Bird's First Coaching Season

This all looks familiar, doesn't it? A rookie coach with no previous head coaching experience, one who had been a great high school and college player in Indiana, comes in and brightens the mood, utilizes the bench, hires experienced and capable assistant coaches, and relies on veteran leadership in the locker room.

What Stephanie White is doing with the Fever this season seems like a not-so-instant replay of what Larry Bird did with the Pacers 18 years ago, transforming a losing team to playoff hopeful. The formula is proven as long as the talent is sufficient, yet many coaches stray from it. They're too ego-driven to pick the brains of other coaches, too insecure to bring in experienced assistants who might be capable of replacing them as the head coach, and lack the personal qualities to communicate effectively with the players, management and media.

White has done all that, which is why the Fever are 17-11 heading into Sunday's game at Tulsa after overcoming a 3-6 start. The micro mood is one of frustration after dropping consecutive home games to losing teams, Los Angeles and Atlanta, but the macro picture is brighter. The Fever are coming off consecutive 16-18 seasons, so to reverse that trend with a rookie head coach, an aging icon in Tamika Catchings and an otherwise young roster that has lost 37 games to injury qualifies as a successful transition and a promising start to White's coaching career.

She's a legitimate Coach of the Year candidate, another similarity to Bird, who won the NBA's award in his first season with the Pacers in 1998. If White gets to 19 wins - a likelihood with six games left in the regular season - she'll tie for third in WNBA history for victories for a rookie head coach. Unlike the other candidates for the honor, she has no legitimate league MVP candidate. And, she's won victory away from setting a Fever record for wins by a rookie head coach.
For now, what counts is the sudden turnaround, and how she's managed it.
Bird, remember, took over a team that had finished four games below . 500 in 1996-97 and won 56 games and reached the conference finals. He did it by injecting optimism into the collective mindset, digging deeper into the bench and bringing in veteran coaches Dick Harter and Rick Carlisle for assistance. White has achieved her about-face with help from assistants Gail Goestenkors, who was a nationally prominent head coach at Duke for 15 years, and Gary Kloppenburg, formerly the head coach of the WNBA's Tulsa franchise and an NBA assistant with Charlotte and Toronto.
She's also made liberal use of her bench. Catchings leads the Fever scoring with a 13.3 average. From the department of arcane (but meaningful) statistics comes this: No WNBA playoff team has ever averaged 75 or more points per game, as the Fever do, with a leading scorer with an average that low. In other words, they have balance and depth, something for which the coach gets at least partial credit.

Eleven Fever players have started games this season, and all 12 average at least 10 minutes per game.
"You never know whose night it's going to be and that's pretty cool," Catchings said following Friday's loss. "Just being able to share the ball, which we didn't do tonight, makes it fun."

Other indications of coaching include the fact the Fever lead the WNBA in three-point percentage while also leading in threepoint defense, and also lead in forced turnovers. An improved defense, in fact, has been the driving force behind the improvement from a 3-6 start while everyone was getting acquainted.

A truly democratic society, of course, requires that everyone be treated the same. That means Catchings, one of the all-time greats of women's basketball, gets no privileges. She was yanked from the first game after the all-star break, at Connecticut, for missing a defensive rotation. That could be regarded as an unseemly thing to do to an icon, but in White's coaching world there are no one-percent elitists.
"Of course I got mad about it, but after the fact I regrouped and came back and finished the game strong," Catchings said, recalling the overtime victory in which she finished with 15 points, eight rebounds and five steals.
"She expects the same thing from every single person, from me to the 12 th man on the bench. That says a lot, when you're taking me out of the game when I've messed up and the rest of the team can see it. That makes the trust level that much higher."

White smiles at the memory, too.

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"In order to gain trust and respect from everybody, you have to be the same," she said. "And I think Tamika wants to be challenged, wants to be coached, and held to the same standard."

White's relationship with Catchings is an intriguing and crucial dynamic for the Fever. White (38) is just two years older, and they were teammates for two seasons with the Fever, in 2003 and ' 04 . Catchings was the team's leading scorer and best player while White was a part-time starter averaging 6.9 and 4.1 points. Memories of those days could compromise White's coaching authority, but there's no evidence of that. Catchings remembers White as a heady coach-on-the-floor point guard and appreciates having a coach who played professionally. She also enjoys the absence of the generation gap she sometimes feels with teammates, who are as much as 13 years younger.
"I relate to her more than I relate to the team," Catchings said.
While White has to ignore Catchings' considerable career accomplishments on occasion, she does have to keep track of mileage. Catchings - who has announced plans to retire after next season - had played 15,305 minutes in the WNBA as of Saturday, more than $101 / 2$ days of nonstop basketball. She's at the stage where she feels good some nights and not so much on others, and the aches and pains are reflected by her statistics. She's had five games of 20 or more points, including a splendid performance on Friday when she contributed 24 points, seven rebounds, three assists, three steals and one turnover in $28 \frac{1}{2}$ minutes. But she's also had games of $0,2,4$ and 5 points.

White, therefore, has to walk the tightrope of keeping her best player on the floor often enough to give her team a chance to make the playoffs while keeping her fresh enough to have something left in playoff games. That eases the sting of taking her out when things aren't going well.
"My communication with her is that it's OK, because you're not 10 years younger," White said. "You're at a different part of your career. You're going to have lulls. We have to find ways to conserve her energy."
White shows unusual poise and confidence for a rookie head coach, as Bird did. That comes from her pedigree as an AllAmerican in high school (Seeger) and college (Purdue), as well as her experience as a stripes-earning assistant on the college staffs at Ball State, Kansas State and Toledo and the WNBA staffs in Chicago and the Fever. In that regard she's most unlike Bird, who stepped into coaching with zero experience on the bench.

White's experience doesn't require her to delegate to her assistants as much as Bird did, but she still seeks the opinion of other coaches. Most prominently, she spent nearly a week with Brad Stevens in Boston's training camp last year, she talks regularly with the Pacers' staff, particularly head coach Frank Vogel and assistant Dan Burke, and she's made several trips to South Bend to learn from Muffet McGraw and her staff.

That partially explains White's calm sideline demeanor. It's her nature, but it's also the impression left by coaches such as Vogel and Stevens, who maintain control without histrionics. Her cool was on obvious display late in Friday's loss when consecutive passing errors led to Atlanta layups that dropped the Fever from a one-point lead to a three-point deficit with $31 / 2$ minutes left. White watched them unfold silently from the sideline, showing no reaction other than to call a timeout.
How does a rookie coach learn patience and understanding so quickly?
"Having kids has certainly helped that," she said, while her nearly four-year-old son Landon sat nearby eating popcorn. (She has three sons, Landon by birth and twins by adoption with her partner Michelle.)
"But it also comes from being a player. I felt I was a calm player. I was intense and raised my voice at certain moments, but I didn't get too crazy. Part of that is my personality and part is understanding your team.
"Players see that. The last thing you want to see when you know you've screwed up is your coach throwing her hands up in the air, because on top of their own disappointment they're disappointed for disappointing you. I don't want to be that person."

White's skull sessions with other coaches go well beyond demeanor, though. She gets into the nuances and niches of Xing and Oing, such as the angle a ballhandler should take when driving into the lane, defending the pick and roll. And she's been around long enough to give as well as she takes.
"She loves talking and exchanging ideas," said Burke, an 18 -season Pacers assistant. "The times I've been with her, she's asking me questions and I've asked her questions. 'How do you do this, why do you do that?' She's very inquisitive. I enjoy talking basketball with her. I learn from her as well.
"She's a student of the game. A basketball junkie. A lifer."
While White can easily talk directly with the Pacers coaches, she converses with Stevens with an occasional text message, follow-ups to her observations during the Celtics' training camp last season.
"A lot of subtleties," she said. "I love the way he communicates. He and Frank communicate in a certain way. They get the

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most out of their players. I listen to the verbiage they're using, the tones they're using, how they're responding to certain situations - in practice more than games, because practice is where your team grows. What positions are they putting their players in to be successful, how are they adjusting their systems to the players they have, and how are they handling rotations and things that are happening within the game?
"I try to absorb all those subtleties rather than just what plays they're running, what defense they're in, how they're playing the pick and roll."

White's television work, which she plans to continue during the Fever off-seasons, enables her fact-finding missions. Her work as a studio analyst for Pacers games gives her all the more reason to attend practices, where she can observe as often as she likes. Her work with the Big Ten network puts her in touch with more coaches, and exposes her to more games.

She worked the sideline for a Purdue-Michigan men's game a few years ago, and was impressed with the plays both teams executed in the final few minutes. So she obtained a DVD of the game and studied it.
"I feel it makes me a better coach, just like being a coach makes me better at TV," she said.
The Fever have yet to wrap up a playoff spot, but the magic number for an 11th straight appearance is down to two. It's difficult to predict beyond that. Only two other WNBA teams, New York and Minnesota, have more wins (19), but three other teams have 16 or 17. The Fever's postseason fate will hinge on health - particularly that of Catchings, but also the likes of point guard Briann January, who sat out the second half of Friday's game and will miss Sunday's game at Tulsa - and the normal issues of fate and circumstance that guide teams lacking dominate talent.

Less than one season in, however, the coaching part of the equation appears to be covered.

## White's Steady Leadership Guides Fever into WNBA Spotlight

The youngest head coach in the WNBA is showing wisdom and maturity beyond her years.
Stephanie White, 38, took over the Indiana Fever this season with no previous experience as a head coach. She immediately installed a new, fast-paced offense. The upshot: Indiana is averaging 85 points in its last eight home games, all victories.

Need another example? Early this season, White watched her club struggle to a 3-6 getaway. She quickly identified defensive shortcomings and went to work on repairs. The result: Fever opponents have failed to reach 70 points in four of the past five games.

White grew as her team grew. She began to flourish on the bench as her team blossomed on the floor.
Now an Indiana club that relies on balanced scoring, hard-nosed defense and attention to detail is the talk of the WNBA. Nobody is hotter. The Fever (17-9) have won six straight games overall and 14 of 17 since that 3-6 start.

And White, who spent five seasons as a Fever player and eight years as a WNBA assistant, is expected to be a solid candidate for league Coach of the Year honors.
"If she's not, I think people are undervaluing what she's done here," said Kelly Krauskopf, the Fever's president and general manager. "I think what she has done is a phenomenal job for a first-year pro coach with a lot of high expectations."

If White goes on to win the media vote as the WNBA's top coach, she would become the first since Michael Cooper of the Los Angeles Sparks in 2000 to capture the award as a rookie with no previous head-coaching experience. In the NBA, current Pacers President Larry Bird won Coach of the Year in his first season (1997-98) on the Indiana bench after never having previously served as a head coach.

What White is accomplishing at Bankers Life Fieldhouse has, in some ways, made a highly difficult task look uncomplicated. Expectations are typically big for the Fever, who have advanced to the playoffs in a WNBA-record 10 straight seasons. White is pushing her team to success with a roster that shows only three players with double-figure scoring averages, led by Tamika Catchings at 13.0.

White, a television commentator in the offseason, easily and affably handles her media chores as a coach. She mixes nicely with fans around town. And she inspires her players with her knowledge and thorough preparation.
"She's the whole package," Krauskopf said. "This job was really made for her."
Fever guard Shenise Johnson echoes Krauskopf. Under White's guidance, Johnson, acquired from San Antonio before the season, ranks as a candidate for Most Improved Player in the league. Johnson has become a consistent scorer (11.3), rebounder (5.0) and playmaker ( 2.3 assists) as White and her staff find various ways to utilize the talented guard.
"Steph's wheels are always turning. She's just so smart," Johnson said. "That's something I really admire about her."
One of the first things White did was hand out notebooks to her players, in which they list five things they do well on the court each day. The notes are less about basketball skills and more about intangibles such as leadership and on-court communication.
"Intangible things win games," White said. "I want our team to value those intangibles."
White said she doesn't focus on the WNBA standings - where her Fever, by the way, are one game behind first-place New York in the Eastern Conference. Instead, she concerns herself with making sure Indiana's players demonstrate effort and energy. She stresses preparedness for all players, coaches and support staff.
"You look at our team on paper and maybe some people have overlooked us," White said. "But what we've done is cultivate a culture that values 12 players, that values 18 staff members, that values the little things we do every day to put ourselves in position to improve."
White sees a Fever squad that is "still in a growing phase." What she also sees, however, is a team managing to keep any stretches of inconsistent play to "short periods."
Ask White if she has improved as a head coach over the past three months and she responds quickly and emphatically: "No

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question."
She points to her improved decision-making. She notes, too, that her play-calling abilities and recognition of lineup mismatches in games have improved.

Looking back, White said her emphasis on offensive changes early this season might have led to the defensive slip-ups that proved costly in the Fever's 2015 start. If a reset button was available on that strategy, the Indiana coach might push it.
"But that would probably be the only thing," said White, who prefers to learn from mistakes rather than be tormented by them. "If I didn't have the hiccups, if I didn't have the stumbling blocks, I might not be where I am right now.
"I have a long way to go, just like our team has a long way to go. ... It's a life-long learning process. I'm just continuing, like our team, to try to grow every day and try to get better every day."

## Fever are hottest team in the WNBA right now

There is almost no surer way to cool down a team than to write about how on fire it is. That said, with apologies to the Indiana Fever, we must say they are scorching right now. They're on a six-game winning streak, and have won nine of their 10 games since the All-Star break in late July.

When you examine how the Fever are doing it, the answers are different from game to game. Sometimes it's been the players you expect to have big performances. Other times, it's been role players stepping forward right when they're needed. It's also been a mix of both.

The bottom line is that the Fever seem to have the right vibe now, and it has them knocking on the door of first place in the Eastern Conference.

After the Fever's 80-79 victory Sunday over visiting New York, the East race got even tighter. The Liberty remain in first at 18-8, with Indiana at 17-9 and Chicago at 17-11. The Fever have won eight straight home games, and have two more this week at Bankers Life Fieldhouse: Wednesday against Los Angeles, and Friday against Atlanta.
Fever coach Stephanie White described the victory over New York like this: "We had five players in double figures. We had tremendous balance. We did a really good job against a terrific rebounding team. We just found a way to win, and I was really proud of our team."

The Fever can very briefly catch their breath and be happy about what they've done since a 106-82 loss to Chicago on Aug. 4. Because it's been a very impressive run.

That loss on the road to the Sky perhaps was, strange as it sounds, a catalyst for the Fever. It was the most points and the highest shooting percentage (63.2) that Indiana had allowed all season. It was their fourth loss to Chicago in 2015, as the Sky swept the regular-season series with Indiana for the first time.

White said after that game, "When we play with a tough defensive mentality, we can be a very good team. But when we don't, we struggle."

Indiana had won three in a row before stumbling at Chicago, so it wasn't as if the Aug. 4 loss was a rock-bottom moment or anything. But it was a strong message to the Fever about how they needed to play to be successful. Indiana isn't going to have the exact same identity under White that it did under Lin Dunn, who retired after last season. But the Fever still have to defend at a certain level, and that's what they didn't do against the Sky.

They bounced back with an Aug. 7 victory over Atlanta in which they totally turned around the dynamic of their loss to Chicago. This time, it was Indiana that scored 106 points, while holding the Dream to 77. Then after winning 73-62 at Washington on Aug. 11, Indiana had a potentially very tricky road trip to the West Coast: Phoenix, Los Angeles and Seattle in six days' time.

But that brought three more victories, all by double digits, with the Fever scoring in the 70s in each game and letting their defense do the rest. Along the way were big moments by players like Lynetta Kizer (19 points vs. the Mercury), Briann January (16 points vs. the Sparks) and Shenise Johnson (16 points vs. Storm).

The Fever's top scorers throughout this season have been old reliable Tamika Catchings, who in her next-to-last year in the WNBA is averaging 13.0 PPG, and Marissa Coleman, who's found a home in Indy (11.4 PPG).
Johnson, acquired in a February trade with San Antonio, is having the best of her four seasons in the WNBA, averaging 11.3 points and 5.0 rebounds while shooting 47.4 percent from the field.

Natalie Achonwa, who had to sit out what would have been her first pro season in 2014 with a knee injury, is in the running with former Notre Dame teammate Jewell Loyd of Seattle for WNBA Rookie of the Year. The Fever were without Achonwa for three games from Aug. 7 to 16, as she was helping Team Canada win a berth in the 2016 Summer Olympics. For the season, Achonwa is averaging 8.4 points and shooting 53.6 percent from the field.
You get the sense that this is "classic Indiana" -- a kind of blue-collar team that's still built around future Hall of Famer Catchings -- and that's a formula that has worked over the long haul. The franchise is on a streak of 10 consecutive playoff appearances, and strongly in position to make it 11.

Indiana has tried to give the 36-year-old Catchings as much rest as possible. She's averaging 26.2 minutes per game, similar to last year's 26.9. Prior to 2014, Catchings had averaged more than 30 minutes per game in all but one season: 27.8 in 2008, when she was dealing with an injury during an Olympic year.
After scoring six points on 2-of-11 shooting in that Aug. 4 loss to Chicago, Catchings has scored 14 or more points in five of the Fever's past six games. Even in her roughest offensive game during that stretch -- 2-of-11 for four points at Phoenix -- she still got nine rebounds, played 31 minutes, and was part of a key victory on the road. Catchings also moved into second place on the WNBA's career rebounding list in that Mercury game, passing Tina Thompson. Now with 3,096 rebounds, Catchings trails only Lisa Leslie's 3,307.
The Fever are still dealing with Erlana Larkins' left leg injury -- she hasn't played since Aug. 11 -- but the team's depth is showing up huge during this winning streak.

There are still eight games left, and we've seen things change drastically on a dime in the WNBA. But right now, the Fever are the league's hottest team, and they're doing it in the collective way that has been Indy's trademark.

## Indiana Fever winning with less of Tamika Catchings

By playing Tamika Catchings less, the Indiana Fever are trying to achieve more. So far, the strategy is working.

A resurgence by Catchings has coincided with a five-game winning streak by the Fever, who meet first-place New York (18-7) at 6 p.m. Sunday at Bankers Life Fieldhouse.

The Fever (16-9) are coming off the first 3-0 West Coast trip in the franchise's 16-year history. They won a fourth consecutive road game - also a franchise first - by beating the Seattle Storm 75-63 Friday night. With nine games left, the Fever have already equaled last year's victory total.

First-year coach Stephanie White attributed the streak to defensive execution and attentiveness to what she
called hustle plays.
"It's also what the identity of the franchise has been," White said in a telephone interview Saturday from Seattle-Tacoma International Airport. "It also helps to have Tamika. She embodies all of that."

Catchings scored 14 points at Seattle and is averaging 15.2 during the winning streak. By design, she is averaging a career-low 25.9 minutes per game.

The Fever have a deep team - they lead the WNBA in bench scoring with 28 points a game - and are distributing the offensive burden. White said Catchings no longer must put the team on her shoulders.
"She also has her teammates to help," White said. "That's how we're going to be successful."

The Fever trailed at halftime in each of their past two games but responded with third-quarter domination. They outscored the Los Angeles Sparks 24-6 in that quarter en route to a $79-68$ victory Tuesday, and they outscored Seattle 30-9.

Catchings said the Fever increased defensive intensity in the second half. She said players have been holding each other accountable since the All-Star break.
"It's helped us as a team to know that we all hold each other accountable, but coach holds us accountable, too," she said in a statement distributed by the Storm.

The Fever have the WNBA's best record (8-1) since the All-Star break. In that span, they lead the league in scoring (81.3) and in turnovers forced (18.1), and they are fourth in points allowed (72.7).

The Fever have been surging despite limited availability of two centers: Erlana Larkins, who has been sidelined by a leg injury, and rookie Natalie Achonwa, who has twice left the Fever to represent the Canadian national team. Lynetta Kizer has thrived as the starting center, including a 14-point game at Seattle.

The Eastern Conference has no clear favorite. Chicago (16-11), the defending champion, sits in fourth place.

The Fever could pull within one game of first by beating the Liberty, who are 1-2 against the Fever. The teams meet again Sept. 13 at Indianapolis in the final game of the regular season. White called Sunday "a gut-check game" for the Fever, who will be tired from travel. The Fever also have home games Wednesday against Los Angeles and Friday against Atlanta.

## Third-quarter surge propels Indiana to historic win

The third quarter has become friendly to the Indiana Fever. And deadly to its opponents.
The Fever came back from a 6-point halftime deficit to throttle the Storm 30-9 in the third period en route to a 75-63 victory at Key Arena in Seattle. Indiana established a franchise record with its fourth consecutive road win, eclipsing 11 previous three-game streaks. The Fever won their fifth straight game overall, captured their eighth win in nine games, and their 13th in the past 16 since opening the season 3-6.

More importantly, Indiana kept pace in the Eastern Conference, maintaining sole possession of second place just two games behind front-running New York (18-7) whom the Fever play Sunday in Indianapolis.

It was the second time in three nights and two West Coast cities the Fever trailed at the intermission, only to take the lead after a dominant third quarter. At Los Angeles on Tuesday, the Fever turned a 14-point deficit into a 24-6 third-quarter run and an eventual 25-point turnaround that resulted in an 11-point win, just Indiana's third ever at Staples Center.
Friday's win marked just the Fever's fourth ever in Seattle, but the seventh time in eight meetings the Fever has beaten the Storm. Indiana swept the series for the second straight season and swept a three-game West Coast trip for the first time in its history.

Indiana opened its overwhelming third period with a 7-0 run capped by Briann January's 3-pointer that gave the Fever the lead at 44-43. Scoreless in the first half and returning to her home state, January finished with nine points and paced Indiana with seven points in the pivotal quarter, while Tamika Catchings and Lynetta Kizer both pitched in six.

Moments later, Indiana took the lead for good on Kizer's bucket for a 46-45 lead. Catchings made it a three-point margin and Shenise Johnson made it six with a 3-pointer at the 5:23 mark. Free throws by Catchings pushed the opening run to 16-2 as the Fever opened an 8-point margin. The third period onslaught received exclamation points from Shavonte Zellous and Jeanette Pohlen, each adding 3-pointers in the final minute as the Fever led 67-52 heading to the final frame.
The key to the game-changing surge after intermission? Rebounding and defense. The Storm had enjoyed 68 percent shooting and a 17-9 rebounding edge in the first half, but the Fever harassed the Storm into just 3-of-15 shooting (20 percent) and corralled 12 of 16 caroms.
"As the game progressed, I thought our depth wore [Seattle] down," said coach of the year candidate and Fever coach Stephanie White. "They read and space the floor so well that they got whatever they wanted in the first half. But we turned up the intensity and got some easy buckets, and that led to being more aggressive on offense, too."
"We attacked more and that got [Seattle] on their heels."
Johnson led all Indiana scorers with a game-high 16 points, while Catchings and Kizer each finished with 14. Seattle got 15 points from rookie Jewell Loyd, with Sue Bird, Alysha Clark and Ramu Tokashiki each adding nine.

The Fever return to Indianapolis where they hosts an Eastern Conference showdown with the Liberty on Sunday at Bankers Life Fieldhouse (6:00 p.m.).

## Catchings, fans preparing for her final exit

Fans had stopped to take pictures of Tamika Catchings as she was interviewed post-game in Los Angeles on Tuesday. The minute the Indiana Fever's most celebrated franchise player peeled off the earphones, fans yelled her name.
The love fest continued as Catchings walked to the locker room tunnel at Staples Center, where fans called her and reached their hands out for a shake or a high-five. She finally broke away to run inside, looking over her shoulder twice with a smile.
It's a scene that's being played out across the country this summer, as the 36-year-old multiple-record holder and ten-time All-Star announced in the spring that she would retire after the 2016 WNBA season. Fans are making sure to see Catchings as many times and as close up as they can before that time.

It's also a scenario that's sure to continue for another year, as some who have sought her have even mistakenly believed that this it is this season that is her last.
"Everybody's trying to get me to quit this year, but I've got one more time!" Catchings joked.
No doubt fans are anticipating the gaping hole that will be left in Catchings' absence. She is the last of a dying breed: an athlete who will retire from the same franchise that drafted her in 2001; one who plays with the same energy and intensity as she ever has, diving for loose balls when necessary; a complete player who fills up the stat sheet; one whose consistency, work ethic and leadership have made her the face of the Fever franchise, and a great ambassador for the league.
"It's the way you play every day. Not just the way you play on game day, or the way you play when you feel good," Indiana coach Stephanie White said of Catchings. "She practices like the plays, and always has. You have to pull her back. She's the ultimate competitor and the ultimate perfectionist. She holds herself to such a high standard, and everybody else follows. She leads by example."
"There's nobody like her - she's extremely unique. I'm going to be crying next year when she retires."
Catchings is also a leader on the stats sheet. This season she became both the league's second-highest leading scorer and the second-highest leading rebounder. She's the all-time steals and free throws leader, and ranks seventh all-time in assists. In 2011, Catchings was named the league's MVP. The following year, she lead the Fever to their first WNBA Championship.
"When your leader is your hardest worker, it really sets the tone," White said.
Catchings went to high school in Texas and then played for coach Pat Summitt at Tennessee, where she went from a shy young woman to a fully-formed athlete. She used the severe hearing loss she was born with as motivation, and she still doesn't back away from challenges.

Before this week's game against the Sparks, Catchings said she had originally been assigned to guard Los Angeles forward Nneka Ogwumike. Catchings wanted to guard Candace Parker, a fellow Tennessee alumni and a friend.
"I said, 'I want to guard Candace!'" Catchings recounted.
She got her way, setting the stage for a one-on-one battle that fans always look forward to seeing. Catchings also helped ignite Indiana's second-half run that lead them to victory.
"For me it was being more aggressive down the stretch, looking up at the scoreboard and seeing if I could do more," she said of the game.

After next year, however, Catchings will be doing more in different arenas. She is still exploring what other career paths she might pursue in addition to expanding her Catch the Stars Foundation for youth, which she plans to grow from her hometown in Indianapolis.
"We'll see what happens next," Catchings said. "I've talked about being a (team) general manager, I've talked about my foundation and doing a lot of stuff with that. I definitely want to expand out of Indy. Chicago, Knoxville and Dallas - hopefully those three will hit really fast - within six to nine months. That's the plan."
Catchings is also engaged. She is keeping her fiancee out of the public eye, but said his first name is Parnell. They plan to wed sometime in 2016.
"I don't know when yet - I've got to get through the next year," Catchings said of the uncertain date. "But it'll be next year sometime."
"I've got a lot going on in my life right now."
Another thread in the tapestry of Catchings' uniqueness is that after ten years of playing overseas in the winter, she's stayed home the last four years, while many of her peers are increasingly opting for more money in other countries, including during WNBA season. For Catchings, it's been about looking ahead.
"You can only play basketball for so long, and then you have to figure out what you're going to do next," she said. "For the last four years I've chosen to stay back, and it's really been about: 'what do I want to start doing?' Dibbling and dabbling in a lot of different things to see if I like them."
For now, though, Catchings and the Fever are concentrating on making this year's playoffs. After a rough season start, they saw players come back from injury and overseas committments and began to surge - particularly after the All-Star break last month. Indiana is currently second in the Eastern Conference, where the top five teams are neck and neck. White said Catchings is flowing with her impending transition to retirement.
"Tamika has been amazing because she understands where she is in her career. She understands that while she's a huge piece, she's becoming a huge piece of the puzzle rather than 'the' piece," White said.
"I think it's taken some pressure off her, and others have stepped up to the challenge. Tamika's embraced that, and she's trusted them. In turn, they've really responded to that."
The Fever play the Storm Friday, on the last stop of a West coast road trip.

## 25-point turnaround highlights Indiana comeback

In a wild turn of events, the Indiana Fever used a season-high 103 -point field goals to fuel their biggest comeback of the season, upending Los Angeles 79-68 at Staples Center.

It marked only the third Indiana road win over L.A. in 16 seasons, but it was the Fever's third straight road win to match a franchise record - for the 11th time in club history and the second time this season. Indiana won its fourth straight game overall, capturing its seventh victory in eight games and its 12 th in the past 15 after beginning the season 3-6 under first-year coach Stephanie White.
"A ton of credit goes to our players," said White whose club has helped position her as a leading candidate as the league's coach of the year. "They toughed it out. They scratched, they clawed. And whenever you have a player like Tamika Catchings, everybody else rallies and plays that way with her. That's just who she is."

Catchings, who paced the Fever with 20 points, staged a gutty head-to-head individual matchup with another former University of Tennessee star, Candace Parker. In the end, Catchings got more from her Fever teammates.
"Everybody played their role great," said Marissa Coleman who played with the Sparks for two seasons before signing a free agent deal with Indiana prior to the 2014 campaign. Coleman scored 14 points with three 3 -pointers and a pair of steals. She added: "At the half, we knew we were playing too fast on defense and we had too many turnovers. When we play together on both ends of the floor, we're a hard team to beat."

The Fever were hard to beat, indeed.
Undeterred by its 14 -point deficit, Indiana raced back into the game by outscoring L.A. 24-6 in the third. The Fever got six points from Coleman and five from Catchings in the period, while limiting the Sparks to 2 -of- 10 shooting in the quarter and taking advantage of nine L.A. turnovers.

White's locker room message at halftime? "I challenged them. I challenged them to be the team they can be," she said.
Shavonte Zellous erased the deficit with a 3-pointer for a 48-48 tie score with 1:19 in the period and, until Candace Parker's free throws with 1:03 left in the third, Los Angeles was on pace to match the lowest-scoring third quarter (4 points) in WNBA history.

A Coleman layup tied it against at 50 , and her four-point play with 0.8 seconds left in the quarter may have been the most dramatic play of the game. The first-time All-Star buried a deep, fallaway 3-pointer that fell through the net after the buzzer sounded and after the Sparks' Marianna Tolo was whistled for a foul. Officials reviewed the last-second shot and ruled it good with time still left on the clock. Coleman sank the subsequent free throw to give Indiana a 4-point lead after entering the period down 44-30.
Coleman's big plays were matched only by the dual between former Volunteers, Catchings and Parker.
From the game's opening sequence when Catchings stripped Parker to produce the game's first basket, to the decisive fourth quarter in which big play after big play featured one of the two former Tennessee forwards, the Catchings-Parker matchup was a heavyweight subplot.
In the fourth quarter alone, the Lady Vols duo combined to shoot 6 -of-10 from the floor, 11 -of-12 at the line with seven rebounds and a pair of steals. Parker scored 12 of her 25 in the quarter, Catchings netted 11 of her 20.

Parker, in her eighth WNBA season compared to Catchings' 15 , posted Catchings-esque numbers while approaching a quadruple-double. She finished with 10 rebounds, six assists and a Sparks-record eight steals.

Catchings, the WNBA's No. 2 career scorer and rebounder and its all-time leader in steals and free throws, finished with a stat line including seven rebounds, three assists and two steals. All seven of her free throws came in the fourth quarter.
"Down the stretch, teams rely on certain things. For me, I was able to attack," said the former MVP and 10 -time All-Star Catchings. "I knew where we were on the scoreboard and I wanted to be aggressive."

Oddly, the matchup of U.S. Olympic teammates and UT alums almost didn't happen. In the Fever's morning shooting practice, Catchings was tagged with guarding Sparks forward Nneka Ogwumike whose 16.1 points per game rank fourth in the league, drawing Catchings to joke that she wanted to guard Parker.

Shortly before tipoff though, it was learned that Ogwumike would sit due to concussion symptoms. Catchings got her wish and spectators witnessed one of the best back-and-forth individual matchups the WNBA could offer.
Parker, though, also contributed seven turnovers, five in the second half, in what was a key stat that defined the game's tale of two halves. After 10 Indiana miscues led to 17 Sparks points in the first half, 13 L.A. turnovers produced 15 points for the comeback-minded Fever in the second half.

Los Angeles knotted the score at 54 on Temeka Johnson's jump shot 30 seconds into the final quarter, and the Sparks led 5857 on a layup by Tolo. The Fever captured the lead for good, however, on Briann January's 17-foot jumper with 7:30 to play to spark a 6-0 run and give Indiana what was then its biggest lead.
Parker cut the lead to 3 on a driving layup and free throw that was matched by a nearly identical three-point effort by Catchings. A turnaround jumper by Parker made it 66-63, but the Sparks never got closer as Indiana controlled the glass with 11 of the game's last 13 rebounds while pulling away.

Indiana outrebounded the Sparks 14-8 in the fourth quarter and used seven second-chance points to seal the second win in three days during its West Coast road trip. Overall, the Fever finished with 19 offensive rebounds, the second-most in franchise history.
Kizer's offensive rebound with 3:44 remaining led to a layup by Shenise Johnson. After another Parker free throw, a Catchings layup staked Indiana to a six-point margin and spurred an end-of-game rally in which the Fever outgunned the Sparks 11-4 in the last three minutes.

The final result for Indiana was a second-half turnaround of 25 points, 49-24.
January matched a season-high with 14 points for a balanced Fever lineup in which all 10 players reached the scoring column. Kizer scored five points while adding a career-high 11 boards. Johnson had nine points and eight caroms.

Los Angeles got 12 points from Ana Dabovic, all in the first half, and Jantel Lavender had 10. L.A. shot 45 percent overall compared to just 38 percent for the Fever, but the difference came beyond the 3-point stripe where Indiana's 10 -of-19 shooting dominated the Sparks' 1-of-13.

The WNBA's best defensive unit behind the arc (31 percent), Indiana limited Phoenix and Los Angeles to 1-of-26 shooting its past two games combined.
Before halftime, the Sparks made use of 11 straight second quarter points to seize control. L.A. opened a 29-22 lead with 7:20 left in the second. Indiana pulled within three, but five different Sparks players put together the 11-0 streak that kept Indiana scoreless for nearly five minutes.

Los Angeles enjoyed 53 percent shooting and took advantage of Fever mistakes in the first half. Indiana stayed in the game with its long-distance prowess, but shot just 3-of-11 from the floor in the second period as L.A. outscored the visitors 23-10.
Indiana concludes a four-game road swing at Seattle on Friday.

## WNBA: Former Maryland Star Marissa Coleman Gains Confidence From Indiana Coach

Marissa Coleman is home in the heartland.

It's taken some time, tears and toughness, but Coleman has found a comfort zone that has the veteran Indiana Fever guard among the elite players in the league, a place she always believed she belonged. Her recent selection to the WNBA All-Star presented by Boost Mobile confirmed that status.
"From day one when I signed here, the conversations coach (Stephanie White) and I shared instilled immediate confidence in me," Coleman said last week before the Fever defeated the Mystics, 73-62 at the Verizon Center.
"She told me that you can be an All-Star in this league. I have confidence and we have confidence in you. That goes a long way. Being selected to the All-Star team meant a lot to me. Now, finally being removed from everything and being able to put it in perspective, it meant more to me than any individual award and honor I've ever received."

Coleman's swagger is soaring as the Fever are making a strong playoff push, having won 11 of their last 14 games heading into Tuesday's contest in Los Angeles. They are tied in the congested Eastern Conference standings with Washington for second place, two games behind New York. Both the Fever and Mystics have identical 14-9 records.

A native of Germantown (Md.), who helped Maryland win a national championship in 2006, Coleman was drafted second overall in 2009 by her hometown team, the Washington Mystics. On paper it was a match made in heaven. She was going to lead the Mystics to WNBA glory.

Unfortunately, Coleman never found her groove in D.C. despite scoring 16 points in her WNBA debut. She was traded to Los Angeles in 2011 where she was a role player and enjoyed a few memorable moments.
"I am a firm believer in everything happens for a reason and those years in D.C. and Los Angeles where I struggled were leading to this point," Coleman said. "They taught me a lot about myself, persevering, hard work and sticking with things.

As she spoke about her journey from first-round draft pick to All-Star, Coleman was relaxed as she sat on the courtside black leather chairs.
"It's been such a roller-coaster ride in this league for me," Coleman said. "If you would've asked me on draft day 2009, I would've been an all-star multiple times by now. There was some extreme frustration with myself and tears after games. To finally make an all-star in my seventh year is probably most special to me."

Despite those tough moments, Coleman never stopped believing.
She continued improving waiting for her opportunity to torture opposing defenses. She was used more as a spot-up shooter in Los Angeles, but in Indiana, Coleman is showcasing all facets of her beautiful game: The deadly jumper, explosive drives to the basket and tenacious rebounding.
"It was more disappointment and frustration than anything for me," Coleman said. "That was the most upsetting thing for me knowing that I was capable of playing at a high level and I wasn't reaching those personal expectations.
"Forget the expectations that everybody else had for myself. I always have higher expectations for myself than anybody can put on me. That was most disappointing knowing I was capable of so much more and I wasn't showing that."

All it took was the right fit and perfect coach. Now, Coleman is shining this season for the Fever. The durable Coleman is a versatile combo guard who can score, defend, push tempo and shoot the 3-pointer. She has bolstered the Indiana backcourt with size, strength, versatility and timely shooting.

After setting a new career-high with 9.1 points per game during the 2014 season, Coleman has been better this year, scoring
in double figures in 15 of Indiana's 23 games, including a career-high 25 points in the win over San Antonio. She ranks 20th in the WNBA in scoring ( 12.8 ppg ) and 11th in three-point percentage, shooting 37.8 percent from deep.
"I knew I was going to have the chance to get to where I finally wanted to be in my career with the confidence that everybody in the organization had in me," Coleman said. "I had a solid year last year. Coming into the season, I knew that coach White had high expectations for me and was going to let me go out play my game and have fun.
"I don't think people realize that being surrounded in a situation where people have confidence in you how much that does for your game. You can just go out there and have fun and not worry about making mistakes, missing shots because you know matter what from top to bottom the people around you have your back and that does a lot for a player in any sport."

Indiana's season has mirrored Coleman's career. A slow start losing its first three games and dropping four of its first five games before turning things around. Coleman is now a key part of the Fever's relentless attack. Indiana has a steely toughness that has served it well this season.

The Fever has endured all types of travel inconveniences this season such as being stuck on a tarmac in a hot plane for almost two hours where players took off shirts in an effort to stay cool.

They were stranded in the Reagan National Airport for five hours. The latter forced a rare postponement of a game when the Fever couldn't catch an alternative flight that would have gotten them to Connecticut in time for that night's game.
"The travel has been horrendous," Coleman said with a laugh. "It's been tough and we talk about it amongst ourselves, but this group has handled it so well. Some teams would complain and we just made the best of delayed flights. Being stuck at the airport just gave us a chance to enjoy each other's company."

That closeness shows on the court as well. While Tamika Catchings is the undisputed leader of the Fever, everybody has made contributions during their recent hot stretch.

Briann January is one of the best defenders in the WNBA.
During their win over Phoenix on Sunday, Lynetta Kizer, another Terrapin standout, scored a career-high 19 points. Demonstrating their toughness, the Fever defeated the reigning champions on the road despite missing both centers and having starting guard Shenise Johnson receive four stitches.

Coleman and the Fever are pumped for the stretch run.
"It's going to be tough," Coleman said. "It makes for a fun rest of second half. We're going to grind it out and see how the standings shake out at the end of the regular season. We're just trying to be consistent and play together as a team. Then we'll see what happens during the playoffs."

## Team Canada basketball star Natalie Achonwa juggles pro life, road to Rio

As one of those 'back-and-forth' sports, basketball is inherently a transition game, as Team Canada star Nathalie Achonwa understands on many levels.
"Don't ask me the day of the week, they're all blending together," the 22-year-old centre said Thursday following the team's morning practice.

On Tuesday night, the Guelph, Ont., native was in Chicago playing for the WNBA's Indiana Fever (a 106-82 loss to the Sky).

On Wednesday, Achonwa flew to Edmonton to join the national women's team in its final preparations for the FIBA Americas Women's Championship, a qualifier for the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro that goes from Aug. 9-16 at the Saville Centre.

Switching from one team to another is part of the gig for players in a variety Olympic team sports, one that Achonwa has worked to make as seamless as possible.
"It really speaks to Nat's intelligence," said Team Canada head coach Lisa Thomaidis. "She's been with us since she was 16.
"We've been playing sort of a similar style of game (the so-called Princeton offence), so she's very accustomed to that. She is very adept at being able to come in, pick up on any of the new subtleties we've been working on and she puts it into place. Not many players can do that, but she's certainly one of them."

The WNBA rookie toggled quickly from helping Canada win gold at the Pan American Games in Toronto to her pro duties with the Fever. Now she's toggled back.
"It's a process and every time I come and go, it's just about shortening the gap on how quickly I can get into reality, and get on this time zone, and get on the groove of this team," Achonwa said. "But everyone is working with me, in terms of making sure I'm on the right schedule, making sure I'm reminded of our plays.
"So they make it a lot easier for me."
And with good reason. Achonwa, who was selected ninth overall in the 2014 WNBA draft by Indiana, is a force inside for Canada, as she demonstrated at the Pan Am Games. In the gold-medal game, she poured in 13 second-half points to help Canada take control of that match against Team USA.
"She wants the ball in pressure situations," Thomaidis said. "There is no backing down, she's fearless.
"In 2012 (at the London Summer Olympics), that's where I think people really started to notice her. It was the biggest stage and she brought it. She wasn't backing down. You can certainly see that in big games."

Like a number of Canada's young, emerging players, Achonwa's game keeps evolving. In fact, Thomaidis challenges her players to 'reinvent themselves,' year over year, so Canada can compete with its international rivals. There's no other choice.
"I think I'm a totally different player now," Achonwa said, looking back to 2012. "Body wise, I was a little bit quicker, back in London.
"But in terms of the IQ and understanding the game, I look at the game a whole different way. Then I was the youngest player and it was more (a case of) taking in as much as I can and just bringing energy. Now I'm still focused on bringing energy, but I can pick my places and I can pick my timing a lot better, just by understanding the game and understanding the flow of the game."

Moving from the top female pro league in the world to Canada's national team is helping that evolution.
With the Fever, Achonwa has adopted female basketball legend Tamika Catchings as her mentor. The 36-year-old Catchings has won three Olympic gold medals and two world championships, for starters, so it's a wise choice.
"Maybe I'm a rookie on my WNBA team, but then I come here and I have things that I have learned from a 14-year vet that I can instil in a leadership role with Team Canada," Achonwa said. "I pick and choose different things I can learn from different players, like (Team Canada captain) Kim Gaucher.
"To me, Kim Gaucher is the Tamika Catchings of Canada basketball."
Catchings has said she will retire following the 2016 Olympics and Gaucher extended her career post-2012 to help Canada take a shot at qualifying for Rio and finding a way onto the podium there.

Achonwa is young and gifted enough that she could be a key player for Canada for another Olympic cycle or two after that, depending on how things go.

She knows what getting to the Olympics entails. She also knows what it is to miss a big international competition.
Achonwa suffered a torn anterior cruciate ligament (ACL) in her left knee in her final game at Notre Dame in 2014 and she missed the world championships that year in Turkey, where Canada finished fifth.
"I would have loved to have been there and be a part of the team. (But) to see them come in fifth, I was just as happy as if I was there," she said.
"I'm just happy that I get to join in (now), like I never took step back."

## W.N.B.A. Star Tamika Catchings Nears End of One Career While Preparing for Another

The list of people who can relate to what comes next for Tamika Catchings, the only player who has been a W.N.B.A. AllStar 10 times, is short.

So as Catchings prepared for a series of lasts - her final All-Star Game on Saturday, her final playoff push with the Indiana Fever this fall, her final Olympics next summer - she turned to another Indiana basketball icon.
"The only person I've really talked to about it is Larry Bird," Catchings said Friday, reflecting on her career. "Because I want to be a G.M. So I wanted to talk to him about the experience, because he got there. He talked about when you're finished playing, going directly into whatever your next venture is. He took some years off trying to figure out what he wanted to do next. But he said, 'I wish I would've started sooner.' But he also said he was glad he took some time to figure out what he wanted to do."

Catchings is leaving the court on her own terms. She is scoring at roughly the same efficiency, though taking fewer shots, conscious of easing the transition for the Fever to a team built around her fellow All-Star, Marissa Coleman, and the versatile forward Natalie Achonwa. Catchings has improved her defensive rebounding percentage to the highest level of her career, despite standing just 6 feet 1 inch in a league that has become bigger and faster since she made her debut with the Fever in 2002.

Instead of continuing to chase goals she has already reached - she has three Olympic gold medals; she has been named the league's defensive player of the year a record five times; she has won a W.N.B.A. title; she has been named the league's most valuable player - Catchings has her eyes on personal goals. She met a man in Los Angeles last year, and he has relocated to Indianapolis. In April, he took her to Eagle's Nest, the rotating rooftop restaurant atop the Hyatt in Indianapolis, and then back to her place to watch a video of the couple's photos set to Catchings's favorite song, "What Took You So Long" by Tyrese.

At the end of the video was a marriage proposal. Catchings said yes, and they plan to marry in April.
"I think when you look back at your relationships in the past, a lot of my relationships were convenience relationships," said Catchings, whose father, Harvey, was an N.B.A. center. "I could go overseas, do what I wanted to do career-wise, but it's like there's an ex-boyfriend here, ex-boyfriend there. So definitely, everything happened at the right time."

In addition to exploring front-office positions, Catchings wants to expand her Catch the Stars Foundation, a charitable enterprise in Indianapolis. And she has set her sights on motherhood.
"I want to have a family," Catchings said. "And I want to be at home with my kids. That's the reason for me not wanting to play while I was pregnant.
"Not that they can't go with you; I've seen it - Candace, Helen Darling with triplets, we've had players in the league do it," she added, referring to Candace Parker.

Catchings continued: "But I'm older now. I've experienced everything there is to experience. So I could get another one of this, another one of that. But you only have one chance to be a mom, one chance to be there for your kids. And my mom, Juanda, was there. My dad played, and she was there with us all the time. Just having that relationship with her, knowing she was there no matter what, that's the relationship I want to have with my kids."

## All-Star Tamika Catchings preparing for life after hoops

UNCASVILLE, Conn. -- A little girl is battling her jump rope -- she accidentally hit herself with it -- and appears close to meltdown mode. Uh oh, her shoulders are slumping, her eyes are watering, her face is scrunching up ...

Time for Indiana Fever forward Tamika Catchings, the WNBA standout so famed for her scoring, defense and rebounding, to come in with the assist.

It's Friday morning at the Mohegan Tribe Community Center just up the hill from the Mohegan Sun Arena that will host Saturday's WNBA All-Star game. Catchings is among the players taking part in a fitness clinic for kids. It's the kind of thing she has done countless times in her WNBA career.

As one attendant tries to encourage the upset little girl, Catchings comes over to whisper encouragement to her. Then Catchings begins jumping up and down herself, and the child starts to grin and joins her.

Nice job. You saved it, Catch.
"I really enjoy this," Catchings said. "Kids can get so frustrated when they can't do something. They look at us and think, 'Oh, she's perfect, she plays basketball,' and they don't realize we started just like them. It's great to be able to go back to the beginning. Hey, I was terrible at jumping rope when I was little."

It's hard to picture Catchings, who is in her record 10th All-Star game, being terrible at any athletic pursuit. This is a player who has won championships at every level, including the 1998 NCAA title at Tennessee, the 2012 WNBA title at Indiana and three Olympic gold medals for the United States.

Her career is now winding down, with the finish line in sight. Catchings turned 36 this week. She will compete through the end of the 2016 WNBA season and hopes to make a fourth Olympic team next year. The league doesn't have an official AllStar game in Olympic years, so this one is it for Catchings. She has spent her entire WNBA career with Indiana, and that's where she will say goodbye to playing. And then?
"It's going to be an adjustment. I've been playing basketball my whole life," said Catchings, the 2011 WNBA MVP. "I've gotten some advice about not just jumping into something really fast -- give yourself some time to assess things but also to reminisce a little about the things you've done.
"You win all these awards and things in your career, and people ask you how you feel. And you say, 'I don't know. I'm still playing.' You don't have time to think about it because you're going on to the next thing."

One of Catchings' most recent awards, though, is more about what she will be moving on to after she stops playing.
Catchings won in the individual category in the inaugural Sports Humanitarian of the Year awards, sponsored by ESPN and PlayStation. The Chicago Bulls won the team award.

Catchings' Indianapolis-based charitable foundation, Catch the Stars, focuses on empowering youth through literacy, fitness and mentoring.
"I see myself continuing to work with my foundation and playing a bigger role in that," Catchings said of her outlook on 2017 and beyond. "I know what I don't want to do -- I don't want to coach. I love working with kids, but coaching doesn't really appeal to me.
"Broadcasting, maybe. I've talked about wanting to be a general manager and working in sports from a business standpoint. I read about this a lot. I like to see what other people have done. You read about the horror stories of athletes who finish playing and then lose all their money. But you also read the success stories."

Suffice it to say, if Catchings in her post-playing career is anything like she has been on the court, there will be no stopping her.
"Every program she has touched has been successful," said Chicago's Pokey Chatman, who will coach the Eastern Conference All-Stars. "I get goose bumps talking about her. That's how much respect I have.
"When I first saw her here, I said, 'Finally, I get to coach you and not have to coach against you.' Because she is a nightmare to face. She can play the $2,3,4 \ldots$ she's going to get the steal or rebound that kills you. And she will make everyone around her better."

Catchings is known as both a great player and great teammate, in part because she relates well to everyone -- veteran or rookie.
"I've always admired her from afar," said the Fever's Marissa Coleman, who is appearing in her first All-Star game. "When I got the opportunity to play in Indiana with her, I was really excited.
"You assume some things about people, but Catch really is what everybody thinks she is. She's a great teammate and a great basketball player. She approaches everything the same, whether it's a practice, shoot-around or a game."

During her career, Catchings has recovered from two of the most difficult injuries basketball players face: a torn ACL and Achilles' tendon. She transformed herself from more of a slasher as a scorer to having a successful face-up shot. She became a confident spokeswoman, for both the WNBA and women's sports in general. And she has always been open to helping other players reach their goals.

Minnesota's Maya Moore, the past season's WNBA MVP, recalls watching as an 8-year-old when Catchings and Tennessee won at the 1998 Final Four. The two faced off in the WNBA Finals in 2012, and they're teammates on the U.S. national team.
"Catch has been such a model player for anyone of any age," said Moore, who will start for the West All-Stars on Saturday. "I remember in high school, I felt connected to her because people said I played like her, as far as how hard I played on both ends. She's always been about playing basketball with a love you can see."

Catchings is still an effective player. She iss averaging 12.8 points and 6.9 rebounds for the Fever, and her career numbers are 16.6 and 7.5. In her 11 playoff appearances with Indiana, her averages have been even a little better -- 16.9 and 9.1. But there's no way to fully measure her energy, which is a constant.

Seattle veteran guard Sue Bird, in her ninth All-Star game, is a year younger than Catchings. The two have played against each other since Bird was at UConn and Catchings at Tennessee, along with being U.S. teammates.
"It's definitely sentimental. This is my last All-Star. My playing career will be over next year, but hopefully the legacy I leave behind will keep going."

## Tamika Catchings on life after hoops

What does Bird say is the hardest part of facing Catchings -- and the best part of playing alongside her?
"It's the same thing, either way -- it's that she never stops," Bird said. "She's a mismatch, no matter who you put on her. You can do a laundry list of what she can do on the court. But more than anything, above all, she never stops.
"I've played against her when the game should be over, and somehow she makes these incredible hustle plays to get her team back in it. And with USA Basketball, like anytime we do a rebounding drill or whatever, I'm like, 'Please, I hope Catch is on my team' because she's just going to make it happen."

The time will come, though, when Catchings will stop -- playing basketball, that is. She has put a date on it. She announced it. She is preparing for it.
"It's definitely sentimental. This is my last All-Star," Catchings said. "My playing career will be over next year, but hopefully the legacy I leave behind will keep going. And I'll keep going.
"I will say this: I think what I've been able to do as a player is still nothing compared to what I can do in a lot of other areas in the future. And I'm excited about that."

## Natasha Howard goes global to expand game

Natasha Howard has to pause when she considers what is the best part about being a professional basketball player.
When she has an answer, she gives a definite response.
"I'm playing against the greatest basketball players in the world," Howard said.
In her second season with the WNBA's Indiana Fever, Howard has grown under the tutelage of teammate Tamika Catchings, and has faced Chicago Sky guard/forward Elena Delle Donne and Phoenix Mercury center Brittney Griner.
At the same time, Howard, a 6-foot-3 reserve forward and a 2010 Waite graduate, continues to face a challenge that every professional basketball player faces: preparing for and focusing on every game while juggling the routine of practices, reviewing scouting reports, and learning opposing personnel on a regular basis.
"My rookie season, it was about learning, developing, and learning the game, and that went so quick and so fast," said Howard, who has averaged 6.3 points and 3.1 rebounds in two seasons, including 4.5 points in 13 games this season. "Now, everything is more smooth. I have ups and downs, but that doesn't matter so much because I have great leaders and great teammates that help me. This year, I'm definitely better, but I'm still learning and picking up things, and I'm picking Tamika's brain. Still, everything's going smoothly."

Howard considers Catchings, a forward with the Fever, a 15-year WNBA veteran, and former league MVP, a mentor of sorts.
"Tamika has given me great advice," Howard said. "Stay focused, stay into it, play my game. She has always helped me stay focused."

Drafted in June of 2014 by the Fever, Howard completed her degree in social science from Florida State in December, following her first WNBA season. She went overseas to play professional basketball during the WNBA offseason, as it's become commonplace to do so in the sport, as many WNBA players pursue more playing time and a paycheck from overseas teams.

Howard, 23, admitted that when she chose to play overseas, she didn't know anybody. She didn't know a word of an unfamiliar language. It didn't stop her.

First, Howard went to Israel, where she joined former Toledo standout Naama Shafir with Elitzur Ramla, where she averaged 14.8 points and 7.9 rebounds. Then, she went to Turkey, where she helped Gelistirenler win the TKB2L championship.

Earlier this month, Howard was one of 12 American players selected to play in WKBL, a Korean women's basketball league.
"That helped me grow a lot, and helped me to experience other peoples' cultures and learning new things besides what we know in the U.S.," said Howard, who finished as Florida State's all-time leading rebounder ( 1,047 ), second in all-time scoring ( 1,811 ), and third in career blocks (186). "It felt really good to go overseas and see that people there respect Americans, and that they treat us with respect when we treat them with respect. I'd love to go back overseas."

Howard had six points and three rebounds coming off the bench for the Fever in Tuesday's 80-62 loss at San Antonio, Indiana's final game before the WNBA's All-Star break.

Instead of treating a week between games as a mini-vacation - some travel to a sunny spot in the Caribbean for few days, while others take time off to rest their bodies - Howard heads to Cincinnati to continue training for the remainder of the WNBA season and for her next international destination.
"I'm training with our development coach," Howard said. "I want to grow my game even more and help my team out."

## Marissa Coleman's First All-Star Season

Indiana Fever forward Marissa Coleman has been named a reserve for Boost Mobile WNBA All-Star 2015 by the WNBA's 12 head coaches. The annual matchup featuring the Eastern Conference All-Stars against the Western Conference AllStars will be nationally televised by ABC on Saturday, July 25 at 3:30 p.m. ET.

The league's coaches voted for six players from their own conference-two frontcourt, two backcourt, and one from either position- to round out the two rosters.

For Coleman, the second overall pick in the 2009 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics out of the University of Maryland-where she won a national championship in 2006-the honor is the culmination of several years of hard work with three different WNBA teams.
"It means more than I can probably express in words, honestly," said Coleman. "It's been such a bumpy road for me since I entered the league. Having such high expectations and not feeling like I was living up to them, all the internal struggles I had, to becoming an All-Star."

Coleman spent the first three years of her career with Washington, starting 28 games her third year after starting only once in her first two seasons. She averaged 8.6 points and 4.8 rebounds per game in that third season, showing consistent production as she got consistent playing time.

She was then traded to the Los Angeles Sparks in February of 2012, where she played for two seasons, making five combined starts in 68 games in an L.A. uniform. Her stats would suggest she never quite got comfortable in Los Angeles, as she averaged 3.1 points per game during the 2012 season while playing the fewest minutes per game (16.1) of her WNBA career.

After a pretty similar 2013 campaign ( 4.6 points in 17.5 minutes per game), she signed with the Fever following that season, and 49 games ( 47 starts) into her Fever career has established herself as one of Indiana's most durable and versatile players on both ends of the floor.

Coleman: "I have to give so much credit to everyone within the Fever organization. My teammates, coaches, Kelly Krauskopf. Each person has helped me find my game again, helped me believe in myself again and find my confidence. Them believing in me and having the confidence in me has meant more than they know."

She had a particular thought on the influence of new head coach Stephanie White, "I have to especially thank Coach Steph from day one, she's believed in me and expressed what type of potential I have. I can't stop smiling!"

Coleman has started all 15 games this season, leads the Fever with 13 points per game and is second on the team in minutes (26.8) behind point guard Briann January, the only other Fever player to start every game this season. She is also among the team's top five in several other statistical categories, including steals (2nd, 1.4), field goal percentage (3rd, .448), 3-point percentage (3rd, .396 ), rebounds ( 4 th, 4.0 ) and assists ( 5 th, 1.9). Her 3-point percentage is ninth in the league.

Having played in six different countries (Italy, Hungary, Spain, France, South Korea, and Turkey) during her overseas career, Coleman has gotten a wide breadth of experience. Her most recent overseas stint was the 2014-15 season with Edirne Spor in Turkey, where she averaged 16.7 points and 7.6 rebounds per game.

Still just 28 years old, Coleman has finally found individual and team consistency in the WNBA, and hopes this is the first of many All-Star appearances.

## Fever-Sun WNBA Game Postponed Because of Airport Delays

Airport delays forced the postponement of Saturday night's WNBA game between the Indiana Fever and Connecticut Sun.
Indiana played in Washington on Friday night and was set to travel to Hartford, Connecticut, on Saturday morning. The Fever said the team's commercial flight was held on the tarmac for nearly two hours because of weather and mechanical problems before finally returning to the gate.

The Fever could not make it to Connecticut for the 7 p.m. EDT start, and the league agreed to the postponement. The WNBA and the teams are working on a makeup date.
"It was out of our control," Indiana Fever coach Stephanie White said by phone i Saturday. "The main priority is our players and their health. It would have been difficult to have them prepared and ready to play a game if we showed up right before tip after a long bus or train ride."

White said most of the players were sleeping and didn't realize they weren't in Connecticut until they were told to leave the plane. They had been on board more than two hours.
"It was a crazy travel day," Fever guard Briann January said. "You have a late game last night and for myself and my teammates it takes awhile to wind down and get your body calmed down again. We got up at 6 this morning to leave to head to airport. Everyone is exhausted. I was knocked out on the plane sitting there."

Indiana (8-7) lost to Washington 68-50 on Friday night. The Fever will now stay in Washington an extra day before flying out to San Antonio for Tuesday's game with the Stars.
"It's always nice when you can get a day or two of rest, but we have a bitter taste and it's nice to have a game the next day to try and work that out," White said. "It's six of one, half dozen of the other."

January laughed trying to recall if this had ever happened to her before.
"We were joking around about that, something that would happen in AAU ball, get on plane and go play," she said. "We're not as young as we used to be, and at this level you should be able to perform at your peak performance level."

With Saturday night's game postponed, Connecticut - 7-6 and losers of five straight - is taking the train to Washington for Sunday's game against the Mystics. Originally, the Sun were going to fly Sunday morning for that night's game.
The two teams may bump into each other Saturday night because they are staying at the same hotel in D.C.
"I'm sure we'll cross paths tonight and laugh about it," January said.
It's not the first time a WNBA game has been postponed. In 2008, Sacramento was supposed to play at Houston, but the game was postponed because of Hurricane Ike.

## Fever puzzle coming together

The Indiana Fever needed a pick-me-up. They have had injuries, players out of the country, and new points of focus all contributing to them losing their first three games and four of five. They dropped to 3-6 before starting a win streak in Connecticut on the final day of June.

In the days leading up to that road game in Connecticut, leader and sure-thing Hall of Famer Tamika Catchings got creative. She's known for that, trying to find ways to inspire and motivate her teammates.
"They laugh at me because I'm always thinking of stuff," Catchings said with her typical off-court smile.
The team was still in search of its identity and what they could hang their hat on. So, on her way to the gym one day, she stopped off at a store bought a puzzle of 'Frozen,' the extremely popular Disney movie.

With the team together, talking about the great opportunity in front of them to be successful and how each player could contribute, Catchings handed out puzzle pieces.
"Alright, we're going to put this puzzle together," she told her teammates. "... And if everybody brings their pieces to the table ... if I hold my piece back and you guys do the puzzles, then it's not a finished product.
"It's just really focusing on everybody bringing their piece to the table. If you bring whatever you're really good at to the table, offensively and defensively, then we can make this puzzle - we can make it work. ... And we've been rolling since."

The Fever (6-6) made it three straight, their longest win streak of the season, during a matinee contest on Wednesday. The struggling Seattle Storm (3-10) were in town and were outplayed from the outset. (Poor Seattle, a West Coast team tipping at 9 a.m. PT. Unlucky scheduling.)

The Fever tallied 26 first-quarter points, never lost a quarter, and added to their momentum with a 88-65 win to get back to .500 for the first time in a year.
"I don't look at the standings or the records," said Catchings, who contributed 12 points, two assists, a rebound and a steal in just over 24 minutes. "I think, more so, just the confidence that we're able to build as a team. When we started off, we had a little low. Finally got our first when and it was like, 'Whew! Here he go,' and being able to build off of that."

And, the win came in front of 12,189 screaming fans - mostly campers - at Bankers Life Fieldhouse as the team held its annual kid's day. That's the 10th highest regular-season attendance figure in franchise history and the best since August, 2003.

The talk coming into the season, under the leadership of first-year head coach Stephanie White, was that the Fever would have a much different look on offense - looking to push the ball frequently. They did shoot it well, over 50 percent for the third straight game, but it was their energy and effort that was most impressive.

The Fever dictated things on the defensive end and scored 24 points off of 23 Storm turnovers. They pounded it in the paint, with a plus-24 advantage, and the bench accounted for 38 points.
"I can't speak enough about the contributions from our bench," said coach White. "We certainly knew that the way we wanted to play, we had to have depth and our bench came ready to play today and really just did a great job."

The Fever are now relativity healthy. (Somebody give trainer Todd Champlin a bonus!) Shavonte Zellous is still nursing a sore back and Maggie Lucas is bothered by a right hip injury, but Catchings, Erlana Larkins, and Jeanette Pohlen were all out on the court.
"I think what it has done is put pressure on players that may not have had that time, may not have had that pressure before," Catchings said of the lineup flux.

Lynetta Kizer has taken on a larger role with Larkins missing time - five games - because of a bruised right knee. She led all scorers with a season-high 17 points and six rebounds. Marissa Coleman reached double figures for the eighth time in 12 games with 15 points - including nine of the Fever's first 15.
"I think we're finally all getting comfortable with playing with each other, playing in the new system," Coleman offered. "We've had a lot of people in and out with injuries. It's been hard to get in a flow with each other and I think we're finally getting to that point."

Just as things are clicking and players are returning to the lineup, the Fever will be without WNBA Rookie of the Month, Natalie Achonwa, who will be in her native country of Canada as they host this year's Pan Am Games in Toronto, July 1620.
"I think right now we're building our chemistry," said Zellous, who has been unavailable for the last seven games. "The few pieces that we have out, people coming back, I'll be back next week, but right now I think we're at a good point because we know what Steph wants. I think we're finding out about each other."

The puzzle is coming together for the Fever, who have two more games left of a four-game homestand. They host the San Antonio Silver Stars on Friday (7 p.m. ET), and then Tulsa on July 15 th.
"With our versatility, with our quickness and our speed and our athleticism, we have great potential to be a lock-down defensive team," said White. "I think we really are just scratching the surface."

## A Fever coach saw Natalie Achonwa's promise in her pain

During one of the worst moments in Natalie Achonwa's life, her future coach looked at her and saw promise.
This was back in 2014. Back when Achonwa led an undefeated Notre Dame women's basketball team deep into the NCAA Tournament. This was when the 36-0 Fighting Irish met star forward Brittney Griner and the Baylor Lady Bears in the Elite Eight in South Bend. This was late in the second half when Achonwa rolled off a ball screen, caught a pass and went to her left for a layup at the rim.

It was a simple play she'd practiced dozens of times that week. But when Achonwa landed on the court her left knee crumbled, the anterior cruciate ligament ripping apart.
"My knee just wasn't there," Achonwa says. "I didn't land on anybody. It was just really meant to be. There was nothing fancy about it."

Achonwa's pragmatism was just as present in the moments after her injury. Her teammates encouraged her to get off the floor. Calmly, Achonwa instructed them to instead get their trainer. She had pushed the Irish to this point. For any of Achonwa's teammates to see her act defeated just five minutes away from the Final Four could put the season to waste. In the first 35 minutes of the Elite Eight game, Achonwa had notched 19 points and 15 rebounds. For the final five she would serve as Notre Dame's biggest cheerleader. This much she understood as she lay underneath the basket, her collegiate career concluding in disaster, her pro prospects a toss-up and a hellacious rehabilitation ahead.

Maybe it was the culmination of so much hitting her at once, but when Achonwa was finally lifted up, she shook off her help and rather then walking straight to the locker room, took a few steps back onto the court to address her team.
"Win this (expletive)!" Achonwa shouted. "This is my court!"
Down the sideline, then-Indiana Fever assistant coach Stephanie White was announcing the game for ESPN. All season she'd been watching Achonwa, studying her and wondering what type of intangibles she possessed that could make her stand out in the WNBA.

The freak injury only a few weeks before the WNBA draft presented the answer.
"In the adverse situation," White says, "She showed her true character."
The Fever took Achonwa with the ninth overall pick in the draft.
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The first-year head coach looks at her rookie as the Fever's next franchise player.
Achonwa is leading all WNBA rookies in scoring with 9.8 points per game and has oddly brought a veteran presence to the new, fast-paced system White has installed - akin to the type of offense Notre Dame runs. This from someone who is continuing to rehab her knee barely a year removed from tearing her ACL.
"She's surprised me with how much she's been able to go this year already," White says. "I didn't know if we were going to have her for 10 minutes a game, 15 minutes a game. I had no idea. She's still fighting off injury. I can't imagine what she's going to be like when she's 100 percent."

It's why White's not shy about calling Achonwa the future of the team.
Others around the organization think it's too soon to say such a thing. They wonder if it could be detrimental to Achonwa's development. Sure, she was a consensus top pick before her injury, but is it good to put that kind of pressure on such a young player?

Even Achonwa pays little heed to the expectations these days. Still, it's hard to shake completely. Especially when the path from major injury to WNBA stardom was constructed in Indianapolis in 2001.

Back then the Fever risked the third overall draft pick on a forward from the University of Tennessee who had just blown out her knee: Tamika Catchings.

It happened to Catchings on Jan. 15, 2001, in a Martin Luther King Jr. Day game against Mississippi State.
With fewer than three minutes to play, Catchings led a fast break up the right side of the court, weaved in and out of defenders and came to a jump stop underneath the rim for a layup. Her knee popped, the ACL severed. Season over. College career over.
"It's one of those things, you know?" Catchings said.
After a while, all of the stories start to sound the same, remarkable only in how mundane they've become. Women athletes are eight times more likely to tear their the anterior cruciate ligament than male athletes, according to a 2007 study. And once it happens it dominates your memory.
Achonwa says the Elite Eight match against Baylor is the only game she remembers vividly from her college career.
Catchings can recall the Mississippi State game perfectly nearly a decade and a half later.
Like Achonwa, Catchings missed her entire first season with the Fever while rehabbing. The first time she got close to making a comeback was right after she was cleared to run. Catchings wanted to be around the team and decided to fly with them for the first time to Houston for a game against the now defunct Comets. While on the trip, Catchings hurt her knee again, requiring her to fly back to Indiana for a second surgery on her meniscus.

The blueprint used to take an injured college great and turn them into professional phenom is far from complicated. This what Catchings realized as her time in the WNBA began. She didn't need to learn new skills or reteach herself the game. Mostly, Catchings just had to refocus her mind.
"Being a star player, we put in so much work," Catchings says. "It's kind of the same thing. It's just a different way of putting work in than before. You're in a whole new situation because you're at the mercy of your body."

It's advice Catchings passes along to other injured players - especially younger ones. So when she encountered Natalie Achonwa before the 2014 draft, Catchings pulled her aside for a quick moment, likely helping out a future front court rival.

A few days later they became teammates.
***
The reality was the 2015 draft class didn't look too promising.
That's what prompted Fever General Manager Kelly Krauskopf to send guard Erin Phillips and a second-round pick to Phoenix for forward Lynetta Kizer and the ninth overall pick in 2014 draft back in March 2014. Indiana was looking to get younger, stronger and faster. Waiting another year wouldn't help the team do so.

Achonwa was high on the Fever's draft board before her injury. She stayed there after. Krauskopf wanted a power forward to help anchor the team and one with bum knees could still apply.
"We were bringing in young players we think we can build around," Krauskopf said.
The Fever filled that role with the fifth overall pick in the draft: Natasha Howard, their first pick of the day.
And then they waited.
At the draft in Bristol, Conn., Achonwa waited, too, wearing a bright red dress, her hair down and a black, clunky brace around her knee like a wart.

When the Fever grabbed her with the ninth overall pick - surprising Indiana with the fact that she was still on the board, and Achonwa that the team still wanted her - the newest member of the WNBA ripped off her brace, stashed it under her table and walked up to meet league president Laurel J. Richie.

Her injury would rob her of an entire season in the league. Her knee would not taint the moment she was permitted to enter it.
When the Fever selected an injured Catchings third overall in 2001, many around the league questioned the young franchise. When Indiana nabbed Achonwa in 2014 hardly anyone blinked.
"It worked out well with Tamika," Krauskopf said. "I thought the odds and concern were lower with Natalie."
To Achonwa, the gesture didn't seem so much a careful calculation as an act of good faith. A gamble she was dead-set on paying off.

The Fever wanted to video chat with Achonwa after they selected her. When Krauskopf, Stephanie White and then-coach Lin Dunn appeared on the screen, Achonwa expressed her appreciation and made a promise that she repeats to herself daily:
"It will all be worth it."

This is why Catchings' blueprint for a comeback is so crucial, one of those things you nod along to as it's being said but you don't pay attention to the meaning behind the words.

Achonwa began rehabbing and going through two-a-days with the Fever in February 2015. The excitement that powered her early on - joining a WNBA team, working out with a professional staff - dwindled as it became routine. After a month of the same workouts, things just didn't seem as shiny as they once had.

At the end of March, Achonwa began arriving at Bankers Life Fieldhouse at 6:30 in the morning to train, the season still two months away. It was as boring as the rest of her days until she walked in one day to see someone else working out, too: Tamika Catchings, entering her 13th season, training as if it were her first.
"That gave me that second flow of excitement," Achonwa says. "I got to see Tamika here every morning. It was reassuring. It's motivating."

By the time the season started, Achonwa was ready to take on a starting role. Maybe it's because no one expected it of her least of all her opponents - but easy baskets just kept finding the forward. The ball would move around the perimeter until it reached an unguarded Achonwa below the rim. Yet once teams started to pay attention to her they still couldn't stop her. The footwork that made Achonwa a coveted college prospect was even faster now - and her knee wasn't even completely healed.

In her first four weeks in the league, Achonwa averaged 10.2 points, 4.6 rebounds and 21 minutes per game. She was named Rookie of the Month for June.
"She reminds me of Catch because of her maturity," Stephanie White says. "Catch came in mature beyond her years and not just on the basketball court. Natalie has that maturity standpoint."
Which is why the comparisons to what Catchings has done for the franchise don't stop coming, and why they make others nervous.
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This is Tamika Catchings' team. No one is arguing that. On the court, she is everything a basketball player aspires to. Off the court she has endeared herself to Indianapolis the way few others have. She hosts clinics and camps and has given back through her Catch The Stars foundation, and has done all of it for more than a decade.

Natalie Achonwa has just arrived.
But Catchings is retiring after the 2016 season. Inevitably, someone will take her place. It may well be Achonwa.
Not that she is even considering it at the moment. Achonwa is way more concerned with winning Rookie of the Year. But there are others doing the thinking.
"When you think about a franchise player in every sense of the word, she is very similar to Tamika," White says.
Krauskopf agrees. "She has all the makings of being a core player, a franchise-type player. What we're seeing is what we knew."
"I'm kind of to that point where it's been what I've been talking about for a while," Catchings admits. "Who's going to be the next one to step into this role? We need that. We need a player like her that people already know who she is here."

Of course, there's always a "But." Catchings has gone through this before. This process of waiting for the next anointed one, of watching some kid enjoy a fabulous rookie season only to see the level of play drop off.

So Catchings and Krauskopf and White don't talk to Achonwa about this. None of them want her to play with that kind of pressure.

Instead they all look at the rookie and wonder. Is this going to be our next franchise player?
"It's too early to talk about now," Catchings says. "You never base things off the first year. You come in as a rookie and the energy is high and everything is going. You have a great year but then it's the next year, and the next year, and the next year."
And then the wonder creeps in again.
"She has it in her," Catchings says.

## Ex-Terp Coleman Left Home To Rediscover Her Game

A decade after she graduated from St. John's, Marissa Coleman's name is still spoken with reverence at the Northwest Washington high school where she was an All-American girls' basketball player.

Coleman started as a freshman on Maryland's 2006 national champions and became the first player in ACC history with 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds, 400 assists, 200 steals and 100 blocked shots. Minutes before her final regular season home game in College Park, Coleman's jersey was retired and hoisted to the Comcast Center rafters.

And the Mystics thought so highly of the 6-foot-1 forward that they selected her second overall in the 2009 WNBA draft, allowing Coleman to continue her career at home.
However, Coleman started just one game during her first two seasons and averaged only 8.6 and 4.8 rebounds in her third as Washington crashed from playoff qualifier to 6-28 disaster. Traded to Los Angeles in 2012, Coleman remained out of sorts as a backup to MVP Candace Parker. She began to recover her form after signing with Indiana last season, but this year, she leads the Fever in minutes and is its second-leading scorer while ranking among the WNBA's leaders in points and threepoint shooting.
"Since coming here, I've had the opportunity to get back to how I played in school, being aggressive, being a scorer," Coleman said ahead of the Mystics' visit to Indianapolis tomorrow. "It wasn't that hard for me to leave Washington even though I had just bought a house in Mitchelville the year before. I missed my family, but basketball-wise, I needed a change. It has worked out for the best. During my time in D.C., I don't think that I was really able to improve my game. A lot of times I was just standing in the corner to shoot threes. That had never really been my game. As the years went on, my confidence wasn't where it needed to be."

Fever coach Stephanie White said that there has been a marked change in Coleman's game and her demeanor this season.
"When Marissa came to Indiana, she had a tremendous opportunity to grow her game, to really get back to the way she played in college," White said. "She wasn't going to be put in a limited role. It was all on Marissa to take advantage of that opportunity and she's done it in every way. I've seen more confidence. I've seen more aggressiveness. I've seen more energy. She's been more vocal. She took last year to learn the system and [decide] what she wanted to be about at this level. She worked on everything we asked her to work on over the winter and she came back so different. She looks like she loves the game again. She has taken her game to another level. She worked on her ball handling. She's always been a really good three-point shooter, but now she's able to play inside and out, to post up, to play much better off the dribble. And she's a much better defender than she was last year. She's a leader on this team."

Which Coleman was at Maryland where she made lifelong friendships with such fellow WNBA veterans as Kristi Toliver, her teammate with the Sparks, and Crystal Langhorne, her teammate with the Mystics.
"We'll all be forever grateful for our time at Maryland," said Coleman, who earned a communications degree and plans to begin a Master's this fall. "Our friendships will be forever. We still talk to each other a couple of times a week. When I'm home before I go overseas [she has played in France, Spain, Italy, Hungary, South Korea and Turkey] or when I come back, I always make a point of going back to Maryland and talking to the players. We take pride in what we accomplished. We don't want to be Maryland's only championship team. We want to make sure that the players who follow us realize what the responsibility they inherited."

At 28 , Coleman is also looking to take more responsibility off the court. She has teamed with the father of ex-Terps teammate Emery Wallace to buy a gourmet pizza franchise, the Mellow Mushroom, that's set to open in the Wallaces' hometown, Roanoke, Va., in February.
"Maryland will always be home although I only live there two months a year right now," Coleman said. "I'm thankful every day that I can wake up and can play this game that I love. I never take it for granted. I have friends who sit at desks all day hating their jobs or being forced to do something that they don't want to do. I get paid to play basketball."

## Confident Coleman Enjoys Strong Start With 2015 Fever

INDIANAPOLIS - Marissa Coleman began the 2015 WNBA season with a self-initiated challenge. Make the All-Star team, she told herself.

Eight games into the season, Coleman is pushing toward her goal.
She leads the Indiana Fever's fast-paced offense in field goals, scoring and minutes played. Coleman ranks $12^{\text {th }}$ in the league in 3-point percentage (36.7) and $14^{\text {th }}$ in points per game (13.6).

The 6-foot-1 forward embraced her aspirations and is performing with unmistakable confidence.
"From Day One, she's been totally different," Fever Coach Stephanie White said. "She's been more vocal, more confident, more empowered. She's more mature. She's becoming a leader. She believes in herself and her talent level."

Coleman, 28, has been a consistent bright spot in her second year with the Fever (3-5).
The University of Maryland product is turning in performances that many, including herself, envisioned when Washington made her the No. 2 overall selection in the 2009 WNBA draft. At Maryland, she became the first player in Atlantic Coast Conference history to record 2,000 points, 1,000 rebounds, 400 assists, 200 steals and 100 blocked shots.

However, during her first five WNBA seasons in Washington and Los Angeles, Coleman and her teams struggled to mesh. Some viewed her mainly as a spot-up shooter. Some, she said, "didn't really think you could do certain things and were putting you in this box."
Coleman craved something better. She wanted to play like she did in college - in full attack mode.
Coleman showed signs of her old self last year with the Fever, averaging a career-high 8.9 points, including 20 in a victory over Washington. Then she played in Turkey this past winter, averaging 16.7 points and 7.6 rebounds while taking additional positive strides as a ball-handler.

When she returned to Indiana in mid-May, noting the Fever's shifting offensive approach and her own growing self-image, she pictured what could become a breakout year.
"I feel like I'm on my way to that," Coleman said this week. "I'm excited. I'm feeling really good. It's easy to think this is going to be that season for me when I'm surrounded by people who, I know, have confidence in me. That goes a long way.
"A lot of the things that I'm getting back to doing now are things that I've been good at all my life."
She also continues to perform with a resilience that has enabled her to play in every one of her teams' regular-season games over the last five-plus WNBA seasons. For women like Coleman, who play year-around basketball here and overseas, that's uncommon reliability.
"Any coach, in any sport at any level, likes the tough players," Coleman said. "So, yeah, I've always prided myself on being one of the tougher players on whatever team I'm on."

With her aspirations of making the Eastern Conference All-Star team in mind, Coleman also is playing fearlessly within the Fever's free-flowing scheme. She goes into every game with an unequivocal zeal. She thoroughly enjoys her teammates.
"I always feel super blessed and lucky to be able to play this game," Coleman said. "But some of the fun was gone (before the Indiana move). It's not as fun when you know you can give so much more and you're not allowed to do that. This is definitely the most fun I've had playing in the WNBA, hands down."

More fun, increased confidence, elevated production - it's all part of Coleman's impressive start this year.

## Lauren Hill's mom: 'We didn't set out to raise a superhero'

Before tipoff at Bankers Life Fieldhouse on Sunday, the family of Lauren Hill walked out to center court as a video tribute played on the jumbotron above.
The recording rattled off words that have come to define Lauren - the 19-year-old basketball player from Greendale who passed away from brain cancer in April.
The Fieldhouse crowd looked on as Fever coach Stephanie White recalled Lauren's impact on her, noting that Hill's strength and courage showed her how to see the bigger picture. The family then took a Fever jersey with Lauren's name and number " 22 " on it and placed it on Indiana's bench for their game against the Sky. They were finally let off the court after receiving long hugs from every Fever player who could get near them.
All of it occurred with a standing ovation as the backdrop. So it's easy to understand the thoughts that occupied members of the Hill family.
"We didn't set out to raise a superhero or anything," Lisa Hill, Lauren's mother, said. "We were just normal parents."
The Fever helped prove otherwise. For every layup scored by either team on Sunday the Fever donated $\$ 300$ to The Cure Starts Now Foundation in honor of Lauren. At the conclusion of Indiana's 98-72 loss, the Fever and Sky combined for 32 layups, good for \$9,600.

Throughout the arena scoreboards were lit up with Lauren's name and fans held up signs that read, "Lauren's Fight for a cure lives on." If nothing else, that was the message the Hill family came out to Indianapolis to send.

Lauren had dedicated the last bit of her life to raising cancer awareness. By the time she passed away she had become one of the disease's most recognizable faces.
"She left us this mission and we're now her voice," Lisa said. "Lauren would be so honored."
Just how widespread Lauren's voice became is still hard to fathom for Lisa, her husband Brent and their children, 14-year-old Erin and 17-year-old Nathan. Lisa said she doesn't think she'll ever be able to comprehend how many people Lauren touched with her story. Especially at events like Sunday's it still amazes the Hill's how often someone approaches them about their daughter.
"All the positive feedback from folks is very important and it means a lot," Brent said." It just solidifies the fact of how she touched people."
After the game, Lauren's fight with cancer was brought up again by White when discussing her team's performance against the Sky. White was upset that her team was feeling sorry for itself after getting off to a bad start and having to play without forwards Tamika Catchings (suspended) and Natasha Howard (left hand injury) as well as guard Shavonte Zellous (lower back injury).

White wanted her team to understand that no one in that locker room had a fair reason to complain - especially on Sunday.
"This is not real adversity," White said. "What Lauren Hill's family went through is real adversity. We've got to put in perspective: We play a game we love, we have a couple of teammates that go down, but it's a basketball game for God sakes. This is what we do. This is our job. We have to be ready to play day in and day out. We have to maintain perspective when we talk about handling adversity."

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## Fever Assistant Goestenkors Headed for Hall of Fame

INDIANAPOLIS - Gail Goestenkors vividly remembers the turning point in her coaching career.
It was the 1999 NCAA regional final in Greensboro, North Carolina. Goestenkors' Duke Blue Devils met the University of Tennessee, which began the ' 99 tournament with hopes of winning a fourth consecutive national championship.
Duke made sure that didn't happen.
And the Blue Devils began a march of success under Goestenkors that impacts the program to this day.
"That was a big program-changer for us," Goestenkors, now an assistant coach with the Indiana Fever, said about Duke's 69-63 victory over Tennessee. "It was really one of those David-versus-Goliath situations. I think that kind of put us on the map where people started to take notice of who Duke was."

Folks noticed Duke, and they noticed Goestenkors. That particular Blue Devils team went on to play in the 1999 national title game, losing to Purdue. Goestenkors went on to build a 396-99 record with four Final Four appearances in 15 years at Duke and then a 102-64 mark in five years at Texas.

Goestenkors, 52, will be inducted into the Women's Basketball Hall of Fame on Saturday night in Knoxville, Tennessee.
Stephanie White, the Fever's head coach, views it as a much-deserved honor for her assistant. Ironically, it was White's performance as a player that pushed Purdue to its national final victory over Duke in 1999. And current Fever star Tamika Catchings was a standout on the Tennessee squad that Duke upset one week earlier.

What Goestenkors did at Duke, constructing a perennial national contender out of a women's program with little tradition, is Hall of Fame stuff, White said.
"It's really a testament not only to her ability to recruit great players but also to her ability to ... develop players individually and collectively. She's got a different energy and poise and toughness about her."

Saturday night, Goestenkors plans to remember her parents first in her induction speech.
"They were my first coaches as far as teaching me how to set goals and the work ethic it takes to attain your goals," Goestenkors said.
Goestenkors played collegiately at Saginaw Valley State University in Michigan. She walked on to the program and helped her team to a 114-13 record over four years. She scored 1,158 points and recorded 469 assists.

Marsha Reall, who was Saginaw Valley State's coach, will present her former player for Saturday night's induction.
"She gave me my start as a walk-on," Goestenkors said about Reall. "I owe a great deal to her. She saw something in me and nurtured my passion for the game."

Goestenkors found out last July that she would be a member of this year's Hall of Fame class. In another bit of irony, she learned of the honor on the same day she resigned as an assistant with the Los Angeles Sparks. Goestenkors resigned out of loyalty to Carol Ross, who had been fired as the Sparks head coach.
"It shows the ups and downs of the game of basketball and really sports in general," Goestenkors said. "(When the Hall of Fame called) I was like, 'Are you sure?' I was a little bit in disbelief."

Goestenkors paused, thought about her coaching career for a moment and smiled.
"I feel very fortunate, feel very blessed throughout my career for all the people I've met and the experiences I've had," she said.
