Hitchcock names All-Stars of 70's

Billy Hitchcock has seen plenty of players come and go during his decade as President of the Southern League.

Hitchcock, former manager of the Baltimore Orioles and Atlanta Braves, replaced Sam Smith and was installed during the 1971 All-Star game held in Jacksonville.

"One of the biggest thrills I get is seeing the players develop and improve during the season and move up the ladder the next year," said Hitchcock who sees each of the 10 Southern League Clubs play at least twice each season.

"Right now, there are 130 Southern League graduates in the major leagues. Scouts and baseball people I talk to, say the Southern League is the strongest of the three Double-A leagues, but, of course, we have no way of proving that."

Hitchcock was asked to name his Southern League All-Stars of the 1970's. He chose to choose a team of players who had performed in the Southern League All-Star game based on how they've turned out as major league performers.

"I had to leave off a lot of good players," Hitchcock said, "but then, we've had a lot of good players in this league during the 70's."

"For instance, Bucky Dent was at Knoxville in 1972, but I like Alan Trammell at shortstop. And there were a lot of other hard choices."

MIKE LUM P OF NO. 28

Michael Ken-Wai Lum. Born Oct. 27, 1945 at Honolulu, Hawaii. Bats, throws left. 6-0, 180. Graduated from Roosevelt High School, Honolulu, 1963. Attended Brigham Young University, Provo, Utah. Married Ramona Cabrel. Lives in Smyrna, Ga. Acquired—Signed as free agent after being chosen in 1978 re-entry draft.

Mike led the NL with 17 pinch hits last season . . . Became Atlanta's single season pinch hit leader in 1979 passing teammate Charlie Spikes who earlier in the year broke Joe Nolan's record of 14 in 1977 . . . Had three

pinch hit homers in 1979, two of which came in consecutive games on Sept. 4 (vs. Cincinnati) and Sept. 5 (vs. Los Angeles) in Atlanta.

Mike re-signed with his original club in February, 1979 in the 1978 re-entry draft . . . Mike had three homers against the Braves while with the Reds in 1978 . . . Was 17-for-52 (.327) as a pinch hitter in 1978 and 11-for-36 (.306) while pinch hitting for the Reds in 1978.

Has eight lifetime pinch hit homers; record of 18 is held by Gerald Lynch . . . His two pinch homers in consecutive games ties another major league record held by 19 players and was last accomplished by Carmen Fanzone of the Cubs in 1974.

Until Dale Murphy matched the feat in 1979, Mike was the last Braves player to hit three homers in a single game, in 1970 against the Padres . . . In 1967, he became the first Hawaiian to play in the majors since the Islands achieved statehood . . . His parents still live in Hawaii . . . Is an accomplished magician, performing on television and at parties . . . Works in Braves' Speakers Bureau in off season.



GARY MATTHEWS OF NO. 36

Gary Nathaniel Matthews. Born July 5, 1950 at San Fernando, Cal. Bats, throws right. 6-3, 190. Graduated from San Fernando High School, 1968. Married Pamela Green. Lives in Atlanta. Acquired—Signed as free agent out of re-entry draft, Nov. 18, 1976.

Gary had his best year ever in 1979, setting career highs in average, at bats, runs, hits, doubles, home runs, RBIs and slugging percentage . . . He was 10th in the NL in both average and slugging percentage.

Gary had batting streaks of 13(.411), 12(.442) and 8(.343) games in 1979 . . . Three times he had two homers in a game (May 1, June 18, and July 28) . . . He reached the 1000 career hits plateau on June 21 vs. Los Angeles.

Gary was acknowledged for his achievements by being named to the National League All-Star Game squad . . . He was held hitless in two at bats in the game, played in Seattle . . . Gary also went on a Japanese tour with National and American League all-star teams at the end of the 1979 season, batting .300 with a home run and three RBIs.

A model of consistency, Gary hit .311 against lefthanders and .303 against righthanded pitching last year . . . He feasted on pitches served up by Philadelphia, Pittsburgh and San Diego . . . Against the Phillies he hit .391 with 4 homers and 15 RBIs; against the Pirates he hit .396 with 5 homers and 14 RBIs; and batted .382 with 1 home run and 7 runs batted in against the Padres.

Gary came to the Braves after selecting Atlanta over 11 other teams following the draft of 1976 . . . He was the National League's Rookie of the Year in 1973 when he hit .300 with 12 homers and 58 RBIs with the Giants . . . A staunch basketball fan, Gary never misses a Hawks' home game . . . Was a two-time all-star in brief minor league tenure.




BOB HORNER INF NO. 5

Robert Horner. Born Aug. 1, 1957 at Junction City, Kan. Lives in Glendale, Ariz. 6-1, 195. Bats, throw right. Attended Arizona State University. Married Chris Berry. Acquired—Signed after selection as nation's No. 1 pick in 1978 summer draft.

In less than two full season, Bob as established himself as one of the top sluggers in baseball . . . His 56 home runs and 161 RBIs in 210 games project to 43 and 133 over a 162 games season . . . Bob ranked 5th in the NL in slugging percentage, .552 and had the second longest batting streak of the season, 20 games . . . Was 5th in the NL in batting average, .314 . . . Also, had two 4-hit games, on June 8 versus Philadelphia and June 28 against San Diego . . . Bob feasted on Pennsylvania pitching in '79 . . . Hit .450 with 3 home runs against Phillies and .440 with 3 homers versus Pirates.

Has averaged a homer for every 13.81 trips to the plate, an improvement over a rookie campaign in which he homered every 14.04 trips, which was the most productive figure ever for a Rookie of the Year . . . Of list including Joe DiMaggio, Ted Williams, Hank Aaron, Mel Ott, Rudy York and Willie Mays, only York had a better home-run-per-at-bat ratio for their first two years.

Set an Atlanta team record with nine sacrifice flies in 1978 . . . Hit NCAA record 25 homers at Arizona State . . . Braves had planned to start Horner at Savannah, but he talked them into staying with parent club . . . Impressed all observers. "Another Harmon Killebrew," said Montreal Manager Dick Williams.



AL HRABOSKY P NO. 39

Alan Thomas Hrabosky. Born July 21, 1949 at Oakland, Calif. Bats right, throws left. 5-11, 180. Graduate from Savannah High School (Anaheim, Calif.). Attended Fullerton (Calif.) Junior College. Married Dee White, has one child, Lisa Deann. Lives in Shawnee, Ks. Acquired—Signed as free agent after being chosen in 1979 re-entry draft.

Al signed with the Braves last Nov. 20 after a dozen clubs had chosen him in the 1979 re-entry draft . . . The colorful relief specialist is nicknamed "The Mad Hungarian" in reference to his ethnic background and flashy mound antics . . . He goes behind mound in tense moments for meditation to psyche himself for task at hand.

Had what a lot of pitchers would consider an "off" season last year at Kansas City, a 9-4 record with 12 saves . . . He explains it by saying, "They (the Royals) knew I wan't going to sign again at about mid-season, so they forgot me and started using other pitchers . . . I didn't pitch very much after July. I let it bother me and didn't contribute the way I should."

Was fifth in the AL with 20 saves in 1978 . . . In his last 4 NL seasons with St. Louis, Al had a 35-16 record with 54 saves . . . He was the NL Fireman-of-the-Year in 1975 . . . Was unanimously voted the NL Pitcher-of-the-Month for July of that year, the first unanimous choice since August, 1965 when Willie Mays was Player-of-the-Month.

Had back-to-back 17-strikeout games during first professional year at Modesto in 1969 . . . Had glittering prep career . . . Was named All-League, All-City and All-Orange in both baseball and football . . . He was twice named to the all-conference baseball team while in junior college . . . Hobbies are hunting, fishing, and camping.




BRUCE BENEDICT C NO. 20

Bruce E. Benedict. 6-1, 180. Bats, throws right. Born Aug. 18, 1955 at Birmingham, Ala. Lives in Omaha, Neb. Graduated from Millard, Neb. High School, 1973. Attended U. of Nebraska at Omaha. Acquired—Signed after selection in 1976 free agent draft.

After injury to Dale Murphy, Bruce alternated the starting catcher position with Joe Nolan . . . Good defensive catcher who handled Phil Niekro's knuckleball well . . . Hit .357 against World Champion Pittsburgh in 1979 . . . Son of a former major league player, Bruce has

excellent knowledge of the game . . . Works at famous Boys Town in Nebraska during the off-season.



DALE MURPHY OF NO. 3

Dale Bryan Murphy. Born March 12, 1956 at Portland Ore. Bats, throws right. 6-5, 205. Graduated from Woodrow Wilson High School, Portland, 1974. Lives in Bethel Park, Pa. Married Nancy Thomas. Acquired—Signed after selection in first round of the 1974 free agent draft.

Until an injury sidelined him on May 21, Dale was hitting .348 with 13 homers and a league-leading 36 RBIs after 39 games . . . Dale tore cartilage in his knee while catching one of Phil Niekro's knuckleballs . . .


Murf returned on July 19 and played first base the rest of the season, providing a good target for Braves infielders with his 6-5, 210-pound frame.

With the acquisition of first baseman Chris Chambliss, Dale will be shifted to the outfield in 1980, a position he hasn't played since high school . . . A good athlete, Murf is expected to make a smooth transition.

Murf hit three homers in a game against San Francisco on May 18 (Vida Blue, 1st inning; Blue, 3rd inning; and Tom Griffin, 7th inning) . . . It was the first time a Braves player had accomplished the feat since Mike Lum in 1970 . . . Dale also had hitting streaks of 12, 10 and 9 games during the season . . . Murf was named the National League Co-Player of the week with Chicago's Dave Kingman for May 13 to May 20 . . . During that period Dale hit .461 with three homers, all in one game, and had 10 RBIs . . . He received a watch from the league emblematic of the honor.

Dale blasted lefthanded pitching for a .368 average and five homers in only 87 at bats in 1979 . . . He hit San Diego pitching for a .333 average and six homers and 14 RBIs . . . He hit .417 against the Mets and .545 in three games versus Montreal.

Came to the Braves as one of the most highly touted catching prospects in the nation in 1974 . . . Led his high school team to honors and was named All-State, All-City and Most Valuable Player in his district his senior season at Woodrow Wilson High in Portland, Oregon . . . won All-Metro Portland honors in basketball.



LARVELL BLANKS INF NO. 16

Larvell Blanks. Born Jan. 28, 1950 at Del Rio, Tex. Bats, throws right. 5-8, 165. Graduated from San Felipe High School, Del Rio, 1969. Attended Mesa, Ariz., College. Married Rosemary Fay. Has two children: Jeffrey Wayne, Debra Lynn. Lives in Del Rio. Acquired—Obtained along with Doyle Alexander in trade with Texas for Adrian Devine and Pepe Prias, Dec. 7, 1979.

The popular "Sugar Bear" rejoins his original club after one season with the Texas Rangers and three with Cleveland . . . Gives the Braves depth at three infield positions, shortstop, third and second base . . . Best day in baseball was with Cleveland when he had five hits in as many chances against Baltimore Aug. 8, 1977.

Originally signed by Braves in June, 1969 draft . . . Was traded to Chicago White Sox with Ralph Garr for pitchers Dick Ruthven and Danny Osborn and outfielder Ken Henderson on Dec. 12, 1975. Then traded on the same day to Cleveland Indians for second baseman Jack Brohamer. Was acquired by Rangers with pitcher Jim Kern for outfielder Bobby Bonds and pitcher Len Barker.



Attended UCLA. Married Audry Garvin, has one child, Russell. Lives in Upper Saddle River, N.J. Acquired—Obtained with Luis Gomez in trade with Toronto for Joey McLaughlin, Barry Bonnell and Pat Rockett, Dec. 6, 1979.

Chris was the primary acquisition for the Atlanta Braves during the 1979-80 off season . . . Said Manager Bobby Cox at the 1979 winter meetings in Toronto, "We came up here determined to get a left-handed hitter, and we got the best one available" . . . Acquisition of Chambliss enables Braves to move last year's first baseman, Dale Murphy, to left field.

Chambliss' trade to the Braves was his second move in little more than a month . . . He was traded from the Yankees to Toronto with pitcher Paul Mirabella and infielder Damaso Garcia for pitcher No. 1 pick in the January, 1970 Free Agent Draft . . . Was traded to the Yankees with pitchers Dick Tidrow and Cecil Upshaw in exchange for Fritz Pererson, Steve Kline, Fred Beene and Tom Buskey on April 26, 1974.

Had an off-year with 63 RBIs in 1979 after driving 276 runs in previous three years . . . Still hit .280, just two points under his career average, and had a career-high 18 homers . . . Hit .280 at home and on the road in 1979 . . . Closed out season with ten game hitting streak. Had another streak of ten games in July . . . Had 14 TBIs in nine games in July.

Few people will forget Chris' homer to beat the Royals in the 9th inning of the final game of the 1976 American League playoffs . . . Finished 5th in the MVP voting that year . . . Phil had another of his outstanding seasons in 1979, being the workhorse of the Braves' pitching staff, as well as the major leagues . . . He tried brother Joe (Houston Astros) for most wins, 21, the third time in his career he has reached the 20-win mark . . . "Knucksie" led the league in games lost, games started, complete games, innings pitched, hits allowed, batters faced, runs allowed, homers allowed, walks allowed and hit batsmen . . . He won the Golden Glove fielding award for the second straight year.

Phil's 44 games started in 1979 were the most in the majors since Wilbur Wood started 48 with the White Sox in 1973. They were the most in the NL since Grover Cleveland Alexander had 44 in 1917 . . . His 218 career wins at the end of the '79 season ranked 8th actively and 50th on the all-time win list . . . Phil recorded one shutout in 1979 to give him 35 in his career, 10th among active pitchers . . . Tied ML record with 6 wild pitches in games vs. Houston on Aug. 4.
