CHRONOLOGY OF THE SAN DIEGO RIPTIDE

May 16, 1998 — Gil Saidy attends his first Arena football game as the Arizona Rattlers win 62-61 when the Milwaukee Mustangs' two-point conversion to win the game fails. Saidy is fascinated with ArenaBall and begins working on getting an Arena football team for the San Diego area.

June 27, 1998 — Cree Morris leaves playing for the lowa Barnstormers in order to bring Arena football to his hometown of San Diego. He contacts the AFL upon his return to Southern California and they inform him that Saidy is in the process of getting San Diego an Arena team.



July 5, 1998 — Morris and Saidy meet at the Old Town Mexican Café and decide to combine their efforts in bringing Arena football to San Diego Arena.

Jan. 15, 1999 — While at the gym, Morris informs his long-time friend Eddie Quiroz of his pursuit of Arena football. Quiroz expresses interest and he joins Morris and Saidy's efforts.

Aug. 24, 1999 — The AFL Board of Directors approved the final four applications for arenafootball2 (af2) to begin play in March 2000. Saidy focuses his efforts from an Arena team to an af2 team.

Mid-June, 2001: AFL Commissioner C. David Baker was on Xtra Sports 690 with Scott Kaplan and Billy Ray Smith. Kaplan and Smith express interest in an af2 team to Baker after the show. Within a week, Smith and Kaplan are told about Saidy's group and they decide to combine their efforts.

Sept. 28, 2001 — Tampa Bay Storm Director of Media Relations, Andy Lopusnak comes to San Diego working for CBS Sports to cover a Chargers game and meets Scott Kaplan, who was the sideline reporter for the game. The two discuss Arena football for hours and Lopusnak expresses interest in San Diego's efforts for making af2 football happen in Southern California. He leaves the Storm and is hired on 12/12/01.

Oct. 24, 2001: San Diego approved for the 34th and final team for the 2002 arenafootball2 season.

Nov. 11, 2001: Mike Arenzana's entry of "Riptide" on sandiegoarenafootball.com is one of over 150 names.

Dec. 15, 2001: Team hosts its first open player tryout at Balboa Stadium. Seventyfive potential players attend the tryout, including eight players that are on the team's training camp roster.



Dec. 19, 2001: The af2 officially approves the name of the team as the "Riptide."



Dec. 27, 2001: The af2 assigns San Diego State standout Rico Curtis and former Oceanside High phenom Jerry Garrett to San Diego. They become the first two players in team history.

Jan 10, 2002: Mike Arenzana is told that his entry of "Riptide" has been chosen as the team name. He will receive four season tickets.

Jan. 15, 2002: Team formally announces that "Riptide" will be the team's name. Also, the team management, coaches and first three players assigned by the af2 announced. The team website, www.sandiegoriptide.com, is launched immediately following the press conference.



Jan. 27, 2002: The Riptide Dance Team has their first audition and five members are chosen from the tryout.

Feb. 6, 2002: Former San Diego Charger and Super Bowl winner Steve Hendrickson is assigned to the Riptide roster.

Feb. 9, 2002: The Riptide hold their final openplayer tryout and over 230 potential players tryout for the team. The Riptide eventually sign 12 players from the workout.

Feb. 10, 2002: The Riptide Dance Team holds their final audition and the remainder of the squad is finalized.

Feb. 15, 2002: The Riptide initiate their community-involvement campaign with the first of many outings with the Greater San Diego Inner-City Games afterschool program.

March 11, 2002: OL/DL Brad Elmore is signed

by the AFL's Arizona Rattlers, becoming the first Riptide player signed away by an Arena feetball tage.



April 6, 2002: Riptide play their first game against the Bakersfield Blitz.

SAN DIEGO SPORTS ARENA

The San Diego Sports Arena, after spending nearly four decades bringing Southern California the greatest names in sports and entertainment, celebrated its 35th anniversary this past November.

With over 150 diverse and exciting events a year, the arena has been consistently one of the top ten arenas in the U.S. in gross dollar sales and in 2001, *Amusement/Billboard Magazine* named the venue #1 in the U.S. for arenas 10.001 to 15.000 seats.

Robert Breitrard, a local high school and San Diego State football star, built the arena for \$6.4 million to bring professional sports to the San Diego community. It opened its doors for the first time on November 17, 1966 when the San Diego Gulls defeated the Seattle Totems 4-1.

Since that historic game, thousands of concerts, sporting and other entertainment events have taken place in this revolutionary venue. Legendary headliners like Elvis Presley, Frank Sinatra, U2, *NSYNC, Led Zepplin, The Who, James Brown, Garth Brooks and the Rolling Stones have performed before millions of guests here.

Millions of others have witnessed some of the greatest moments in sports history, including the 1975 NCAA Final Four, when John Wooden coached his final collegiate game as the UCLA Bruins won their tenth title under him, and the first Muhammad Ali-Ken Norton heavyweight fight in 1973. Norton, a San Diego native, broke the jaw of Ali in the first round and then went on to win the bout in a split decision.

The Sports Arena is currently the home of the 10-time MISL champion San Diego Sockers, the 4-time Taylor Cup winning San Diego Gulls of the WCHL and now the expansion San Diego Riptide of arenafootball2.

The 1971 NBA All-Star game took place at the arena and the NBA's Rockets and Clippers once called the Sports Arena home before moving to Houston and Los Angeles, respectively.

The arena continues to make improvements to enhance the entertainment experience with a new score-board, food court, JBL sound system, dressing rooms, production room, catering room and interactive displays by the World-Famous San Diego Zoo and San Diego Wild Animal Park.

As a celebration of the facilities 35-year anniversary in 2002, the arena will be unveiling an enormous lifesized photo display of the most historic moments at the arena as it continues to grow and expand well into the 21st century.

COACHING PROFILES

Cree Morris

Head Coach/ Director of Football Operations

The Riptide's first head coach is former Orange Glen High School quarterback Cree Morris, who has playing experience with the NFL, Arena Football League and the World League. Morris also played collegiate football with San Diego State and St. Mary's College.



Morris, 31, led Orange Glen to a 12-1 record his senior year in 1988, finishing second in the state in passing with over 3,000 yards and 30 TDs. He was named Palomar League Offensive Player of the Year, First-Team All-CIF and Honorable Mention All-State.

He spent three years at San Diego State, where he had the rare distinction of throwing Darnay Scott his first collegiate touchdown and handing Marshall Faulk his first collegiate carry in the same game — a 49-13 win over Cal State Long Beach on 9/8/1991.

In 1992, Morris transferred to Division II St. Mary's College in Moraga, California, where he earned a B.A. in Health, Fitness and Recreation with an emphasis on teaching. In two seasons with the Gaels, he threw for 3,451 yards and 24 TDs, as well as six rushing scores. He is listed 16 times in the school's all-time record books after leading them to consecutive winning seasons in just 15 starts.

He participated in the training camp of the Los Angeles Raiders in 1994. In April of 1995, Morris signed with the San Jose SaberCats of the Arena Football League, however, the St. Louis Rams invited him to their training camp. In 1996, Morris spent a season in the World League of American Football with the London Monarchs.

The following year, Morris began his two-year Arena career spending a year and half with the Arena League's San Jose SaberCats (1997-98) and finishing his career with the Iowa Barnstormers (1998).

Following his playing career, Morris focused on bringing Arena football to the San Diego area.

He has served as an assistant coach at John Swett High in the Bay Area (1994), his alma mater Orange Glen (1997-98) and Castle Park High (2000-01).

He's married to Stephanie, who he has been dating since they were 12. On December 8, they had their first child, Noah Trey.

COACHING PROFILES

Derek Dahlen

Defensive Coordinator/Secondary Coach

He is a renowned rugby player, with seven years experience with San Diego's OMBAC 15's and 7-on-7 teams that have won two national championships. Last year, Dahlen had the honor of representing the United States in a Mediterranean and Middle Eastern tour that had a 9-1 record and became the first U.S. team to win an international tournament in Budapest since the 1924 Olympics.



He attended St. Augustine High in North Park, where he lettered in football, basketball and wrestling. He met Riptide Head Coach Cree Morris while participating in a scrimmage against San Diego State, while he was at Mesa Junior College in 1989. Transferred to St. Mary's in 1990 and was named the team's Rookie of the Year in 1991 and Defensive Back of the Year in 1992. Was a roommate of Morris' when the Riptide head coach transferred there.


When not playing rugby, Dahlen has been a high school football assistant coach with John Swett (1993-94) and Castle Park since 2000. One of his former players, Chris Riggs, was named All-CIF, All-County and voted Player of the Year.

Dahlen is the VP and general manager of one of San Diego's favorite restaurants, Bully's East in Mission Valley. His father opened Bully's in 1971 and the Dahlen family has been serving the San Diego community ever since.

Tim White

Offensive/Defensive Line Coach

White is a math teacher at University of San Diego High School, where he also is the assistant head football coach and the head coach of the junior varsity and freshmen wrestling teams. White was also the Assistant Head Football Coach for St. Augustine High School and before that, three seasons with Santana High School. He was a tutor and volunteer for 2 seasons

THE HISTORY OF ARENA FOOTBALL

THE ARENA FOOTBALL LEAGUE, EVOLUTION OF A FAN FRIENDLY SPORT

On February 11, 1981, while watching the Major Indoor Soccer League all-star game at Madison Square Garden, James Foster drew the outline of a miniature football field over a hockey rink on a manila envelope and penciled in notes on what would evolve into a curiously new and exciting adaptation of America's favorite team sport. The NFL marketing veteran had created a unique new game of "indoor" professional football that was quite distinct from the established outdoor game. He began with a proven sport — American football — and knowing that there was no room for competition with the NFL, he decided to create an indoor, summer "hybrid." In doing so, he applied the best of the outdoor game with innovative twists: 50-yard fields, eight-player single-platoon system, drop kicks and rebound nets.

FASCINATING, COMPLEX NEW GAME PIOUES FANS' INTEREST

In 1985, after the rise and fall of the USFL, Foster began to further develop the game. To measure public response, he conducted a "test game" in Rockford, Ill. on April 26, 1986. The response led to a "showcase game" Feb. 26, 1987 at the Rosemont Horizon in Chicago. The game was greeted enthusiastically by 8,200 fans and set the stage for the national debut of the Arena Football League in June 1987. Four teams were fielded for the inaugural 1987 season: Chicago Bruisers, Denver Dynamite, Pittsburgh Gladiator, and Washington Commandos. The Dynamite, led by quarterback Whit Taylor, defeated the Gladiators, 45-16, to become champions of ArenaBowl I before 13,232 fans in Pittsburgh's Civic Arena and a live ESPN audience. The average attendance in that inaugural season was 11,279.



DETROIT "DRIVES" TO BE THE BEST

Pizza mogul and owner of the NHL's Detroit Red Wings and MLB's Detroit Tigers brings ArenaBall to the Motor City in 1988. In their six seasons in the Arena Football League, the Detroit Drive participated in the ArenaBowl in every season of their existence winning four — their only losses coming to the hands of Jay Gruden and the Tampa Bay Storm. The Drive were led by AFL legendary Head Coach Tim Marcum and players like **George**LaFrance, Art Schlichter, Gary Mullen, Dwayne Dixon and Alvin Rettig.

INDOOR WAR BECOMES RIVAL-FREE

A new era of "The 50-Yard Indoor War" unfolded in 1990. Foster and partners at Gridiron Enterprises, Inc. made the decision to sell licenses to investors in major markets, and thereby enabled private ownership of teams. On March 27, 1990, the U.S. Patent Office issued patent No. 4,911,443 for the Arena Football Game System, making it the only sports league in history able to play a patented, rival-free game.



STORM WARNING LOOMS, ATTENDANCE SKYROCKETS

Following the 1990 season, the league made its second venture onto foreign "turf." The Detroit Drive, after winning their third straight title, collided with the Dallas Texans before 14,257 fans in Paris, France. Back in the United States, the league expanded from six to eight teams in 1991, including the debut of the Orlando Predators and the Tampa Bay Storm. The Storm established a single game attendance record with 24,445 fans versus Denver — that record, however, was broken two years later by the Storm, whom hold every attendance record in AFL history. The league averaged an all-time high of 12,813 fans per game.



TAMPA BAY-ORLANDO "WAR ON I-4" RIVALRY BEGINS; STORM WIN FIRST OF FOUR TITLES IN SIX YEARS

On June 1, 1991, the Tampa Bay Storm and Orlando Predators play their first game in each's team history. Orlando prevails 51-38 in the first of many "War on I-4" battles. The rivalry is the greatest in AFL history. Both have won ArenaBowl titles against each other and won semi-final games to advance to ArenaBowls. Twelve seasons later, the Storm have four titles and the Predators two. The two teams have appeared in 11 title games. In 1991, the Storm, in their first year, beat three-time defending champ Detroit 48-42 for their first of four titles in six seasons.




THE SNAKEPIT COMES TO LIFE, WAGNER WINS FIRST OF SIX STRAIGHT IRONMAN AWARDS


The four-time winner of the NBA's Executive of the Year award, Jerry Colangelo, brought Arena football to Phoenix in 1992. The Rattlers were, and still are, coached by former Dallas Cowboy great Danny White and averaged 15,505 fans in America West Arena (The Snakepit). The league introduced divisional play for the first time. On the field, the Predators "unleashed" Barry Wagner, who claimed the first of six consecutive Ironman of the Year awards. In 1993, both the Rattlers and Predators sold-out each home game. While at the ThunderDome in St. Petersburg, Storm shattered their own attendance record for a regular season game (28,746 vs. Orlando) and playoff contest (21,111 vs. Albany).

RATTLERS STUN PREDATORS, MILWAUKEE WELCOMES ARENABALL, STORM WIN THIRD TITLE

The 1994 season was highlighted by great team accomplishment. Only a 40-39 loss to Tampa Bay in the final game of the season kept the Predators from becoming the seventh team in the history of professional football to go undefeated and untied in a regular season. Arizona became the lowest seed ever to win the league title, climbing from the third seed to upset Orlando, 36-31, in ArenaBowl VIII. The Rattlers become the first pro team from the state Arizona to win a pro championship. The true meaning of fan support was demonstrated in Milwaukee as 14,232 fans per game struggled along with the expansion Mustangs through a 0-12 season. In 1995, the expansion lowa Barnstormers, quarterbacked by future two-time NFL and Super Bowl XXXIV MVP Kurt Warner. fell eight points short of an ArenaBowl IX appearance. The Storm beats the Predators 48-35 in ArenaBowl IX in front of 25,087 at the ThunderDome; George LaFrance earns his third ArenaBowl MVP award.







TEN YEARS LATER, FAN TOTAL REACHES ONE MILLION FOR SEASON

The league's 10th Anniversary season in 1996 proved to be record setting. More than one million fans attended games for the first time in history. Additionally, ESPN's broadcast of ArenaBowl X between the Storm and Barnstormers, quarterbacked by Warner, surpassed one million households. Tampa Bay wins 42-38, when Warner fails to win the game with four snaps near the goal line in the final minute.

GRUDEN ENDS PLAYING CAREER WITH TITLE; STARTS HEAD COACHING ONE WITH ANOTHER: NOW PLAYING AGAIN

Storm quarterback **Jay Gruden** plays his final game in ArenaBowl X after a stellar career where he led Tampa Bay to a 12-2 playoff record, four championships in six seasons and finished with every AFL career passing mark. In 1998, he took over as head coach of Orlando, the Storm's bitter rival, and led the Predators to an ArenaBowl title that year and another in 2000. This season, Gruden will take the field as the Predators starting quarterback, playing his first pro game in more than five years.

BAKER BEGINS ARENA REIGN; RATTLERS CLAIM TITLE SECOND CHAMPIONSHIP: WARNER PLAYS LAST AFL GAME

The 1997 season marked **C. David Baker**'s first as league commissioner, and what followed was a "high-scorin', heart-stoppin', helmet-poppin'" experience. The Rattlers, who led the 14-team circuit with nearly 16,000 fans per game, claimed their second title in ArenaBowl XI against the Barnstormers before 17,436 fans, a team record. It marked the last Arena football game for Kurt Warner, who was later signed by the St. Louis Rams. The Arena Football Hall of Fame inducts its first class of inductees. On the year, five clubs averaged more than 50 points per game - the league's per game combined point total reached an all-time high 91 points per game.



ABC TELEVISES ARENABOWL, NFL-AFL ANNOUNCE ALLIANCE, LEAGUE UNVEILS FANS' BILL OF RIGHTS

ABC Sports broadcasts ArenaBowl XII, won 62-31 by the Predators over the Storm on Aug. 23, 1998. Former Storm QB, Jay Gruden, coached the Predators to their first of two championships in his first year as head coach. Albany's Chad Dukes snapped Wagner's streak and won the Ironman of the Year trophy. The league also shattered the previous mark of 91.6 combined points per game, scoring a whopping 97.4 in 1998, including a record 111.1 in Week 13. According to a 1998 ESPN Chilton Sports poll, Arena Football was named as one of the "hottest new sports" that has emerged in the United States over the last decade. On Feb. 8, 1999, the National Football League agreed to purchase an exclusive option to acquire an equity interest in the AFL. The option will give the NFL a minority ownership interest (up to 49.9%) in the AFL and a voice in the operation of the league. The alliance between the NFL and the AFL began on June 3, 1998,



when the AFL Board of Directors approved the application of New Orleans Saints owner Tom Benson to place a team in New Orleans. NFL bylaws previously prohibited NFL owners from investing in other football leagues or teams, but an amendment to NFL rules was adopted on May 22, 1998, allowing an exception for AFL teams in an NFL club's own market. In April of 1999, the AFL unveiled its Fans' Bill of Rights — the first of its kind by any pro sport.

WARNER MAKES BIG IMPACT IN NFL; ARENA FOOTBALL VIDEO GAME "UNLEASHED"


Former Barnstormer QB **Kurt Warner** gets the starting nod with the St. Louis Rams for the 1999 season after high-priced free-agent QB Trent Green was injured in the preseason. Warner went onto lead the Rams from a 3-13 record in '98 to a 13-3 record and the franchise's first Super Bowl



victory. Warner was the 1999 NFL MVP and Super Bowl XXXIV MVP. Last season, he received his second NFL MVP award and led the Rams to the Super Bowl. In his short three seasons as an NFL starter, Warner holds nearly every passing record in NFL history for that period of time and is the NFL career leader in completion percentage and passer rating. On May 26, 2000, Midway Entertainment released the first Arena football video game — Kurt Warner's Arena Football Unleashed.

af2 KICKS OFF, FIREBIRDS CELEBRATE 10 SEASONS WITH ARENABOWL TRIUMPH

On August 24, 1999, the AFL Board of Directors approved the final four applications for arenafootball2 to begin play in April 2000. The original 15 teams consisted mostly midsize cities in the southeast and Midwest, operating in arenas with capacity of 6,000 to 12,000. The Firebirds, celebrating 10 years in Albany, won ArenaBowl XIII over defending champion Predators, 59-48. Albany's **Eddie Brown** won a record third Offensive Player of the Year award and was MVP of ArenaBowl XIII, while Arizona's Hunkie Cooper garnered his first of two straight Ironman of the Year trophy. The Detroit Fury owned in partnership



by Palace Sports & Entertainment and William Ford Jr. of the Detroit Lions began play in 2001, while another group backed in part by the late Walter Payton — the Chicago Rush — also began in 2001; both teams made the playoffs with the Rush beating the defending champion Predators in the first round of the playoffs. Washington Redskins owners Daniel Snyder and Fred Drasner were awarded an expansion team for the DC area that will begin play in the 2003 season.

MILLENNIUM SEASON INCLUDES 32 MARKETS PLAYING ARENA FOOTBALL

For the AFL, the 2000 season was, to say the least, yet another moment of history in the making. With new NFL owners signing on, including the Cowboys and Redskins, plans for future All-Star and international



exhibition games and increasing resolution to the labor dispute, the AFL continues its climb to the next tier of major professional sports. Nearly 80 regular season records were matched or broken in 2000, including Aaron Garcia's 92 passing TDs (he passed for 104 the following season) and Mike Horacek's 46 touchdown receptions for the Barnstormers. Horacek also broke a 13-year old record for receiving yards, gathering 285 in lowa's 77-76 win over the Firebirds. The New England Sea Wolves and San Jose SaberCats combined to score a then record 161 points. In that game, rookie Anthony Derricks of the Sea Wolves returned five kicks for touchdowns, a league record. More than two million fans attended regular season Arena Football games in the 32 markets competing in both the AFL and af2. It was the fifth consecutive year that the AFL surpassed one million fans. In their inaugural season, 15 af2 teams drew nearly one million fans. Dallas Cowboys owner Jerry Jones and family were awarded an AFL franchise in Dallas, TX - the Desperados begin play this season.





af2 LAUNCHES INTO STARDOM WITH INAUGURAL "KICKOFF 2000" GAME

With over a year of planning and organizing, af2 becomes a reality on March 31, 2000 at the Birmingham-Jefferson Civic Center as the Tennessee Valley Vipers (Huntsville, AL) take on the home-standing Birmingham Steeldogs in front of a frantic 14,831 fans on opening night. OL/DL Heath Springer of Tennessee Valley scored the first ever points in af2 history on a safety in the first quarter, which sparked the visiting Tennessee Valley Vipers to victory, 58-19.

af2 BECOMES A LEAGUE OF OPPORTUNITY FOR ITS PLAYERS, COACHES AND OFFICIALS

The movement of af2 players to other leagues with 70 af2 players were moved up to the CFL, AFL or NFL throughout the inaugural season. Tulsa Talons' lineman David Camacho started the first wave of player movement when the NFL's Baltimore Ravens, showing that the af2 is a "league of opportunity" for its players, signed him. Almost 20% of af2 players on rosters for the 2000 season moved up to another league. Two af2 head coaches also got opportunities at the next level as Tulsa Talons' Head Coach Jon Norris signed on to be an assistant with the AFL's Oklahoma Wranglers and Augusta Stallions' Coach of the Year Mike Neu is now the Head Coach of the Carolina Cobras. The excitement of af2 caught on to the officials as eleven total officials who were on af2 crews in 2000 were moved up to officiate in the AFL for the 2001 season. The growth of af2 has spawned a new generation of athletes, coaches and officials.

af2 PROVES TO BE A "HIT" AT THE TURNSTILES

Through a vigorous 120-game, 18-week schedule, af2 fans across the league turned out in bunches to cheer on their respective teams. The Arkansas Twisters proved to everyone that the game of Arena Football could work in mid-sized communities. The Twisters led af2 in attendance in 2000 with an average of 13,766 fans per game including two games this season with over 16,000 fans. In total, arenafootball2 averaged 7,239 fans per game and over 900,000 fans walked through turnstiles in af2 venues throughout the regular season and playoffs. Besides the NFL, NHL and NBA, af2 was the only other professional sports league to fill its buildings to over 70% capacity in 2000 (af2 was at 72%).

af2's QUAD CITY BREAKS THE CENTURY MARK

On May 26, 2000, the Quad City Steamwheelers beats Greensboro 103-3 in the most-lopsided game in professional football history. They become the first team to score over 100 points in a single contest and their 100-point margin of victory is the largest in pro football history.



PERFECTION FOR QUAD CITY; ARENACUP BROADCAST ON TNN


The stage was set as the undefeated Quad City Steamwheelers looked to finish off a historic first season in ArenaCup 2000 against the hungry Tennessee Valley Vipers. In front of a sellout crowd of 9,201 fans at The Mark in Moline. IL and a national television audience on TNN, the two teams played the most exciting game of 2000. Back and forth they went until Quad City finally pulled ahead for a 68-59 victory and a record-setting 19-0 unblemished mark and championship. Over 300,000 fans tuned in to the TNN broadcast announced by Eli Gold, Mark May and Jill Arrington, to provide the perfect end to a historic season. Players, who played for the love of the game and to keep their



dream alive, coaches, officials and especially the fans worked together to make af2's first season an overriding success.

ONE MILLIONTH FAN, STEAMWHEELERS REPEAT, SWINTON FINDS SUCCESS IN THE NEL

At Pensacola's home game against Rochester on July 12, 12-year-old Brain Martin becomes af2's onemillionth fan. The af2 became the first current professional football league to reach the 1 million mark in just its second season. On August 10, 2001 the Quad City Steamwheelers slipped past the Richmond Speed 55-51 to become two-time ArenaCup champions. Neither team recorded back-to-back scores, as there were 16 lead changes, including WR/LB Scott Hvistendahl's 3-yard championship-winning touchdown catch from QB Jay McDonagh with 10 seconds left to play. After lighting-up the af2 in 2001, former Arkansas Twister Reggie Swinton finishes his first NFL season. Playing in all 16 games, Swinton returned 56 kickoffs for 1,327 yards (5th in NFL) and took back 31 punts for 414 yards (5th in NFL) including one for TD. He averaged 23.7 yards per kickoff return (5th in NFL, minimum 50 returns) and 13.4 yards per punt return (3rd in NFL, minimum 25 returns). Swinton also caught seven passes for 117 yards and one TD.



GARCIA AIRS IT OUT IN NEW YORK

On July 7, 2001, **Aaron Garcia**, of the AFL's New York Dragons, hurls 11 TDs and runs in another as the Dragons beat Carolina 99-68 in a game that saw 22 TDs scored by the teams combined, five field goals



and even a safety. The 167 points is the most in Arena history for a single game. Garcia would finish the season with a pro football record 104 passing touchdowns.

10 TEAMS ADDED FOR 2002 SEASON, WEST DIVISION OPENS

af2 continues to grow in 2002, as 10 expansion teams are added. Albany, N.Y.; Bakersfield, Calif.; Cape Fear (Fayetteville), N.C.; Fresno, Calif.; Honolulu, Hawaii; Mobile, Ala.; Mohegan (Uncasville) Conn.; New Haven, Conn.; San Diego, Calif. and Wilkes-Barre/Scranton, Pa. will all try to reach ArenaCup III. The expansion class features Pro Football Hall of Famer Johnny Unitas, co-operator of the Wilkes-Barre/Scranton Pioneers, and former NFL quarterback Ken Stabler, co-operator and director of football operations for the Mobile Wizards. The league sticks with the two-conference format, but expands to four divisions in each conference, including the new West Division, af2 reaches alltime highs with the 34-team, 18-week, 272-game regular season schedule.

4/8: Arkansas has a crowd of 16,068, the largest crowd to see an af2 game in the 2000 season as they wallop Charleston 86-13. Richmond QB Cody Whipple catches a 32-yard touchdown pass from himself after a deflection off of a defender, but the Speed loss 48-41 at Pensacola.

4/19: Tulsa OL/DL David Camacho gets signed by the Baltimore Ravens, making him the first af2 player to make the leap up to the NFL.

4/22: Norfolk kicker Lee McDonald converts 6 of 7 field goal attempts to give Norfolk a 39-38 win against Charleston in the first ever af2 game that goes to overtime. McDonald's six field goals is an af2 record for most three—point field goals made in a game.

5/5: Charleston Swamp Foxes' kicker Tom Sellers successfully drop kicks a 25-yard field goal, worth 4 points, as the Swamp Foxes beat Richmond 51-44. He becomes the first kicker since the AFL's St. Louis Stampede's Tom Whelihan did so in 1996.

5/16: Tennessee Valley OL/DL Curtis Jeter signs with the Saskatchewan Roughriders, becoming the first af2 player to sign with the Canadian Football League.

5/26: Quad City defeats host Greensboro 103-3. Quad City's 103 points is the most points ever scored in an Arena Football game. Quad City OS **Shon King** grabs seven TDs and returns a kick for another for a total of eight scores and 48 points; both af2 records.

6/3: Jacksonville kicker Jim Tarle connects on a 58-yard field goal (af2 record) in a losing effort against Richmond. Arkansas QB Jon Neilson passes for Arena-record 11 touchdowns in the Twisters 88-33 blowout over the Greensboro Prowlers.


7/29: Quad City finishes regular season with a 16-0 record becoming the first af2 undefeated team.

8/1: af2 announces its final regular season attendance of 868,696 for 120 games.

8/11: Quad City defeats Tennessee Valley 68-59 in the ArenaCup 2000. Steamwheelers become first professional football team to win 19 games in a season (19-0).

10/20: The Indoor Football League (IFL) is sold to Arena Football League – the Peoria Pirates and Lincoln Lightning are the only IFL teams to be integrated into the af2.

12/14: The NFL begins to oversee and manage Arena Football League and af2 game officials.



Peoria's Todd Kurz misses six field goals and the Steamwheelers limit the Pirates to just 59 yards of total offense.

4/7: Lincoln WR/DB Heath Staples sets af2 record for most tackles in a game with 14.5 in the Lightning's 50-45 win over the lowa Barnstormers.

4/11: af2 announces that 32 players from 2000 season make final 2001 rosters of AFL teams.

4/13: Quad City OS Craig Cole becomes only player with two missed field goal returns for a touchdown in a game against Memphis in the Steamwheelers 97-7 win over the Xplorers.

4/19: Norfolk sign former NFL QB Mike Buck as their head coach. He losses his first game 30-27 to Tallahassee, but leads the Nighthawks to wins in five of their next six.





4/21: Roanoke FB/LB Roy Johnson sets af2 record for longest rush from scrimmage with a 49-yarder in their overtime win over Jacksonville 50-47.

5/4: The Quad City Steamwheelers defeat Bossier City 55-43 to bring their all-time record to an unprecedented 24-0. The 24-game win streak is the longest win streak in professional football history and ties for second-longest undefeated streak in pro football history.

5/12: Quad City loses its first ever game 49-47 to Tulsa after Jay McDonaugh's two-point attempt to tie fell incomplete with 16 seconds left in the game. After recording two touchdowns, Birmingham OS Wayne Thomas set the career scoring record with 288 total points. The Steeldogs went on to a 65-42 win over Peoria. Thomas added 150 more points by the end of the season, bringing his career mark to 438

5/19: Throwing for 225 yards against Peoria, Tulsa QB Craig Strickland sets the all-time league record for total offense with 4,458 total yards in a losing effort against the Pirates (51-28). He finished the season with 4,035, bringing his two-year career total to 6,918.

6/8: With three kickoff returns for touchdowns, Louisville WR/DB **Brian McDonald** sets the season record and ties the league record for most kickoff returns for a touchdown in a game against Roanoke in the 83-41 Fire victory. He finishes the season with seven kickoff returns for scores.

6/22: With his 2.0 sacks against Jacksonville, Tallahassee OL/DL Ernest Certain set the single-season record for sacks. He finished the season with 20.0.






7/12: At Pensacola's home game against Rochester, 12-year-old Brain Martin becomes the one-millionth fan for the 2001 season. The home-standing Barracudas lose 31-28. The af2 become the first current professional football league to reach the 1 million in total attendance in just its second season.

7/14: Charleston WR/DB **Kenyatta Spruill** rushes for 96 yards against Norfolk and Baton Rouge's Leonard Holmes rushes for 93 yards against Birmingham as both break the former af2 record for most rushing yards in a game (79). Richmond DS Tyrone Laster becomes the first and only player in af2 history to return 2 interceptions for touchdowns in a game against Memphis. One of the returns (57 yards) is an af2 record for longest interception return.





7/21: Tennessee Valley QB **Matt Sauk** sets league record for most passing attempts (60) and completions (38) in Vipers' 56-55 season-finale win against Arkansas. The Vipers trailed 55-21 with 14:50 left in the fourth quarter and staged the biggest comeback in Arena history (34 points) to beat the Twisters.

7/24: af2 announces the addition of Wilkes-Barre/Scranton to the expansion class of 2002. The team is co-operated by Johnny Unitas, a Pennsylvania native, and Pro Football Hall of Famer.

8/1: Former Alabama and NFL quarterback Ken Stabler was introduced as part of the operator group and director of football operations for the Mobile Wizards.

8/10: The Quad City Steamwheelers slip by the Richmond Speed 55-51 to become two-time ArenaCup champions. Neither team recorded back-to-back scores, as there were 16 lead changes, including WR/LB Scott Hvistendahl's 3-yard championship-winning touchdown catch from QB Jay McDonagh with 10 seconds left to play. TNN broadcasts the game for the second straight year.

His statistics with the Louisville Fire for 2001 included: 83 receptions for 1058 yards with 16 TDs; 13 missed field goal returns for 325 yards with 3 TDs, and 90 kick returns for 1879 yards, resulting in 7 TDs. AFL and the US Army form a partnership.

2/4: AFL holds Pacific Rim Training Camp in Honolulu, Hawaii. Nearly 200 participants from Japan, Australia, New Zealand, Samoa, Tonga and Fiji participate in the weeklong camp. This is just another step to globalizing Arena Football.

MOLINE, IL — Xavier Patterson's 37-yard touchdown reception from Billy Dicken with just more than two minutes into the fourth quarter gave Quad City a 61-59 lead and proved to be the winning score for the Steamwheelers. Shon King gave Quad City a 14-0 lead in the first quarter on a 54-yard kickoff return just nine seconds into the game and a 29-yard pass from Dicken. Quad City pushed its lead to 27-14 on King's 32-yard reception early in the third quarter after two scoring strikes from Tennessee Valley QB Bryan Snyder. But the Vipers rallied to take a 45-41 lead early in the third quarter after Bobby Washington's 34-yard reception and a 1-yard plunge by Snyder. Ten seconds later, Tennessee Valley took a 52-41 lead when Quad City fumbled the ensuing kickoff, which was recovered for the score. But Quad City's King turned the game around with a 57-yard kickoff return for a score followed by a 53-yard missed field goal return for a score to give the Steamwheelers a 55-52 lead. A 16-yard reception by Washington with 20 seconds left in the third quarter gave Tennessee Valley its final lead of the game at 59-55. King ended the game with 338 all-purpose yards (174 kickoff return, 53 missed field return, 111 receiving) and five touchdowns en route to Game MVP honors.



MOLINE, IL — Neither team record back-to-back scores as there were 16 lead changes, including WR/LB Scott Hvistendahl's 3-yard championship-winning touchdown catch from QB Jay McDonagh with 10 seconds left to play to give the Quad City Steamwheelers their second consecutive af2 championship. With 1:22 remaining, Richmond WR/DB Kevin Harvey scored on a 13-yard strike from QB Bob Bees to give the Speed a 51-48 lead. But Richmond left too much time on the clock for the defending ArenaCup champions. On Quad City's ensuing possession after the Speed's final score, the Steamwheelers took over on their 18-yard line and QB Jay McDonagh, the championship's MVP, promptly connected with OS Craig Cole for a 15-yard gain. McDonagh then hit Hvistendahl, named the game's IRONMAN, for receptions of six and seven yards before the 6-foot-3, 335-pound Jamarr Ward managed just 1 yard on a carry on the next play. We believe that every Fan is entitled to a wholesome environment for guests and family members, free of violence, profane gestures and language or rude and invasive behavior that could in any way interfere with a first-class entertainment experience.

We believe that every Fan demands that we maintain absolute respect for the game of Arena Football and maintain the integrity of the finest of fair competition at all times.

We believe that every Fan deserves our very best effort on a consistent basis, on every play on the field, every action in the stands, every call to our office, and every involvement in our community.

We believe that every Fan is entitled to a total entertainment experience at an affordable cost for all members of the family from the time they arrive at the arena to the time they depart.

We believe that every Fan should receive the very best in competitive football, entertainment, merchandise, food and beverage for their purchasing power.

We believe that every Fan is entitled to interact with and have access to players and coaches for autographs and conversation in recognition of their support at every game.

We believe that Fans are entitled to fast, accurate, and complete information about our players, coaches, league, games, and performance.

We believe that Fans expect the Arena Football League to be comprised of gentlemen and ladies who are examples and role models for youth, free of physical violence, drugs, alcohol, and gambling abuse.

We believe that Fans expect us to honor our country and to be involved in our communities to make contributions for a better, safer, and more positive place to live.

We believe that Fans should know that we are committed to serve and not to be served, to give and not to just take, and to inspire and encourage people to higher levels of personal and professional achievement, growth, maturity, and respect for each other.









RULES OF THE GAME

THE FIELD

An indoor padded surface 85 feet wide and 50 yards long with eight-yard end zones.

Goal posts are nine feet wide with a crossbar height of 15 feet (NFL goal posts are 18-1/2 feet wide with the crossbar at 10 feet).

The goal-side rebound nets are 30 feet wide by 32 feet high. The bottoms of the nets are eight feet above the ground.

Sideline barriers are 48 inches high and made of high-density foam rubber.

THE EQUIPMENT

The official football is the same size and weight as the National Football League ball. Each ball is manufactured by Wilson Sporting Goods.

THE PLAYERS AND FORMATIONS

Eight players on the field; 19-man active roster; two-man inactive roster.

Players play offense and defense with the exception of the kicker, quarterback, offensive specialist (the kick returner on defense) and two defensive specialists.

Substitution: All non-specialists may substitute only once during each quarter.

Four (4) offensive players must line up on the line of scrimmage.

Three (3) defensive players must be down linemen (in a three of four-point stance). One linebacker may blitz on either side of the center. Alignment is two (2) or more yards off the line of scrimmage. No stunting or twisting. Offensive motion: Once receiver may go in forward motion before the snap.

TIMING

Four 15-minute quarters with a 15-minute halftime. The clock stops for out-of-bounds plays or incomplete passes only in the last minute of each half or when the referee deems it necessary for penalties, injuries or timeouts.

Each team is allowed three (3) time-outs per half.

MOVEMENT OF THE BALL AND SCORING

Four (4) downs are allowed to advance the ball ten (10) yards for a first down, or to score.

Six (6) points for a touchdown.

One (1) point for a conversion by place kick after a touchdown, two (2) points for a conversion by drop kick and two (2) points for successful run or pass after a touchdown.

Three (3) points for a field goal by placement or four (4) points for a field goal by drop kick.

Two (2) points for a safety.

THE KICKING

Kickoffs are from the goal line. Kickers may use a one-inch tee.

Punting is illegal. On fourth down, a team may go for a first down, touchdown or field goal.

The receiving team may field any kickoff or missed field goal that rebounds off the net.

Any kickoff untouched which its out of bounds will be placed at the 20-yard line or the place where it went out of bounds, whichever is more advantageous to the receiving team.

PASSING

Passing rules in Arena Football are the same as outdoor NCAA Football in which receivers must have one foot inbounds. A unique exception involves the rebound nets. A forward pass that rebounds off of the end zone net is a live ball and is in play until it touches the playing surface.

OVERTIME RULES

Overtime periods are 15 minutes during the regular season and the playoffs.

Each team gets one possession to score. If, after each team has had one possession, one team is ahead, that team wins. If the teams are tied after each has had a possession, the next team to score wins.









HOW TO CALCULATE ARENA FOOTBALL PASSER RATING

The AFL, like the NFL and other professional football leagues, rates its passers against certain performance standards. The NFL has been rating passers since 1960 with this QB rating system. This system can rate anything from a single passing attempt to a player's career. The AFL's rating system differs from its professional counterparts in only a slightly, but big enough to make a difference: touchdown percentage. The AFL multiples the TD% by .15 instead of .20 like the NFL

Four categories are used to calculate QB rating:

- Completion percentage
- · Average yards per attempt
- · Touchdown percentage
- Interception percentage

The maximum any passer can receive in any category is 2.375 and least is zero. For example, to gain 2.375 in completion percentage, a passer would have to complete 77.5 percent of his passes. The AFL-record for a season is 69.6 by the New York Dragons' Aaron Garcia in 2001.

To achieve 2.375 in average yards per attempt, a passer would have to average at least 12.5 yards per attempt. The AFL single-season record is by San Jose's Mark Grieb (10.23 in 2001).

For a 2.375 in touchdown percentage, a passer would have to have 15.83% of passes be touchdowns. Grieb's 20.5 ration in 2001 is the single season mark. Twenty others have surpassed the 15.83% mark in a season in AFL history.

And finally, a passer would have to not throw an interception in order to get a 2.375 in the interception % category.

The four category scores are then converted to a 100-point scale. It is possible to gain as much as a 158.33 rating when the passer has 2.375 in all four categories.

A "perfect game" or 158.33 rating has only occurred in nine NFL games since 1960, a record two by former All-Arena QB-turned Super Bowl MVP Kurt Warner.

For a season, the NFL highest is by Steve Young in 1994 with a 112.8 rating. In the AFL rating scale he would, however, have only a 106.5 rating. Grieb's amazing 2001 season rating of 134.15 tops the AFL charts. He would have the same rating in the NFL scale since his TD % (20.5) was higher than 15.83.

For example, Mark Grieb was 157-of-229 for 2,343 yards with 47 TDs and 4 interceptions in 2001 for the SaberCats.

This is how his 134.15 rating is calculated:

Completion Percentage – 157-of-229 is 68.6 percent. Subtract 30 from the completion percentage (34.3) and multiply the result by 0.05. The result is a point rating of 1.715

Average Yards Gained Per Attempt – 2,343 yards divided by 229 attempts is 10.23. Subtract three yards from yards-per-attempt (7.23) and multiply the result by 0.25. The result is 1.8075.

Touchdown Percentage - 47 touchdowns in 229 attempts is 20.5 percent. Multiply the touchdown percentage by 0.15. The result is 3.075, which will be credited as 2.375 since his TD% is higher than 15.83.

Interception Percentage - 4 interceptions in 229 attempts is 1.7467 percent. Multiply the interception percentage by 0.25 (0.43667) and subtract the number from 2.375. The result is 1.9383.

The sum of the four steps is (1.715+1.8075+2.375+1.9383) 8.049. The sum is then divided by six (1.3415) and multiplied by 100. In this case, the result is 134.15.
