CALIFORNIA CAPTURES PLAYOFF SPOT

NEW YORK AND PENNSYLVANIA CLASH FRIDAY, SUNDAY

NEW YORK, N.Y. - In two dramatic overtime matches which concluded the 1980 ASL regular season, the California Sunshine fought back to clinch the final berth in the ASL playoffs by overtaking the Golden Gate Gales by two points, for second place in the American Conference. Facing the prospect of two back-to-back matches with the two playoff contenders in the National Conference, the Sunshine upset New York United, 2-1, on Wednesday at Shea Stadium, and secured their spot in postseason play by scoring two goals versus the Pennsylvania Stoners before falling, 3-2, in extra time on Thursday in Allentown. The combined points awarded for goals scored and Cal's victory over United pushed the Sunshine ahead of Golden Gate with 99 points to Golden Gate's 97, with the Gales having led the Sunshine by seven points heading in to the week's action. Sacramento Spirit finished on top of the American Conference with 103 points.

In Wednesday's game in New York, Cal's playoff prospects looked bleak after Carmelo D'Anzi rifled in a 20 yard shot for United in the 25th minute, and carried their advantage in to the second half. But the Sunshine's Don Burke, who had come on as a substitute only three minutes earlier, tied the game up on a solo effort in the 72nd minute to force the match into overtime. With only five minutes remaining in the second and final extra session, Carlos Zavaleta pushed in a ball from the midst of a goal mouth scramble to give California the crucial victory. The win drew the Sunshine even with Golden Gate and they needed only to score one goal versus Pennsylvania to capture the American Conference playoff position.

The Sunshine wasted no time in making sure of their second place spot on

PLAYOFF PREVIEWS - New York will host Pennsylvania in the first leg of the National Conference playoffs on Friday, September 12th, when they host the Stoners at Randalls Island Stadium in New York City. The playing site was changed from Shea Stadium due to a conflict in the playing dates with the New York Mets. The second leg of the home-and-home, aggregate-goal affair will be played on Sunday, September 12th at ASD Stadium in Allentown, the home of the Stoners. During the regular season, Pennsylvania had a 3-3-0 record versus New York, with 8 goals for, and 9 against. In the last meeting between the two clubs, New York defeated Pennsylvania, 2-0, in New York.

In the American Conference, Sacramento Spirit, the first place finisher, and California will meet in Santa Ana for the first leg on Wednesday, September 10th with the return match set for Sunday, September 14th at Hughes Stadium in Sacramento. Sacramento finished with a 4-2-0 record versus California during the season, with 14 goals for, and 10 goals against. In their last meeting Sacramento defeated California by a score of 1-0 in Sacramento.

PLAYERS TO WATCH IN THE PLAYOFFS:

PENNSYLVANIA: The Stoners fashioned the top record in the entire ASL this past season, due primarily to the strong defense led by goalkeeper Scott Manning and sweeper George Gorleku. Manning topped all keepers with a 0.97 average, while Gorleku established himself as the League's top defender with his rugged tackling and dominance in the air. Adrian Brooks and Clyde Watson are the orchestrators in midfield, with Christian Nwokocha and Ian Filby the danger men in attack.

NEW YORK: United feature a high scoring attack, led by their Argentine striker Doval. Goalie Gerard Joseph came on to register three shutouts in United's last four games, and his back four marshalled by Redmond Lane, with All Stars Mario Concha and Feranado Clavijo providing valuable strength in defense and midfield, respectively. Late additions Wilson and Brazilian International Clodoaldo should provide a steadying effect on United during the post season competition.

SACRAMENTO: All Star striker Malcolm Filby leads the Spirit, with another All Star, Willie Munguia, the driving force in midfield. In defense, Sacramento has three experienced tough defenders in Bobby Arber, Mickey Brown, and Andy Stanton. Keeper Tom Reynolds was the ASL 2nd team All Star goalie this year, and has been to the playoffs before, so he should be prepared for the pressure.

CALIFORNIA: Cal's All Star midfielder Don Tobin could possibly be the top player in the ASL, and is the chief schemer for the Sunshine. Keith Walley complements Tobin well in midfield. In defense, Ramon Morlado, the sweeper, is
