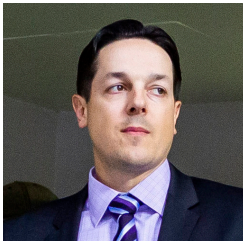

# HOCKEY OPERATIONS BIOS

## President & Governor Danny Briere



Briere was named Mariners Vice President of Operations in June of 2017, two years after finishing his playing career. He was named President and Governor in March of 2021. The former center played 973 NHL games over 17 seasons with the Phoenix Coyotes, Buffalo Sabres, Philadelphia Flyers, Montreal Canadiens, and Colorado Avalanche. He finished just shy of 700 career points and was a two-time All-Star. Briere was known as a clutch playoff performer throughout his career as well. As a 2010 Stanley Cup Finalist with the Flyers, he led the league in postseason scoring, putting up 30 points in 23 games. He averaged just under a point-per-game in his NHL playoff career (124 games). The Gatineau, Quebec native now resides in Philadelphia with his wife, Misha. Briere also has three sons: Carson and Caelan who play college hockey, and Cam, who is currently the Mariners video coach.

# HOCKEY OPERATIONS BIOS

## Head Coach Ben Guite



Ben Guite, 43, became the second head coach in Mariners history in August of 2021, taking over for Riley Armstrong who accepted an AHL job with the Lehigh Valley Phantoms. Guite is a household name in Maine already, having played and coached for the University of Maine NCAA Division I men's ice hockey program. He was a part of the team's second and most recent National Championship in 1999 as a junior forward, and went on to become the team's leading goal scorer and assistant captain the following season. Drafted by the Montreal Canadiens in 1997, Guite played 13 years of pro hockey, including NHL time with the Boston Bruins, Colorado Avalanche, and Nashville Predators. He also played nearly 600 career games in the AHL. Following his playing career, Guite returned to UMaine as an assistant coach in 2013. After four years, he was promoted to associate head coach, a position he held until 2021. Guite briefly served as Interim Head Coach in the Spring of 2021 following the tragic death of Head Coach Red Gendron. Guite is a native of LaSalle, Quebec. He and his wife, Kristen - Portland native, have two sons: Patrick and Maxime.

# HOCKEY OPERATIONS BIOS

## Assistant Coach Terrence Wallin



Wallin, 29, retires from a five year professional playing career to become the second assistant coach in team history. A native of Yardley, PA, Wallin has multiple New England connections, including a family home in Kennebunk. He also played his college hockey at the University of Massachusetts-Lowell from 2011-15. After beginning his pro career with the Southern Professional Hockey League's Peoria Rivermen in 2015-16, he rose to the ECHL and the Adirondack Thunder. Wallin played for parts of three seasons with Adirondack, plus a stint with the Rapid City Rush, before being traded from the Thunder to Maine prior to the start of the 2018-19 season. Wallin reached the AHL in 2017-18 and 2018-19, playing stints with the Binghamton Devils and Hartford Wolf Pack. He served as an alternate captain each of his two seasons as a player for the Mariners. In 2019-20, he scored 23 goals, tied for the team lead. Through two seasons, Wallin ranks second in all-time franchise points, goals, and power play goals, and leads the franchise in game-winning goals. Wallin founded Evolution Hockey Camps in 2019, teaching hockey skills to players of all ages. He currently lives in Portland with his wife, Erin.

## Equipment Manager Brian McQueen



McQueen joined the Mariners in September 2021 after three years in the SPHL with the Knoxville Ice Bears. He was named SPHL "Equipment Manager of the Year" in 2020. A native of Boston, MA, McQueen moved to Missouri where he attended the University of Central Missouri, earning a degree in Sport Management, and where he played inline hockey as a part of the NCRHA. He also gained experience in the ECHL as an equipment intern for the Kansas City Mavericks in 2017-18. Since 2015, Brian has also spent time working for the Kansas City Chiefs during their training camp, as well as a full season in 2017. Brian is excited to be returning to the east coast and currently lives in Biddeford.

## Athletic Trainer Matt Salmen



Salmen came on board in September of 2021 as the second athletic trainer in the franchise's history. Working with the Mariners new medical partners, Maine Medical Partners Orthopedics & Sports Medicine, Salmen joined the staff from St. Lawrence University in Canton, NY. He had been part of a five trainer staff at SLU since 2015, working for all 33 university athletics programs. Originally from Minnesota, Salmen got his bachelor's in athletic training at Minnesota State-Mankato and his master's of science in health and human performance from Austin Peay State University (Clarksville, TN). Salmen also worked for Adrian College's hockey programs from 2013-15 in Adrian, MI.

# AFFILIATE INFORMATION

## NHL Affiliate: Boston Bruins

The pride of professional hockey all throughout New England, the Boston Bruins are one of the National Hockey League's most prestigious franchises. An "original six" team, the Bruins are the third oldest active NHL organization and the oldest in the United States. The B's are six time Stanley Cup champions, most recently in 2011. The 2021-22 season is the first in the partnership with the Mariners, but the AHL edition were Boston affiliates from 1987-1992, before moving to Providence. More on that below. Today's Bruins remain a perennial Stanley Cup contender, reaching the Quarterfinals once again in 2021, where they fell in six games to the New York Islanders. They've won at least one playoff series each of the past four seasons.

## AHL Affiliate: Providence Bruins

You could say that hockey in Portland has come full circle, with the new Providence affiliation, as the P-Bruins are the former AHL Maine Mariners. Boston moved its AHL affiliate from Portland to Providence following the 1991-92 season, ending the 14 year run of the original Mariners. Providence, like Portland, has a rich history of minor league hockey, having hosted the Providence Reds (now the Hartford Wolf Pack) for five decades from 1926-1977. The Bruins lone Calder Cup championship came in 1998-99 after winning 56 games in the regular season. They were led that season by future Stanley Cup winning coach Peter Laviolette. The P-Bruins have finished first in the Atlantic Division each of the last two seasons, but no playoffs were held either year due to the pandemic.

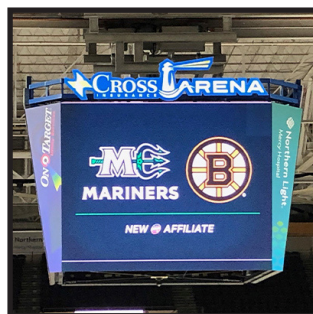

# HISTORY & TIMELINE

It was officially announced that professional hockey was making a triumphant return to town in June of 2017 when Comcast Spectacor purchased the ECHL membership of the Alaska Aces and relocated it to Portland, Maine. With Philadelphia Flyers brass Paul Holmgren and Danny Briere at the helm, the Mariners were “re-born” in September 2017 when they got their name, winning in a fan vote and paying homage to Portland’s first pro hockey franchise. A full timeline of the events leading up to the rebirth of professional hockey in Portland is below, and continues on the next page with a list of significant event, up to present day:

**June 15th, 2017:** Comcast Spectacor announces its purchase of the ECHL membership formerly known as the Alaska Aces and its intention to move the franchise to Portland, Maine and the Cross Insurance Arena.

**September 29th, 2017:** The Mariners get their name after beating out the Lumberjacks, Watchmen, Puffins, and Wild Blueberries in a fan vote.

**November 29th, 2017:** The Mariners logo and color scheme is revealed.

**February 17th, 2018:** Riley Armstrong is announced as the first head coach of the Mariners.

**April 9th, 2018:** The Mariners announce their first affiliation with the NHL’s New York Rangers and AHL’s Hartford Wolf Pack.

**June 22nd, 2018:** Forward Alex Kile signs with the Mariners, becoming the first rostered player in franchise history.

**August 15th, 2018:** Beacon The Puffin is revealed as the Mariners’ mascot.

**September 11th, 2018:** The Mariners make their first trade in franchise history, acquiring forward Terrence Wallin from the Adirondack Thunder in exchange for defenseman Matias Cleland.

**October 13th, 2018:** The Mariners host the Adirondack Thunder in the inaugural ECHL contest in Portland. Jason Salvaggio scores the first goal in franchise history at 10:29 of the first period. A crowd of 5,291 witnessed the game.

# HISTORY & TIMELINE (cont'd)

**October 21st, 2018:** After losing their first 3 games, the Mariners get their first win in franchise history, defeating the Newfoundland Growlers, 4-2 at the Cross Insurance Arena.

**November 24th, 2018:** Forward Ty Ronning registers five points in the third period of his ECHL debut to lead the Mariners to a thrilling 6-4 comeback win over the Manchester Monarchs. The Mariners trailed the Monarchs 4-1 with less than 14 minutes remaining in the game.

**March 17th, 2019:** The Mariners and Newfoundland Growlers play an 18-round shootout at the Cross Insurance Arena, the 4th longest shootout in ECHL history. The Mariners win the game 5-4, with Wade Murphy scoring twice, including the game-winner in the 18th round.

**April 7th, 2019:** The Mariners finish their inaugural season with a 22-12-1-1 home record, as they defeat Newfoundland again in a shootout, 4-3. Murphy once again scores the winner.

**August 28th, 2019:** Riley Armstrong is promoted to Assistant General Manager and given a two-year contract extension.

**February 15th, 2020:** A night after the Newfoundland Growlers break the ECHL record with their 19th straight home win, the Mariners end the streak, with a 3-1 victory on “The Rock.” They follow it up with two more victories on Feb. 18th and 19th to become the first team ever to hand the Growlers three straight home losses.

**March 10th, 2020:** The Mariners fall to the Norfolk Admirals, 3-2 at home, in the final game before the COVID-19 pandemic cancels the remainder of the ECHL regular season and playoffs.

**November 18th, 2020:** The entire ECHL North Division, including the Mariners, opts out of the 2020-21 season, due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Fourteen of the twenty-six teams participate in the season.

**June 30th, 2021:** The Mariners announce a new 3-year affiliation agreement with the Boston Bruins.

**August 3rd, 2021:** Ben Guite is named the second head coach in Mariners history after Riley Armstrong accepts a job in the AHL. Terrence Wallin is named assistant coach.

# PORTLAND HOCKEY HISTORY

## The Original Maine Mariners (1977-1987)

Professional hockey in Portland has a rich history, dating back to the 1970s, when the original Maine Mariners were brought to town by the same franchise that owns the modern Mariners, the Philadelphia Flyers. The “first” Mariners began play in the 1977-78 season as the AHL affiliate of the Flyers and played their first game in Portland on October 15th, 1977. The Mariners took the league by storm, winning the Calder Cup after a 43-28-9 regular season and defeating the New Haven Night-hawks for the title. They followed up the impressive feat by repeating as Calder Cup Champions the following season, going 45-22-13 and taking down New Haven once again in the finals. The Mariners are still the only franchise in AHL history to win the Calder Cup in each of its first two seasons.



Prior to the 1983-84 season, the Flyers sold the affiliation to the New Jersey Devils, and the Mariners pulled off more “first year” magic, winning their third Cup, despite the franchise’s first regular season losing record (33-36-11). They defeated the Rochester Americans in the Calder Cup Finals to capture their third championship. It also marked their fifth finals appearance in seven seasons of existence.

## Maine Mariners, Second Franchise (1987-1992)

Following the 1986-87 season, the Devils relocated their AHL franchise to Utica, NY, opening the door for the Boston Bruins to take geographical advantage of the Portland market and place their top affiliate in town - an AHL expansion franchise. The Bruins preserved the team name and its logo, making only a color scheme change from Flyers black-and-orange to Bruins back-and-gold. Remarkably, it appeared that the Mariners were going to pull off yet another first year run to the Cup, finishing with the best record in the North Division (44-25-7-4), but they were ousted by the Fredrickton Express in the Division Finals. The 1987-88 season would be the only successful one for the Bruins iteration of the Mariners, who failed to finish above .500 or make the playoffs in any of their four preceding seasons. After the 1991-92 campaign, the Bruins moved the franchise to Providence, Rhode Island, where it still operates today. The last Maine Mariners AHL game took place on April 4th, 1992.



## Portland Pirates (1993-2016)

After just one season without hockey at the Cross Insurance Arena, the Washington Capitals moved their AHL affiliate from Baltimore, Maryland to Portland, and the Pirates were born. Enjoying tremendous success on and off the ice right away, the Pirates did what only the Mariners could do before them, and won the Calder Cup in 1993-94: their first season. Barry Trotz, head coach of the 2018



Stanley Cup Champion Washington Capitals served as the bench boss, leading the Pirates to a 43-27-10 regular season mark and a six-game victory over the Moncton Hawks in the championship series. Trotz would serve as head coach until 1997. The Pirates returned to the Calder Cup Finals in 1995-96, but lost to the Rochester Americans in seven games. Although the Pirates would remain in Portland for ten more seasons, they would never make a return to the finals.

In the summer of 2005, the Pirates switched parent clubs from the Capitals to the Anaheim Ducks, an affiliation that would last for three seasons. In 2008, a new relationship began with the Buffalo Sabres that would last through the end of the 2010-11 season, after which the Sabres reunited with Rochester. The move ushered in the Phoenix Coyotes era, which spanned four seasons. During what would be their final season in Portland (2015-16), the Pirates were affiliated with the Florida Panthers. On May 4th, 2016, it was announced that the Pirates had been sold with intent to relocate the franchise. Less than two weeks later, the move to Springfield, Massachusetts became official.

## Maine Mariners, ECHL (2018-pres)

Pro hockey returned to the Cross Insurance Arena in 2018-19, two seasons after the departure of the Pirates. This third version of the Mariners is owned by Comcast Spectacor and operated on the business side by the Philadelphia Flyers, while serving as an affiliate club of the Boston Bruins and AHL’s Providence Bruins. For the first three seasons (the third of which the Mariners did not play due to the pandemic), they were affiliated with the New York Rangers and Hartford Wolf Pack. The Bruins affiliation was announced on June 30th, 2021.

The ECHL is the “Premier AA Hockey League,” boasting 26 teams across the U.S. and into Eastern Canada. Formerly short for “East Coast Hockey League,” the expansion into areas like Boise, Idaho, Salt Lake City, Utah, and Rapid City, South Dakota, made the ECHL decide to identify by its abbreviation only. The ECHL and AHL are the only minor leagues affiliated with the NHL. The ECHL was founded in 1988, celebrating its 30th anniversary in 2017-18. The league is split into four divisions (North, South, Central, Mountain) within two conferences (Eastern and Western) and its Championship trophy is the Kelly Cup. The Newfoundland Growlers captured the 2019 Cup in their first season of existence. The ECHL follows most of the rules and regulations of its two higher leagues, but plays with three forward lines instead of four – dressing just 18 players (goaltenders included) in a game (compared to 20 in the AHL and NHL). Roster size is 20, compared to 23 in the NHL. Players on ECHL rosters can have a contract with an NHL, AHL, or ECHL team. In 2019-20, the ECHL switched from five to seven minute overtime periods and instituted video review for goals in all arenas. The 2021-22 season saw the addition of the Trois-Rivieres Lions (Trois-Rivieres, Quebec) and the Iowa Heartlanders (Coralville, Iowa), while the Brampton Beast ceased operations. For the first time in five years, all 27 ECHL teams have an NHL affiliate.

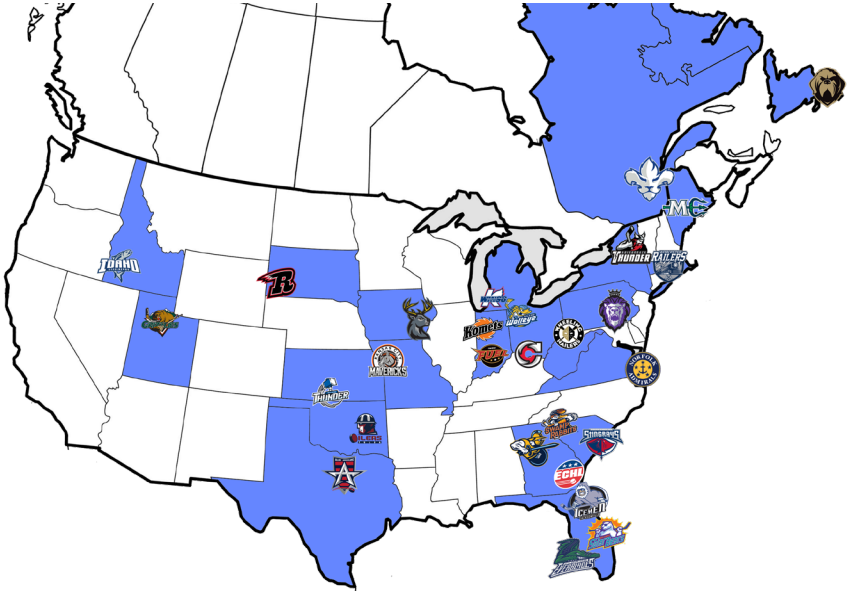

## **Jordan Binnington, G (Blues)**

One of the biggest stories of the 2019 Stanley Cup play-offs, rookie Binnington helped the Blues capture their first Cup, by beating the Bruins in seven games.

## **Tim Thomas, G (Bruins, Panthers, Stars)**

Thomas led the Bruins to a Stanley Cup Championship in 2010-11 and won the Vezina Trophy twice ('09 and '11).

## **Michael Ryder, F (Canadiens, Bruins, Stars, Devils)**

Ryder had five 50 point seasons in the NHL and five with 25 or more goals. He was also on the 2011 Bruins Stanley Cup team.

## **Jonathan Quick, G (Kings)**

Quick is a two time Cup champ with the Kings ('12 and '14) and a three time All-Star. He won the Conn Smyth Award (Playoff MVP) in 2012.

## **Braden Holtby, G (Capitals)**

Holtby led the Capitals to their first Stanley Cup in team history in 2018. He won the 2016 Vezina Trophy and is a three time All-Star.

## **Ruslan Fedetenko, F (Flyers, Lightning, Penguins, Rangers)**

Fedetenko is best known for his Stanley Cup Finals heroics, scoring both goals for the Lightning in their 2004 Game 7 win over the Calgary Flames. He won a second cup with the Penguins in 2009.

# THE STORY OF 2019-20

The remainder of this media guide contains information about the 2019-20 Mariners as well as the franchise record book and historical statistics. The Mariners did not participate in the 2020-21 ECHL season due to COVID-19, so below is a brief synopsis of what happened before the team was put on pause.

-Riley Armstrong was promoted to Assistant General Manager in the offseason of 2019, on top of his head coaching duties.

-The season got off to a similarly rocky start as 2018-19, with the Mariners dropping 5 of the first 7.

The Mariners hit their stride right before the holidays, winning 6 of 7 - five against Adirondack, whom the Mariners were chasing down in the standings.

-A season highlight came on Dec. 20 and 21 when they won back to back shootouts in Glens Falls to go into the holiday break with a play-off spot in hand.

-January was a grind - featuring a stretch of 8 games in 10 days. The Mariners went 3-4-1-0, but remained in a playoff spot heading into the All-Star break. Rookie forward Jake Elmer represented the Mariners at the All-Star festivities in Wichita, KS.

-On Feb. 11th, Alex Kile scored the game-winning overtime goal against Brampton at the Cross Insurance Arena, his third home OT winner of the 2019-20 season.

-Facing a daunting road trip to Newfoundland in mid-February, the Mariners became part of ECHL history, falling victim to the Growlers' record-setting 19th straight home win on Feb. 14. They would turn the tables on the Growlers by winning the final three games of the series, becoming the first team to ever hand them a trio of consecutive home defeats.

-On Mar. 10th, the Mariners drop their fourth in a row, a 3-2 home loss to the Norfolk Admirals, and ultimately the last game that was played at the Cross Insurance Arena in 2019-20.

-The team finishes with a final record of 32-26-3-1, and a magic number of 8 points to clinch a playoff spot, with 10 games left unplayed.
